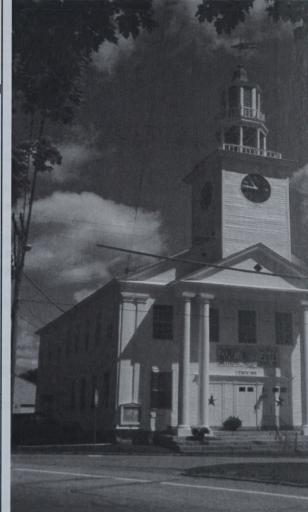

Gideon L. Nadeau, Sr. was a dedicated resident and public servant for the Town of Troy. This inspirational quotation could have been written for him and about him.

In putting this dedication together we have read over many letters, statements and testimonials from former Selectmen of both Troy and Fitzwilliam, Board heads, Commanders in the Army/Army Reserves and Superiors in the Department of Defense regarding his many accomplishments as a public servant, businessman, soldier and person in general. Since the 1970's Gideon participated in many committees and boards with the Town of Troy.

Town Budget Committee Planning Board - over 15 yrs. Planning Board Chairman – over 5 yrs. Chairman Youth Study Committee Chairman of Annual Art's Festival American Legion Head of Memorial Services Member of Industrial Development Committee Zoning Board Scout Master and Committee member Board of Selectman- on second 3 yr. term when he passed

Gideon's ability to lead others, to get them involved, direct them to sensible decisions and to recognize and solve problems were some of his strongest traits.

Years ago he was able to expand the youth program from 8 weeks a year to a year round scheduled program that involved a large percentage of the town's youth. With the help of Gary Jardine and other volunteers he started the first roller skating program that raised over \$30,000.00 towards building what is now known as the Samuel E. Paul Community Center. He refused to release those funds until the building was suitable enough to hold functions and not just a snack shack. Fortunately, he lived long enough to fulfill his dream thanks to the huge donation from Peter Paul in memory of his Father and longtime town doctor. As a side note, Gideon's birth certificate shows Dr. Samuel E. Paul was the doctor who delivered him at home in Marlborough.

Gid united people to work together, to give of their time and to accomplish painting the Town Hall for the Bicentennial, organizing the roast beef dinner to fix the heating table at the Samuel E. Paul Community Center and organized the town employees & committees' picnics, at no expense to the tax payers in his time as a Selectman. Gideon loved this town, the people and the employees with a passion. He really never had any agenda other than to try to keep the taxes down, get some of the much needed projects accomplished, to listen to everyone who called or stopped him, whether he agreed or not, and to try and make a difference. He was the go to guy for the employees and felt that you treat them right and they would do their jobs over and above. "A happy employee is a good employee" was his motto. He took his duties as Selectman very responsibly because he represented his fellow citizens and was the voice of reason that every town needs to have at some point. Even though Gideon was vilified and called names by some, he was praised by others in the town and local newspaper because he felt it was in the best interest of the townspeople to open up and let EVERYONE know what was really going on with the Troy Mill issue. He never wavered or backed down from his conviction of "What is right is right and what is wrong is wrong".

One former Selectman noted that "Gideon was an active man who continually strived to improve his knowledge and was active in the betterment of programs for all the townspeople." It was also noted that "he was available to any type of emergency and donated both his time and energy to any town project that came up."

While the town and its committees were a large part of Gideon's life, he wore more hats then most people do in a life time, sometimes all at the same time, receiving praise from both his co-workers and superiors.

Over the years, up until the end, he was involved in some business venture or another. Gid's Garage, Tamarack Farm, Grain and Garden Supplies, Troy Country Store, U-Haul Rep., Gid's Plowing and Sanding Services and last but not least, Gid's Handyman Services.

He served in the Army and Army reserves, with honor, for 32 yrs. and 28 yrs. with the Dept. of Defense. At one point he drove from Troy every day back and forth to Ft. Devens, Mass. This was after milking his 29 cows and taking care of his other animals including horses. After his day was done he came home to do it all over again.

