To the inhabitants of the Town of Plainfield in the County of Sullivan in said state, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Meriden Town Hall in said Plainfield on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for three years, a Treasurer, a Tax Collector, one Trustee of Trust Funds for three years, two Auditors and any other necessary town officers.

You are further notified to meet at Meriden Town Hall in said Plainfield on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March next, at one-thirty o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

- Article 2. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes, to be paid on or before one year's time, pursuant to the New Hampshire Laws of 1917.
- **Article 3.** To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

Article 4. To see of the Town will vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the Town the benefits of Title II of the Federal Social Security Act (Old Age and Survivors Insurance), as authorized by Chapter 101 of the Revised Statutes Annotated Amended by Chapters 301 and 332 of the Laws of 1955, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 to defray the Town's share of the cost thereof.

Article 5. To see if the Town wishes to exclude from the plan services in any class or classes of positions filled by popular election.

- **Article 6.** To see if the Town wishes to exclude from the plan services in any class or classes of positions the compensation for which is on a fee basis.
- Article 7. If a plan for Social Security coverage is adopted, to see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to execute on behalf of the Town the necessary agreement with the State of New Hampshire to carry into effect the plan and to see if the Town will designate the Selectmen to be responsible for the administration of the plan.
- Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to spend not more than \$250.00 to purchase 24 folding chairs for the Meriden Town Hall and 24 folding chairs for the Plainfield Town Hall to supplement the now inadequate seating arrangements in both halls. (By request)
- Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to extend the street lights in Plainfield Plain south on Route 12A to the residence of L. E. Koehler and north on Route 12A to the junction of Route 12A and the Meriden Stage Road. (By request)
- Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to have the Road Agent plow out the entrances to all public buildings in the town with the town snow plows. (By request)
- Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate not more than \$300.00 for the purpose of buying a motion picture projector through the Civil Defense organization.
- Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$500.00 for the purpose of buying a boiler for the Highway Department to use thawing culverts.
- Article 13. To see what action, if any, the Town will vote to take in regard to the covered bridge in Meriden, and to see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for such purpose.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to allow a two per cent discount on 1956 property taxes paid within 30 days following the day the Tax Warrant is delivered to the Tax Collector.

Article 15. To see what action the Town will take with regard to the reports of town officers.

The polls will remain open until six (6) p.m.



My. dear Mr. Hayes:

During the year January 1, 1955, through December 31, 1955, the Plainfield Free Bed Fund in the Mary Hitchcock Memorial Hospital, Hanover, New Hampshire, rendered 39 days' service to seven residents of the Town of Plainfield, New Hampshire.

The charges at the minimum hospital rates for services rendered to these patients amounted to \$758.66.

The portion of the hospital's income from free bed funds which is allotted to the Town of Plainfield was increased during 1955 from \$400 to \$900. As of December 31, 1954, there was an unused balance, which, when brought forward, resulted in an allotment of \$1265 for the year 1955.


Substracting the services rendered from the total allotment, there is an unusel balance of \$506.34, which will be brought forward to 1956.



- Article 3. To choose a member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
- Article 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- Article 5. To choose auditors or other agents for the ensuing year.
- Article 6. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees and other officers heretofore chosen and to pass any vote relating thereto.
- Article 7. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of School District officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of said district and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund and state building aid, together with other in-

come; the School Board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenues and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxation by the district.

- Article 8. To see if the district will vote to elect its officers by an official ballot and to adopt the non-partisan ballot system, as provided in Sections 112 and 120, Chapter 34, of the Revised Laws, as requested by petition.

BUILDING COMMITTEE REPORT

January 16, 1956

The Building Committee held several meetings following the Annual District Meeting in order to work out the details of the building plans and arrange for the advertising for bids. The plans were approved by the State Office of Education and the state fire marshal's office. Four different contractors bid on the addition and R. J. Pierce from Brattleboro was the low bidder. The heating and plumbing work was awarded to the low bidder, John McNamara, and the lighting was done by Fred Dean. The necessity of legislative approval delayed the start of construction and, consequently, the work was late in being finished and school was nine days late in starting.

The committee believes that the addition has improved the appearance of the building from the outside and has made an excellent educational unit for the present number of children in the eastern end of the town. The PTA has arranged an efficient and attractive lunch area and their cooperation and help is appreciated.

Elsewhere in this report there is a financial statement of the cost of the addition.

The School Board members of the committee thank Mr. Ranson who drew the plans and the other members of the committee who generously gave of their time and ability to plan, direct and supervise the construction.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Plainfield:

The construction of the two room addition with the basement space at Meriden, as directed by the building committee, was a very satisfying educational step forward for the children of your community. I appreciate the cooperation given by all members of the building commit, tee, the School Board, and the contractors who did the various types of work on the building. The children now have excellent facilities for their education.

