

TOWN WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of New London in the County of Merrimack, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in Whipple Memorial Hall in said New London on Tuesday the twelfth day of March next at ten of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To hear reports of agents or auditors and committees heretofore chosen and pass vote relating thereto.

4. To see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day.

5. To see what amount the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Town Library for the ensuing year.

6. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for street lighting for the ensuing year.

7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for cemetery purposes for the ensuing year.

8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the New London Hospital for the ensuing year. 9. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for the support of highways, bridges and sidewalks more than the law requires for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,426.50, and the State to give \$1,426.50, for State Aid Construction, and make appropriation of the same.

11. To see if the Town will vote to oil the road from Effie and Cora Bunker's house to Benjamin F. Sargent's house, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$100.00 for relaying the sidewalk on Main Street, from the driveway of New London Inn to easterly corner of Pleasant Street, and make appropriation of the same.

13. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for Hydrant service.

14. To see what action the Town will take in regard to Blister Rust Control and make appropriation for the same.

15. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the short piece of road from the John Green road across the bridge to the State Aid Construction road.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$300.00 for the purchase of snow fence and make appropriation for the same.

17. That a committee be appointed to locate the graves of those designated on the Monument in front of the Town Hall who served in the Continental Army, and have a tablet dedicated to their memory so that they can be decorated on Memorial Day, and make appropriation for the same.

18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell the land adjoining the New London cemetery.

19. To see if the Town will adopt a Zoning Ordinance as recommended by the Zoning Commission appointed by the Town, or take any other action with reference thereto. 20. To see if the Town will cause the Selectmen to appoint a Planning Commission of three persons to take every possible advantage of State and Federal planning for New London during the coming year. This Commission to serve without compensation from the Town.

21. To see if the Town will vote to improve Seaman's Road from the residence of E. W. Converse to the junction of the State Road at Low Plain School House and make appropriation for the same.

22. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes for the ensuing year.

23. To see if the town will vote to adopt the provisions of the municipal budget act.

24. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

TRACY MEMORIAL BUILDING

Librarian's Report

For the year ending October 1, 1934

Eight years of library and community service have been completed at Tracy Memorial Building. Appreciation of the value of such a service to the life of the town has been variously expressed by many individuals during the year.

The free use of the building has been enjoyed for regular meetings of the Hospital Aid, the Woman's Club, the Garden Club, and for occasional meetings of the 4-H Club, the Civic Association, the King's Daughters, the Junior Guild, and numerous committees. A piano recital by pupils of Mrs. Helen M. Colburn was given in June. The New Hampshire Pen Women met at Tracy Memorial in September.

Several entertaining and educational evenings were offered to the community during the fall, winter and spring months. Prof. Arthur F. Newell, representing the Lord Bryce Fellowship, spoke on "Adventures in Understanding", furthering friendly relations between England and United States. Victor M. Cutter gave an interesting description of "Life in Central America", based on his personal experiences during fifteen years in the tropics. Miss Ruth Colby entertained with an illustrated talk on a summer trip through England, and a flight to Paris. Herbert D. Swift gave a showing of local moving pictures one evening. Alfred E. Plumpton and his daughter, Phyllis Plumpton, gave a pleasing piano and song recital on a Sunday afternoon in May.

Ten major exhibits were open during the year. These included a Local Talent Exhibition, the Guy Shorey Photographs, the Doll Exhibit, the Manrique Textile Exhibit, a two day Flower Show by the Garden Club, the Stamp Club Exhibition, the Smithsonian Wild Flower Plates, the Sawyer Studio Exhibit of Hand-tinted Scenes of North America, and the Second Annual Exhibition of the Slade Photographs and other photographs by members of the Boston Camera Club.

Small exhibits at the library desk and under the glass tops of the fireplace tables have been of interest from time to time.

Features in connection with the work of the children's room were the customary display of new, also favorite older books in the post office window during Good Book Week in November, under the slogan "Growing Up With Books"; four afternoons of pictures of an educational nature-World's Fair pictures shown by Bertha M. Glassey; King Arthur pictures, shown and described by Edward Picknell of the Elkins School, who, with another Elkins pupil, John Pierce, drew the long roll of pictures; Memo pictures of Yellowstone National Park shown to Grades V and VI, and Alaska pictures shown to Grades I and II by the librarian. A new venture was the Stamp Club, started primarily for the children, but developing naturally and pleasantly into a mixed group of children and adults. Meetings are held regularly twice a month, with considerable evidence of interest, and an exhibition was held in June, which nearly three hundred people visited.

