

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

#### Town Warrant

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Newfields, in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Newfields Town Hall in said Newfields, on Tuesday, the 11th day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the Town will vote to have all Town Books audited by a Certifield Public Accountant.

4. To raise and appropriate for the issuance and distribution of printed matter and otherwise publicizing the resources and natural advantages of the town in co-operation with other towns co-ordinated in the Seacoast Regional Development Association, the sum of Thirty Dollars (\$30.00).

5. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for road construction and raise and appropriate Seventy-Five Dollars (\$75.00) for same.

6. To see if the Town will vote to grant a discount on taxes paid in full on or before August 15th, discount to be three per cent.

7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

8. To see if the Town will vote to pay the Tax Collector the usual one and a half per cent for collecting Taxes.

9. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Locust Cemetery, a gift from Miss Isabel Paul. 10. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) from the relatives of Miss Nellie W. Pease for the perpetual care of the graves of Lucius S. Pease, Mary Ann French, his wife, and Mary Emma, Abbie, Lucius, and Nellie W. Pease, his children, in Piscassic Cemetery, provided that said lot be put in a condition acceptable to the Trustees of Trust Funds.

11. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

# Report of School Board

The annual meeting of the School District was held at the Town Hall, March 12, 1940, at 7.30 in the evening. The following officers were elected: Perley R. Bean, moderator; Robert E. Nixon, clerk; Francis N. Gray, treasurer; Helen J. Simpson, member of School Board for three years.

The Board met and organized. Helen J. Simpson was elected chairman.

The Board desires to express its appreciation for the excellent work of Mr. Towle, the teachers, and Mrs. Sheehy with our children. We wish to thank our janitor, Mr. Gray, for the clean appearance of our school rooms. We also wish to acknowledge the continued coöperation of the Parent-Teacher Association. The new bus provided by Mr. Marshall has facilitated transportation for our children.

# REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS To the School Board of Newfields, New Hampshire:

I take pleasure in submitting my annual report as Superintendent of Schools, the twenty-second in the series.

It is interesting to note that the total enrollment in the local school (see Table I) has remained almost the same for the last six years. Table I tells us, also, that Newfields is paying for the high school education of nearly as many pupils as are enrolled in the local elementary grades.

Conditions of health and weather last year together with pupil and parent interest were conducive to good school attendance and the result was, as will be seen in Table III, the best percentage of attendance in ten years. Reference to previous statistical tables also reveals the fact that this percentage is the best since

1919 and probably the best ever yet attained. Table VII likewise shows this excellent attendance. It is not often that as many as six Newfields pupils have perfect attendance for the year. Such was the case last Names of Newfields pupils are found on both year. the elementary school honor roll and also on the honor rolls of the secondary schools they attended. As is the case in all school history, not only of Newfields but all other school districts as well, a few Newfields boys and girls from time to time have had to discover, by the hard way of experience, that home study, conservation of time and energy and other similar practices are essential to success in high school work. Between honor rolls and failure, or near failure, many of our pupils have patiently and industriously pursued their courses in the middle ground. It is to be hoped that, whatever their various successes with books and studies, all will have learned ultimately something of the art of living together and will be better citizens of a larger world because they have learned the elements of good citizenship in our schools.

The results of standardized and other tests given annually in our schools show, as they must in every school, a varied range of attainment. The most important information these results give us is the degree to which the talents of each individual pupil are trained. Is the school doing all that it can for each pupil? I feel justified in saying that, at least, the school is earnestly endeavoring to do this. Our regular teachers with their industry, high sense of duty, maturity and professional skill, accomplish much each year for the pupils individually and collectively, and our music supervisor adds much worthwhile training and pleasure to the school life.

The health of the school is most completely supervised by Mrs. Sheehy and she is accorded heartiest coöperation by teachers and pupils alike. Her report, found on a later page, gives the details of her activities during the past year. Such a report, however, cannot convey a complete picture of all the time, thought and care which Mrs. Sheehy gives to her work in Newfields and the other districts in which she is employed.

The school building is in excellent repair and we have an unusually good water supply and an adequate heating plant. The greatest physical need of the school now is modern toilets and I recommend that these be installed at the earliest time that the district considers it possible to do so. Would it be in order to start now, at least with a fact finding committee to report on costs and possibilities? The district's present project of rearranging periods of appropriations of school money is an example of fine coöperation of all the citizens of the town. I trust that the district will approach the matter of modern sanitary equipment for the school in the same spirit.

You will note in Table III that the number of visitors to the school during last year was much smaller than in recent past years. Everything connected with the school is of public interest and I would urge all citizens to visit it oftener and so give encouragement and support to the teachers and pupils.

We continue to be grateful to the Parent-Teacher Association for the active interest which, through the years, has provided us with victrola, electric lights, a supply of water and many other advantages.

It would be impossible for those directly concerned with the administration of the schools to be of greatest service without the aid and coöperation so generously given by parents and other citizens and by officials. We are very thankful for it and we pledge our best service for the children who are later to be citizens of Newfields.
