TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Temple in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Temple on Tuesday, the 13th day of March, next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for salary and expenses of Police Department.
3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for same.
4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of highways for Summer period. \$6,000.00.
5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for snow removal. \$4,000.00.
6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for oiling roads. \$600.00.
7. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for the improvement of Class V roads and raise and appropriate the sum of \$626.65 and the State will contribute \$4,177.69.
8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day, said sum to be handled under the auspices of the Day-Quinn-Blood Ex-Servicemen's Association. \$250.00.
9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Temple Volunteer Fire Department.
10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise or borrow for additional equipment or remodeling existing equipment of the Fire Department.

11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Library.

12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Old Age Assistance. \$2,000.00.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$78.00 (1/100 of 1% of the valuation of the Town) to the Monadnock Region Association of Southwestern New Hampshire for issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising, and by other means calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the Town, in cooperation with the other thirty-seven towns of the Monadnock Region.

14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of Taxes not exceeding the sum of \$20,000.00.

15. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Civil Defense Organization. \$100.00.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$25.00 to be expended in cooperation with the New Hampshire Forestry and Recreation Commission for opening and maintaining of trails and old roads for forest fire protection. The New Hampshire Forestry and Recreation Commission to provide a matching sum met in excess of \$25.00 for this purpose.

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise or borrow money for the purpose of building a new Town Shed for housing Road Agent's Machinery and equipment.

18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for a Capital Reserve Fund for Road Machinery.

19. To see what action the Town wishes to take relative to the election of Town Officers by Australian Ballot.

20. To see what action the Town wishes to take in regard to the hour of holding the Annual Town Meeting.

21. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Road Machinery repair and maintenance. \$600.00.

22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to be turned over to the Trustees of Trust Funds to be added to the Bicentennial Scholarship Fund and to continue this authorization from year to year until altered or rescinded at any future annual or special Town Meeting. \$100.00.

23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 to be turned over to the Trustees of Trust Funds to be added to the "Trust Fund for Year 2008" and to continue this authorization from year to year until altered or rescinded at any future annual or special Town Meeting. \$50.00.

24. To see if the Town will vote to approve the following rules and regulations for the guidance of the Trustees of Trust Funds in administering the Bicentennial Scholarship Fund:

RULES AND REGULATIONS

Bicentennial Scholarship Fund

It is the purpose of the Bicentennial Scholarship Fund to provide aid to Temple students who have completed their High School education and who wish to enter college, Teachers College, Nursing School or similar institution to further their education.

1. Awards from this Fund shall be determined by a committee of five, consisting of the three members of the Trustees of Trust Funds, a representative of the School from which the student is graduating, and one other to be selected by the Trustees.

2. Awards may be made only from interest or other earnings on the principal amount of the Fund and no award shall be made until the principal and accumulated earnings are of such amount as to reasonably guarantee continuance of an annual award of at least \$100.00.

3. In considering awards, first consideration should be given to students who, because of their financial situation, might not otherwise be able to attend College. Also, the High School record of the person being considered should be sufficiently high as to provide reasonable assurance that the student can complete a College course.

4. Actual payment of any award from this Fund shall be made at the end of the first Semester, directly to the College or other institution the student is attending and will continue to attend for the balance of that school year.

25. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for work to be done in the cemeteries of the Town during the ensuing year in addition to the regular application of fertilizer and grass cutting. \$500.00.

(Note: — For Selectmen and others who may be interested)

A real need exists for cutting certain trees which prevent the development of some areas for cemetery purposes, particularly in Miller Cemetery; other trees need trimming; some tilting stones need to be straightened; some stones need to be cleaned and as much grading and seeding should be done as funds will allow.

In addition we need a new supply of "perpetual care markers" and "flag holder markers" for many of the 84 graves of veterans of wars in which citizens of Temple have participated, e. g. Revolutionary War, 53, War of 1812, 7, Civil War, 13, Spanish American War, 1, World War I, 3 and World War II, 2.

