MARCH 4, 1975

The Town Meeting was called to order at the Town Hall by the Moderator John A. Perkins at 10:00 A.M.

After reading the items on the Warrant, the Moderator declared the polls open for casting of Ballots for Town Officials. Also for the voting as to whether the proposed amendments will be adopted.

After asking if all who wished had voted, the polls were declared closed at 7:00 P.M. After the closing of the polls the counting of ballots began to continue until all ballots had been properly totaled.

### MARCH 8, 1975

The Town Meeting of Nottingham took place at the Town Hall on Saturday, Mar. 8, 1975 at 2:P.M.

The Meeting opened with prayer offered by Rev. William McInnes and John A. Perkins presiding.

Each item of the budget was discussed and fully explained. The expenditure appropriation for Town Officers expense was cut by \$1700.00 making it \$7500.00. Town and other Town Buildings was raised to \$6750.00.

The Police Dept. was discussed and many voiced their opinion. A hand vote was taken: Yes 69 No 48. A paper vote was called for which the results were Yes 66 No 63. The Police Dept. Budget was raised to \$6400.00.

ARTICLE #2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and to make appropriations for same. It ws moved by Peter Witham to raise \$83,247.50, then amended and seconded to read \$85,447.50 and passed to raise such money and adopted.

ARTICLE #3. To see if the Town will vote to invest Federal Revenue Sharing in a special fund, to be used in accordance with applicable guide lines, specific appropria-

tions to be made by vote of the Town. Moved by Donald Perkins to be accepted, seconded by Gary Chase and passed.

ARTICLE #4. To see if the Town will vote to spend the sum of \$16,000.00 for the purchase of a Hough Front End Loader for use by the Highway Dept. from Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972. Moved by Philip Fernald, seconded and passed that the Article be changed to read: To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$16,000.00 for the purchase of a front end loader for use by the Highway Dept. from Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972—to be purchased by the Selectmen and Road Agent.

ARTICLE #5. To see if the Town will vote to spend the sum of \$1500.00 for Nottingham Volunteer Fire Dept. for ten Plectron Chief 500 Receivers with batteries, from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972. Moved by Gary Chase, seconded and passed.

ARTICLE #6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7000.00 to tar and sealcoat roads. Moved by Philip Fernald, seconded and passed.

ARTICLE #7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$935.00 for 1975 Town membership dues to the Strafford Regional Planning Commission. Moved by Mary Louise Fernald, seconded and passed.

ARTICLE #8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$974.63 the State to contribute the sum of \$6,497.50 for Town Road Aid. Moved by Donald Perkins, seconded and passed.

ARTICLE #9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,152.00 in support of the Rural District Health Council, Inc. Visiting Nurses Assoc. Moved by Jean Fernald, seconded and passed.

ARTICLE #10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to be used as a contribution for the Raymond Ambulance Association. Moved by Jean Fernald, seconded and passed.

ARTICLE #11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to be paid to the Nottingham Historical Society. Moved by Mary Louise Fernald, seconded and passed.

ARTICLE #12. To see if the Town of Nottingham will vote by a yes or no ballot, to create, establish and maintain a Town Mosquito Control District under the provisions of RSA 437A of the New Hampshire State Laws. The goal is to try and eliminate breeding conditions for mosquitoes Joint effort with neighboring towns will be necessary. N. H. Laws RSA 437A provides a maximum of 5 cents per \$100. property evaluation. This levy shall be a separate item on a tax bill. It was moved by E. O. Foss, seconded by G. T. Fisher to adopt article 12 as read. It was moved by Earl Rourke to amend Article 12 to read: "to establish a Mosquito Control Committee". It was moved by R. Bengston to change the word ballot in article 12 to the word vote. The original motion by E. O. Foss and G. T. Fisher was withdrawn. It was moved by Peter Witham to add after "Mosquito Control Committee" and report back at next Town Meeting. It was moved by E. Rourke, seconded and voted in the affirmative that the Article read: To see if the Town will vote to create, establish and maintain a Town Mosquito Control Committee and report back at the next Town Meeting.

ARTICLE #13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the Seacoast Regional Office of Child and Family Services of New Hampshire, a private charitable organization. Said sum to be raised for current operating expenses to enable the Seacoast Regional Office to continue providing services to residents of the Town of Nottingham whether or not said residents are able to pay. Moved by Jean Fernald, seconded by Perry Williamson, passed.

ARTICLE #14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4000.00 to be added to the \$5000.00 raised and appropriated at the 1974 Town Meeting for the purpose of purchasing 15 acres of land abutting the existing school lot, at \$600.00 per acre. Moved by Richard Fernald, seconded by Richard Bengston, passed.

ARTICLE #15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2000.00 for the purpose of initiating a capital reserve fund for the specific purpose of purchasing a new fire truck. Moved by Peter Witham, seconded by Donald Perkins and passed. An amendment by Gary Chase, seconded by Ronald Chase to raise the amount to \$4000.00 was lost.

ARTICLE #16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 for the purpose of installing two steel doors at the Blaisdell Memorial Library. Moved by Philip Fernald, seconded by Janice Chase and passed.

ARTICLE #17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Conservation Commission to study the feasibility of changing class VI (unused) roads to Recreational or Green Belt Roads. It was moved by E. Kotler and seconded by Perry Williamson that Article 17 be accepted as read. After discussion it was moved by Douglas McDonald and

seconded to amend Article 17 by deleting the last section:—Specific examples are: Old Gile Rd., the Haines School House Rd. and the road between Priest Rd. and Kennard Rd. The original motion made by E. Kotler and seconded by Perry Williamson was withdrawn. Then moved by Douglas McDonald, seconded by Richard Stone to vote on Article 17 as amended. Voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the Town Clerk's salary from \$300.00 per year to \$500.00 per year. Moved by Mr. Bosworth, seconded and passed.

