THE WATER COMMISSIONERS THE SELECTMEN

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Newfields, in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Newfields, on Tuesday, the twelfth (12th) day of March next, at two o'clock in the afternoon until nine of the clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- 2. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year.
- 3. To see if the Town will grant a discount of 2% on taxes paid in full thirty days after the taxes are committed to the collector.
- 4. To see if the voters will authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow a sum or sums not exceeding in the aggregate of \$25,000.00 in anticipation of the collection of taxes for the current municipal year and to issue in the name and on the credit of the Town negotiable notes therefore, said notes to be repaid during the current municipal year from Taxes collected within the current municipal year.
- 5. To see what action the Town will take relative to the authorization of the sale of real estate held or acquired by the Town on account of purchase at tax sale.

- 6. To see what action the Town will take toward the acceptance of reports of Town Officers as printed in the Town Report.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Water Commissioners, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money in anticipation of revenue.
- 8. To see what sum the Town will raise and appropriate during the current municipal year for the Capital Reserve Fund for the purpose of purchasing a new fire truck.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to file in behalf of the Town an application under the provisions of P. L. 560, 83rd Congress, for aid from the Federal Government to defray the cost of final plans and specifications to be prepared by Green Engineering Affiliates, Inc. for a sewerage system, including lateral and interceptor sewers, pumping station and force main and treatment facilities.
- 10. To see if the Town of Newfields will vote to appropriate the sum of \$1,059.00 to buy Visiting Nurse Services for the inhabitants of Newfields from the Medicare certified Exeter Visiting Nurse Association and send one representative to serve on the Board of the Exeter Visiting Nurse Association.
- 11. To see if the Town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to appoint a committee which will help the Town participate in a state-wide contest to improve the appearance of New Hampshire.
- 12. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

(Business Meeting to be held at 8:00 p.m.)

REPORT OF THE NEWFIELDS WATER BOARD

The extension to the town water system, consisting of additional wells and an additional pumping station, was completed and put into operation on January 30, 1968. Both the Extension system and the older system are now in operation. Each is supplying approximately half of the town's water supply. Either is capable of maintaining the town supply by itself, and the operation of both is fully automatic.

The machinery of the two pumping stations should be inspected regularly and any change in performance reported and checked promptly. In addition, I recommend that the town property, including the wells and pumping station, be fenced off to protect the purity of the supply.

It is also recommended that the town install meters in order to monitor consumption in the event of a future shortage or further expansion of the town.

On behalf of the Board, I wish to thank Mr. Ernest Chick, Superintendent, and Mr. William Chick, Assistant Superintendent, for their services in maintaining the town's water supply during the difficult period of repair of the older system and installation of the extension system. This could not have been accomplished without them.

I regret to announce that Mr. William Chick has resigned as Assistant Superintendent as of January 1, 1968.

I regret to announce that I must resign as Water Commissioner as of July 31, 1968, as I shall be away for the following year. I wish to express my personal appreciation for the cooperation and assistance which I have

received from my fellow commissioners, from the Superintendent and Assistant Superintendent, from Mr. Merle Sharp, and from Mr. Edwin Kimball of Newmarket whose design and workmanship brought the extension system into operation.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD

The annual School District meeting was held at the Town Hall on March 13, 1967. District Officers elected for the following year were: Lindsey R. Brigham, Moderator; Mary B. Hallinan, Clerk; Barbara Hallinan, Treasurer; Glendora Lawrence, Member of the School Board for three years.

The Board elected William C. Tebo as Chairman and Glendora Lawrence as Secretary.

In accordance with Article 9 of the 1967 School District Warrant as adopted, the School District received the sum of \$200.00 for playground equipment. With the assistance of the Parent Teachers Association Committee, equipment as follows was selected, purchased and installed:

- 1. A double see saw.
- 2. A tether ball.
- 3. A giant stride.

The children have received many hours of enjoyment from this additional equipment.

The Robert Lawrence Memorial Library has continued to be a most helpful and useful addition to our educational facilities. Our volunteer librarian, Mrs. Harriet Knipstein, and assistant, Mrs. Barbara Tebo, deserve a special Thank You for devoting many hours to its reorganization and operation.

The AREA School Advisory Committee Representative for Newfields is William C. Tebo. This committee meets at least three times a year, and is responsible for recommending improvements or changes in curriculum and other school programs and services at the Junior and Senior AREA Schools.