The work of the teachers has been very gratifying this year. Each teacher has at least several years of experience or good training for teaching and these factors have helped to make good education possible for the pupils. Several of the teachers have taken extension courses during the year, in order to keep up with new helps in the field of instruction. Mrs. Ann LaCoss has done a great deal for the children through her physical examinations. The children to age 15 have had the opportunity to have the Polio inoculations.

The janitors and bus drivers have performed their tasks especially well and have kept the safety of the children in mind. The drivers' interest in having the pupils cross the road in front of the bus while the red lights are flashing was particularly commendable.

The lunch programs have fed many pupils and this has been a help for the health of the pupils. Many foods from the Federal Government have been received for the lunch programs and the government has reimbursed the programs by five cents for each lunch eaten by a child. This has enabled the programs to operate at a low cost for the meals. The PTA groups have been most conscientious in the operation of the lunch programs and deserve the appreciation of everyone.

The condition of both of the schools that are in operation is very good. The unused school buildings that

are owned by the District should, undoubtedly, be sold in order that no additional cost result from them. The busses being used in Meriden Village are in good condition. The bus in Plainfield should be traded for a 48 passenger by September, 1957.

The District for the current year received \$17,340.87 from the state for aid for the operation of the schools. The next year's amount will be some less because there are more pupils in the state and probably more districts will qualify for state money. There is a definite possibility that the state income will be sufficient to qualify for the state to pay 20 per cent of the bond payment. The actual amount will be figured on the bond payment for the current year and should give the district \$250.00 for 1956-57 and \$500.00 for the next year.

My appreciation and thanks are given to the School Board, district officers and the citizens who have helped to make the current year successful.

TOWN MEETING 1955

At a legal meeting of the inhabitants of the Town of Plainfield, in the County of Sullivan, State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town Affairs, held in the Town Hall on Plainfield Plain, in said town on March 8 at ten of the clock in the forenoon, the business of the day was disposed of in the following manner:

The meeting was called to order by the moderator, Tracy Spalding. Prayer was then offered by the Rev. Paul Mills of the Community Baptist Church. The calling of the meeting was then read by the moderator, including the action taken by the town under Article 14, March 10, 1953, "that the time for reading and acting upon the articles of the Town Warrant, starting with Article 2, shall be 1:30 p.m. and this shall be included in the warrant for the calling of the meeting."

Article 1 of the warrant was read and the polls were opened.

At 1:30 p.m., the articles of the warrant were taken up as follows:

- Article 2. Voted in the affirmative that the town vote to instruct the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes, not to exceed \$20,000, to be paid on or before one year's time, pursuant to the New Hampshire Laws of 1917.
- Article 3. Voted in the ffirmative that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,537.69 and to instruct the selectmen to borrow \$3,000 payable \$1,500 per year, beginning in 1956, to apply on the construction of the so-called Will French bridge. The money to replace the \$4,500 voted last year under Article 3 of last year's warrant as that money was not actually borrowed in 1954.
- Article 4. Voted in the affirmative that the town authorize the selectmen to trade the Chevrolet truck for a new truck of similar size and capacity, and that the town raise and appropriate a sum therefore, not to exceed \$2,000.

- Article 5. Voted in the affirmative that the town buy a four-wheel-drive unit to use with the new new Chevrolet truck, and raise and appropriate a sum therefore not to exceed \$1,550.
- **Article 6.** Voted in the affirmative that the town authorize the selectmen to buy a new tractor and shovel and that the town raise and appropriate a sum therefore, not to exceed \$3,000.
- **Article** 7. Voted in the affirmative that the town raise and appropriate the following sums to defray town charges for the ensuing year:

Article 11. Voted in the affirmative that the town will authorize the selectmen to lease the Plainfield Plain Town Shed to the Plainfield Volunteer Fire Department for a period of 99 (ninety-nine) years for the sum of \$1.00 (one dollar).

- Article 12. Voted in the negative that will move the Plainfield Town Dump from its present location and relocate on town property or in some other area where fewer residential properties will be deteriorated by its nuisances, paper, etc., blowing onto private property, rat infestation, foul smelling smake and the threat of fire where it will not deface a highway leading into Meriden Village as it does at present.
- **Article 13.** Voted in the affirmative that a copy of the report of the town officers, as printed with corrections, be accepted and a copy be placed on file.
- Article 14. Voted in the affirmative that the town request the selectmen to print the votes of this meeting, and subsequent meetings, article by article, in the Town Report of the following year.

 Voted in the affirmative that the moderator appoint a Finance Committee of six within thirty (30) days of this meeting.


