

#### WARRANT

#### State of New Hampshire

Sullivan, SS.

Town of Plainfield

To the inhabitants of the Town of Plainfield in the County of Sullivan in said state, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Meriden Town Hall, in said Plainfield on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for three years, a Treasurer, a Tax Collector, one Trustee of Trust Funds for three years, two Auditors and any other necessary town officers.

You are further notified to meet at Meriden Town Hall in said Plainfield on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next at one-thirty o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

Article 2. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to borrow money, not to exceed twenty thousand dollars, in anticipation of taxes, to be paid on or before one year's time pursuant to the New Hampshire Laws of 1917.

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to sell or trade the Chevrolet truck now owned by the Town; proceeds of said sale or trade to be applied on the purchase of a new truck; the balance to be raised by appropriation and issue of long term serial notes. Article 4. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the following described sections of Route 12A that have been replaced by the new state road built in 1959; Viz.: Section 1, beginning near the Blancha L. Daniels Place and leading westerly along the northerly side of the new road to the Freeman Hill road; Section 2, beginning at the westerly side of the Freeman Hill road and leading westerly and southerly to the River road; Section 3, beginning on the southwesterly side of the River road and continuing southerly to the new state road.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the following described section of Black Hill road, beginning at the first culvert easterly of Albert K. Read's swimming pool and continuing easterly over Black Hill to its intersection with the road to the so called Porter place.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen when they are drawing up the Town Warrant for the Annual March Town Meeting to notify the inhabitants, qualified to vote in Town Affairs; to meet at Ten o'clock A.M. for the election of Town Officers; and further to notify said inhabitants, qualified to vote in Town Affairs; to meet at 7:00 o'clock P.M., to act on the remaining subjects in the Warrant for such meetings.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell the Town's interest in Lot. No. 630, located on Snow Mountain.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to establish a Capital Reserve Fund to be used for building State Aid Bridges.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to be added to the Capital Reserve Fund for major repairs to or replacement of the Covered Bridge at Meriden. Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell or lease to the School District of Plainfield the right to build an addition to the Town Shed, or the right to build a shed or garage on the lot of land where the Town shed is located for the use of the School District.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to allow a two per cent discount on 1960 property taxes paid within 30 days following the day the Tax Warrant is delivered to the Tax Collector.

Article 13. To see what action the Town will take with regard to the reports of town officers.

Article 14. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

The polls will remain open until six (6:00) p.m.

#### TOWN MEETING — 1959

At a legal meeting of the Inhabitants of the Town of Plainfield, County of Sullivan, State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town Affairs, held at the Town Hall at Plainfield Plain, in said Town on March tenth at ten o'clock in the forenoon, the business of the day was disposed of in the following manner:

The meeting was called to order by the Moderator, Tracy M. Spalding. Prayer was offered by the Rev. Mr. Jack Hemenway of the Meriden Congregational Church.

Pursuant to the warrant of the meeting Article One of the warrant was read and the polls were opened.

At one thirty o'clock in the afternoon the remaining articles were taken up and disposed of in the following manner:

Article II. It was moved and seconded that the Town vote to instruct the Selectmen to borrow money, not to exceed \$20,000.00 (Twenty thousand dollars) in anticipation of taxes to be paid on or before one year's time, pursuant to the New Hampshire Laws of 1917. It was voted in the affirmative.

Article III. It was moved and seconded and voted in the affirmative that Article 3 be postponed until after Article 4 through 12 have been enacted upon, after which we shall return to Article 3.

Article IV. It was moved and seconded that we appropriate the sum of \$42,019.08 to defray Town charges for the ensuing year:

An Amendment was made and seconded that summer maintenance be cut to \$6,000.00 and Town Construction (Graveling \$2,000.00) be eliminated.

Voted in the negative.

The vote on the original motion was in the affirmative.

**Article V.** A motion was made and seconded that the Town vote to raise the sum of \$1,000.00 to be added to the Capitol Reserve Fund for the repairs to or replacement of the Covered Bridge at Meriden.

Voted in the affirmative.

Article VI. A motion was made and seconded the Town vote to allow a two percent discount on 1959 property taxes paid within 30 days following the day the Tax Warrant is delivered to the Tax Collector.

An Amendment was made that the Town vote to allow one percent on property taxes in place of a two percent discount.