A part-time teacher, Mrs. Ganley, was hired in January to assist with special teaching requirements, to help slow learners catch up to their class. This was approved in order to provide the best possible education to all of our students, in whichever area they have requirements.

More cooperation of the parents in regard to behavior of children during school hours and on the playground after school is very necessary. Teachers should not have to spend so much time on discipline, as this training should come from the home. The playground may have to be closed to the children after school if this continues to be a problem.

Mrs. Norman F. Holder, the School Nurse, and Dr. John W. G. Tuthill have continued their excellent health program.

The P.T.A. has continued the Soup and Milk program also conducting the Thrift Shop in order to support their activities. This year they have provided new rain coats, safety patrol belts, and baseball equipment.

It is with regret that the School Board reports the retirement of our Superintendent, Mr. Raymond Hoyt, after twenty years of devoted and faithful service to our District. It is our hope that he may enjoy a long and happy retirement.

We would like to thank our nurses, guidance councilor, teachers, janitor, and all others who devote their time and efforts to make our school a better one for our children.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Newfields, N. H.:

It is with mixed emotions that I submit my twentieth and last annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

I take this opportunity to express my sincere thanks to the members of the school board, past and present, teachers, supervisors, members of the Parent-Teacher Association and to the citizens for the support given to me during this period of years. I shall always follow with interest the progress of the schools with which I have been so closely associated. There is evidence to show that by working together we have been successful in obtaining better school facilities and in continually improving the curriculum and program of studies for the girls and boys of this community.

The school year began with the following teaching staff:

There are several changes in this staff. Mr. Leonard McMaster replaced Mrs. Betty Phinney as principal and Mrs. Idolyn Crabtree as teacher of Grades 4-5. Mrs. Mary Echols succeeds Mrs. Carolyn Pulsifer as teacher of Grade 2. Mrs. Donna Batchelder is teaching Grade 3 in place of Mrs. Phinney. Mrs. Sally Wool is teaching music this year and Mr. Roger Marchand and Mr. James Iovino have joined the Title I staff as successors to Mrs. Sylvia Rice and Mr. Stanwood Fish as supervisors of

remedial reading and guidance counselor, respectively.

The enrollment as of December 22 was as follows:

This is a total of 122 as compared to 120 on a comparable date a year ago.

The Newfields - Exeter Title I project continues to give the girls and boys in the Newfields school a more nearly complete school program by offering remedial reading, guidance counseling and health services of a clinical nature including a speech clinic one-half day a week.

The tuition rates for 1968-1969 as approved by the State Department of Education and announced by the Exeter School Board are:

These estimated per pupil costs for 1967-1968 compare with the state average per pupil costs of \$637 for high school and \$549 for junior high school exclusive of rental charges.

The AREA Junior High School was opened to six hundred and thirty pupils on schedule on September 6. This is a very attractive and functional building and provides the students with a broadened curriculum. The building has made it possible to implement fully the AREA School Plan for the six school districts involved for Grades 7-12.

Mr. Frederick King, Teacher Consultant for Supervisory Union #16, describes some of the work which he is doing as elementary school supervisor and director of curriculum as follows:

As a teacher consultant I must assume a leadership role in the process of curriculum development, curriculum balance, articulation between grades, divisional levels and communities, and integration among the various subject matter areas.

If I were to list a group of action words to describe the consultant's tasks, I would say they might include encourage, stimulate, support, facilitate, guide, influence, suggest, question, challenge, demonstrate, coordinate and lead as I work with teachers.

Last fall at the opening school meeting as teachers gathered for the beginning of a new year I called for new aspects in learning that would bring about a vitality so much needed to successful classroom teaching.

We know, with considerable certainty, that the world of today's children will see new and changing patterns of social organization. One of my main tasks is to join with teachers in examining possible changes and to take a leadership role in channeling these changes into educationally sound procedures.

The school holds a key position in the survival of our nation. A number of projects and pressures are appearing at various levels. The role of the teacher consultant as a curriculum leader takes on new importance as one sees the "flood" of ideas from the "outside." An examination of the new is essential but at the same time we must strive for effective utilization of the already proven materials and media.

This fall a new social studies guide was placed in the hands of our teachers. It is now being used as a guide for social studies instruction. It is not final. We will continue to discuss and examine it through teacher meetings and discussion. The classroom will be the true test of the guide's ability to bring about a "new life" to social studies. This is but one example of curriculum study.

The teacher consultant is concerned with the learner and the process of learning. We want children to be actively involved in their education. We need to be more concerned about the development of human beings capable of creative thoughts and action.

