THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Marlboro in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Marlboro on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for repairs and construction of sidewalks or act in any manner relating thereto.

4. To see if the Town will raise a sum of money for repairs, water storage, equipment, supplies and other expenses of the Fire Department.

5. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for Electric Lights.

6. To see if the Town will raise the sum of \$2,000.00 to aid the Community Nursing Association or act in any manner relating thereto.

7. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for Memorial Day.

8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote for the purchase of tar for highways or act in any manner relating thereto.

9. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid

on Class V roads, raise and appropriate the sum of \$594.71, the State to give \$3,964.70.

10. To see if the citizens of the Town will vote to construct a so-called black top road on Depot Street extending from East Main Street by the Arthur Wilcox and Omar Dumont homes, up the hill and over to the New England Telephone Company right-of-way crossing on Depot Street.

11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$231.00 (1/100th of 1% of the valuation of the town) to the Monadnock Region Association of Southwestern New Hampshire for issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising, and by other means calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the town, in cooperation with the other thirty-seven towns of the Monadnock Region.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300 to be paid to the Federated Church of Marlboro for the cost of heating and janitor services for the Youth Center when utilized by the following youth groups of our community under adult supervision: Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Cub Scouts, Brownies, Catholic Youth Organization, and 4-H groups.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,000 to help maintain the Frost Free Library or act in any manner relating thereto.

14. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to support the program sponsored by the Recreation Commission.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, for hydrant service, the sum of \$3,125.00, this being \$125.00 per hydrant.

16. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,765.00, \$1,000 to be used to pay the water note at the Keene National Bank due December 15, 1958, the other \$3,765.00 to make up the deficit of the water works

department for 1957 or act in any manner in relation thereto.

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,000.00 for the reconditioning and tarring of the roads in Pine Grove Cemetery, and replacing water lines.

18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate not to exceed \$1,200.00, to install a new heating system at the Library.

19. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,185.00 as its fair share of the operating costs of the Elliot Community Hospital.

20. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to manage the litigation of the case now pending in Superior Court involving the validity of the will of the late Fred D. Hemenway under which the Town is a beneficiary, and to agree on behalf of the Town to the settlement of that litigation and the Town's interest therein upon such terms as they shall consider to be for the best interests of the Town, including the authority to execute all necessary documents in connection with such settlement and the authority to join with other beneficiaries under the will in connection with any further legal proceedings which may be required to accomplish such settlement.

21. To see if the town will vote a sum of money to provide police protection for the school children while crossing Main St., or act in any manner in relation thereto.

22. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate a sum of money for installation of Christmas lights and decorations, or act in any manner relating thereto.

23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50 for Civil Defense.

24. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Hundred Dollars (\$400.00), to be used in co-operation with State and Federal funds, for

the control of White Pine Blister Rust within the confines of the town.

25. To see if the town will vote to extend the town water main beginning at the Toy Shop and continuing to the residence of Ernest Sawyer, raise and appropriate money for the same, or act in any manner in relation thereto.

26. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to the playing of games of beano or act in any manner relating thereto.

27. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sums for perpetual care of Cemetery lots received since January 1, 1957.

28. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow on the credit of the Town in anticipation of taxes.

29. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any Real Estate acquired by the Town through Collectors' deeds.

30. To hear reports of Town Agents or Committees or other officers heretofore chosen or appointed and pass any vote relating thereto.

31. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF MARLBORO FIRE DEPARTMENT

The Marlboro Fire Department answered 16 still alarms and 1 general alarm, namely, Edw. J. Worcester. The department answered 1 Mutual Aid and received Mutual Aid once.

The new fire alarm which consists of 1 eight inch, 1 ten inch and 1 twelve inch Cooper air horn has been installed and accepted by your Firewards. The cost was greater than anticipated. The difference was taken from this year's appropriation.

The department is now fully equipped with 1 base, 3 mobile, (one for each truck) and 1 portable radios which has been installed and is in full swing with the other 39 town or over 125 radios in the Southwestern New Hampshire Mutual Aid.

The members of the Marlboro Fire Company have united with the department in the past 2 years in purchasing radios. Members of the company raised money through different activities to the amount of \$799.00 which was added to the departments \$400.00 making a total of \$1,199.00. The Civilian Defense matched the same amount making a total of \$2,398.00 which was the total cost.

The Firewards wish to thank you people for the fine cooperation in preventing fires and the help that was given the department at fires.