The observance of Christmas was accompanied by holiday decorations and a Christmas program followed by carol-singing about town. On New Year's Day open house was held by trustees and librarians, assisted by several ladies of the town.

Adult education classes were successfully conducted by Dr. Royce S. Pitkin and Dr. J. Duane Squires during ten evenings of the winter months. The course was called "An Introduction to American Civilization Today", and attendance and interest were very gratifying. M. Roy London and Lester S. Frost conducted winter classes in bookkeeping and a good number availed themselves of the privilege of such a course. New London is fortunate in having those who are qualified and willing to give their time in such ways as these men have done.

George F. Slade has presented the building with an enlarged picture of the finale in the pageant, "Hills Against the Sky". "Sunapee Mountain from the Brocklebank", an oil painting by George O. Draper, was loaned by the artist for several months. Mrs. Jane A. Tracy has given the library five folios of North American flower plates, containing four hundred separate plates, the work of Mary Vaux Wolcott. The excellence of these plates is recognized when one knows that they are published by the Smithsonian Institution of Washington, D. C. Gifts of first day covers and foreign stamps from Mrs. Tracy have been welcomed by Stamp Club members.

Gifts and loans of books, pictures and curios, also a gift of ten dollars from a friend of the library, testify to the interest of many people in the place that Tracy Memorial holds in the life of the community. Gifts of stamps have come from several sources. Mr. Arnold has given two more specimen stones for the gem collection. Autographed copies of works of the authors have been received from Clare Benedict and Royce S. Pitkin. The loan of numerous books from the personal library of Mr. and Mrs. F. J. Manrique was appreciated throughout the winter.

Additions to the International Mind Alcove arrive regularly four times a year, a welcome and appreciated gift of books of travel, showing life and customs in other countries. Books valuable to the reference collection have been added by the acquisition of the Cambridge History of English Literature, in fourteen volumes, and the Cambridge History of American Literature, in three volumes. Three volumes in the Dictionary of American Biography have been added as published. The library, by yearly additions, is acquiring a well-rounded reference collection.

The May number of the American Library Association Bulletin contained an article by a California librarian on "Libraries in Community Buildings", in which was included a description of Tracy Memorial Building.

In June a library school student, Miss Esther Williams of Wollaston, Mass., was sent from Simmons College to Tracy Memorial for two weeks of observation and practice work.

Library meetings of the year were attended by trustees and librarians. The state meeting at Exeter was attended by Mrs. Jane A. Tracy and Mrs. Mary B. Macomber, trustees, and by the librarian. Mrs. Bertha M. Glassey, assistant librarian, was in attendance at the meeting of the American Library Association at Montreal. The librarian had a part on the program of the Boscawen Neighborhood Meeting. The Elkins borrowers have visited the library for the exchange of books to a greater degree than in former years. Earlier in the year Mrs. Allie J. Sargent attended to the exchange of the Elkins books.

During the months of July and August Alice A. Todd served as vacation assistant. Evelyn Dahl of Jamestown, N. Y. assisted in the care of the building and flowers during the summer months. She assisted in the children's room on Saturday afternoons.

Consideration of the statistics for former years shows definite growth and use of the facilities of the library and community building. Town school use of the library is constantly growing, and members of the faculty and student body at Colby Junior College continue to be frequent visitors and borrowers.

Figures for the past year show that visitors have numbered 21,200, and the circulation of books, magazines and pictures has totaled 18,405. Twenty per cent of the circulation has been non-fiction, which is an indication of the studious nature of the community. The picture collection has reached such proportions that there is a marked use of the material, which is filed in three special cabinets designed and built by Melville H. Robbins. Five hundred sixty-five pictures were loaned, principally to teachers, during the six months in which a record of this material has been kept.

Books added to the library in a year's time have been 517 in number, of which 128 titles were gifts, and 389 were added by purchase.

AUGUST 31, 1934

During the past year the Executive Board has held twelve regular meetings, one special meeting, and several informal meetings with the Tag Day committees. These meetings have been well attended, there being an average of six members present.

The Board has had splendid co-operation with the Hospital staff, and Miss Boyle should be highly complimented for her work.