ARTICLE #19. To see if the Town will authorize Selectmen to borrow in anticipation of taxes. Moved by John Fernald, Sr., seconded and passed.

ARTICLE #20. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell property acquired through Tax Collector's Deeds and surplus equipment at Public Auction and after being offered at Public Auction, to sell remaining property at Private Sale. Moved by John Fernald, Sr. Seconded and passed.

ARTICLE #21. To transact any other business that may come before the meeting. Donald Perkins moved, it was seconded and passed, that the Selectmen be authorized to appoint all other Town Officers. It was moved by Donald Perkins, seconded by Dana Russell and passed that the Selectmen should hold a Public Auction of properties acquired by Tax Deed which are owned by the Town.

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

# PROPOSED CHANGES TO THE ZONING ORDINANCE AND BUILDING CODE REGULATIONS

Nottingham, New Hampshire

2. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 1 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Nottingham Zoning Ordinance as follows?

Amend Article III General Provisions, section 7; which now reads:

Trailer homes or mobile homes, so-called, shall be allowed in any zone, provided said home complies with the Building Code requirements and is erected or set upon a continuous, permanent foundation of concrete or other masonry wall.

To be changed to read as follows:

Trailer homes or mobile homes, so-called, shall be allowed in any zone, provided said home complies with the Building Code requirements. That the number of trailers and/or mobile homes to be limited to 100. After this number is reached, no more will be allowed until one is removed.

3. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 2 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Nottingham Zoning Ordinance as follows?

Amend Article III General Provisions, section 8: which now reads:

The foundation of each mobile home shall follow the Plan adopted by the Planning Board and made a part of this Article by incorporation by reference.

To be changed to read as follows:

The foundation of each mobile home and other dwellings shall follow the Plan adopted by the Planning Board and made a part of this Article by incorporation by reference.

4. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 3 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Nottingham Zoning Ordinance as follows?

Amend Article III General Provisions by adding section 10 to read as follows:

No Trailer Parks and/or Mobile Home Parks shall be permitted in any zone.

Amend Article IX Board of Adjustment, Paragraph C, section 5e: which now reads:

No Trailer Parks and/or Mobile Home Parks shall be permitted in any zone.

To be changed by deleting section 5e.

5. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 4 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Nottingham Zoning Ordinance as follows?

Amend Article IV General Residence and Agricultural District, section 7, Setback: which now reads:

Setback: There shall be between the property line and and building, a minimum distance of fifty (50) feet from the property line in all directions.

To be changed to read as follows:

Setback: There shall be between the property line and any building, a minimum distance of fifty (50) feet from the property line in all directions, except that on lots of record which can not meet requirements the Planning Board may approve reduced setbacks.

6. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 5 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Nottingham Zoning Ordinance as follows?

Amend Article V Lake Residence District, section 4 Setback: which now reads:

Setback: There shall be a minimum distance of fifty (50) feet between the edge of the nearest right-of-way and the extreme front of any building. No new building shall be located nearer than fifty (50) feet of the property line.

To be changed to read as follows:

Setback: There shall be a minimum distance of fifty (50) feet between the edge of the nearest right-of-way and the extreme front of any building. No new building shall be located nearer than fifty (50) feet of the property line. On lots of record which cannot meet those requirements the Planning Board may approve reduced setbacks:

7. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 6 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Nottingham Ordinance as follows?

Amend Article VI Recreational Camp District, section 5: which now reads:

Trailers and mobile homes in the Recreational Camp District may be leased or rented for a period not exceeding six (6) consecutive months, for recreational use only, in any twelve month period. Use of, or residence in a trailer or mobile home in future or presently established Recreational Camp Districts for a period exceeding six (6) months, shall be deemed a violation of the prohibition against Trailer Parks or Mobile Home Parks in any district,

To be changed to read as follows:

Dwellings in the Recreational Camp District may be leased or rented for a period not exceeding six (6) consecutive months, for recreational use only, in any twelve-month period. Use of, or residence in any dwelling in future or presently established Recreational Camp Districts for a period exceeding six (6) months, shall be deemed a violation of this district.

8. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 7 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Nottingham Building Code as follows:

Amend Building Code section 2, Foundations: which now reads:

All structures shall be set on solid foundations of cement, brick, or stone or other acceptable masonry except that in special cases where buildings are to be used for accessory use or the Building Inspector may waive the requirements of this section and permit the use of wood, metal or masonry piers.

### To be changed to read as follows:

All structures shall be set on solid foundations of cement, brick, or stone or other acceptable masonry except that in special cases where buildings are to be used for accessory use the Building Inspector may waive the requirements of this section and permit the use of wood, metal, or masonry piers.

- 9. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to buy a Grader, at a cost not to exceed \$18,000.00. To raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 this year and to use Revenue Sharing Fund for the balance of \$15,000.00.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 for the purpose of improving the water in the library.
- 12. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for the purpose of adding to the capital reserve fund for the specific purpose of purchasing a new fire truck.
  - 13. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the

sum of \$450.00 for the purpose of updating property maps to April 1, 1976.