He served as a Shop leader to over 25 mechanics and finished out those years as the Unit Administrator, at the Reserve Center in Keene, overseeing over 160 other Reservists' files, pay and all their benefits, programs, problems etc. He was pointed out to be a "highly effective and skillful Instructor".

"His initiative, leadership, dependability, perseverance and the ability to communicate effectively with subordinates and supervisors" was noted more than once. "He was able to communicate to individuals or large gatherings with ease and clarity."

When he retired from the service and his civil service jobs, on the same day because he turned 60 yrs. old, he received plaques and mugs stating he was the best UA and Sgt. First Class that they ever had. His fellow Reservists called him Ole' Crusty, Gramps and Sarge, but, they also knew that he treated everyone equal and if they messed up they were held accountable for it.

If nothing else is ever said about Gideon L. Nadeau, Sr., it would be, he was hardworking, strong willed, felt that "one hand washed the other", a handshake sealed the deal and that he was a great friend, neighbor and husband. He was a workaholic, honest, funny, caring and had a warm heart for all animals and most people alike.

She was the first face you would see when you walked in the door at Kimball Hall. As supervisor of the checklist for many years; Margaret was also the first face you would see when you walked in to vote for your candidate of choice at the polling station. She also did that with a smile and a good word. She was a large supporter of the town and her church, The Trinitarian Congregational Church

These are the things everyone in town knew about Margaret; but there are things you may not have known. She was married to her husband Ralph (whom you also see working the polls as well as working in the town hall) for 60 years. She had five children, three boys, two girls. She was so proud of them and her nine grandchildren and three great great-grandchildren. For her, family was the most important part of her life. If there was any type of function going on with them, she was there with laughter and love.

she played steel drums; and loved every minute of it; but not just for the music; but for the fellowship with other people who had the same interest. She was a great friend who would be there for you thru thick and thin. She would sing your praises to everyone, but was very humble when it came to herself.

She never learned to drive, so when she would get a call, saying "I'm going here today; would you like to go?" Her answer would most always be, "give me a few minutes to change my clothes and I'll be ready by the time you get here." She loved to shop, but mostly because she loved the social part of the adventure; not only with the person she was shopping with; but she would most always run in to someone she knew, either from the town or from NGM Insurance Co. where she worked for 35 yrs. No one could ever say that Margaret Heald couldn't stick to something.

For me, the writer of this dedication; she was my shopping buddy, my dearest friend; my cheerleader; my councilor. For many things she was the "wind beneath my wings;" and I shall always miss her and I will always hold a special place in my heart for Margaret E. Heald. The people of the town may miss her at the Senior center and the polls, as well as the common where she either worked a table for the seniors or for her church; and I shall also miss her for those reasons; but most of all I miss her for loyal friendship.

The Selectmen's office would like to say that with the passing of longtime town resident Margaret Heald (January 2015) and Selectman Gideon Nadeau (September 2015), the Town has lost two dedicated and caring individuals and they are surely missed.

2015 was a year of transition in the Selectmen's office. We are all aware of the act of betrayal by a long time town employee which was the cause of this transition. Even with this sad act there were several individuals that stepped up to keep the Town running in some sort of order. The Selectmen's office would like to thank those individuals.

A big thank you to all of our volunteers who serve on Boards, Committees or helped with the painting of the Town Hall. A special thank you to Marcia and Gideon Nadeau for spearheading this project. Like always, there are opening on boards and committees and I urge you all to get involved. If you are interested in serving, please contact the Selectmen's office.

It was an honor for me to be elected to the Select Board and to have worked with Tom, Gideon and now Allan Bailey. During this time the Selectmen hired Alissa Fox as the Administrative Assistant/ Welfare Officer.