REPORT OF RECREATION COMMISSION

The opening of the playground last summer was delayed because of the shortage of trained leaders. However, in the middle of July we were fortunate to secure the services of Henry Skerry, who in spite of being rather young, had done considerable leadership work in the Keene YMCA program. Mrs. Marshall Harris was engaged to assist with the younger children. The program operated for four weeks with attendance which compared favorably with previous years.

As in past years the committee helped to finance transportation for pupils in some of the elementary grades so that they could participate in the Red Cross swimming classes. Approximately twenty children were registered in this activity. In addition to this all children were taken to Sand Dam at Troy for swimming on two occasions.

During the summer the members of this committee met several times with the selectmen and other adults in town to discuss plans and possible sites for installing a paved area to serve as a base for a skating rink and certain summer activities. It was finally decided to locate the area in the corner of the field nearest the Arthur Wilcox house and in the fall a plot 100' by 50' was paved using 80 tons of hot top mix. This area has been flooded and has proved to be reasonably satisfactory but it still needs a coat of sealer. Heavy snow in January interfered with the ice program but it is anticipated that there will be more skating before the season ends. Credit is due to more people than it is possible to name for assisting with the work. Among these are our Road Agent, Edward Beauregard, Elmer Grover and members of his crew, men of the PTA and the Fire Department.

This year's Halloween program was among the most successful we have had. The committee was again as-

sisted by the Student Council of Marlboro High School and by the Marlboro Fire Department. Events included a well attended parade and movies and refreshments at the Town Hall which were followed by dancing to music by Allan Kendall's Orchestra appearing through courtesy of the musicians' union.

Your committee still recognizes the need for a suitable building to house toilet facilities and equipment at the Athletic Field. We plan to investigate the project thoroughly this season and be prepared to present a plan and request an appropriation at the next annual meeting. Another need for a more complete program is some provision for swimming nearer the center of town and safer for young children than the present site at the quarry offers. This may well be given serious thought in the near future.

We men on the committee appreciate the continued confidence shown by the citizens and express our thanks for the support given us. We ask you to go along with us on further studies as suggested above or others which may come later and help us in devolping whatever plans may seem best for our community.

REPORT OF POLICE DEPARTMENT

For the Year of 1957

The yearly report of the Police Dept. released by the Chief of Police is as follows. The local drivers exercised more caution this year than in previous years. We had 38 accidents during the year and these were not all serious and there was one fatality. There were 4 arrests. There were 141 complaints, these complaints consist of: Cars backfiring, and breaking street lights, taking care of intoxicated people, delivering emergency messages, taking care of stray dogs and dogs biting people, and teenagers racing on Main Street. Suspended 13 licenses.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE FROST FREE LIBRARY

To the president and trustees of the Frost Free Library. The librarian submits the following report for the year, October 1st, 1956 to October 1st, 1957.

The library was open 155 days.

The total circulation of books was 7370. Of this number 2861 were juvenile fiction, 233 juvenile non-fiction, 1720 were adult fiction, 398 adult non-fiction. Circulation of magazines and pamphlets was 2158. We have also borrowed many non-fiction books from the State Library.

Our reference section and vertical file have had constant use.

The bookmobile visits the library once in eight weeks furnishing us with many books for our use.

The library has observed the holidays and events of the year with special displays of books, posters, etc. The art teacher, Miss Charleston, displayed some of the children's art work. We enjoy exhibiting their work. Several classes have visited the library to be instructed in the use of the library. We enjoy working with the teachers and pupils. We appreciate their interest in our library.

There were 121 new books purchased this year. Those of special interest are the Life Magazine book, The World's Great Religions, A Pictorial History of the American Indian by Oliver LaFarge; Our Literary Heritage by Van Wyck Brooks and Otto Buttman; The American Heritage book of Great Historic Places. We have added two sets of classics to the young people's collection. They are: Collier's New Junior Classics which contain 611 stories and poems. The collection contains a unique reading guide for stories of the countries, index of titles

and authors. Makes an excellent supplementary reading program for history, geography, nature and social sciences.

The Children's Classics is a 10 volume set containing nine of the considered all time favorite children's classics, which are: Heidi, Black Beauty, Tom Sawyer, Alice in Wonderland, Robinson Crusoe, Arabian Nights, Robin-hood, King Arthur, Treasure Island and Anderson's Fairy Tales. These are written for the third to six grade level.

In building a library the aim is neither completeness nor a well-rounded book collection but one that is custom built for its particular community. We are fortunate to have had people interested through the years in our library to maintain this aim.

"Books are the best friends, and this perhaps is their greatest gift to modern men." "They yield us information. They give us inspiration. They furnish us sublimation."