- 14. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,285.90 in support of the Rural District Health Council, Inc. (@ \$1.10 per capita).
- 15. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,000.00 to tar and sealcoat roads.
- 16. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$963.29, the State to contribute \$6,421.94, for Town Road Aid,
- 17. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 to be paid to the Bicentennial Committee of the Nottingham Historical Society—such sum to be used for appropriate bicentennial activities in 1976.
- 18. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 to be used as a contribution for the Raymond Ambulance Service.
- 19. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$2500.00 for the purpose of hiring a librarian for the Blaisdell Memorial Library.
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to invest Federal Revenue Sharing in a special fund, to be used in accordance with applicable guide lines, specific appropriations to be made by vote of the Town.
- 21. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell property acquired through Tax Collector's Deeds and surplus equipment, at Public Auction, and after being offered at Public Auction, to sell remaining property at Private Sale.

- 22. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Gooch Subdivision Road, 7/10ths of a mile. This road was built to Town specifications with surface treatment in 1974 and 1975.
- 23. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectment to appoint a panel of five (5) alternates for the Zoning Board of Adjustment as indicated in R.S.A. 31:67A.
- 24. To see if the Town will vote to have the Budget Committee elected rather than appointed in accordance with R.S.A. 32:2 and R.S.A. 32:3.
- 25. To see if the Town will vote to discuss the merits of a Mosquito Control Research Plan for the Town of Nottingham. The Mosquito Control Committee had requested \$1200 to fund this project but the Budget Committee decided not to fund it at all, thereby denying the Town the ability to raise any money at all for this project.
- 26. To see if the Town will vote to strongly urge the Post Office Department (and any other necessary representatives of the people) to make Nottingham one postal district with delivery service from said postal district to all residents, instead of the present piecemeal delivery, from other postal districts which is neither complete nor satisfactory.
- 27. To see if the Town will vote to accept Resolutions A and B-1 put forth by the Federal Government as requirements for participation in the National Flood Insurance Program.

Resolution A. Now, therefore, be it resolved that the Town of Nottingham hereby:

1. Assures the Federal Insurance Administration that it will enact as necessary, and maintain in force for those

areas having flood or mudslide hazards, adequate land use and control measures with effective enforcement provisions consistent with the Criteria set forth in Section 1910 of the National Flood Insurance Program Regulations; and

- 2. Vests the Planning Board with the responsibility, authority, and means to:
  - a. Delineate or assist the Administrator, at his request, in delineating the limits of the areas having special flood (and/or mudslide) hazards on available local maps of sufficient scale to identify the location of builling sites.
  - b. Provide such information as the Administrator may request concerning present uses and occupancy of the flood plain (and/or mudslide area).
  - c. Cooperate with Federal, State, and local agencies and private firms which undertake to study, survey, map and identify flood plain or mudslide areas, and cooperate with neighboring communities with respect to management of adjoining flood plain and/ or mudslide areas in order to prevent aggravation of existing hazards.
- d. Submit on the anniversary date of the community's initial eligibility an annual report to the Admistrator on the progress made during the past year within the community in the development and implementation of flood plain (and/or mudslide area) management measures.
  - 3. Appoints the Planning Board to maintain for public inspection and to furnish upon request a record of elevations (in relation to mean sea level) of the lowest floor

including basement of all new or substantially improved structures located in the special flood hazard areas. If the lowest floor is below grade on one or more sides, the elevation of the floor immediately above must also be recorded.

4. Agrees to take such other official action as may be reasonably necessary to carry out the objectives of the program.

Resolution B-1. Now, therefore, be it resolved by the Town of Nottingham as follows:

- 1. That the Building Inspector and Planning Board shall review all building permit applications for new construction or substantial improvements to determine whether proposed building sites will be reasonably safe from flooding. If a proposed building site is in a location that has a flood hazard, any proposed new construction or substantial improvement (including prefabricated and mobile homes) must (1) be designed (or modified) and anchored to prevent flotation, collapse, or lateral movement of the structure, (ii) use construction materials and utility equipment that are resistant to flood damage, and (iii) use construction methods and practices that will minimize flood damage; and
- 2. That the Planning Board shall review subdivision proposals and other proposed new developments to assure that (i) all such proposals are consistent with the need to minimize flood damage, (ii) all public utilities and facilities, such as sewer, gas, electrical, and water systems are located, elevated, and constructed to minimize or eliminate flood damage, and (iii) adequate drainage is provided so as to reduce exposure to flood hazards; and

- 3. That the Planning Board shall require new or replacement water supply systems and/or sanitary sewage systems to be designed to minimize or eliminate infiltration of flood waters into the system and discharges from the systems into flood waters, and require on-site waste disposal systems to be located so as to avoid impairment of them or contamination from them during flooding.
- 28. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

ARTICLES 1 through 8 will be acted upon TUESDAY, MARCH 2nd, 10:00 A.M. - 7:00 P.M.

ARTICLES 9 through 28 will be acted upon SATURDAY, MARCH 6th at 2:00 P.M.

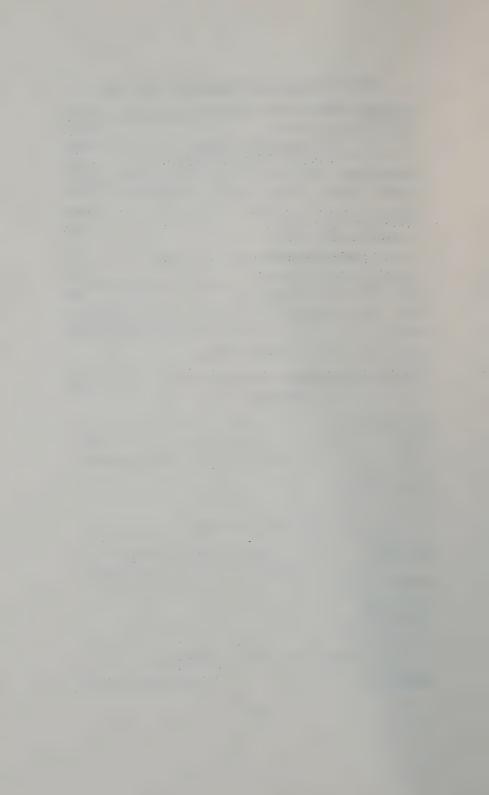

#### REPORT OF THE LIBRARY TRUSTEES

Blaisdell Memorial Library Hours are now as follow:\*

Monday - 6:30-8:30 p.m.

