## TOWN WARRANT STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the town of Surry in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Surry on Tuesday the eleventh day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon to act on the following subjects:
(1) To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
(2) To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
(3) To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid construction on highways and raise the sum of $\$ 576.00$ for the same, or will accept State Aid for construction on class five roads and raise the sum of $\$ 139.88$.
(4) To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the repairs on highways and bridges.
(5) To see if the town will vote to discontinue that part of the Joslin road, so-called, from E. M. Britton place to the new road from Surry to Gilsum, or take any action in relation thereto.
(6) To see what action the town will take in regard to relocating the street lights or take any action in relation thereto.
(7) To see how much money the town will vote to raise for the aid of poor.
(8) To see how much money the town will vote to raise for the care of Town Hall.
(9) To see how much money the town will vote to raise for Old Home Day, or take any action in relation thereto.
(10) To see how much money the town will vote to raise for Memorial Day.
(11) To see what action the town will take in regard to the Wright Grove or take any action in relation thereto.
(12) To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen and treasurer to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
(13) To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of $\$ 35.00$ for the Monadnock Region Association of Scenic New Hampshire for the issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising, calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the town in cooperation with the other thirty-seven towns in the Monadnock Region.
(14) To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of $\$ 100.00$ in trust for the George H. Randall burial lot in the Village cemetery.
(15) To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of $\$ 50.00$ for the care of the John W. Conley burial lot in the Village cemetery.
(16) To hear the reports of the town officers.
(17) To allow accounts.
(18) To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Surry :<br>I hereby submit my annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

## ORGANIZATION AND ENROLLMENT

No changes were made in the teaching positions this year.
I have each year devoted a portion of my report to a discussion of some of the aims of our general supervisory program. Previous reports have covered the phases of the program applying directly to the content and improvement of instruction, Since effective instruction is influenced also by a continuous program designed to strengthen the organization of our schools, I believe that a brief outline indicating the nature of some of this activity should be of general interest.

Instruction sheets to all teachers in the supervisory union have repeatedly emphasized the importance of maintaining a uniform standard practice in relation to the following details of school management:

1. Permanent records of personal data, attendance, and scholarship.
2. Report cards, failures, and make up work.
3. Organization and supervision of all playground activities.
4. Organization and supervision of school programs, socials, entertainments, and athletic contests.
5. Exhibits of school work.
6. Conduct of school lunch program.
7. Fire drills and safety control measures.
8. Details of class and room management.
9. Care, preservation and use of instructional equipment and reference materials.
10. Development of school libraries and use of circulation libraries.

The report card usually results in more misunderstanding and conflicts of opinion than any other item of school management. It is not surprising that this should be so since accep!able practices for reporting to parents are many and varied. However, regardless of the form used, I believe that pupil scholastic reports have meaning and value only when they are made by the teacher and interpreted by the parent according to some definite policy which is understood and accepted by both. It has been my experience in talking with parents to find that they usually desire a fair, truthful, and frank estimate of the actual quality of the work of the pupil as measured by the ability of the child and the standard for the grade. I believe also that our teachers generally have recognized their responsibility in this regard and try to mark pupils truthfully and fairly according to their best judgment. Teachers have been urged to consider the report card as a transcript of the pupil's school record and to report deficiencies consistently as they occur.

Although repeated failures may indicate that a pupil would profit by repeating the grade, they are more generally caused by inattention, failure to complete assignments, or careless work. Teachers and parents should make an honest attempt to ascertain the cause of pupil failures and cooperate in some effective measures to eliminate them when possible.

In most of our schools the teachers have been very conscientious in the performance of their duties in supervising playground activity during the noon and recess periods. The informal situation on the playground affords an opportunity for wholesome pupil-teacher relations and for practical instruction in proper attitudes and group conduct.

Last year many of the schools in the supervisory union conducted school programs and exhibits designed to demonstrate school work and pupil performance. Programs of this nature are very much worthwhile. They tend to promote interest and cooperation and are worthy of the encouragement and support of the community served by each school.

The above table indicates that there has been a decided general increase in the enrollment of the Surry schools since 1934. During this eight-year period there has been a decrease in the per pupil cost of elementary school instruction and operation from $\$ 131.49$ per pupil in 1933-1934 to $\$ 61.98$ per pupil for the school year ending June 1940.

According to the state report the per pupil cost for 1939-40 on the basis of all district expenditures was $\$ 69.24$ for Surry as compared with the State median of $\$ 81.85$.

Although there has not been an increase in the total elementary instruction costs proportionate to the increase in enrollment, there are several factors beyond our control which are bound to affect an increase in the amount of money necessary to be raised for the support of schools:

1. An increase of $\$ 20.00$ per pupil for tuition at Keene High school.
2. An increase in the number of pupils attending high school will undoubtedly result from the increased elementary enrollment.
3. The state law now requires the district to pay for transporting pupils to high school up to the age of 14 years.
4. The cost for health supervision is apportioned by the state on the basis of elementary enrollment.
5. The state per capita tax is based on total registration; high and elementary,
6. There has been an increase in the number of pupils transported by the district; eight in 1934 ; sixteen in 1940-41.
7. There has been an increase in the number of these transported pupils located on the back hill routes.
8. New regulations have been made by the state motor vehicle department affecting school busses. This adds to the cost of transportation since liability insurance is required and the carrying capacity of the busses is limited.

Two deliveries of surplus food commodities were made to the schools during the year. Apples, oranges, raisins, and canned peaches were used to supplement lunches brought from home. It is expected that this program will be continued. One shipment of surplus commodities has been received this year at each school.

## HEALTH

The health program, as usual, has been carried on by Miss Margaret E. Harris. Following is a report of the work from January, 1940 to January, 1941, and includes both the examinations and follow-up work:

There has been a substantial increase in the total registration. This increase has been continuous over a period of several years. The difference between the average membership and the total registration shows the extent of transient membership.

There has been each year recently an average of about ten pupils who enter and leave the Surry schools during the year. These pupils are often irregular in attendance. Since school books must be provided for these pupils regardless of the length of time they are enrolled, the actual cost of providing for them is greater than would appear by the length of their period of attendance.

I wish to thank the members of the School Board, teachers, parents, and pupils for their cooperation during the school year.
