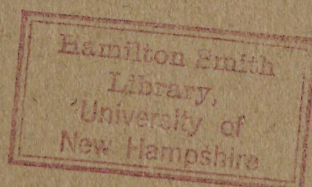

TOWN WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Newbury, in the County of Merrimack, in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

[L. s.]

You are hereby notified to meet at Town hall, in said Newbury, on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for the same.
3. To bring in your ballots upon each of the questions submitted by the Convention to Revise the Constitution relative to the amendments proposed by said Convention at a session held on January 28, 1921.
4. To see if the town will vote to accept the provisions of Chapter 117, Laws of 1917, on a section of the Central Road, so-called, and appropriate, or set aside from the amount raised for highway work the sum of \$350 for this purpose.
5. To choose a Library trustee for the ensuing two years.

6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be used for the observance of Old Home Day.

7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300 toward exterminating White Pine blister rust.

8. To see what action the town will take in regard to shingling Town hall, and to raise and appropriate money for same.

9. To see what action the town wishes to take in regard to buying a tractor, and to raise and appropriate money for same.

To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors or Officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

Members of School Board:

This, the first report by your superintendent, covers the year ending August 31, 1920, and includes organization and attendance, instruction, extension activities, buildings and equipment, and recommendations.

ORGANIZATION AND ATTENDANCE.

Teachers had been engaged for all schools except the South before the superintendent assumed his duties. Due largely to the required licensing and the contract system of employment of practically all teachers in the state, there was only one change in the staff during the school year. However, salary increases were necessary within the year to retain two experienced teachers who were not under contract. The following is a complete list of the regular teachers employed in the town.

Four schools were maintained for thirty-six weeks. On account of the resignation of Miss Colburn and the extreme scarcity of qualified teachers, the Cheney school was closed at Christmas and the pupils transported to the South.

When you consider the extremely severe weather of last winter and the length of your transportation routes, the following table of attendance reflects credit upon the perseverance of your boys and girls and the co-operation of their parents. This is particularly true of the Baker Hill school, which maintained for the entire year the best attendance record of any school in the five towns comprising this supervisory union.

INSTRUCTION.

Particular attention has been given in the first four grades to the subject of reading. The ability to read readily and comprehendingly is the key to promotion in these grades and is essential to the enjoyment and profit derived by the child from the work in all grades. In addition to more formal reading, emphasis has been placed on the silent reading of even a larger list of books and upon the training of the child to accurately and in correct language reproduce the content of the printed page. Standard scale tests in reading, prepared by Professor Adams of the Plymouth Normal School, were given in all eight grades. The highest average rating in both speed and comprehension was made by the fifth and sixth grades. Satisfactory averages were secured in the other grades.

In the grammar grades, in addition to the study of United States history, considerable time was given to the background of American history, including the early racial history and mythology of the peoples contributing to modern civilization.

Simple geographical readers were used with all pupils in the primary grades. New Tarr and McMurry geographies, including the latest European revisions, were adopted by the school board and introduced in the grammar grades.

Arithmetic in the primary grades was taught principally from the blackboard and without the use of textbooks and answer lists. For the moral value of the pupil's training in self-reliance and habits of accuracy simple proof methods of checking results were taught and insisted upon.

Stress was placed on the practice of personal hygiene, on the relation of the individual to the health of the community and on the menace of alcoholics and narcotics.

The Palmer method of penmanship was taught in the first four grades.

Formal drill in spelling was given in all grades above the second.

Thrift and patriotism as civic duties were interpreted through classroom exercises, current history and biography, care and economy in the use of school materials, and by the participation by the pupils in the public observance of Memorial Day.

EXTENSION ACTIVITIES.

In this connection I wish to mention the medical examination of the pupils and teachers made by Dr. Lloyd H. Cogswell. Fully as important as the inspection is the need of follow-up work, which is not included in the duties of the inspecting physician. During the long summer vacation the largest number of corrective treatments can usually be secured. It is during the summer months as well as during the school year that the services of a school or community nurse may be made of particular value to both the parents and children. The following report of the examining physician indicates a possible field of activity for the local Red Cross or some other community organization.

BUILDINGS AND EQUIPMENT.

Permanent improvements made during the year include at the South the installation of two slate blackboards and the purchase and installation of a jacketed heater and ventilating system similar to that previously installed in the District No. 2 schoolhouse.

At Baker Hill the former benches have been replaced by individual desks, and the seating arrangement reversed, to secure greater utility of heat. The two windows directly in front of the pupils and on the north side of the building have been walled in, thus removing the danger of injury to the pupils from improperly directed light and shutting out much of the draft in cold weather. This building is in serious need of reshingling and painting.

The schoolroom at No. 2 is in extremely poor repair. Before children are required to occupy this room another year there should be thorough cleaning, repair of plastering and painting. The seating and desk equipment should also be improved.

The building at Mt. Sunapee has in several respects the best equipped schoolroom in the town. This building is in good repair and meets every requirement of a school of this size.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

In making a survey of your district, I would recommend that your schools be consolidated into two or three buildings. One of these schools should provide for ten grades and should have facilities for teaching manual training, cooking, sewing, school gardening and elementary agriculture. The remaining schools would need to provide instruction for only the first six grades. Newbury is primarily an agricultural town and the course of study should tend to promote its agricultural resources. A consolidated school means a building of few rooms, with

approved and qualified teachers, equipped with modern improvements. This would mean that the district would own and operate one or more closed transportation vehicles, so equipped as to be either motor-driven or horse-drawn, according to the season.

CONCLUSION.

In conclusion, I wish to thank the citizens, teachers and school board for helpful support and loyal co-operation.