Wednesday - 12:30-2:30 p.m.\*\* - 6:30-8:30 p.m.

Friday - 8:30-12:30\*\* (except 10:00-10:30 a.m.)

12:30-3:30 p.m.\*\*

Saturday - 2:00-4:00 p.m.

- The library is sometimes open additional hours when people are processing books—look for the yellow smile sign on the door.
- \*\* Hours primarily designated for elementary school use.

#### Collection:

A total of 314 new volumes have been processed and are now on the shelves. Of these, 163 books are hard-bound additions to the adult and reference collections, while 151 are selected paperbacks donated for the children's section by the Friends of the Library. Included in the reference books purchased are an unabridged dictionary and a 16-volume Popular Mechanics Do-It-Yourself Encyclopedia set. There are over 500 books (both new and used) in the library basement waiting their turn to be sorted and processed. These books represent library purchases, and many generous donations from other libraries, trust funds, groups and individuals. The library owes a debt of thanks to many benefactors.

It is slow and exacting work to process a book correctly. At approxiamtely 20 minutes per book processed, the new books on the shelves represent over 100 hours of volunteer time (not counting the 15 hours per week during which the library is open for circulation), as Blaisdell Memorial Library is staffed entirely by volunteers.

#### Circulation:

Circulation figures have risen significantly since 1974.

#### Programs:

As the Nottingham Elementary School has no library, Blaisdell Memorial has served as the school, as well as the town library. Hours are specified (those starred in the above listing of hours) in which the school students visit the library, and, when possible, receive instruction in library techniques. Instructional materials have been obtained, such as training aids, or guides to the Dewey Decimal System, which are displayed in the library, and pamphlets explaining how to use the library. One of the Dewey Decimal System plaques has been loaned to the 8th grade teacher, and some instruction was given to the graduating 8th grade last June. Library techniques and research methods aren't acquired by a student in one session, however, and this is a program which would be worthwhile to expand.

In honor of National Library week, the trutstees and Friends of the Library sponsored a poster contest for the Elementary School children and Nottingham Kindergarten. A similar contest is planned for the upcoming year.

In the coming year, the Trustees hope to sponsor art shows of the works of Nottingham residents. The first will be presented in the month of March, 1976.

A movie program is being planned for the summer of 1976 (free films are available from the state).

#### Facilities and Equipment:

A telephone has been installed. The telephone number is 679-8484.

The microfilm reader-printer is now in the library, and will offer an opportunity for many programs, as well as the original purpose of reference to the microfilmed town records. It is hoped that a microfilm container can be purchased in the coming year, so the films may be stored safely, and in order.

The trustees are considering different models of book depositories, so books may be returned when the library is not open. Many people have requested that some type of book return be made available.

Since the new building was first opened, there have been problems with the water supply. There are foul, odorous deposits, which have stained all of the plumbing facilities, and the water is undrinkable. Funds are being requested to correct this problem.

The stairs leading to the basement are only roughly finished and present a potential safety hazard.

The Friends of the Library have donated funds for a large bulletin board for the children's section. Materials have been ordered, and it will be installed soon. A smaller, general purpose bulletin board is also planned for items of interest, and free informational pamphlets are being requested from State and Federal agencies (to include free IRS booklets).

It is hoped also that an ad hoc committee may be formed by representatives of the library trustees, the Historical Society, and interested citizens to plan the completion of of the basement and obtain cost and estimates.

#### Bookmobile:

The bookmobile from the New Hampshire State Library visits Blaisdell Memorial three to four times per year. Bookmobile loans have increased from a total of 948 in 1974 to approximately 850-1000 volumes per visit in 1975.

#### Summry and Projections:

Library services and programs have grown rapidly in the past year. It has become evident that there is a cogent need for a librarian to manage the collection and supervise circulation and processing of books. There are a number of expensive items in the library which are subject to loss, damage, or destruction if not propertly cared for and managed. The average cost of a hardbound work of fiction is currently \$8.71. Non-fiction works are two to three times as expensive. There are some books in the collection which cannot be replaced.

A proposal was submitted requesting funds from the town and the school committee to hire a librarian, or to designate one paid librarian for the town, and one to supervise the school program. It is modeled after a successful program from the Town of Lyme, N. H. It is hoped that fair consideration will be given to this proposal on its merits. Volunteer efforts have been exceptional, and this proposed program would not preclude the use of volunteers. They are figured into the program and will always be welcomed. The library has many essential services to offer the community—it is hoped that it may be used to its fullest potential this year, and in the future.

As the new building has not yet been dedicated perhaps it could be on 4 July 1976, in honor of the Bicentennial.

#### FIRE CHIEF'S REPORT

The Nottingham Volunteer Fire Department answered twenty-six calls in 1975, six structural fires, four chimney fires, two car fires, two auto accidents to wash down gasoline, two lost children, one bomb scare at the school, two power line fires in which the wires had fallen or tree limbs had fallen onto the lines, six grass and woods fires, and one unusual call of water running through the house because of broken pipes.