Yes 23 No 52

Amendment defeated.

The vote on the original motion was in the affirmative.

Article VII. A motion was made and seconded that the Town will post a list of owners of delinquent Dog Taxes.

An Amendment was made and seconded that the motion be amended to include the publishing as such a list in the Town Report.

Vote on the amendment was in the affirmative. The vote on the original motion was also in the affirmative.

Article VIII. A motion was made and seconded that the Moderator be authorized to appoint a committee of five persons as a Bicentennial Committee to make plans for the observance during the year 1961, by the Town, of the Two Hundredth Anniversary of its chartering, and that the sum of Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) be appropriated for the expenses of the Committee.

The Committee to explore possibilities (both locally and in cooperation with representatives of nearby Towns also chartered in 1761) and to report with recommendations to the Annual Meeting of March, 1960.

Voted in the affirmative.

Article IX. A motion was made and seconded that the town vote to appropriate the sum of \$21,000.00 for the purpose of making improvements to the Willow Brook Road (T.R.A.) such sum to be raised through the issuance of bonds or notes under and in compliance with the provisions of Chapter 241, New Hampshire revised Statutes annotated, 1955, as amended by Laws of 1957, Chapter 273:3, and authorize the Selectmen to determine the date and place of payment of such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other steps as may be necessary to negotiate such bonds or notes as shall be to the best interest of the Town of Plainfield.

Yes 52 No 63

The motion was defeated.

Article X. A motion was made and seconded that the Town vote to discontinue the present non-partisan ballot system of electing Town Officers, and replace it by the Australian Ballot System.

Voted in the negative.

Article XI. A motion was made and seconded that we pass over the article.

Voted in the negative.

A motion was made and seconded that we reconsider Article 11. Voted in the affirmative.

#### Article XI (continued)

A motion was made and seconded that the Town raise and appropriate a sum of \$1,000.00 for the construction of additions, alterations and improvements to the Lebanon Airport (including the acquisition of land therefor) to be voted and financed jointly with the City of Lebanon and any other instrumentalities of the State of New Hampshire, the State of Vermont, and the Federal Government.

Voted in the affirmative.

Article XII. A motion was made and seconded that the Town accept the reports of town officers as printed in the Town Report, and a copy be placed on file by the Town Clerk.

Voted in the affirmative.

Article III. A motion was made and seconded that in accordance with R.S.A. Chapter 31 and 36, the Town adopt and enact the Plainfield Building Construction and Zoning Ordinance in the form recommended by the Town Planning Board, acting as the Zoning Commission, in its final report dated March 5, 1959.

Yes 65 No 54 The motion was adopted.

Article XIII. The following resolution was made:

Be It Resolved: That the Selectmen of Plainfield be authorized subject to Chapter 466, paragraph 33, of the Public Statutes, to post an ordinance requesting that all dogs owned or kept in said Township shall be at all times restrained upon the premises of said owner or keeper, unless in company of, and under the control of, said owner or keeper.

Said ordinance in no way to affect the use of hunting dogs in legal pursuit of game.

A motion was made and seconded that the above resolution be adopted. It was voted in the affirmative.

Be it resolved that the Moderator appoint an advisory committee of six members, and that a chairman be named, said committee shall be appointed within 30 days of this meeting.

A motion was made and seconded that the above resolution be adopted. It was voted in the affirmative.

Be it resolved that the Selectmen study and put before the people in the form of an Article in next year's warrant, the possibility of holding the discussion of Articles of the warrant in the evening of Town Meeting day.

A motion was made and seconded that the above resolution be adopted. It was voted in the affirmative.

During the year January 1, 1959 through December 31, 1959, the Plainfield Free Bed Fund in the Mary Hitchcock Memorial Hospital, Hanover, New Hampshire has rendered 40 days' service to 8 patients from Plainfield, New Hampshire.

The portion of the hospital's income from Free Bed Funds amounted to \$900.00 for 1959. There was an over-use of \$176.05 as of December 31, 1958 and subtracting this figure from the allotment, brought the net allotment for the year to \$723.95.

The charges at the minimum hospital rates for service rendered to these patients during the period amounted to \$1,042.99, which left an overuse of \$319.04 as of December 31, 1959.

