TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

[L. s.]

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Newbury, in the County of Merrimack, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Newbury on Tuesday, the eighth of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects: The Articles of the Warrant to be taken at Ten o'clock in the forenoon, with the exception of balloting.

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred fifty dollars (\$350.00) for painting the Office Building inside and out.
5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four hundred fifty dollars (\$450.00) for painting the Memorial Hall.
6. To see what action the town will take in regard to raising and appropriating the sum of for the purpose of Class V Roads.

7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One hundred twenty-five dollars (\$125.00) for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the town, together with the other towns in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region.
8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three hundred dollars (\$300.00) for the New London Hospital.
9. To see what action the town wishes to take in regards to disposing of property acquired by tax deed, the vote to hold until rescinded.
10. To see if the town will vote to reroof the Town Hall raise and appropriate money for same.
11. To see what action the town wishes to take in regards to purchasing a 600 gallon tank truck and raise and appropriate money for same.
12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Hundred dollars (\$400.00) for the control of Pine Blister Rust.
13. To see what action the town wishes to take in opening the Information Booth for the coming year at Newbury and raise and appropriate money for same.
14. To see what action the town wishes to take in regard to erecting signs on town roads at intersections or where needed to raise and appropriate money for same.
15. To see what action the Town wishes to take in regards to stocking Lake Sunapee with fish, raise and appropriate money for same.

16. To see what action the town wishes to take in regards to accepting One Hundred dollars (\$100.00) for the perpetual care of the Wade Messer cemetery lot.

REPORT OF HEALTH OFFICER

1948

June 4—To Lumber Company at South Newbury to observe smoke nuisance. We served notice to the company on this day to stop burning slab or we would take steps to remove the incinerator.

June 11—To Lumber company at South Newbury to check smoke. Many complaints have been received because of this smoke nuisance both by the Health Officer and the Local Board of Health. At this date the mill is still operating and will do so until forced to stop. The attitude of the man in charge is very antagonistic and he shows no inclination to cooperate.

June 16—To South Newbury. Smoke was very thick in the village in the morning. Not so bad in afternoon. Reported to Selectmen.

June 22—To Lumber Company at South Newbury. Our intentions were to tear down the incinerator but a lawyer for the company agreed not to use the incinerator for two (2) days and to notify us of their further intentions at that time. Present at this meeting: Health officer, 3 Selectmen, Road Agent and 5 men. We were notified later that the company would stop burning slab.

June 22—Checked cottage at Edgemont in following up complaint of last fall and found conditions improved some but not entirely satisfactory. This man still intends to use boat house for his own family during summer, dumping waste back of the tracks.

July 28—Visit to cottage near Newbury Center to check water supply. Found owner had sent in sample and was o.k.

August 1—Visit to Pine Cliff section to check dumping a rubbish by side of the road. Found rubbish but no evidence

as to who was doing the dumping. Road Agent agreed to clean the rubbish with the town truck. It is difficult to understand why people will dump rubbish beside the roads in this town and ruin clean woods and beautiful scenery when we have 3 dumps in the town for this purpose. If you see anyone dumping rubbish beside a road in this town or any other unauthorized place please report names or car registrations to your Health Officer and I will guarantee action.

September 7—Visit to cottage at Blodgetts Landing to examine sink drain and cesspool. Found septic tank had been running over but owners were not at cottage. Will contact later.

October 12—Contacted cottage owner mentioned above and after some persuasion he agreed to fix the trouble if he was still the owner next season. (The cottage is for sale) I will check the cottage next season. There are apparently still a few people who think that the overflow from a septic tank is harmless and may be allowed to flow above the ground. According to the State Board of Health this information is not true, such liquid flow must be kept underground.

Names and true location mentioned in this report are in the permanent files of your Health Officer and any resident may have this information upon request to him.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Your local organization to prevent and extinguish brush and woods fires is glad to report a good year of forest protection in 1948. In spite of danger conditions nearly equalling at times those of 1947 when great losses were suffered in New Hampshire and New England, fire damage and loss this year have been gratifyingly low.

With the continuing cooperation of all the people, we can hope to have another successful year in 1949. Let us remember that in any year, over 90% of all fires are caused by carelessness and that all of these man-caused fires are preventable.

Today, we have more slash and uncut grassland than for use our outdoors are also more numerous than ever before. We must therefore be ready for fires which might occur but, many years in the past. Smokers, campers and tourists who above all, prevention by everyone is the greatest need.

A few simple precautions taken by every citizen will help, as follows:

- (1) Always get a written permit from the warden before kindling a fire outdoors when the ground is not covered with snow.
- (2) If you smoke, always extinguish matches and tobacco before dropping or throwing them down. In automobiles, always use the ash trays.
- (3) Report fires and smokes to the warden without delay.

The observance of these and other simple rules will go far to insure safety from fire damage and your cooperation in this way is earnestly solicited.

Newbury is in a more fortunate position than most towns in the state. The school census at the present time does not indicate any great increase in school enrollment during the next four or five years. The seventh and eighth grades are the largest classes in the school system. The effect of the tramway on the population in the northern part of the town will have to be watched very closely. The bad weather as

far as skiing goes will tend to hold down any growth for at least a year.

Three important moves were made last year. The Hot Lunch Program was started and was tremendously successful. It appears to be just as successful this year with the children at the South School doing an especially fine job at Mrs. Jim's. You should be proud of them. The other major moves were: providing High School transportation and setting aside one half of one per cent of the assessed valuation as a building program fund. Both of these projects should be combined next year. The years go by very fast and, if in one year Newbury decides to make some changes in the buildings, you will have a nice little nest egg on which to fall back.

One major change this year has been to improve the lighting in the schools which was quite bad. Fluorescent lighting has been installed in the Center School and the old lights from the Center School have been added to the South School.

The supply of elementary teachers is probably shorter than last year. Few new teachers are entering the field and many still continue to leave. Many towns are forced to increase their teaching staff because of increased enrollment of children. I need at least three more teachers in the Union than I had last year. If every teacher in the Union returns, and I know they won't, I will still have to go looking for three teachers. Last year I thought I had scraped the bottom of the barrel. It is not a pleasant prospect.

I know of no other town where the school board is paid on the basis of the number of visits to the schools, and the number of school board meetings. This business of being a board member is becoming more complex each year. The amount of pay that any school board member gets in relation to the amount of time and effort is very small; not to mention the complaints, which sometimes requires the wisdom of a Solomon to solve. It would be only in keeping with general practice to set a definite sum to be paid each

boardmember, and assume that they would serve to the best of their ability. I have the greatest respect for the board members in my union, even if I don't always agree with them.

In spite of all the difficulties, it has been a very enjoyable year. I have enjoyed the Newbury children very much both in the grade schools and those at Simonds. I am beginning to feel that I really know them. You have an excellent group of youngsters and they deserve nothing but the best.

My relations with the School Board, teachers and towns people have been very pleasant and I appreciate the fine spirit of cooperation which you have given me.
