STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE Town Warrant

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Newfields, in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Newfields on Tuesday, the 9th day of March, next, at two o'clock in the afternoon to eight of the clock in the evening, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the

year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the Town will vote to apply unincumbered surplus of \$2,451.77 against the appropriations

for the current year.

4. To see if the Town will vote to grant a discount on taxes paid in full on or before August 15th, discount

to be three percent.

5. To see if the voters will authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow a sum or sums not exceeding in the aggregate of \$6,000.00 in anticipation of the collection of taxes for the current municipal year, and to issue in the name and on the credit of the Town negotiable notes therefore, said notes to be repaid during the current municipal year from taxes collected within the current municipal year.

6. To see if the Town will vote to pay the Tax Collector the usual two per cent for collecting taxes.

7. To see what action the Town will take relative to the authorization of the sale of real estate held or acquired by the Town on account of purchases at tax sales.

- 8. To see what action the Town will take toward the acceptance of report by Town Officers, as printed in Town Reports.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the town the benefits of Title II of the Federal Social Security Act (Old-Age and Survivors' Insurance) as authorized by Chapter 234 of the Laws of 1951 and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$65.00 to defray the town's share of the cost thereof.
- 10. If the foregoing article is adopted, to see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to execute on behalf of the town the necessary agreement with the State of New Hampshire to carry into effect the plan and to see if the Town will designate the Town Treasurer as the officer to be responsible for the administration of the plan.
- 11. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Newfields, New Hampshire:

I take pleasure in submitting my sixth annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

The school year 1953-1954 opened with the following personnel:

Mrs. Gladys Chick, Teacher of Grades 4-6

Mrs. Gladys Clements, Teacher of Grades 1-3

Mrs. Eleanor Henry, Teacher of Music

Miss Mary Shea, School Nurse

This is the same staff as last year and it is experienced and conscientious in its efforts to provide good training for the boys and girls.

It may be of interest to the citizens to know that the last session of the State Legislature was more favorable to the cause of better education than the previous session had been.

One example of this was the increase in the amount of State Aid from \$600,000 to \$900,000 per year. State Aid for the Newfields School District was thus raised from \$776.22 in 1952-1953 to \$1,678.46 in 1953-1954 as a result.

Also in order to improve administrative services, the legislature made it possible to increase the number of supervisory unions in the state from forty-eight to fifty. It hopes that this will make it possible to limit the number of school districts in any given union to not more than seven. There are some unions at present with eight or nine school districts. This same law has further provided for an additional number of assistant superintendents in the larger cities and it also provides for about five helping teachers in the larger unions. The Helping Teacher so-called has become an Elementary Supervisor on a union wide basis in some places. In the case of both the Assistant Su-

perintendent and the Helping Teacher the state pays a part of the salary.

The Newfields School District has received \$1,341.34 in Federal Aid for the last school year, 1952-1953, and application has been made for Federal Aid for this present school year.

This money plus the additional State Aid should help materially to defray the increased costs of the school budget.

The response of the parents to the All-Risk Student Accident Insurance program would indicate that there is an interest in this type of insurance coverage. In this Supervisory Union with a total enrollment of 1,410, eleven hundred and eighty-eight availed themselves of the opportunity to take the insurance for this school year. In Newfields, the response was in about the same ratio as for the union as a whole. This schooltime Accident Insurance Plan is offered at the nominal rate of only one dollar per student for the entire school year.

The purchase of a film-strip projector by the Parent-Teacher Association has given the school a good start on an audio-visual program. This machine is an excellent classroom teaching device and it is now desirable to start a film strip library to which a few rolls of film can be added each year.

I call to your attention the reports of the school nurse and the music teacher. I hope that the tables which follow will also be of interest to you.

I again wish to thank the citizens, the members of the School Board, and the teachers for their continued cooperation and support.

SCHOOL HEALTH REPORT

To the Superintendent of Schools:

During the school year a health contest was sponsored. With the aid of the teachers and parents, the children made scrap books of health and safety habits. Much interest was shown. So many excellent ones were turned in that it was difficult to make awards.

This year the children want to make posters. All of this is excellent health education but it does not go far enough. We need to sponsor health attitudes in the youngsters that will be lasting. No better way can be found than through periodic physical examinations in school. This is lacking in Newfields. In spite of the fact that the State Department of Education recommends a minimum of four comprehensive physical examinations during the school career of each child, this is not done until they reach Junior High. Consequently some conditions may exist that should have been found, and corrected where possible, at an early date. I feel we should concentrate on obtaining a part-time school physician in the next school year.

This year we were able, with the help of an illuminated eye chart, to detect a few eye conditions that would have been difficult to find without it. The parents have been most cooperative when notes have been sent home concerning eye or hearing defects, and most of these conditions have been, or are in the process of being, corrected.

We have had the usual run of communicable diseases and colds but on a very small scale. Let's hope it stays that way.

In a school district that does not have a hot-lunch program, we believe that we cannot too strongly or too frequently urge upon the parents the necessity of providing nutritious, appetizing lunches for the growing child. An adequate lunch will help make an alert, happy child. Let's see that he has it!

REPORT OF THE MUSIC SUPERVISOR

To the Superintendent of Schools:

The main purpose of a music program in the schools is to present such a variety of experiences that each child may discover some phase of musical activity in which he may find enjoyment not only as a child, but as an adult.

With this purpose in mind, during 1953 rhythms, music appreciation listening, rhythm band, dramatization, ear-training, dancing, singing, reading music and part-singing have all been included in the program. The pupils in the upper grades have purchased tomettes, and are very much interested in working with them. This instrument is excellent, not only as a means for learning to read music and for harmonizing, but also is often an incentive for the study of some other instrument later on.

In May the pupils participated in the annual Memorial Day program. It was decided not to have a Town Hall Christmas program in 1953 but instead work has been started on the operetta "Lazy Town." This will be presented sometime in the spring.

In closing, I wish to thank Mr. Hoyt, the members of the School Board, the Parent-Teacher Association, the teachers and the parents for their cooperation.