26. To vote on the question of amending existing regulations respecting the supervision of cemeteries of the Town of Temple, by adoption of the following:

Voted, that all rules and regulations heretofore passed and adopted by the Town of Temple, N. H. at any regular or special Town Meeting, with respect to the care and maintenance of cemeteries of the Town be and the same are hereby rescinded and that the following statement of the "duties of Cemetery Trustees" and "rules and regulations" for the guidance of the Cemetery Trustees be and the same are hereby approved and adopted.

CEMETERY TRUSTEES

The Board of Trustees of Cemeteries of the Town of Temple, shall consist of three members, one of whom shall be a member of the Board of Selectmen, one to be a member of the Trustees of Trust Funds, (these two members to be appointed by their respective Boards) and the third member to be appointed by the Moderator at each annual Town meeting.

The Cemetery Trustees shall have charge of all cemetery work and they are authorized to expend such sums of money as become available for the care and improvement of the Cemeteries of the Town.

They shall establish such rules and regulations as are reasonable and necessary for each and all Cemeteries of the Town, and such rules and regulations shall become effective and binding after being presented to, and approved by any regular or special Town Meeting.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. In order to maintain as near the natural grade as possible, all grade lines will be established by the Cemetery Trustees.

2. All monuments and markers shall be located and set subject to approval of Cemetery Trustees.

3. **Charge for Miller Cemetery Lots.** Single lots may be assigned by the Cemetery Trustees to legal residents of the Town at no charge. For each additional lot requested and assigned a charge of \$10.00 will be made, payable to the Town at time of assignment. Non-residents may, upon written request to the Cemetery Trustees, be assigned a lot in Miller Cemetery upon payment of a charge of \$10.00 for each lot assigned.

4. **Internments.** All internments shall be made under the direction of Cemetery Trustees and the following fees shall be paid:

Summer Fee	Regular \$30.00
Winter Fee	Regular \$40.00

5. **Provision for care of Cemetery Lots.** Residents and Non-Residents who have made no provision for perpetual care of their lots may, through the Cemetery Trustees, arrange for such care by depositing with the Trustees of Trust Funds (Cemetery Lots Perpetual Care Fund) the sum of \$100.00 for each lot to be cared for. Where perpetual care has not been provided, arrangements may be made through the Cemetery Trustees for annual care. This will be accomplished by payment to the Town Treasurer, on or before April 1 of each year, the sum of \$4.00 for each lot to be cared for. For record purposes the Town Treasurer will issue a receipt for each such payment and send a copy to the Cemetery Trustees for their information and guidance.

27. To transact any further business which may legally come before the meeting.

REPORT OF ROAD AGENT

At the start of the season we bought a york rake. This is a big help in getting the roads in shape. One man can operate it.

Three culverts were replaced: one on the road beyond Phillis', one on Odell's Road, and a 52 foot one at Rockwood's corner. We need to continue to put in new culverts for many years.

A pipe arch bridge was put in on Blood's Road.

The grader was steam cleaned and painted. The circle was repaired.

We were able to do quite a bit of graveling. The following places received gravel: Blood's Hill, Tyler's Hill, Willard's Cross Road, Howard Hill, Rockwood's corner to John Harling's, Von Sneidern's Road, Haney's to Barry's corner, Odell's Road, Phillis' Road, and Whitcomb's Road. I think the present graveling program should be continued and increased. A big problem is to find good gravel in or near Temple.

Alvin Holt, Jr.'s Road was widened by removing a section of stonewall. There are several roads in town that need widening for safe driving and to help in snow removal.

CIVIL DEFENSE REPORT

To the Residents of Temple:

The affairs of the world have brought the problems of Civil Defense into sharp focus. But as the questions become clearer, the answers become blurred and doubtful. In many cases the answers raised more questions than they settled.

For several years the State and Federal Civil Defense agencies have talked of evacuating the population of key cities to smaller towns. Basically the planning stopped there; no one had really planned for, nor started the stock-piling of needed foodstuffs, bedding, surgical or medical supplies.

Now, however, the talk and plans are turning more and more to fall-out shelters. Here we have an answer that raises more questions than it resolves. Then, too, many responsible people feel that this is in the public, rather than the private domain. For that reason, I have asked the Selectmen to put an article in the Warrant pertaining to public fall-out shelters.