To the inhabitants of the school district in the town of Marlboro qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the High School in said district on the 5th day of March 1958, at 8 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
- 3A. To choose a member of the school board for one year.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the esti-

mated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

9. To see if the district will approve the use of any balance on hand June 30 1958 in the budget, toward payment of obligations on the new high school project.

10. To see if the district will authorize the school board to enter into tuition contracts with other school districts for the high school education of their pupils.

11. To see if the district will vote to accept the provision of ch.186 pat 24 RLA. as amended to provide for the employment of a union helping teacher, to work with pupils and teachers, to adapt the program of studies to better most pupil needs and to act as a consultant to the entire staff.

12. To see if the district will vote to adopt the provision of ch. 34 sec. 112-120 RLA or amendments thereto, namely the non-partisan ballot system for the election of school officers previously elected by ballot; to become effective March 1959.

13. To see if the district will vote to use a check-list for election of officers beginning March 1959 and will adopt as its school check list, the town check-list, as provided in RSA 197: 12a as inserted by laws of 1957 chapter 57.

14. To take up any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENT

During the past year, Marlboro has seen the greatest change in its schools that it has experienced for over half a century. Less than a year ago, the new Marlboro Junior-Senior High School was merely an architect's ideas on a blue-print. Today the new structure is in full use, serving to meet the expanding needs of education in the community.

The new school will enable the Marlboro School District to meet all of the new secondary school requirements adopted by the State Dept. of Education and remain as a certified and approved high school; a condition which would have been impossible in the old building. In addition to better serving the educational needs of Marlboro pupils, the school also enrolls students from Harrisville, Roxbury and Dublin as tuition pupils.

All of this has not been without cost, but in an age where we can afford six million dollars for a single rocket and sixty million for one submarine; it appears fundamental to our survival to spend until it hurts, to educate our children,—the citizens of tomorrow. America's answer to the Russian challenge in science will only successfully be met by heavier investments in public school education,—in new schools such as Marlboro High School.

The public has had two organized opportunities to examine their new school plant and many hundreds of people took these opportunities. It is hoped and believed that they are pleased with the results achieved and satisfied that every dollar was spent wisely.

The citizens of the community are to be congratulated on their willingness to provide the pupils of Marlboro with this fine means and pathway to a better education.

REPORT OF PRINCIPAL OF MARLBORO SCHOOLS

Dr. Charles L. Bowlby, Superintendent of Schools
Marlboro, New Hampshire

I herewith submit my annual report for your review and publication. I wish to emphasize to you and to the citizens that this report covers the activities of the school from February 1, 1957 to January 31, 1958 and does not coincide with the fiscal year of the school district. This difference of time has occasionally led to some misunderstandings of facts stated and I think it well to point out the dates involved.

SCHOOL POPULATION

It seems to be an item of interest to townspeople to know how the pupils are distributed so I am including the usual age grade table to show these figures. At the present time we have fourteen tuition pupils and indications are that this number will increase next year, particularly in grade nine.

Minor changes have occurred in the above figures since school began. Some of our pupils are temporarily attending schools in Florida and will return to us in a few weeks. I am pleased to have again been assigned to direct the activities of all the grades since the resignation of the elementary principal. Because of the break in administration no detailed report is included for this year of work in grades 1-6 but will become a part of my next report.

TEACHING STAFF

Four resignations at the close of the year and the expansion of the curriculum gave us five new staff members in September. Miss Frances Perrin, 1957 graduate of Keene Teachers College, became the teacher in grade four when Mrs. Conway did not return. Damon Russell who had taught grade six for two years and served as elementary principal resigned to accept the principalship in Chesterfield and John Burnham was transferred from grade five to grade six. Mrs. Freda Hastings, a teacher with several years experience, was employed for grade five. Miss Janet Spear resigned to accept a position in Connecticut and Mrs. Fred Barry replaced her as teacher of junior high English and French and Latin. Mrs. Barry is a graduate of Middlebury with several years successful experience. Miss Ann Charleston did not return as art supervisor and her place is being taken by Mrs. Alice Scott. With the completion of the new building a physical education program was set up and Mr. Charles Hamel, a 1957 graduate of the University of Massachusetts, was hired as instructor and coach of athletics. All of the new staff members are carrying on their work successfully.

Although he is not a member of the actual teaching staff one other person was necessary to operate our plant. We secured the services of Edward Croteau on a part time basis to assist with the custodial duties. He and Mr. Farwell take much pride in keeping our buildings in good condition.

STUDENT PERFORMANCE

Last year I attempted to outline some of the problems faced by our students and staff members and will not devote space to a repetition here. It needs to be pointed out, however, that our graduates are facing more rigid requirements each year as they apply for admission to post-secondary institutions. Advanced schools are looking for students with ability whose marks are in line with that ability and capable students who have not worked up to their capacity may be disappointed when they apply for admission.

