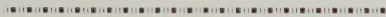

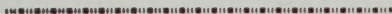

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Temple in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Temple on Tuesday, the 14th day of March, next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same.
3. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of highways for Summer period, \$5,500.00.
4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Bridges, \$500.00.
5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for snow removal, \$4,000.00.
6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for oiling roads, \$1,000.00.
7. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for the improvement of Class V roads and raise and appropriate the sum of \$630.00 and the State will contribute \$4,200.02.
8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of calcium chloride or dust layer, \$300.00.
9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day, said sum to be handled under the auspices of the Day, Quinn, Blood Ex-Service Men's Association, \$250.00.
10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Temple Volunteer Fire Department, \$500.00 for current expense and \$500.00 for a Capital Reserve Fund, said sum to be turned over to the Treasurer of the Town, \$1,000.00.

11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Library, \$870.00.

12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Old Age Assistance, \$2,000.00.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for the purchase of the small tract of land of Alvin W. Holt containing one-third of an acre and adjoining to the north and west the land upon which the Town Barns are situated in Temple Village, for use in conjunction with said Town Barns, or to take any other action relating thereto, \$150.00.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$77.00 (1/100 of 1% of the valuation of the town) to the Monadnock Region Association of Southwestern New Hampshire for issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising, and by other means calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the Town, in cooperation with the other thirty-seven towns of the Monadnock Region.

15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of Taxes not exceeding the sum of \$20,000.00.

16. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the local Civil Defense Organization, \$100.00.

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$25.00 to be expended in cooperation with the New Hampshire Forestry and Recreation Commission for opening and maintaining of trails and old roads for forest fire protection. The New Hampshire Forestry and Recreation Commission to provide a matching sum not in excess of \$25.00 for this purpose, \$25.00.

18. To see if the Town will vote to raise or borrow money for the purpose of building a new Town Shed for housing Road Agent's Machinery and Equipment.

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for the salary and expenses of the Police Department, \$300.00.

20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for a Capital Reserve Fund for Road Machinery.

21. To see what action the Town wishes to take in regard to the hour of holding the Annual Town Meeting.

22. To see what sum of money the Town will raise or borrow for an adequate water supply system for the School, to be under the jurisdiction of the School Board after completion.

23. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for Road Machinery repair and maintenance.

24. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for inside painting of Town Hall.

25. To transact any further business which may legally come before the meeting.

Mansfield Public Library has been especially honored this year. Mr. Karl W. Bigelow, in memory of his wife, has formed a Margaret Johnson Bigelow Memorial Fund for the benefit of the library. There is \$559.00 in the fund at present, of which \$50.00 is to be used yearly and exclusively for new books including something of note on Africa.

There have been many fine books presented during the year. The contributors were: Mr. Clark Woodward, Mrs. Alberta Hagar, Elaine & Estelle Sheldon, Mrs. Muriel Hyde, Mrs. Carl Von Sneider, Mrs. Lynn Barber, Mrs. Ruth Weston, Mrs. Barbara Headman. Very much appreciated was the gift subscription of the American Heritage magazine given by Mr. and Mrs. Harry Stratton. The number of new books purchased or given our library was 73 adult's and 96 children's, being a total of 169 books.

A total of 3674 books were circulated this year. Adult Non Fiction circulated 603 books and 413 Fiction, and Children's were 678 Non Fiction and 1980 books of Fiction.

During National Library Week a film program was given by our state library consultant Mrs. William Hopkins. SCHOOL WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of Temple qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Temple Public School in said district on the ninth day of March 1961, at eight o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

9. To see if the district will vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the district the benefits of Title II of the Federal Social Security Act (Old Age and Survivors insurance) as authorized by Chapter 101 of the Revised Statutes Annotated Amended by Chapter 301 and 332 of the Laws of 1955, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$18.00 to defray the district's share of the cost thereof.

10. If Article 9 is passed to see if the district wishes to exclude from the plan services in any class or classes of positions, the compensation for which is on a fee basis.

11. If Article 9 is passed, to see if the district wishes to exclude from the plan services in any class or classes of positions filled by popular election.

12. If a plan for Social Security coverage is adopted, to see if the district will authorize the school board to execute on behalf of the town the necessary agreement with the State of New Hampshire to carry into effect the plan and to see if the district will designate the school treasurer as the officer to be responsible for the administration of the plan.

13. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Temple, I respectfully submit my fourth annual report as your Superintendent of Schools:

Staff and Instruction

The Temple school opened this year with two changes in teaching personnel. The changes were brought about by the retirement of Mrs. Alice Hammond who had for many years taught in grades four and five at the school. The second vacancy occurred when Mrs. Jennie Bracey found it impossible to fulfill the requirements of full time teaching due to a severe illness which occurred late in the summer. Miss Helen Stone continues as Principal of the building and this year has been teaching grades four, five and six. The School Board was extremely fortunate in being able to employ very capable and interested teachers to fill these vacancies. In the primary room, Mrs. Frank Yeaw, of Milford, a graduate of Lake Erie College, Ohio, with additional study at St. Lawrence University in Canton, New York, was hired to teach. She has had experience in physical education work which was her major field at St. Lawrence University, and also at the Y.W.C.A. in Columbus, Ohio. During the past year, she filled a position as a teachers' aid at the Garden Street School in Milford. The teaching position for handling grades seven and eight was filled by Mrs. Jeannette Collins, of Wilton. Mrs. Collins is a graduate of Tufts College, with nine hours of additional study in the education field on extension from the University of New Hampshire. Mrs. Collins has done a considerable amount of substitute teaching in Union #63 for the past several years. The Board has been extremely fortunate in filling out the staff with two such qualified, conscientious and dedicated teachers.