Please accept our thanks for the handling of this Fund during the past year.

#### **REPORT OF TRUSTEES OF TRUST FUNDS**

The Trustees of Trust Funds would like at this time to call your attention to the work that is being done in the several cemeteries in the Town. The larger cemeteries of the Town have been lawn-mowed this past summer. The fence in the Penniman Cemetery was painted this year and that at the Plainfield Cemetery was partly painted in 1958; another section was painted this year, with the last part to be painted in 1960. Each year improvements in the care and maintenance of the cemeteries has been made. We hope that a steady progress will be made in their care and that it will continue until the Cemeteries within the Town will be as well cared for as those in some of the larger nearby Towns and Cities.

A small portion of the cost of the care of the Cemeteries is appropriated each year at the Annual Town Meeting, but the largest portion is paid from the Trust Funds that have been created in the past through the thoughtfulness of those who have been interested in the care and beautification of the cemeteries that are the resting place of their family and friends. The additional care of the Cemeteries can only be accomplished by additional income, obtained by increasing our Trust Funds.

We are indeed grateful for the Trust Funds that have been created in the past, and at this time would like to thank those who have in more recent times given Trust Fund.

Mrs. Loella J. Fadden created a fund known as the Elbridge G. and Loella J. Fadden Fund. This is for the care of the family lots in the Gleason Cemetery, and was given in 1958. In the past year several funds have been presented to the Town. The Gaston Hamory Fund, for the care of the Hamory Lot in the Gleason Cemetery, was given by Mrs. Olga Hamory. The H. H. Williams and W. H. Williams Family Fund for the care of the Williams Lot in the Moulton Yard Cemetery was given by Mr. and Mrs. Herbert H. Williams and Family and Mr. and Mrs. Wallace H. Williams and Family. The Edward C. Waite Fund was given by Mrs. Eunice Waite, Mrs. Sylvia Gray and Mrs. Christine Dow. This is for the care of the family lots in the Plainfield Cemetery. Mrs. Lulu Spalding has given the I. Wilmer Spalding Fund for the care of the family lot in the Plainfield Cemetery. The Executrix of the Henry N. Penniman Estate, Mrs. Pansy Penniman, established the Henry N. Penniman Fund for the care of the Penniman Lot in the Moulton Yard Cemetery.

Also the Executor of the Edward M. Pierce Estate gave two Funds. The Edward M. Pierce Fund for the care of the family lot in the Plainfield Cemetery and the William H. Pierce Fund for the care of the family lots in the River Cemetery. All of these funds were given for the care of specific lots and any excess income may be used for the general care of the cemetery in which they are located.

Funds for the River Cemetery are urgently needed. It is only through the expending of the Town Appropriation that this Cemetery receives any care.

We wish to express our thanks, and that of the Town, to the creators of these Trust Funds for their generous gifts. Also we would like to take this opportunity to thank Miss Annie H. Duncan and the Trustees of Kimball Union Academy for the generous gifts toward the general care of the Mill Cemetery. Also Mrs. Eva Mooney and Mr. Charles H. Williams for their contributions toward the care of the Plainfield Cemetery.

Again we wish to thank those who have given funds and donations and to urge you, the friends and citizens of Plainfield, to help in establishing Funds for the care of our cemeteries.

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#### PREVENTION IS EVERYBODY'S BUSINESS

The year 1959 was fortunate from a forest fire standpoint. New Hampshire had the best record in the nation. Fewer acres were burned, suppression costs were substantially reduced and damage to woodlands held to a minimum. The record resulted from a combination of favorable weather conditions, an alert warden service and a cooperating public.

Yet, despite all this, there still persists a disturbing note:

58%, or 6 out of every ten fires in 1959 were caused by careless smokers and debris burners.

10%, or 1 out of every 9 fires was caused by children.

Careless, indifferent, thoughtless and independent minded individuals and failure of parents to properly supervise children and keep matches out of their reach, annually cause these unnecessary fires which cost large sums to extinguish and cause extensive damage. The elimination of these three causes of fires would radically change this picture. The rules are simple —

- 1. Before burning, secure a permit from your local forest fire warden the law requires it.
- 2. Be sure to properly supervise your burning.
- 3. Make certain your fire is DEAD OUT before leaving it.
- 4. Don't throw lighted matches, cigars and cigarettes from moving vehicles use your ash tray.
- 5. Don't burn at home Use your town dump and save yourself much possible difficulty, both personal and financial.