We can build wonderful schools, and provide a multitude of materials, but the teacher's job of helping the child see what is the full meaning of attaining skills and knowledges will be the key to the future of our nation. The teacher consultant joins with the classroom teacher in a "partnership" for better education. If I, as a consultant, can communicate with teachers the observations, understandings, perceptions, enthusiasms, and beliefs which I feel and we share together these concerns for better schools, then I have no doubt that a more effective education will be realized. I will continue to serve this community with this philosophy.

I trust I have in this report pointed out to you, as citizens, a kind of philosophy or spirit that prevails as I work with the staff. It is not an item by item account of what was done this past year, but rather a communication to you of an attitude and commitment I have in continuing to develop a better school program.

I call your attention to the reports and tables which follow.

SCHOOL HEALTH SERVICES

To the Superintendent of Schools:

School Health Services cover a wide field and are designed to include all that affects the well being of school children. This year physical examinations were offered to all children in Grade 6, new admissions who had not had an examination in the previous year, plus those children with conditions warranting the opinion of a physician who would otherwise be unlikely to receive professional attention.

Vision screening has been carried out with the assistance of a volunteer mother along with screening for hearing loss which is done by the school nurse on children in Grade 1, 4 and 6, new students entering the school and upon any child with symptoms of possible hearing loss referred to the nurse.

Tuberculin testing was done on children of Grade 1, and Staff members in September. We shall, in cooperation with the N. H. Tbc. Association, continue this valuable diagnostic screening program each year and will include all allowed by the sponsoring Association.

Special emphasis on dental health has been evidenced by demonstrations, clinics and dental health education. In the summer of 1968, we hope to benefit from a new State sponsored program offering free dental examination, cleaning, and topical application of fluoride to all pre-school children, ages 3 to 6 years. This program is similar to the one presently sponsored by the Newfields P. T. A., available to all school children for a nominal fee. Parents are encouraged to take advantage of this opportunity for their pre-school children.

Pre-school clinic held on Registration Day is the best way we know of determining whether a child is physically and emotionally ready for Grade 1. A registered state dental hygienist is to be present at this time to examine the child's teeth and consult with the parent. Opportunity to have your child brought up to date on his immunizations will be available.

Through education only can we expect returns from our efforts to establish good understanding and practices of health, hygiene, and safety. Special speakers, filmstrips, films and other aids to enrich the health education curriculum are available—ideally—for introduction in conjunction with special class units at a time when our material will be most meaningful to the students.

Parents are welcome to visit the health office for conference when there is a health related interest which you may wish to discuss.

I am sincerely appreciative of the support of the School Board, Superintendent of Schools, Principal Mr. McMasters and all individuals and organizations whose interest has helped to make our health services more effective and far-reaching.

REPORT OF THE MUSIC SUPERVISOR

To the Superintendent of Schools:

The music program in Newfields this year has the overall intent of encouraging the students to enjoy music in as many ways as possible. First graders learn most songs wholly by ear and participate in related dancing and rhythmic activities. By second grade the students begin to connect the aural with the visual through the use of music books. Note reading as such formally begins after the children are fully familiar with dynamics, symbols, and terms, in the third grade. They receive pre-instrumental instruction also during this year.

Fourth, fifth, and sixth graders gain increased familiarity with the mechanics of the printed music page. Other aspects of the program include guided listening, recognition of basic musical elements of melody, harmony, and rhythm, observation of keyboard, and choral participation.

REPORT OF THE ART SUPERVISOR

To the Superintendent of Schools:

The world of a child is made of pictures: the red leaves fluttering slowly to the ground, frosty breath on a winter's morning, and the patterns of clouds outside a classroom window. The teacher's role is to bring these pictures into focus, not only the familiar ones seen everyday, but new ones discovered in class. An art course, in correlation with the regular program of studies, enables the child to strengthen his understanding of the subject by expressing himself in the way most natural to him, without feeling self-conscious.

I have tried to introduce a variety of projects besides paper and crayons. These include water colors, papier mache, clay, pastelle, collage, dioraras, mobiles, poster paints, and balsa wood. With the help of the teachers, some of whom have continued on their own time and initiative, I think the children have discovered enjoyment, and a sense of personal accomplishment in art. And this, not the "prettiness" of what they create, determines the success of the program.

I would like to extend my thanks to the School Board, Mr. McMasters, and all the teachers for their cooperation and assistance.