The other positions at the school continue to be filled as they have in the past: Miss Ethelyn Edwards continues as Music Supervisor; Dr. Claire Cayward as School Doctor; Mrs. Laila Luhtala as School Nurse; and Mrs. Kenneth Gibbs as Noon Lunch Manager. Custodian services continue to be supervised by Miss Stone with the cooperation and help of the children of the upper rooms of the school.

The difficulties in finding good teachers to work in multiple-graded rooms grows more acute each year. A three grade load for a single teacher creates a feeling of inadequacy and frustration, very difficult to resolve. Even under ideal conditions, wonderful children, cooperative and understanding parents and Board, the conscientious teacher looks to a single grade teaching situation as the ideal to be sought.

Temple probably is going to be on the fringe of having difficulties in finding and holding good teachers until it can become part of a unit large enough to provide single grade teaching situations. A really stable, steady, educational system cannot be developed until such an administrative unit becomes a reality.

The use of the Science Research Associates Elementary Reading Laboratory, put into effect this year, is doing much to improve the individual reading ability of children in grades four through eight. This individualized program puts children under pressure to read rapidly and also to read with full comprehension. The program is set up so that each child competes with himself and tries during each practice period to do better than he has done in his previous reading experience. All children in the rooms are reading on an individual basis at levels which they find to be most suitable to their individual skills and abilities.

You will be pleased to know that a very careful analysis of annual achievement test results shows that the Temple children are making excellent academic progress when compared with children throughout the country. On the average, over a year of academic growth took place during the past school year. Further analysis shows that achievement at every grade level is at or beyond that which could be expected from intelligence test scores. In other words, the children are making academic gains beyond those which would ordinarily be expected when compared with their intellectual abilities. A comparison with results tabulated in 1955 shows that more children are achieving above the normal for them, than were in 1955. The sum and substance of this analysis of test results is a definite indication that children in the Temple school are being more than adequately educated in spite of the difficulties which are naturally associated with teaching in a small multiple-graded room school. As children have come into the school from other communities, comparisons have shown that local children more than measure up. This informal comparison is now supported by specific results showing excellent academic growth and achievement.

An opportunity for a day of outdoor education for children of the upper grades was made during the past fall through the cooperation of Mr. Waldo Stone, the Director of Camp Union in Greenfield. Due to the difficulties of transportation and the lack of cooperation of the weather, this day was not provided as scheduled, but it is hoped that this coming spring such a program will be put into effect. All of the other schools in the Union have participated

in this program and have found it to be extremely valuable and worthwhile. The things that the children learn first-hand in the outdoor education program can, through effort by the teacher, be incorporated into almost every academic area of the school, and children enter into this kind of study with unusual enthusiasm.

School Building and Grounds

During the past year, the ceiling was installed in the cafeteria area, completing a project that has been needed for many years. In the kitchen area, a sink which was obtained from War Surplus Property Division was installed. This replaced the single-tubbed sink, that the State Department of Health had reported as inadequate for many years.

In this year's budget, funds have been provided for bringing about an improvement that has been necessary ever since the addition to the original building. The present location of the furnace room is such that little air can get into the room, since both fire doors should be kept closed at all times for safety purposes. Even with the louvers on the doors, sufficient air is not available to insure that the fire will burn properly. This is a definite hazard and one that should have been corrected many years ago. The present budget calls for the installation of an air duct which goes from the boiler room through the teachers' room to a window.

Special Articles

A series of special articles is found in the Town Warrant relating to the offering of Old Age Survivors Insurance to workers in the school other than teachers, namely the noon lunch manager and at some time in the future perhaps a school custodian. Similar articles appeared in the Warrant in 1952 but no money was raised by article action nor was an agreement ever carried out with the State of New Hampshire. In order for such employees of the District to have the benefits of this insurance, necessary action must be taken at the School District Meeting.

Finance

The total appropriation for the year 1961-62 is \$41,140.38 which is an increase over the amount provided last year of \$5,864.50. School assessment comes to \$40,240.38 which is an increase over the school assessment set by the Tax Commission of \$5,904.50.

There are a few areas within the budget that are primarily responsible for this increase in school assessment. In item 6, an increase in teachers' salaries of \$615.00 is necessary if teachers who are presently on the staff are to be encouraged to continue to stay for another year. As it is, the salaries being paid teachers in Temple

is a very modest amount, when compared with communities of similar size in this part of New Hampshire. In item 14, an increase of \$522. is shown. This increase is being provided to more nearly bring into line the budgeted amount in this area with the actual expenditures that are being made each year. This increase includes the regular amount of money which is set aside for summer cleaning of the building, properly maintaining the building during the school year and also to take care of needed painting to keep the building in proper condition. The bulk of the increase in the school assessment is shown in Item 17 where an increase of \$4,560. is evident. This increase is brought about by an increase in the State's average cost for tuition at the high school level from \$399. this year to \$435. during the coming year. Twenty-six children are being budgeted for during this present year and thirty-four during the coming year. Item 18a, shows an apparent increase of School Lunch of \$200. This increase is not a true one, since in the income part of the budget one will find an income of \$200. which is anticipated from Federal Reimbursements to the noon lunch program. This change in accounting is one that has been recommended by the State Department of Education.

Conclusion

I wish to again express my appreciation to the Temple School Board, the teachers, and to the Citizens of Temple for their cooperation, understanding and assistance. Such attitudes have greatly aided me in carrying out my educational responsibilities.