We were called to Lee, Epping, Deerfield, and Northwood for structural fires in 1975. These were all Mutual Aid calls.

We called Northwood, Barrington, Lee, Raymond, for woods and one car fire. I called another Mutual Aid call for a lost child which brought men and women from Lee, Barrington, Raymond, Deerfield, Exeter, and Northwood fire departments and the New Hampshire Fish & Game Department, and the Chief of Police from Greenland with his dog.

Any outside burning you will have to contact John Fernald, Sr. at 679-8802. He is our Forest Fire Warden in Nottingham.

# REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

Upon the recommendation of town selectmen and city councils, the Division of Forests and Lands appoints a forest fire warden and several deputy forest fire wardens in each town and city every three years. The town or city warden is responsible for maintaining a force of men and adequate equipment to suppress any wildfire that occurs in his town or city during his term of appointment. The fire warden must authorize all open burning when the ground is not covered with snow. No open fires can be authorized between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m., unless it is raining, without the additional permission of the state district fire chief.

Any person wishing to kindle an open fire when the ground is not covered with snow must first obtain the written permission of the forest fire warden. Camp and cooking fires also require the warden's permission.

The Division of Forests and Lands, through its Forest Fire Service, assists all cities and towns in meeting these requirements by training the warden and deputy forces in wildfire suppression tactics, making hand tool suppression equipment available at fifty percent of cost, supplying pieces of Federal excess property for use as fire attack vehicles and sharing up to fifty percent of the cost of wildfire suppression costs.

Wildfire prevention is also a joint state, city or town program. Smokey Bear is available from the Forest Fire Service for local fire prevention programs. Posters and Junior Ranger kits are available for distribution by local fire departments upon request to the Forest Fire Service. Each forest fire warden is expected to carry on a continuous wildfire prevention program within his town or city.

# 1975 REPORT OF THE NOTTINGHAM RECYCLING CENTER

Total operating expenses for 1975 were \$8,567.44. Sale of approximately 102 tons of materials brought in \$2,607.06. Actual net cost to the Town thus totaled \$5,960.38. These figures do not include various capital improvements to the plant covered by a grant from the State of New Hampshire and other outside sources. Most notable of these was the installation of a new incinerator to replace the rather inefficient original design. The new model burns more trash using less fuel and should help to counteract inflationary increases in oil prices. Storage space was enlarged, the building was stained, and the drive to the plant was paved. All residents are reminded that town ordinance requires that trash be kept separate in four categories: A, metal, B, Glass, C. Clean Paper, and D. all other trash.

# RURAL DISTRICT HEALTH COUNCIL ANNUAL REPORT 1975

The past year has seen an increase in the services provided by the Rural District Health Council coupled with an increase in the requests for service. As the federal government studies the cost of health care there is increased interest in home care and preventive medicine as methods of reducing costs and improving health services. The Rural District Health Council continues to qualify as a certified home health agency, implementing procedures to continue to provide quality care.

In January 1975, Mrs. Marie Dexter, R.N. joined the staff in a dual role as Referral Coordinator at the Frisbie Memoriol Hospital where she is a member of the Utilization Review Committee, and also as staff nurse for the agency providing skilled care for the towns of Barrington and Strafford The addition of a Health Aide, Mrs. Joan Menez, has enabled the Council to better utilize the professional staff while continuing to provide quality care.

Along with the regular skilled nursing services provided in the home, members of the agency staff conduct adult screening clinics monthly in Northwood and Farmington which was requested by senior citizens groups in those towns. They also participate in the aftercare program in cooperation with the Strafford County Guidance Center and the Seacoast Counseling Center, assist local groups with area screening programs, participate in health planning and, by contract, supervise health aides in the Strafford County Homemaker-Home Health Aide Program. The Maternal and Child Health Program is very active providing regular physical examinations, immunizations and dental care for children 0-6 years enrolled in the Well Child Clinics. The agency staff also does home visiting to the

patients participating in the Strafford County Prenatal and Family Planning Program and the Exeter Area Family Planning Program.

The strength of the Council lies in the efficiency and dedication of its staff. In addition to the two persons mentioned above, members of the professional staff are Mrs. Ardala Houle, R.N. Agency Supervisor; Miss Arlent Thorne, R.N., Maternal and Child Health nurse; Mrs. Barbara Drew, R.N.; Mrs. Myrtle Walsh, R.N.; Mrs. Lucy Myers, R.N.B.S.; Mrs. Bernadette Cameron, R.N.; and Mrs. Kathleen Hansen, RPT. The office duties are ably handled by Mrs. Norma Davis and Mrs. Eleanor Eaton.

The Rural District Health Council has been requesting \$1.00 per capita from member towns since 1969. As a result of the recent inflationary times and increase in services provided, it has been necessary, therefore, to increase the per capita request from each town by 10c to enable the Council to continue to provide these services.

During the past year the Council has made 309 home visits and 102 well child visit making a grand total of 411 for the town of Nottingham.

# STRAFFORD REGIONAL PLANNING COMMISSION -- ANNUAL REPORT 1975

The towns who are members of the Strafford Regional Planning Commission (SRPC) have joined together in a mutual effort to 1) deal with concerns and plans for growth and development; 2) share technical planning services for their municipal needs; and 3) receive federal/state monies and support available for these services. The professional staff, which includes three full time planners, have been able to provide more local assistance during the past year as a result of their efforts in securing several part time assistants through educational and government grant monies.