Because I have made it a policy to visit the State C. D. Headquarters several times a year, we were able to obtain the truck mentioned in the Fire Department Report. At the time of purchase, the truck was eight years old, had very few (20,000) miles on it and was, and still is, in excellent condition. As of last summer, the retail price on such a vehicle was about \$3,000. Other useful articles have been obtained through Civil Defense and Surplus Property Headquarters.

FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT

To the voters of Temple:

Another year has passed during which we have had no large fires and few small ones. It should be noted however, that the prompt action of your Fire Department did save many tax dollars for the town.

You will note that there is an article in the warrant relative to getting replacement equipment for the Fire Department. Through Civil Defense we obtained a surplus Army 6x6 in excellent condition and we feel that it should be equipped and placed in the Fire Service as a tanker-pumper. Several builders have been contacted and asked to give estimates as to the cost of the work, and the estimates given have been similar.

When completed the truck will carry one thousand gallons of water; a new pump, suited for our needs; a functional body designed to store hose, ladders, suction hose, portable lights, generator, pump, etc. Because of the age and condition of the other trucks, it is felt that this move should be made this year.

During the past year the Department has purchased several hundred feet of hose, portable lights, a thousand gallon tank, plus some smaller items. Much of the money you appropriate for the support of the Fire Department goes for fixed expenses such as heat and insurance.

Your Fire Department is active in the Souhegan Valley Mutual Aid Association. There are twelve towns involved who are ready and willing to give aid to any neighboring town that needs it. In effect we have increased the size of the Department many times without a corresponding increase in taxes.

AN APPEAL FROM YOUR FOREST FIRE WARDEN

In these days of constantly rising taxes and wages, any unnecessary expense is an added burden on everyone's pocketbook — yours and mine. Forest fires cost money and damage our valuable woodlands. Lightning sets some forest fires, but we have no control of lightning. Children cause many fires. Ninety-eight percent of our forest fires result from human carelessness — our carelessness. This, we — you and I can do something about.

When we require you to obtain a permit for out-of-doors burning or forbid you to burn on days of high fire danger or set up regulations — hours, etc., governing the use of the town dump we are simply protecting yours and the town's interests.

The ever present threat of forest fires is the concern of all of us; the responsibility for preventing them is ours and the costs of extinguishing are ours. We can do something about this problem, by being aware of and alert to the danger and by cooperating with your warden.

Do the things that are required of you —

1. Follow the warden's directions.
2. Secure the required burning permit.
3. Keep your fires under control.
4. Completely extinguish your fires before leaving them.
5. See that your children are properly cautioned.

Everyone will benefit by it.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Temple, I respectfully submit the 1961 annual report as your substitute Superintendent of Schools.

STAFF AND INSTRUCTION

The Temple School opened this year with Miss Helen Stone as principal and teacher of grades four, five and six. Mrs. Frank Yeaw of Milford resigned her position as teacher of grades one, two and three. Mrs. Nancy C. Steele of Greenville, a two year graduate of Boston University General College and of the Eliot-Pearson School of Tufts University, is doing excellent work in the primary grades. Mrs. Jeannette Collins is the teacher of grades seven and eight.

In the test results in May 1961, the following achievements show that all grades except the seventh were above the norm for their grade.

Grades four, five and six now have the Science Reading Laboratory kit in reading for additional individual study. It is hoped that the additional kit for use in grades seven and eight will be purchased for use in the near future.

BUILDING AND GROUNDS

Some grading was done near the side entrance to improve the parking area. Repairs of the outside doors have been completed. The water tank has been enclosed in the basement area. This spring and next summer painting, plumbing and replacement of hall mats will be in order.

FINANCE

The budget shows an increase of Approximately \$2,013. The items which show increases are largely in the areas of Teachers' Salaries and district's share of Retirement, \$1,100 plus \$74.58, and in Tuition which is increased \$742 due to two or three more pupils attending high school and the increase in tuition rates in the three high schools.

CONCLUSION

I wish to thank the Temple School Board, the teachers of the Temple School, the clerical staff in the administrative office and the citizens of the town for their cooperation, patience and assistance during the transition period in the administration during the school year. Collectively we constitute a good educational team, working for progress in educational offerings in order that the boys and girls of Temple may be better prepared for their participation in today's world.