#### **OUR BICENTENNIAL** — What It Means

Two hundred years ago, from this Town Meeting Day in 1960, New Hampshire and all of Vermont above Fort Number Four (now Charlestown) was a vast unsettled wilderness. The Connecticut River, between its forested banks, had been a great highway for the marauding Indians who swooped down upon the settlers near the Massachusetts line. Retaliatory bands of New England men followed them up the river in pursuit and in reprisal. These Massachusetts and Connecticut men saw these great stretches of fine lands, and wished to have them. Many of our townspeople know the story of Major Rogers and his Rangers who made a heroic trip into Canada to wipe out the nest of the Saint Francis Indians who had caused the massacres. The story is well known of the terrible return trip of the starving survivors of this excursion down the Connecticut River and past our very shores, to be received and revived at Fort Number Four in November, 1759. When the Connecticut and Massachusetts men knew that the wilderness lands could now be safely settled, there were many applications to New Hampshire Governor Wentworth, whose capitol was Portsmouth, to give charters for new townships along both banks of the Connecticut River. (It was then thought that all of what is now Vermont lay in New Hampshire's domain.)

So, in 1760, Governor Wentworth's surveyors traveled up the Connecticut River, marking off the township lines at every six miles, and surveying the dividing lines six miles inland to make townships six miles square. These townships were laid out in two bands each side of the River, and more up the tributary rivers.

In the summer of 1761, groups of men (and women, too) in the older New England States, who intended to become proprietors for any of these new towns, sent their representative committees up into this country to select the most favorable locations, and then sent their representative clerks to Governor Wentworth to receive the Town Charters in the name of King George the Third.

The earliest charters were signed on the Fourth of July, although that date had no special meaning at that time. (Many but not all of these towns laid out received their charters in 1761.)

Plainfield's Charter was signed on August Fourteenth, 1761. Therefore, on August Fourteenth, 1961, our Town will be able to celebrate its Two Hundredth Year.

All Americans have been taught to take off their hats to the courage of pioneers, whether they underwent their trials and privations at Plymouth Colony or on The Great Western Plains.

Plainfield intends to remember and salute the men and women who organized the Town, surveyed it, put through the first horse-trail roads, cleared their first three-acre plots and brought their families here.

Plainfield intends to pay tribute to its men who fought in the Revolution, in the Civil War, and in the more recent wars.

Plainfield recognizes the persistence of the people who demanded good schooling, and church-membership.

But Plainfield will not forget that our Town has always been devoted to home life and home industries rather than to spectacular mills or commercial centralization.

For two hundred years, in the Town of Plainfield, our people have lived their own lives. There have been marriages, births and deaths in these many homes, these many families. Plainfield recognizes that the fathers of families have done their best, with their wives as helpmeets, to raise Plainfield's next generation of citizens. Some have gone away from Plainfield, and others have come here. On Plainfield's Two Hundredth Anniversary, it is not only the early pioneers and their energy and courage that will be honored, but the energy and courage of all of the Plainfield inhabitants, through all of the life of the Town.

#### Plans for the 1961 Bicentennial

Your Committee to make plans for the Two Hundredth Anniversary in 1961 has developed a program of celebration evenly balanced between Plainfield Plain and Meriden.

The Plainfield Charter date is actually August Fourteenth, but it was found that August Fourteenth 1961 falls on a Monday. Therefore it was decided that the previous Saturday, August Twelfth, would be the most suitable time for an all-day celebration. The next day, Sunday, August Thirteenth, could receive special attention at the churches.

Because Plainfield Plain has a long, straight, level street, it has been selected as the best spot for the parade. Because of this, the opening ceremonies would need to take place in the Plain Town Hall.

It is planned that the opening ceremonies will take place in the late morning, and will include a very nice surprise event, ending at noon.

A noon dinner, or noon food facilities, would then be announced, which the Committee hopes would be furnished by women's organizations on the Plain. At this "noon-hour" time, Plainfield's public and organizational buildings would be open to the public, with attendants in charge, floral decorations, historical placards, special exhibits, and articles for sale (by the women's organizations) and souvenirs obtained for the occasion.