This past year the Selectmen have worked very hard to help make it possible for home owners who were in arears with property taxes to be able to keep their property. We also appointed a new Troy Redevelopment Group which has since been dissolved through the filing of bankruptcy. The Selectmen have elected to eliminate the PA-28 Inventory of Taxable Property forms effective for 2016. Our road agent (Jim Dicey) is in the process of working with the Department of Environmental Services to obtain a permit to dredge the beach area at the Samuel Paul Recreational Center. The dredging will be completed at no cost to tax payers as the funds are being given by Peter Paul in the amount of \$25,000.00. We have seen our tax rate drop from \$35.10 per thousand to \$32.11 per thousand. The Selectmen are asking that we be frugal with our spending in order to help maintain a lower tax rate. While I am on the subject of a lower tax rate, I would urge everyone to vote for the default budget for the School Department this year.

TOWN TREASURER

The Town of Troy is in fairly good financial condition. The town ended 2015 with an 8% surplus retention. We have three long-term debts. The Town receives 20% back each year on the landfill long-term debt, 30% on the Sewer Upgrade and 30% on the Water upgrade. Our general fund balance (cash-on-hand) this year ended with a small decrease from 2014.

We have three outstanding bonds, Landfill until 2020, Sewer Upgrade until 2027 and Water Upgrade until 2029.

We have two lease/purchases, (1) for the Police Cruiser until 2017 and (1) for the Highway Dept. Dump Truck until 2019.

The town funded the Capital Reserve Funds this year for the Fire, Highway, Highway & Streets, Police Dept., and Reassessment. We also funded the Expendable Trust Fund for General Government Buildings, and Samuel E Paul War Memorial. We have a Special Revenue Fund for the Troy Transfer Station/Recycling which is funded by the sale of bags, CD dumpster fees and the sale of recyclables. This fund purchases the bags, equipment, doing any renovations and a portion is used against the landfill long-term debt.

The Town did not have to borrow any money this year in lieu of receiving taxes.

The Monadnock Regional School District portion of the tax rate decreased this year due to surplus that was applied against their appropriation.

The Cheshire County net appropriation came in slightly lower than 2014 due to the lowering of the equalization valuation.

We had an decrease in the town portion of the tax rate due to an increase of revenues and using \$125,000 in surplus.

Article 2 - Zoning Amendments

1. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #1 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Troy Zoning Ordinance?

To Amend Article XXI - Definitions, as follows: #32 Non-Conforming uses-Means an existing building, use or lot that was lawful at the time of the adoption, revision or amendment of this ordinance, but does not conform to the present requirements of the zoning district in which it is located.

Specifically it means:

a. A building or structure that does not meet the setback requirements of the district.

b. A use that is not permitted in the district.

c. A lot that does not meet either the lot size, dimension and/or frontage requirements of the district.

The nonconformiity may be related to any one of the above, or any combination thereof. Having one particular non-comformity does not render the entire property non-conforming. The relevant provisions of Article XIII shall apply to the particular circumstances of the property.

The purpose of this amendment is to better define the three different types of non-conformities and clarify that a property may contain a single or multiple non-conformity.

2 Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #2 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Troy Zoning Ordinance?

To Amend Article XIII,C2. as follows: C. Non-Conforming Lots of Record (Grandfather Clause)

2. Any non-conforming lot may be enlarged, even though the enlargement does not make the lot conforming.

The purpose of this amendment is to clarify that any non-conforming lot not only vacant lots, may be enlarged without needing to meet the current lot size for the district.

Article 4 - Landfill Bond Payment

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **(\$91,006)** for the annual bond payment for closing the town landfill, and to authorize the withdrawal of **\$40,000** from the Transfer Station/Recycling Center Special Revenue Fund to offset this expense. The balance of \$51,006 is to be funded by taxation. The Board of Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

Article 5 - Highway Block Grant

Article 7 - Cemetery Maintenance Trust & Perpetual Care Trust Deposits

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of (\$600.00) to deposit \$200.00 in the Cemetery Maintenance Expendable Trust Fund, and to deposit \$400.00 in the Cemetery Perpetual Care Trust Fund, from the sale of cemetery lots in 2015, deposited in the unreserved fund balance (surplus). The Board of Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

