THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

[L. s.]

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Newbury, in the County of Merrimack, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Newbury on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes, for current expenses.
4. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid, known as T.R.A. on class V roads. If so, vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$533.34 the State to contribute the sum of \$2,133.37.
5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum equal to not more than one one-hundredth of one per-

cent ($1/100$ of 1%) of the assessed valuation, based upon the 1940 assessment, for the purpose of advertising the attractions and resources of the Town, in connection with other towns in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 (One Hundred Dollars) for publicity purposes.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 (Four Hundred Dollars) for the control of Pine Tree Blister Rust, the State to contribute the usual amount.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 (Three Hundred Dollars) for new fire hose.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 (One Hundred Dollars) to provide for additional fire protection due to the war emergency.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 (One Hundred Dollars) to provide watchman and additional police protection due to the war emergency.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 (Two Hundred Dollars) for the use of the town health officer and board of health due to the war emergency.

12. To see what action the town will take to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 (Two Hundred Fifty Dollars) Forest Fires.

From the above tabulation, it will be noted that the schools of the district were in session the full 360 half-days required by law. The percent of attendance has increased, and the amount of tardiness has been diminished by about one-half. The number of pupils registered is 76. Twenty-one high school students from this district were registered in neighboring towns and two elementary pupils attended in Bradford. This makes a total of 99 pupils residing in the District and attending public schools,—a decrease of 19 pupils from last year.

This year, only ten or eleven pupils are attending at Baker Hill school. On account of this and the shortage of elementary teachers with the consequent increase in teachers' salaries, the district could undoubtedly save money by closing this school and transporting the pupils to the other schools. By this means, the expenses of the district might be kept within the present budget.

SHORTAGE OF TEACHERS

We wish to direct the attention of the board and the parents of pupils in the district to the serious shortage of teachers. During the past two years this has been becoming more acute, particularly among elementary teachers. Now, it is greatly accentuated and is extended to high school teachers. The reasons for this are: (a) Large numbers of young men have enlisted in the army or navy. (b) Others, both men and women have gone and will go to work in essential industries where they receive much higher wages or salaries than they would in teaching. The latter will be followed by others who are now teaching, unless higher salaries are paid. Prices are going up, and the value of the dollar is coming down. The cost of living has increased eleven percent since August, 1939. Food prices are up nineteen percent. A dollar at the grocers is worth only about eighty cents.

Twelve million factory workers have already received an increase of 30% in average weekly earnings. Farm products have gone up 45%. Teachers' salaries, however, remain the same. Prices by the end of the year 1942 will in all probability be 25% higher than in August, 1939. Thus the teacher's salary of \$1,000.00 will be cut to \$750.00. To have purchasing value equal to that of 1939, it should be advanced to \$1,250.00. This will, of course, mean an increased budget and higher taxation, but to meet this, incomes of the people in general are rising faster than the cost of living. Property is worth more.

At the coming district meeting, it will be necessary for the people of the community to choose whether they will jeopardize the welfare of their children through the loss of their best teachers, or whether they will increase the salaries of these teachers enough to hold them in the district. Already several of the teachers in Supervisory Union No. 26 have received very attractive offers to teach in neighboring states or in the larger towns and cities of New Hampshire.

The schools are our long-time line of defense. It is the responsibility of the people to strengthen rather than weaken this line.

At the South School, there is need for new toilets. The tanks of chemical toilets now in use there have rusted out. We would suggest the installation of regular flush toilets in place of these. A supply of running water is available for this purpose. If it is impossible to obtain these on account of war priorities, the septic toilet at Baker Hill might be moved to this school as a temporary measure. However, this would replace only one unit where two are needed.

In conclusion, we wish to thank the members of the board for their continued cooperation and support, and their constructive policy for the regular progress and advancement of the schools.