Mrs. Maurice Shepard was appointed on the Board of Directors to fill the unexpired term of the Secretary.

Early in the year the financial condition of the Hospital due to lack of income through the winter months, became a real problem. REPORT OF BOARD OF ENGINEERS, NEW

LONDON FIRE DEPARTMENT

The Board of Engineers report another satisfactory year's work with the New London Fire Company. There have been few severe fires, but more still alarms and chimney fires than usual, which has made the amount of fire expense greater than usual.

The matter of chimney fires is a difficult thing to control. No one knows how serious a small danger may become, and we believe it best to respond ready for efficient action, even though the number of such fires becoming serious, is small. We responded to one call at George's Mills to a serious fire, but owing to the lateness of the call, no efficient help could be rendered except for protection of the adjoining property.

The equipment has been kept up to condition by the addition of new hose this year, and the Board would like to see the further addition of a quantity of $1\frac{1}{2}$ inch hose as soon as conditions warrant. This type of hose is being used by many departments and is, we believe, just as effective for many places and is much less expensive and easier to handle.

PROPOSED ZONING ORDINANCE

Town of New London, N. H.

To promote the health; safety, convenience and general welfare of the community by regulating and restricting the use and construction of buildings and premises in the Town of New London, and for said purposes dividing the town into districts the following Ordinance is hereby enacted by the voters of the Town of New London, New Hampshire, in official meeting convened:

Section I. Establishment of Districts

(A) The Town of New London is hereby divided as shown on the Zoning Map, dated March 12th, 1935 and filed with the Board of Adjustment, into four classes of Districts:

(1) The Business Districts shall include all property from the western bounds of Joseph Bourgeau along the Northern side of Main Street to the Eastern Bounds of the New London Inn. Also from the Evarts Messer corner of Burpee Hill Road along the Southern side of Main Street to the Eastern bounds of Lovely's New London Pharmacy. In Elkins, the Business District shall be limited by Willow Park on the Western end and the brook at Mac-Donald's Store on the Eastern End and only on the Southern side of Main Street. The depth from Main Street in every case shall be five hundred (500) feet.

(2) The Educational Districts shall be the area occupied by Tracy Memorial Library, Colby Hill School, and Colby Junior College, and in Elkins that occupied by the graded school. (3) The Shore Districts will be in three parts; Sunapee, Twin Lake and Pleasant Lake. The Sunapee area will be bounded by the lake and the highway between New London and Newbury except that in no case will the depth of land so included be less than one thousand (1000) feet. The Twin Lake area will be that included between the road around the lake and the lake except that in no case will the depth of land so included be less than one thousand (1000) feet. The Pleasant Lake area will be that included between the road around the lake and the lake except that in no case will the depth of land so included be less than one thousand (1000) feet.

(4) The General Residence and Farming Districts will include all else in the Town of New London.

(B) In cases of lots located in two districts, as where a district boundry line divides a lot in a single or joint ownership, of record at the time such line is adopted, the regulations for the less restricted portion of such lot shall extend not more than thirty (30) feet into the more restricted portion, provided the lot has frontage on a street in the less restricted district.

Section II. Uses, Business District

In a business district, no building or premises shall be erected, altered or used, for any purpose injurious, noxious or offensive to a neighborhood by reason of the emission of odor, fumes, dust, smoke, vibration or noise, or any other cause, or for any of the following specified uses unless the Board of Adjustment shall rule that such use, under such conditions and in such a building as it may prescribe, will not be detrimental or injurious to the neighborhood:

(A) Overnight camps or public camp grounds.

(B) Public dance hall, except where operated as an

accessory to schools, hotels and boarding houses, and is not generally open to the public. This is not intended to prohibit certain uses of Town Hall.

(C) Factory,

(D) Junk Yard.

(E) Lumber or coal yard.

(F) Wholesale storage of oil or gasoline.

(G) Dump.

(H) All forms of signs, billboards, banners or other outdoor advertising mediums, whether illuminated or not, are prohibited except upon the lot or premises occupied by the business so advertised, and then they shall not be larger than twelve square feet. No electric lights, arches, signs or banners of any kind shall be suspended across any highway or sidewalk without the permission of the Board of Selectmen or their Agent or Agents. The use of any wild or domesticated live animals or fowl whether caged or tied shall not be permitted for advertising purposes at any time.