Some of the major work efforts completed during 1975 are as follows:

- —The land capability analysis has been completed for the southern section of our Region. Communities included in the study are Dover, Durham, Lee, Madbury, Newmarket, Nottingham, Rollinsford, and Somersworth. The booklet, which contains easy to follow maps, tables, figures, and narrative, is entitled Southern Strafford Region An Environmental Planning Study, and is available for citizens' use in our town office, or it may be purchased from the SRPC office in Dover.
- —A related coastal zone survey and analysis has been completed. The coastal zone includes all tidal lands and waters inland, approximately to Route 125, and up tidal rivers beyond the tide water to points of significance.
- —Work has begun on a solid waste management study, and an application has been approved for a mass transportation system feasibility study.

- —A Cost-Benefit Analysis Model was prepared and distributed as a planning tool for use by the towns, cities, and citizens to aid in the evaluation of any prospective developments or growth in terms of cost of services versus tax revenue. This booklet is also available at our town office.
- —A Human Services Directory was prepared and published. The directory includes a listing of the services provided by 144 agencies in our Region. Information includes a description of services, eligibility requirements, fee schedules, and contact procedures. Copies are available in our town office and library.

Response to a specific local request resulted in the following for the Town of Nottingham:

—Working with the Planning Board, Conservation Commission, and interested citizens, the professional staff of the SRPC assisted us in compiling an inventory of the Town's natural resources and current land uses. From this information, eight detailed maps were prepared at a scale of 1" to 2000'. Two additional maps - showing 1) resources to be protected and 2) land use suitability summarize the data collected. A booklet describing the characteristics and planning implications of the above was also prepared. The booklet, maps, and cost-benefit analysis model are tools for enabling Nottingham to make decisions about its growth and development based on sound information.

The SRPC staff and office are available to private citizens or groups for information on a variety of issues. Programs and workshops are held by the SRPC on trends and developments which could affect the Region. During the past year, the following topics were presented to the public: Coastal Zone Management Planning, Energy Consid-

erations in City and Town Planning, Highway Planning Procedures for State and Federal Highway Systems, National Bicentennial Community Program, Economic Aspects of Recycling, Advantages of Historic Preservation and Planning, and a Cost-Benefit Analysis Model workshop.

All detailed reports are available for inspection by any interested citizen during office hours, or by contacting your local appointed Commissioners. Citizen participation is always needed and welcomed. Without it, we could not have completed our inventory and mapping.

# REPORT OF THE RECREATION COMMISSION

The Recreation Commission was responsible for the Town Beach and volunteers helped to clean the beach of trash and provide labeled barrels for rubbish disposal. They also helped clear more road turnouts for easier trespass since the beach is used by more people each year. We still have the problem of boats being launched and pulling into the beach area and we are working with the state to control their access.

The swimming program was continued last year with 72 children registering for the month long session. The children are divided into classes by ability and tested in accordance with Red Cross swimming standards. We hope to be able to provide the more advanced swimmers the chance to continue toward obtaining their lifesaving badges.

A bicycle rodeo was held in the spring with 75 children in attendance. Each cyclist was tested for bicycle safety skills and the condition of their bicycles. All received a certificate noting what parts needed servicing, how they passed their written tests and a safety flag.

A Summer Craft and Sport Program was conducted for two weeks in August for three hours a day. An average of 50 children attended each day under the supervision of Mary Stone and Janet Frost. The craft program included weaving, printing, tye dyeing, working with different paint media and a Christmas project. The sports included kickball, badminton, softball and relay races.

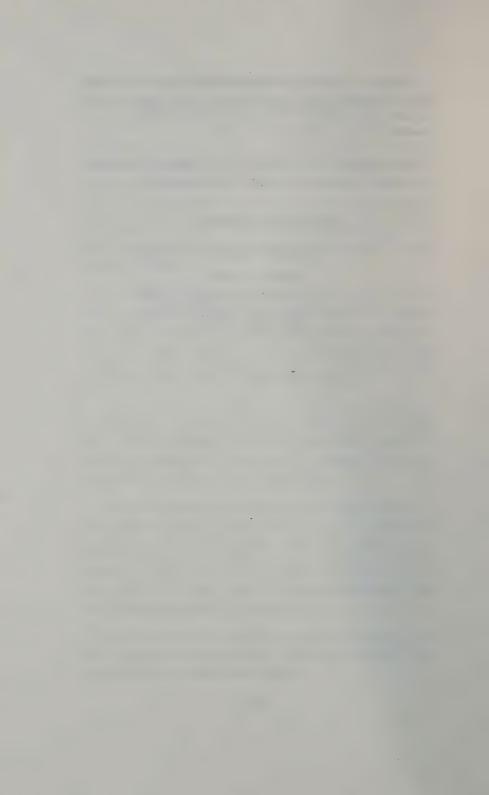

#### MINUTES OF NOTTINGHAM

#### SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING

#### MARCH 7, 1975

The Annual Meeting of the Nottingham School District took place on March 7, 1975 at the Nottingham School. Moderator, John Perkins called the meeting to order at 8:00 p.m. read the Warrant and discussion of the Warrant Articles followed.

ARTICLE I. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the District.

It was suggested that the following salaries be raised:

School Board Member (\$200 each)	400.00

Moderator	10.00
Treasurer	150.00
Auditors	25.00
Preparation of Town Report	35.00

It was moved by Richard Bengston and seconded by David Colby that the sum of \$880.00 be raised under Article I and the above salaries accepted.

Voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE II. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

Richard Bengston reported that there were no reports to be made other than those contained in the Town Report. ARTICLE III. To choose agents and committees in relation to any subject embraced in this Warrant.

Richard Bengston asked that this article be postponed until Article VI was discussed.

ARTICLE IV. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district.