Article 8 - Police Department Cruiser Payment

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **(\$8,475)** for the 3rd year payment on the lease, and to authorize the withdrawal of said amount from the Police Department Capital Reserve Fund to offset this expense The Board of Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

Article 9 - Highway Department Lease Payment

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **(\$16,995)** for the 2nd year payment on the lease, and to authorize the withdrawal of **(\$10,000.00)** from the Highway Capital Reserve Fund to offset this expense. The Board of Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

Article 10 - Transfer Station Bags

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **(\$4,512)** to purchase transfer station bags and to authorize the withdrawal of said amount from the Transfer Station/Recycling Center Special Revenue Fund, to offset this expense. The Board of Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

Article 11 - Highway Department Tow Behind Sweeper

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **(\$20,000)** to purchase a sweeper and to authorize the withdrawal of said amount from the Highway Capital Reserve Fund, to offset this expense. The Board of Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

Article 12 - Highway Department Capital Reserve Fund Deposit.

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **(\$10,525)** to be deposited in the Highway Capital Reserve Fund This amount to come from the unreserved fund balance (surplus) representing the amount received in sale of highway equipment in 2015. The Board of Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

Article 13 - Richmond Road Paving

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **(\$140,000)** to resurface all of Richmond Road. The amount estimated to resurface is \$180,000, but will be using \$40,000 from the Highway Block Grant received from the State in 2016, with the above appropriation. If this article is not passed the Highway Dept. is asking that the following article be considered. The Board of Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

Article 14 - Richmond Road - 1.2 miles

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **(\$50,000)** to resurface 1.2 miles of the Richmond Road. The amount estimated to resurface 1.2 miles is \$90,000, but will be using \$40,000 from the Highway Block Grant received from the state in 2016, with the above appropriation. **Pass over this article if the above article passes**. The Board of Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

Article 15 - Phillips Heart Start Machines

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of (\$1,905) to purchase (3) Heart Start Machines for the Town Hall, Community Center and the Police Department. The Board of Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

Article 16 - 2016 4x4 Police Truck Cruiser-5 Year Lease

To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into a Long-Term lease/purchase agreement for a 2016 SSV 4X4 Truck Cruiser in the amount of (\$41,725) and to raise and appropriate the sum of **(8,783.14)** for the 1st Payment due December, 2016 and to authorize the withdrawal of said amount from the Police Department Capital Reserve Fund. Annual Payments will be payable over the term of the next 4 years. **2/3 Majority Vote Required.** The Board of Selectmen recommend this appropriation. Non-recommended by the Budget Committee.

Article 17 - Emergency Management 2015 Unexpended Appropriation

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **(\$2,378)** to be deposited in the Emergency Management Expendable Trust Fund. This amount is to come from the unreserved fund balance (surplus), representing the unexpended balance of the Emergency Management 2015 operating budget. The Board of Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

Article 18 - Kimball Hall Furnace

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of (\$3,800) for a new furnace at Kimball Hall. The Board of Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

Article 19 - Water/Sewer Department Operations

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **(\$405,108)** for Water/Sewer Department operations. Income comes from the collection of water and sewer rents. The Board of Commissioners and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

Article 20 - Capital Reserve Fund Deposits

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **(\$75,000)** to deposit in the Capital Reserve Funds as specified.

In 2015 the Fire Department responded to 229 calls for service, up by 146 calls from the previous year.

The Department would like to thank all of the men and women that dedicate a tremendous amount of time throughout the year, to training and maintaining the equipment and the apparatus so it is ready for whatever they may face at the next call. In 2015 the Fire Department purchased a few hose fittings , new nozzle,2 Altair four gas meters,2 four inch hydrant valves, 4 ladder belts, 1000 ft. of four inch hose and two class A uniforms. Due to the high volume of calls the department was not able to purchase some of the items that need to be replaced so we could stay within our budget.