Section III. Uses, Educational District

(A) In an Educational District, no building or premises shall be erected or used for any purpose except for educational use, i. e., class rooms, dormitory, heating plant, hotel, chapel, library, greenhouse or administration uses, incidental to and controlled by an educational institution. All of which is intended to include any accessory use, customarily incident to an educational institution or public library.

(B) Anything prohibited in any other district is likewise prohibited in an Educational District with the following exceptions:

(1) None.

Section IV. Uses, Shore Districts

In the three established shore districts, no building or premises shall be erected, altered, or used for any purpose, injurious, noxious or offensive to a neighborhood by reason of the emission of odor, fumes, dust, smoke, vibration or noise, or any other cause, or for any of the following specified uses, unless the Board of Adjustment, shall rule that such use, under such conditions, and in such a building as it may prescribe, will not be detrimental or injurious to the neighborhood. (Λ) Overnight camps or public camp grounds.

(B) Public dance hall, except where operated as an accessory to hotels and boarding houses, and is not generally open to the public.

(C) Any building or premises for the purveyance of any public amusements, games or entertainments.

- (D) Public wharf or pier.
- (E) Public gasoline filling station or public garage.
- (F) Junk yard or dump.
- (G) Public stable or blacksmith shop.
- (II) Carpenter shop, foundry, lumber or coal yard.
- (1) Manufactory of any kind.

(J) All forms of signs, billboards, banners or other outdoor advertising mediums, whether illuminated or not, are prohibited, except upon the lot or premises occupied by the business so advertised, and then they shall not be larger than six square feet. No electric lights, arches, signs or banners of any kind shall be suspended across any highway or sidewalk without the permission of the Board of Selectmen or their Agent or Agents. The use of any wild or domesticated live animals or fowl, whether caged or tied, shall not be permitted for advertising purposes at any time.

Section V. Uses, General Residence and Farming Districts

In the General Residence District, no building or premises shall be erected, altered, or used for any purpose, injurious, noxious or offensive to a neighborhood by reason of the cmission of odor, fumes, dust, smoke, vibration or noise or any other cause, or for any of the following specified uses, unless the Board of Adjustment shall rule that such use, under such conditions, and in such a building as it may prescribe, will not be detrimental or injurious to the neighborhood.

(A) Overnight camps or public camp grounds.

(B) Public dance hall, except where operated as an accessory to hotels and boarding houses, and is not generally open to the public.

(C) Any building or premises for the purveyance of any public amusements, games or entertainments.

(D) Public gasoline filling station or public garage.

(E) Hospital or sanitarium.

(F) Clubs, where the chief activity of which is a service, customarily carried on as a business.

(G) All forms of signs, billboards, banners or other outdoor advertising mediums, whether illuminated or not, are prohibited, except upon the lot or premises occupied by the business so advertised, and then they shall not be larger than six square feet. No electric lights, arches, signs or banners of any kind shall be suspended across any highway or sidewalk without the permission of the Board of Selectmen or their Agent or Agents. The use of any wild or domesticated live animals or fowl, whether caged or tied, shall not be permitted for advertising purposes at any time.

Section VI. Uses, Non-Conforming

(A) Continuation on non-conforming uses.

(1) Any lawful building or use of a building or premises or part thereof, at the time of the adoption of this Ordinance or any Amendment thereto, may be continued, although such building or use does not conform to the provisions thereof.

(B) Change or extension of non-conforming uses.

(1) The Board of Adjustment may order the issuance of a permit for any non-conforming use to be changed to any specified use, not substantially different in character or more detrimental or objectionable to a neighborhood, or if in a part of a building or premises, designed or intended for such use, to be extended throughout such building or premises.

 $(\mathbb{C})^{\top}$ Temporary Uses.

(1) The Board of Adjustment, may order the issuance of a temporary permit for not more than one year and under such conditions as will safeguard the character of the neighborhood, during the non-conforming use.

(D) Restoration after Fire.

(1) Nothing herein shall prevent the substantial restoration within one year and continued use of a building, damaged by fire or other casualty, provided that in case of damage to a building, non-conforming in use, location or structure, to an extent that the estimated cost of such restoration exceeds two-thirds of its fair valuation immediately prior to such damage and provided that the Board of Adjustment so authorizes.

(E) Public Buildings.

(1) Non-conforming National, State, County and Town buildings are permissible in any district; also any structure requested by the Public Service Commission, is permissible in any district.