It was moved by Richard Bengston and seconded by David Colby to raise the sum of \$275,259.23 to cover this article.

It was explained by members of the Board that the Budget Committee recommendation under this article was for the sum of \$270,336.19. This article was discussed item by item. Under line 190 Charles Chamberlain explained that there was a 145.00 increase for membership dues to the New Hampshire School Board Association. Under the 200 Series line 210 - Teachers' Salaries was discussed at length. Budget Committee Member, Brad Batchelder explained the cut in teacher's salaries made by the Budget Committee.

Mr. Douglas McDonald spoke in favor of the increase in teachers pay and supplied information on Nottingham's standing in the State as far as its pay scale for teachers is concerned. Mr. McDonald pointed out that only 16 districts out of 122 in the State paid their teachers less than Nottingham and that Nottingham ranks 100 out of 122 in maximum salary pay for its teachers.

Line 1010 - It was explained under this item that teachers who coach sports are paid \$100 for coaching and teachers who take part in other clubs at the school receive a token pay of \$50.00 for each club.

It was moved by Douglas McDonald and seconded by Elizabeth Kotler that Article #4 be amended by adding \$150.00 to the 1000 series to provide equal opportunity for girls in sports. This would bring the total of the 1000 series to \$900.00 and the total amount raised under Article #4 to \$275,409.23.

Voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE V. To see if the District will authorize the School Board to make application for and to receive, in the name of the District, such advances, grants-in-aid or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government and/or state agencies.

It was moved by Richard Bengston and seconded by David Colby to accept Article V as read,

Voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE VI. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for a contingency fund as provided by the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, 196 4B.

It was moved by Richard Bengston and seconded by Richard McGowen to accept Article VI as read.

It was moved by Brad Batchelder and seconded to amend Article VI to read the sum of \$2,400.00 as \$2,500.00 is in excess of the 1% allowed on the total of last year's budget.

Voted in the affirmative.

To transact any other business which may legally come before the meeting.

It was moved by Richard Bengston and seconded to vote

on Article III to the effect that no agents or committees are to be appoined.

Voted in the affirmative.

Mrs. Ann York asked for a report on the committee appointed to study a possible area high school. Mr. David Colby reported on the data gathered to date.

The study done on the busing of children in Nottingham was discussed by Richard Bengston. It was explained that before bus contracts are signed for next year, discussions will take place on new bus routes and re-routing of buses.

It was moved by Richard Bengston and seconded to adjourn the meeting.

Voted in the affirmative.

The meeting was adjourned at 9:11 p.m.

In September of 1971, just five years earlier, the enrollment was 163 pupils. In just five years, the enrollment has increased by 23.9%. In addition, the district is supporting the following pupils: Four at Epping at \$885.00; One at Northwood at \$885.00; One at the McFarland School, Exeter, @ \$885.00; Two at Great Bay School at \$1,450.00; One at Barrington @ \$885.00 and one at the Clarke School for the Deaf at \$885.00. The last five pupils are handicapped and require special programs not available in Nottingham.

Since our last report was prepared, the New Hampshire General Court has met and passed many laws. It is believed it would be helpful to the citizens to know of these actions. A number of statutes which appear to be of importance to the residents of the district have been summarized and are presented as a part of the report.

Duty to Provide Education. It is the duty of the school board to provide at district expense, an elementary and secondary school education to all pupils residing in the district who have not reached the age of 21. (Was 18 years)

Posting Warrant. In counting the days between the posting of a meeting warning and the meeting, Saturdays, Sun-

days and legal holidays are included in the count of 14 days between the meeting and posting dates. This prevents misinterpretation.

Officers to be Chosen. This statute is changed to allow the election of one or more auditors, and if more than one is chosen, the terms may be staggered. Previously, the auditors could only be elected for a one year term.

Lord's Prayer and Pledge of Allegiance in the Public Elementary Schools. This is new and permits the recitation of the traditional Lord's Prayer and the Pledge of Allegiance in public elementary schools. Pupil participation shall be voluntary. It requires a district vote to implement.

School Holidays. This is new. Schools shall not be open for regular instructional purposes on Veterans' Day, November 11, and Memorial Day, May 30. Opening school would be a violation of the law.

Eligibility. No person employed on a salaried basis by a Supervisory Union, or any District within a Supervisory Union may at the same time serve as a school board member in any District of the Supervisory Union. Examples of salaried positions include teachers, custodians, administrators, secretaries, bus drivers paid by the district, school lunch workers, and teachers aides.

Instruction in National and State History and Government. Beginning no later than Grade VIII, all schools must provide a regular course of instruction in history, government, and constitutions of the United States and of New Hampshire.

Filing for Office. This is a change. Persons filing for district office must file not earlier than 45 days before the election and not later than 5:00 p.m. of the third Monday

before the election with the District Clerk. The filling period begins 10 days sooner, but closes 7 days earlier. If the district has adopted the absentee ballot, the filing period closes the fifth Monday before the election.

Public Employee Labor Relations. Probably the most important action, in the opinion of the writer, to be taken by the legislature was the passage of this act. It requires school boards which employ ten or more persons with a common interest to meet with the employee group or its representatives and negotiate the terms and conditions under which the employees work. At present, the negotiations are limited to economic matters, but there is nothing to prevent a liberal interpretation of this restriction, or to later, amend the law. School boards are not to negotiate any powers granted to them by state law or by policy of the State Board. There will be more problems and expenses connected with this law than any other recently passed for New Hampshire education.

In closing the undersigned would like to thank the pupils, teachers, School Boards, and Citizens for the continued support and cooperation which has been extended to them.