The Fire Department purchased a 2001 HME 75' Ladder truck with funds appropriated by capital reserve from New England Fire Equipment and Apparatus. The truck was completely repainted and lettered and a ladder and pump certification was done and other miscellaneous items repaired. The department would like to thank everyone for the time spent searching for a ladder truck that would fit our needs and price range. The department would like to thank Chief Huntoon, Deputy Carter, Captain Hebert, Firefighter Holman and Firefighter Huntoon for taking the time to go to Connecticut to look at the truck and to go back to pick it up when it was ready.

The Department does a quarterly training with Fitzwilliam, Richmond and Royalston that is put on by FETC fire training, the cost is split by the four towns.

The Department signed a mutual aid assist agreement with Fitzwilliam Fire to help each town with the low personnel volume especially during the day time, the departments are toned at the same time for fire calls and Troy is toned on a re-tone to assist the Fitzwilliam Ambulance. The Department has 25 firefighters right now, which is up from last from years if you are interested please stop by or contact one of us to have a look around the fire house and ask any questions.

I would like to thank all of the men and women for all of their time throughout the year whether it is day or night to respond to calls, training and all of the other nights of meetings and maintance on the building and all Department owned equipment. It has been a pleasure working with everyone over the past year.

The Forestry Division responded to ten forestry related calls in Troy and eight mutual aid forestry calls (Richmond four calls, Keene one call, Roxbury one call, Winchendon one call and Athol one call) throughout the 2015 year.

The Forestry Division would like to thank the Deputy Wardens and all of the fire fighters for their help and hard work through the year.

The Forestry Division received a 50/50 grant threw the Division of Forest and Lands. The items that were purchased thru the grant where one 1 ½ " high pressure pump,4 wildland shirts, 4 wildland nomex pants,7 pair wildland gloves,2 combination tools and 2 fire rake cutting tools.

If you obtain a seasonal fire permit or a permit for the day please check the fire danger rating for the day at nhdfl.org and if the danger is a class three or higher we would request that you not burn. Failing to totally extinguish any fire before leaving it makes you liable for any cost that may accrue from it.

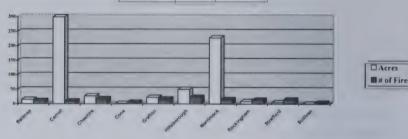

Report of Forest Fire Warden and State Forest Ranger

Your local Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department, and the State of New Hampshire Division of Forests & Lands, work collaboratively to reduce the risk and frequency of wildland fires in New Hampshire. To help us assist you, please contact your local Forest Fire Warden or Fire Department to determine if a permit is required before doing <u>ANY</u> outside burning. Under State law (RSA 227-L:17) a fire permit sequired for all outside burning, unless the ground is completely covered with snow. The ability to obtain fire permits on line was initiated in 2015. Approximately 120 towns participated in the online system with over 4,000 permits issued. To obtain a permit on line visit <u>www.NHfrepermit.com.The</u> New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services also prohibits the open burning of household waste. Citizens are encouraged to contact the local fire department or DES at 603-271-3503 or <u>www.des.nh.gov</u> for more information. Safe open burning requires diligence and responsibility. Help us to protect New Hampshire's forest resources. For more information please contact the Division of Forests & Lands at (603) 271-2214, or online at www.nhdfl.org.

This past fire season burned **661 acres** which was the most recorded since 1989 when 629 acres burned. The fire season began in early April with the first reported fire occurring on April 8th. The largest fire was the 275 acre Bayle Mountain fire in Ossipee. This fire started on May 5th and burned for several days. The Bayle Mt. fire was also the largest individual fire in NH in over 25 years. There were also a number of other sizable fires in May which definitely kept NH's wildland firefighting resources stretched to the limit. These larger fires increased the average wildland fire size to 5.12 acres. As usual our higher fire danger days correlated well with the days that there were fires actually reported. The statewide system of 16 fire lookout towers continues to operate on Class III or higher fire danger days. Our fire lookouts are credited with keeping most fires small and saving several structures due to their quick and accurate spotting capabilities. The towers fire spotting capability was supplemented by the NH Civil Air Patrol when the fire danger was especially high. Many homes in New Hampshire are located in the wildland urban interface, which is the area where homes and flammable wildland fuels intermix. Several of the fires during the 2015 season threatened structures, and a few structures were burned, a constant reminder that forest fires burn more than just trees. Homeowners should take measures to prevent a wildland fire from spreading to their home. Precautions include keeping your roof and gutters clear of leaves and pine needles, and maintaining adequate green space around your home free of flammable materials. For Annual Town Report 2015 Monadnock Advisory Commission