Section VII. Building Regulations

(A) No restrictions in any district, are made as to the height of any building.

(B) In a general residence district, no residence shall be erected or moved on to a lot, unless it be of the same general size and style of architecture, of other similar buildings in that neighborhood, and suitable to the approval of the Board of Selectmen or their Agent or Agents.

(C) In a business district, no structure shall be erected or moved on to a lot, unless it be of a generally suitable type for business use and meet the approval of the Board of Selectmen or their Agent or Agents.

Section VIII. Area Regulations

(A) Front Yards.

(1) In a General Residence District, no building shall be built nearer to any street line than the maximum setback observed by two-thirds of the buildings on the same side of the street, to right and left as far in either direction as an intersecting street, but not exceeding a distance of one thousand feet in any case; provided, however, that if within such limits less than one-third of the lots are built upon, the set-back shall then be forty feet, unless the Board of Adjustment shall rule that a lesser set-back will safeguard the character of the district.

(2) In all other districts, no front yard regulations are made.

(B) Side Yards.

(1) No restrictions are made in any district as to the area of side yards.

(C) Rear Yards.

(1) No restrictions are made in any district as to area of rear yards.

(D) Corner Clearance.

(1) In all districts, within the area formed by the lines of intersecting streets, and a line joining points on such lines, fifteen feet distant, from their point of intersection, or in a case of a rounded corner, the point of intersection of their tangents, no structure, fence, billboard or vegetation shall be maintained above a height of three and onehalf feet above the plane through their curb grades.

(E) Accessory Buildings.

(1) No restrictions are made in any district as to the area to be occupied by accessory buildings.

(F) Projections.

(1) No restrictions are made in any district as to the projections of window sills, belt courses or other ornamental features nor cornices, nor an uncovered porch into either front or rear yards.

(G) Appurtemant Open Space.

(1) In any district, no lot shall be so reduced that the dimensions of any of the open spaces shall become smaller than herein prescribed. No yard or other open space, required for a building, by this Ordinance, shall during the life of such building, be occupied by, or counted as open space for another building.

Section IX. Enforcement

 (Λ) Enforcement Officers.

(1) This Ordinance shall be enforced by the Board of Selectmen or by their appointed Agent or Agents and without personal compensation. This appointed Agent of the Selectmen must not be any one of the five members of the Board of Adjustment. (2) No building or structure or part thereof shall be crected, altered, or moved without a permit from the Selectmen or their appointed agent. This permit will be issued upon application of the land owner or builder, stating that the plans and intended use indicate that the building is to conform in all respects to the provisions of this ordinance.

(3) All cases of dispute between the Selectmen or their appointed Agent and the petitioner must be referred to the Board of Adjustment.

(B) The Board of Adjustment.

(1) Within thirty days after the adoption of this ordinance and thereafter as terms expire, or vacancies occur, the Board of Scleetmen shall make appointments to the Board of Adjustment, conforming in membership and duties to the provisions of Sections 54 to 60 inclusive of Chapter 42 of the Public Laws of New Hampshire, as amended.

(2) The Board of Adjustment shall act on all matters within the jurisdiction under this ordinance, in the manner prescribed in said State Statutes and subject always to the rule, that due consideration shall be given to conserving the public health, safety, convenience, welfare and property values.

(C) Owners' responsibility.

(1) All property owners shall be presented with and file receipt for, a copy of this Ordinance and be held responsible for the contents thereof, as applying to their properties.

(D) Penalty.

(1) Whoever violates any of the provisions of this ordinance, shall be punished by a fine not exceeding ten dollars for each day of such violation.

Section X. Validity

(A) The invalidity of any section or provision of this Ordinance, shall not invalidate any other section or provision, thereof.

(B) When effective.

(1) This Ordinance shall take effect upon its adoption at any regular or special Town Meeting.

8. To see if the district will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the district, as determined by the school board in its annual report.

9. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the New London School Board:

I herewith submit the annual report of the superintendent of schools.

Attendance

The attendance last year was a little low on account of illness. This fall and winter whooping cough has kept many pupils at home. This is unfortunate but could not be prevented. The number of tardinesses last year was too large. Some tardiness is, of course, unavoidable, but most of it can be prevented by a little extra effort. The present enrollment is slightly less than it was last year. The grades next year, with two exceptions, will apparently be remarkably uniform in size, each having 12-15 pupils. The senior high school, in its third year now, enrolls 41 pupils. In the future, as far as we can judge at this time, it will have 50-60 pupils.