## REPORT OF THE NOTTINGHAM SCHOOL BOARD

The 1975-76 school year has been a busy and productive one. The most pressing and constant area of concern, requiring many hours of deliberation, has been the problem of busing in our rural town. The two school buses, 208 elementary school children, and an area of 48.2 square miles to cover has its drawbacks. We have tried to accommodate the townspeople with school children in the best possible manner through several bus route changes. It is our hope to add a third bus next year to help alleviate some of the problems that exist at this time.

Numerous meetings concerning possible future affiliation with Coe-Brown Academy, the Raymond Area High School Study Group, Joint School Board meetings and special meetings held to discuss student attendance, have all lent themselves to help us better the educational needs and operational management of our growing school both on the elementary and secondary school level.

The Board has passed several new policies in the areas of tardiness, dismissals, attendance and busing in an effort to protect the interest of concerned parents, tax payers and our children.

Title I services continue to be provided in Nottingham to help those children with learning problems. Services through Title I are rendered two days each week. We are also fortunate to receive the services of the Strafford Learning Center every other Tuesday for testing those in need of special education and working with our curriculum to meet those needs.

On Saturday, September 6th at 2:10 p.m., a fire was discovered by our full time custodian, Frank McLean. For-

tunately, the fire was contained to a small area in the new addition. Because of the number of school break-ins, and the serious consequences a fire can bring, the Board has looked into the purchase of smoke detectors, a dial out fire alarm system as well as a burglar alarm system for the protection of school property.

We are pleased to report that there have been two new additions to our teaching staff. Mrs. Leatitia Richards was hired as a full time aide to work with the third grade and Miss Carol Lovitz is a full time teacher working with grades 1 and 5. As our staff grows, so too does our curriculum and student body. The staff has worked hard to maintain quality education in Nottingham as evidenced by our test results. We thank them for their efforts in helping us to secure the best possible educational system for our town.

We regret the recent untimely death of our school Superintendent, Mr. Charles H. Morgan, who so efficiently and capably served us over the past five years. He will be missed by all those who have come to know him and work under his direction.

Parental participation at our regular Board meetings has been most welcome. It is through a concentrated effort in the spirit of cooperation that will enable us to continue working together for excellence in education.

### PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

The Nottingham School has once again been experiencing growing pains. There has been an increase in enrollment from 185 to 213 students. One of the changes due to this increase in enrollment has been an addition to the teaching staff. Mrs. Richards was hired as a full time aide for the third grade.

We have added a new 3M copying machine to our audiovisual department, which has been a great help to the teachers. With the addition of one or two pieces of equipment each year, we are hoping that eventually we will have a complete audio-visual center that contains equipment in good working order. This will enable us to provide a curriculum which offers more than textbooks for teaching. Variety can be added to our program through films, filmstrips, records, etc.

A new filing cabinet was purchased for the office. The old cabinet will be used to file school board papers. Door mats were purchased for the upper grade classrooms. It is hoped that these door mats will serve as a safety feature and help cut down on classroom maintenance. Wall fans were installed in the bathrooms and two fire-proof dispensers were put in the girls' rooms. Flourescent lights were installed in the upper grade classrooms replacing the old bulb fixtures. This replacement will cut down the electrical bill and surpass the state lighting requirements. Work accomplished during the summer months included sanding and painting a large portion of the building, repairing shades, cleaning windows, waxing floors, and small general maintenance jobs.

A fire in the new wing of the school caused considerable damage. New texts for the 1975-76 school year were destroyed. It was also necessary to replace two sets of encyclopedias, three cabinets, lighting fixtures, the ceiling, and carpeting. We were extremely fortunate that the fire occurred after school hours.

Our volunteer program, under the capable supervision of Mrs. Sweeney, is still in operation. The staff appreciates the help of all those involved and hopes the program will continue with the same success as in the past.

The administration appreciates the cooperation and efforts of all during the past school year. We hope to continue serving the community's educational needs and will endeavor to do so to the best of our ability.

### SCHOOL HEALTH REPORT

To the Superintendent of Schools:

The Health Program, for the year 1974-75, was carried out in the usual manner. The annual physical inspection of each student, and an Audio and a Visual screening done. Parents were notified of an existing problem, if such were found.

Pre-school children attended the Vision and Hearing Clinic made possible by the State Division of Public Health, and sponsored by the Saddle Back Mountain Lions Club.

A Comprehensive Health Education Program was initiated at the Junior High level. This program included the studies recommended by the State Board of Education. Films were presented, and then followed by discussion and question period. The class instruction covered the physiology and hygiene as it relates to the effects of alcohol, drugs and veneral diseases on the human system. Motor safety, smoking and health, nutrition were also part of the program.

The lower grades 1-4, studied The Rules of Good Health. Films and pictures of the body building foods, proper exercise, rest and care of teeth were stressed.

Grade 4 participated in the Dental Preventive Disease Program offered by the State Bureau of Dental Public Health. After signed parental consent, the staff Dental Hygienest made an oral health examination and gave a class demonstration and instruction period. Each student received a tooth brush and dental floss for daily brushing and removing extra plaque between the teeth. Once a week the student was checked after chewing a red food coloring tablet for remaining plafue surfaces. The program was con-

tined, on a daily basis for 16 weeks. Marked improvement was evident at the end of the program.

The Girls in grade 5 were shown the film, "The Story of Menstruation."

The State Board's regulation on Medication Policy became a law, and was adopted by the school, and written into the School Health Policies.

I wish to express my appreciation to Mr. Morgan, the School Board, the Principal and Staff, and the Parents for their cooperation.