In the early afternoon a historical parade will assemble at the School House (where the floats will be decorated), and will proceed through the Village to a point where the floats can be drawn up and admired at close range.

Following the floats, it is planned to have a parade of antique vehicles, if they can be obtained in the Town.

School-children in costumes, or any others who wish to appear in costume, can take part in the parade on foot.

A loudspeaker will advise the crowd to go to Meriden where a later-afternoon theatrical skit or musical event will be given.

Supper will then be served at an organization hall or at food stands, and articles will be for sale as at Plainfield Plain, and exhibits will be shown wherever possible, including store-windows.

In the evening a "Calico Dance" (that is square-dancing with called figures) will be held, and exhibition numbers to be a feature of it.

It has been taken into consideration that hot weather is to be expected, and the comfort of the spectators and performers has been considered in the way of cold bottled drinks, cool areas for rest, and cool costumes.

To make the Bicentennial plan a success, the cooperation of all organizations in Plainfield will be necessary. It is urged that all individuals in Plainfield can be of the greatest help to the Committee.

In order to make the parade successful, owners of old vehicles, and such other things as are needed, should kindly report it to any member of the Committee.

The Committee is very anxious to see what photographs can be found, that will show early school groups, early church picnics, other scenes of the "horse and buggy" days, scenes of special interest.

The Committee would like to know what old costumes we have in Town to be studied. Old costumes are often too fragile or too small to be worn, but some could be exhibited, and many could be photographed for the record. The objects to be included in any of the exhibits are to be carefully selected, but the Committee needs to know the location of all suitable things and to be able to look at them and photograph them for consideration.

The work of the Committee during the coming year will be directed toward these searches and (we hope) finds.

There is already under way an attempt to see if some form of a Town History can be prepared in time to be published in 1961. This would be carried out by an Historical Group able to do research on the project. A good deal of material for it has already been compiled by several individuals in the Town, but it would be necessary to collect a great deal more of the Town's historical background in order to adequately do justice to the Two Hundred years of the life of our Town, and to edit it into a readable History.

It is expected that old photographs, or other suitable pictures, would be reproduced in this publication, if the Committee can lay its hands on them.

Another activity of the coming year will be the cooperation with other Towns that have 1761 Charters.

Your Chairman had attended informal meetings with unofficial delegates from some of these Towns, previous to holding our first Committee meeting, and was able to lay some helpful information before the Committee at the start.

But, during the past season, the organization within some other Towns, and between other Towns, has been proceeding slowly. So that, until all of the Towns intending to celebrate in 1961 can send officially appointed delegates to a general meeting, it will not be possible to elect a chairman or steering committee for the region.

It is expected that the region will agree on a slogan and an insignia for the 1961 Bicentennials, and that a booklet telling of the celebratory events in all of the Towns will be published in quantity, and put in public places for the convenience of tourists, summer residents, and the residents of nearby towns and cities.

It is expected that there will be publicity in regional magazines and newspapers for the Group as a whole as well as for individual Towns.

The Town will be expected to contribute its share for the publication of the booklet, or leaflet, which is likely to go to press this fall.

The work which is to be done on Route 12A passing through Plainfield Plain in the summers of 1960 and 1961 is scheduled for completion by July, 1961. However, should the Town Street be in bad condition at the date of the Celebration, it might be wise to postpone the Celebration for one or several weeks, so as to show our Town to visitors in its best aspects.

It also must be understood that many Towns are celebrating in the summer season, and conflicts of dates may have to be solved.

### The State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the School District of the Town of Plainfield, in the County of Sullivan, in said State, qualified to vote in the district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in Meriden, in said District on Saturday, March 5, 1960 at one o'clock in the afternoon to act on articles one through five, (polls will be open from 1 P.M. to 6 P.M.) and beginning at 2 o'clock to act on articles six through twelve.

Article 1. To choose, by ballot, a Moderator for the ensuing year.

Article 2. To choose, by ballot, a Clerk for the ensuing year.

Article 3. To choose, by ballot, a member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

Article 4. To choose, by ballot, a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

Article 5. To choose, by ballot, Auditors for the ensuing year.