High School Program

The course of study in the high school is modern and progressive, and is much nearer, without doubt, the ultimate course toward which we are tending than the program now in operation in most secondary schools. The emphasis is correctly placed upon those subjects which are intimately concerned with the pupils' future social, civic, industrial, and family life. The few who wish to go to college can by proper selection of subjects gain admission to most of the colleges. Colleges are not now so much interested in preparatory courses as they are in the calibre of the pupils seeking entrance. Too long have high schools shaped their courses of study to fit the small group preparing for college under the old rigid requirements. High schools are now at liberty-rather, are morally bound-to revise their programs to suit the needs of the ever-growing group of pupils who will pass into life's occupations directly upon graduation from high school.

The subjects offered in the New London High School are as follows:

The Course of Study

This course of study aims to provide a broad cultural training leading to active participation in the social, civic, industrial and family life of the nation. It should, of course, be supplemented by work in art, dramatics, journalism, music and athletics.

Subjects marked with an asterisk (*) alternate with subjects in the grades immediately preceding and will not be offered again until the school year 1935-1936. The subjects are arranged as they would be taken by a pupil entering grade nine in the fall of 1934.

Pupils in grade ten may elect subjects listed under grade nine for the school year 1934-1935. Pupils in grade twelve may elect subjects listed under grade eleven for the same school year.

By proper selection of subjects this curriculum will prepare for admission to most of the leading colleges and universities. No elective subject will be offered unless the number electing it is large enough to make the teaching of the course justifiable.

Extra-curricular Activities

The school is to be commended for having organized games in a recreation period at the close of the day. It is decidedly more beneficial to have all pupils engaged in wholesome athletics than merely to develop a single team, with other pupils on the side lines. School-room work is not thereby shortened since each class period is forty minutes in length.

The Glee Club and Orchestra meet once or twice a week, under the able guidance of Miss Shambo.

The English classes, under the direction of Miss Colby, issue a weekly paper in mimeographed form. This is good experience and serves as the local weekly paper in the winter season. This is a good service well performed.

School Work

The work of all the grades is being carried on effectively, as shown by tests. Instruction is adapted to the needs of the individual pupil. Effort is constantly made to discover the difficulties of each pupil and steps are taken to remedy the trouble.

The work in reading is especially good. An effective system gives the pupils a good start in the first grade. In each grade there is a library of easy books which the children may read in spare time and they do read them, with pleasure and profit. Constantly they contribute information gleaned from this supplementary reading. Thus their background of knowledge is broadened and their ability to read is increased. Perhaps no single factor is more important than this library of supplementary reading books.

The Elkins School is one of the outstanding rural schools in the state. The atmosphere of the school is one of cooperation, loyalty, and good fellowship. Books are not the only source of knowledge there. In many purposeful projects the pupils construct models, draw pictures, collect interesting articles, or dramatize episodes in history and literature.

Nursery School

With the cooperation of the Federal Emergency Relief Administration we are operating a nursery school. The purpose of such a school is to train pre-school children in good habits of play, rest, and eating; also to develop group cooperation. The government pays the salaries of two teachers, nurse and cook; also furnishes the noon lunch and a part of the supplies used. The local expense is only for janitor service, fuel, and place of meeting.

Whooping cough kept many children at home at first, but now there is an enrollment of 22 children. The school is really accomplishing its purpose and is a worthy part of the school system. The teachers are Elizabeth Ann Healy of Contoocook, N. H. and Dorothy Goings of New London. Mrs. Laura Homan serves as nurse and Mrs. Beth S. Woodward as cook.

Finances

The budget for 1935-36 is a little smaller than the appropriation for 1934-35 and is much less than the amount spent in 1933-34. The school board has managed the financial affairs of the school with good judgment. It is expected that there will be a balance on hand next June of about \$1,500. This can be used to decrease the appropriation for 1935-36. Half of this anticipated balance is due to tuitions from pupils who entered our schools rather unexpectedly. About \$600 has been saved on transportation because it was not found necessary to maintain one route which was rather anticipated.

I want to express my appreciation of the cordial cooperation of the School Board and teachers which has made my work in New London very pleasant.