The Monadnock Advisory Commission was created by State Statute and is charged to advise and guide the Department of Resources and Economic Development on the management of lands on Monadnock, Gap and Little Monadnock Mountains. State law allows the Commission to accept tax deductible donations. MAC is a primary source for search and rescue supplies and equipment.

At MAC meetings held on February 5th and November 12th at the Jaffrey Civic Center, State Park Manager Elizabeth Kintz reported on attendance and income, trail conditions and upkeep. Phil Bryce, Director of Parks informed us of plans for improvements to Park infrastructure. Peter Palmiotto, Antioch University gave updates on the MERE Project

(Monadnock Ecological Research & Education Project). Carrie Deegan,

SPNHF reported on the 10th Annual Trail week projects completed and how the 2014 Trails Assessment guided the focus.

During last winter's heavy snow season, much of the Park staff' time was spent cleaning up from the previous storm, preparing for the next, and making sure hikers were prepared for the conditions.

Mid-April saw a visitation increase as the winter's snow melted. As the weather improved, the high use trend continued through the summer, into the fall and all the way through the end of the year. Columbus Day weekend saw some of the highest visitation numbers in the park's history. The three staffed trailheads (Head-Quarters, Gilson Pond Area and the Old Toll Road) saw over 8,000 visitors over the course of the weekend. The year's attendance at those same trailheads totaled 120,000. Fees paid via Iron Rangers at the unmanned trailheads Dublin and Marlborough indicate nearly 700 additional hikers .

The Monadnock State Park staff responded to 21 search & rescues requiring a total of 241 staff hours (the longest taking over 12 hours to resolve). Some of these calls required coordination with NH Fish & Game,DHART, Jaffrey-Rindge Memorial Ambulance Service, Jaffrey Fire & Rescue, area Police Departments, and other rescue organizations.

Troy Historical Society

The Troy Historical Society members began 2015 working with the Bicentennial Committee planning and fundraising for Troy's 200th birthday. Once the celebration was over it was time to turn our efforts back to planning the future of Kimball Hall and the society.

Kimball Hall was closed until April of 2015, the Senior Citizens Group had moved to the new community building, and the big black stove had been moved out of the Kimball kitchen. The electricity and water were turned on and we began making plans to move some of the historical collection downstairs.

A water leak was discovered in the kitchen causing damage to part of the floor and walls. Work has begun to remedy that problem and help make the kitchen more energy efficient.

In the fall, we worked to winterize the building by closing storm windows, and covering some windows with plastic. Also, we put weather stripping around the doors hoping these efforts would save on heat.

We received many donations to the museum. Judy Moran donated several items belonging to her relatives such as a "Crazy Quilt" which is over a hundred years old and a pink tea set that her aunt had brought back from England after WWII. Dave Smith of the "Ole Time Trading Post" donated a large photo of Mt. Monadnock. Dennis Poirier donated several WWII military items belonging to Louis Lagrenade, his great-uncle, teaching materials that belonged to his grandmother, Dorothy Lagrenade, and some Boy Scouts items.

We had several requests to use the materials at the museum for research. One researcher was looking for information on the Mill, others were looking to trace family members. The old town reports came in handy.

The members of the Society would like to thank all those who have helped us have another successful year in "Preserving the Past for Tomorrow."

