To the Inhabitants of the Town of Newfields, in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Newfields on Tuesday, the 10th day of March, next, at two of the clock in the afternoon to eight of the clock in the evening, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to grant a discount on taxes paid in full on or before August 15th, discount to be three per cent.
- 4. To see if the voters will authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow a sum or sums not exceeding in the aggregate \$6,000.00 in anticipation of the collection of taxes for the current municipal year, and to issue in the name and on the credit of the Town negotiable notes therefore, said notes to be repaid during the current municipal year from taxes collected within the current municipal year.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to pay the Tax Collector the usual two per cent for collecting taxes.

- 6. To see what action the Town will take relative to the authorization of the sale of real estate held or acquired by the Town on account of purchases at tax sales.
- 7. To see what action the Town will take toward the acceptance of report by Town Officers, as printed in Town Reports.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to increase the price of lots with perpetual care in Rockingham Cemetery (from \$125) to \$200.
- 9. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Newfields, New Hampshire:

It is with pleasure that I submit my fifth annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

The school year 1952-1953 started with the following

personnel:

Mrs. Gladys Chick, Teacher of Grades 4-6

Mrs. Gladys Clements, Teacher of Grades 1-3

Mrs. Eleanor Henry, Teacher of Music

Miss Mary Shea, School Nurse

There was one change in the teaching staff. Mrs. Gladys Chick of Newfields replaced Mrs. Elizabeth Mudget as teacher of grades 4-6.

The above staff is experienced and it is endeavoring to work for the best interests of the boys and girls.

During the summer, the interior of the school building was redecorated. The classrooms and hallways were painted with attractive pastel shades and the blackboards were painted with an improved green paint. Additional bulletin board space which has been badly needed was provided. The result is that the rooms are very attractive and clean in appearance and the lighting of the rooms has been greatly improved.

I would like to take this opportunity to congratulate the citizens and the School Board for the many improvements which they have been willing to make to the school building in the last few years. The installation of flush closets and sinks, installation of a new oil burning boiler, the digging of an artesian well, the painting of the exterior of the building and the redecoration of the interior of the building are all major projects. The completion of these projects has greatly modernized the school plant and it has provided much greater comfort and better working conditions for the students and teachers.

I feel that the greatest need of the school at the present time is an audio-visual program. The great use which the armed forces made of such equipment for training purposes during the last war gives proof of its value as a teaching device. At the time of writing this report, the purchase of a film-strip projector is being considered by the P.-T.A. There are many excellent rolls of film strip now available which cover almost every school subject and which are suitable for all grade levels. These film strips can be purchased in sets of 20 or more rolls at a worthwhile saving in cost. I hope that this projector can be obtained for use in the schools.

A moving-picture projector is an expensive piece of equipment to buy but I understand that it might be possible to rent such a projector locally. If this could be done, then the way would be open to take out a club membership, possibly at the University of New Hampshire film library. Such membership at a cost of \$65 would provide \$75 worth of films which could be scheduled for the entire school year and would provide on the average two reels of film to be shown every two weeks.

The gift of a very fine metal slide donated by Mr. Thomas Brewitt of Exeter has greatly added to the playground equipment.

The generous gift of land by members of the Battles

family will make possible the enlargement of the playground area in the rear of the school.

I call to your attention the reports and tables which follow and I trust that they will prove of interest to you.

I wish to thank the citizens, the members of the School Board, and the teachers for their continued cooperation and support.

REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE

To the Superintendent of Schools:

The school is the child's abode for many of his working hours. It should provide the best there is for a safe, comfortable and healthful living.

Good health is not accidental. It is something that must be constantly worked for and guarded by good health habits. It is up to all of us, the parents, the teachers, the nurse, to instill these habits in the child.

This year, along with the routine examinations by the school nurse, more emphasis has been placed on health education. A great deal of this work depends on the classroom teacher and I have found them most cooperative and interested in carrying out health projects in their daily schedules. Both classrooms have been provided with a set of health books for each grade. The teachers are giving more time to the teaching of this subject.

There is still a lot to be done in Newfields to provide more adequate services for the health of the school child. Physical examinations by a doctor and a dental clinic are needed. But each year sees something new added to provide healthful environment. New equipment for outdoor play has been obtained, which adds to the enjoyment of healthful living while in school.

During the past year the nurse has been able to pro-

vide visual aids in teaching good health habits. Film strips and movies on such subjects as how to avoid colds, how to dress to suit the weather, how to care for the teeth and others have been shown the children. These, along with short health talks, give more value to the teaching of health.

I have found the P.T.A and the parents I have been in contact with to be most cooperative.

Our plans for the future should center around coordinating our thinking and services to provide all the available health resources possible for each child. The goal must, of necessity, be a long term one, but progress can be made gradually and may become a reality before long.

REPORT OF MUSIC SUPERVISOR

To the Superintendent of Schools:

The music program each year covers those steps in music which are necessary in order that each child may have the opportunity of obtaining a well-rounded musical background.

During the first year of a child's school life, an attempt is made to stimulate his interest in music. Work on rhythm band, dances, singing games and action songs help to do this. Ear-training is also very important in the first and second grades. Some children have a natural musical ear, while others are not so fortunate. Work is done to attempt to bring these low voices up to the correct pitch. With work this can usually be accomplished.

Music appreciation, work on the fundamentals of music, note-reading and part-singing are all part of the work to be covered before the end of the sixth grade. Folk dancing, too, helps the child to acquire rhythm and poise.

In May, the operetta, "The Magic Charm," was presented at the Town Hall. I wish to express my thanks to those mothers, members of the P.-T.A., teachers and pupils who worked so hard to make this a success.

Pupils of the six grades participated in the Memorial Day exercises.

During Education Week, in November, special programs were presented by the children in the classrooms.

The annual Christmas program consisted of plays and musical selections.

I wish to thank Mr. Hoyt, the School Board, P.-T.A., teachers and parents for their cooperation.