Article 6. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees and other officers heretofore chosen and to pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 7. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of the School District officials and agents and for the payment of statutory obligations of said District and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state and federal governments, together with other income; the School Board to certify to the selectmen the balance; which balance is to be raised by taxation by the District:

Article 8. To see if the District will raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$800.00 of which one half

shall be from local taxes, for the purpose of accepting National Defense Education Act (Public Law 85-864) Funds, and to authorize the School Board to make application for, to accept on behalf of the district, and to apply against this appropriation any or all grants or other funds which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government or from the State of New Hampshire under the provisions of the National Defense Education Act.

Article 9. To see if the School District will vote to purchase a school bus and to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the payment of same and to determine if it is to be paid from capital reserve, current appropriation or by borrowing and if by borrowing, to authorize the School Board to issue notes through a bank for such time and under such conditions as the School Board may determine.

Article 10. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be placed in a capital reserve fund toward the purchase of a school bus.

Article 11. By Petition: To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate a sum, not to exceed \$550.00, to reimburse the Meriden and Plainfield school lunch programs at the rate of 3c per meal served to elementary school students; proof of number of meals served to be attested to School Board by a copy of the monthly report to the State.

Article 12. To see if the School District will vote to build a shed to house the school buses at the site of the Town sheds and to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the payment of the same and to determine if it is to be paid from current appropriation or by borrowing, or both, and if by borrowing to authorize the School Board to issue notes through a bank for such time and under such conditions as the School Board may determine. Article 13. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

# DIVISION OF MUNICIPAL STATE TAX COMMISSION Concord, New Hampshire

July 28, 1959

Submitted herewith is the report of an examination and audit of the accounts of the Plainfield School District for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1959, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the District. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the School Board and the School District Treasurer.

Comparative Balance Sheets as of June 30, 1958 and June 30, 1959, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein, the Net Debt decreased by \$2,018.75 during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1959.

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the School District during the fiscal year is made in Exhibit B, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein.

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1959, are presented in Exhibits C and D. As indicated by the Budget Summary (Exhibit D), a revenue surplus of \$1,174.52, plus a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$1,224.88, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$2,399.40.

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1959, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit E-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of June 30, 1959, is indicated in Exhibit E-2.

A statement of the outstanding long term indebtedness of the School District as of June 30, 1959, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit F. It is noted that the current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) increased from \$2,350.65 to \$2,399.40, during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1959, as shown herewith:

### PLAINFIELD SCHOOL DISTRICT REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Plainfield:

The number of pupils in both the Plainfield and Meriden schools has increased, especially in the primary grades. This made necessary the employment of a part time teacher to assist with the instruction of the pupils in Plainfield Village. It was fortunate that the downstairs room was improved during the summer, and with the addition of better heating, has proved to be a satisfactory location for these additional pupils who are taught each morning by Mrs. Northrop. The entire group of 38 first and second graders meet together with Mrs. Corette in the afternoon.

In Meriden, additional pupils have recently enrolled so that Mrs. Hendrick has 34 pupils in the primary room. The four regular classrooms in each building are at or beyond their normal capacity and it appears that in the future there will be more pupils.

There will be a substantial increase in the number of pupils to attend high school in 1960-61. This, as is shown in your budget, will make necessary an increased appropriation for high school tuition. At a recent meeting with the Finance Committee, a suggestion was made that some study of the long-range questions of high school education should be made. It is important that any study be tied in with the coordination of the program for the seventh and eighth grade pupils.

The State Aid for the current year was about \$4,000 more than a year ago, and with increased enrollment this figure should become larger. A need for substantial state money to assist local districts in New Hampshire is imperative. Teachers' salaries and other expenses continue to increase throughout New Hampshire and the country, and consequently Plainfield costs continue to grow. The average state pays 40% of the

entire school costs, whereas New Hampshire, from state funds, on the average pays only 4%. This is a situation that desperately needs improving.

The children have generally exerted better than average effort in their school studies, and the achievement tests, as administered by Mrs. Durkee last April, show very satisfactory results. Special commendation should be given to the teachers who have insisted on high scholastic attainment and to parents who have encouraged their children to make the most of their school opportunities. There are outstanding honor students in high school who have graduated from this district.

My thanks are extended to the School Board members, teachers, custodians, finance committee, bus drivers, cooks, PTA, parents and citizens who have assisted in any way to promote a sound school program.