TROY PLANNING BOARD

The Planning Board's regulatory duties, based on NH RSA 673, include the review and approval of subdivisions, lot line adjustments, and site plan review applications. The Board is also charged with maintaining a Master Plan (last revised in 2007) and other ordinances and policies that purposefully guide land use in Town.

In 2015, the Planning Board had a fairly quiet year in terms of subdivision and site plan review applications, overseeing the approval of only one two-lot subdivision application and holding one preliminary conceptual consultation. However, our attention and efforts were engaged in other areas: participating in conference and instruction on planning and zoning law, learning about and providing comment on the Northeast Energy Direct natural gas pipeline proposal, writing to New Hampshire Department of Transportation about the status of the Route 12 Bypass, and working with Southwest Region Planning Commission to improve safe mobility for people of all ages (including walking and biking). This last item in particular is something we will continue to work on in 2016. Expect to hear more in an upcoming edition of Troy Town News.

Membership of the Planning Board during 2015 included Jon Collins (Vice Chair), Francis Fournier (Chair), Curtis Hopkins, Robert Luopa, Janet McCullough (Alternate), Tom Matson (Selectmen's Representative, Gideon Nadeau (Selectmen's Representative), and Henry Underwood (Secretary).

To schedule a meeting, inquire about an existing ordinance, or locate an application form or other document, please contact the Planning Board Clerk. As a reminder, we meet the first and third Wednesdays at Town Hall at 7 p.m. All meeting are open to the public. Consider joining us for a meeting, as a member, or, as an alternate. Filling vacancies in membership can occur throughout the year, not just at election time.

TROY WATER AND SEWER DEPARTMENT

In the year 2015, the Troy Water and Sewer Department had a busy start with several frozen water services do to a very cold winter and frost as deep as 6 feet. As the temperature started to rise we were out replacing services around town as needed and we replaced 2 fire hydrants on Fitzwilliam Rd. The Water and Sewer Department also applied for a grant from the NHDES to do a leak detection survey as part of our water conservation plan.

The Wastewater Plant was busy as well making sure that we meet the NPDES permit. As part of the NPDES permit we submitted a Collection system O&M plan and we also revised our sewer ordinance. Also as part of or NPDES permit we are required to submit a map of our sewer system in digital format. So to cut cost in having an outside company GIS the system we are doing it ourselves using an app called Water PointNnetwork. It will also allow us to map the water system.

The Water and Sewer Commissioners meet on the second Wednesday of each month at 5:00 p.m., unless otherwise posted. If you have any concerns, problems or questions, you are welcome to attend any meeting, and we will try to accommodate you in any way we can. Richard read the results of the voting from yesterday and stated that any time after Friday, the elected people need to go to the Town Clerk's office to get sworn in.

Article 2 - Zoning Amendments

1. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #1 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Troy Zoning Ordinance?

To amend Article XIV. Paragraph C (3) by revising subparagraph c (now renumbered as e) of the variance criteria and reorganize the remaining four criteria as follows (**bold Italic is new language**)?

C 3. Variance:

- a. The variance will not be contrary to the public interest.
- b. The variance is consistant with the spirit of the ordinance.
- c. Substantial justice is done by granting the variance.
- d. The values of surrounding properties will not be diminished.
- e. Literal enforcement of the provisions of the ordinance would result in unnecessary hardship. For the purpose of this subparagraph, "unnecessary hardship" means that, owing to special conditions of the property that distinguish it from other properties in the area.
 - I. No fair and substancial relationship exists between the general public purposes of the ordinance provisions and the specific application of that provision to the property, AND
 - II. The proposed use is a reasonable one.

If the criteria in subparagraph C are not established an unnecessary hardship will be deemed to exist if and only, owing to special conditions of the property that distinguish it from other properties in the area, the property cannot be reasonably used in strict conformance with the ordinance, and a variance is therefore necessary to enable a reasonable use of it.

The purpose of this amendment is to incorporate recent state legislation regarding variances criteria into the Zoning Ordinance

2 Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #2 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Troy Zoning Ordinance to add a new paragraph F. to Article XIV - Board of Adjustment as follows?

> F. Duration of Approvals: All approvals granted for any special exceptions or variances shall be valid if exercised within (2) years from the date of approval, unless further extended by the Zoning Board for good cause.

The purpose of this amendment is to incorporate recent state legislation regarding duration of approvals into the Troy Zoning Ordinance.

For such proposals the Board may waive certain performance standards of this ordinance and site plan review submission items that would not apply if no new construction or ground disturbance are being proposed.

Collocation and/or modification applications shall be reviewed for conformance with applicable building permit requirements, but shall not otherwise be subject to zoning or land use requirements, including design or placement requirements, or public hearing review, according to the procedure outlined in RSA 12-A:10.

The purpose of this amendment is to incorporate recent state legislation regarding the application procedure for collacation and modifications into the Troy Zoning Ordinancwe.

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sume of **(\$91,006**) for the annual bond payment for closing the town landfill, and to authorize the withdrawal of \$31,000 from the Transfer Station/Recycling Center Special Revenue Fund to offset this expense. The balance of \$60,000 is to be funded by taxation. The Board of Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

PASSED AS PRESENTED

Article 5 - Highway Block Grant

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **(\$48,064)** for the maintenance, construction and re-construction of Class IV and V highways to be offset by the State of NH Highway Block Grant Program. The Board of Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

PASSED AS PRESENTED

Article 6 - Cemetery Operating Budget

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **(\$27,953)** for the care of cemeteries and to authorize the withdrawal of \$26,338

proportionately from the Cemetery Maintenance Expendable Trust and the Cemetery Perpetual Care Trust Funds. The balance of \$1,615 to be funded by taxation. The Board of Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

PASSED AS PRESENTED

Article 7 - Technology Improvements

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **(\$25,000)** to network the Emergency Service Building and the Town Hall and to replace the server and the computers in the Police Department, and the Selectmen's Office. The Board of Selectmen recommends this appropriation. Not Recommended by the Budget Committee.

Article 8 - Cemetery Maintenance Trust & Perpetual Care Trust Deposits To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of (\$600.00) to deposit \$200.00 in the Cemetery Maintenance Expendable Trust Fund, and to deposit \$400.00 in the Cemetery Perpetual Care Trust Fund, from the sale of cemetery lots in 2014, deposited in the unreserved fund balance (surplus). The Board of Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this Approp.

PASSED AS PRESENTED

Article 9 - Cemetery Lots not under Perpetual Care

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **(\$27,032)** to purchase perpetual care for those cemetery lots that are not presently covered by perpetual care. The investment will permit the town to cover the regular cemetery maintenance with income from the cemetery trust funds and have no future impact on taxation. The Board of Cemetery Trustees Trustees of Trust Fund, and the Budget Committee recommends this appropriation.

Amended to add after perpetual care, this amount is from taxation.

PASSED AS AMENDED

Article 10 - Recreation Revolving Fund

To see if the town will vote to establish a Recreation Revolving Fund pursuant to **RSA 35-B:2,II**. The money received from fees and charges for recreation park services and facilities shall be allowed to accumulate from year to year and shall not be considered to be part of the general fund unassigned fund balance. The treasurer shall have custody of all monies in the fund and shall pay out the same only upon order of the recreation director. These funds may be expended only for recreation purposes as stated in RSA 35-B, and no expenditure shall be made in such a way as to require the expenditures of other funds that have not been appropriated for that purpose.

PASSED AS PRESENTED

Article 11 - Recreation Revolving Fund Deposit

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **(\$300.00)** to be deposited in the Recreation Revolving Fund. This amount is to come from the unreserved fund balance (surplus), representing the amount received in 2014 from the Keene Rotary Club for the roller skating program. The Board of Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

PASSED AS PRESENTED

Article 12 - Samuel E. Paul War Memorial Expendable Trust Fund