The learning ability of our pupils is slightly above the national average according to results we obtain when we measure their capacity with accepted standard devices. Performance of our pupils is in line with their indicated ability in most cases. Our problem lies in getting our pupils to be dissatisfied with mediocre success and making them realize that their future success may be determined by the amount that they exceed the average output. In this respect we call upon the parents for assistance. Insistence upon students doing more study at home and the development of good study habits are ways in which parents can help us. Parents of our high school pupils can be absolutely certain that the quality of work expected of them will require a definite amount of preparation outside of school hours and if pupils are not bringing home books and spending time in preparation of lessons, they are neglecting their work. We believe that a high school education is a privilege as well as a right and every pupil should make genuine effort to learn as much as possible. It goes without saying that parents share the responsibility for seeing that their youngsters do this.

As pointed out in a previous report an ever increasing amount of financial aid is becoming available for the high school graduate who is well prepared and decides to continue his education. Students in our classes are encouraged to start investigating advanced training programs early and to make application during the first months of their senior year. Training opportunities may call for considerable sacrifice by parents but employment opportunities available to the well trained person make such expenditure a sound investment.

The success of graduates at college as reported to accrediting agencies determines the standing of high schools with those agencies. Performance of our graduates to date has kept us in good standing in the New England Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools which is the official accrediting agency in this section of the United States. It is imperative that we maintain this standing if schools and colleges are to continue admitting our graduates.

ATTENDANCE

Our attendance problems are few but occasionally one is serious and works to the detriment of the student. Other than actual illness there are two really acceptable excuses for absence—serious misfortune at home and conditions of travel and weather which threaten the health or safety of the child. No reasonable school administrator will refuse to accept an excuse for occasional absence if it is with the knowledge and consent of the parent but these should be the exception rather than the rule. Our facilities cannot be fully utilized and pupils cannot be taught when they are absent. There is probably no one single factor that contributes more to poor work than irregular attendance.

Tardiness is sometimes a problem. Students are expected to be in their seats in their homerooms when the second bell rings. Pupils not there are absent or tardy as the case may be. The State Department of Education sets an average of .5 tardiness per pupil as a permissible maximum. This means that in a school of 100 pupils we could

allow no more than fifty cases of tardiness per year. A few of our pupils are giving our school a poor record in this respect. I urge parents to cooperate in getting pupils to school on time.

LOCAL SCHOLARSHIP FUNDS

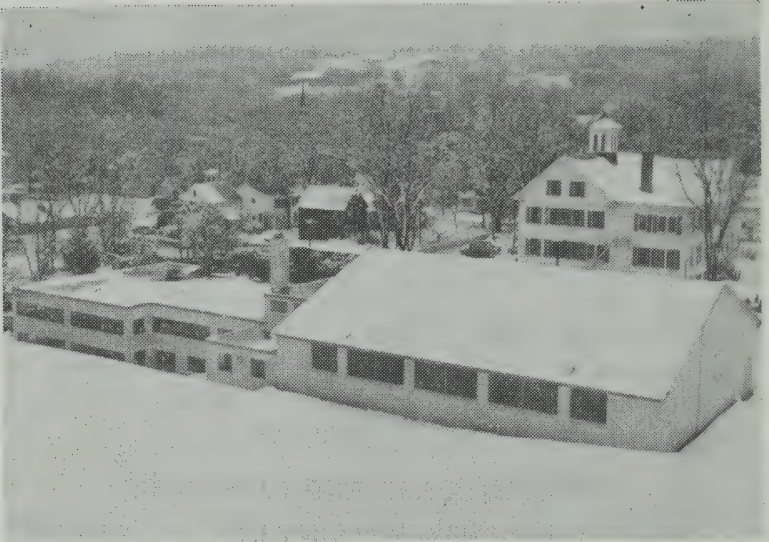
For each of the past several years the income from the Pease and Davis Scholarship Funds has amounted to \$905.52. All graduates of our school who are attending advanced training are provided applications on which to apply and the money is allocated by the school board on the basis of declared need. This money often proves very helpful and sometimes means the difference between staying in school and dropping out.

SCHOOL PLANT AND FACILITIES

Regardless of what occurs, probably the outstanding single event of this school year will be the occupancy of our new building. We are certainly fortunate to have such a splendid structure in which to carry on our efforts. The morale of our students and staff was boosted considerably upon occupancy of our new quarters. All phases of the



Front view of the Primary School.



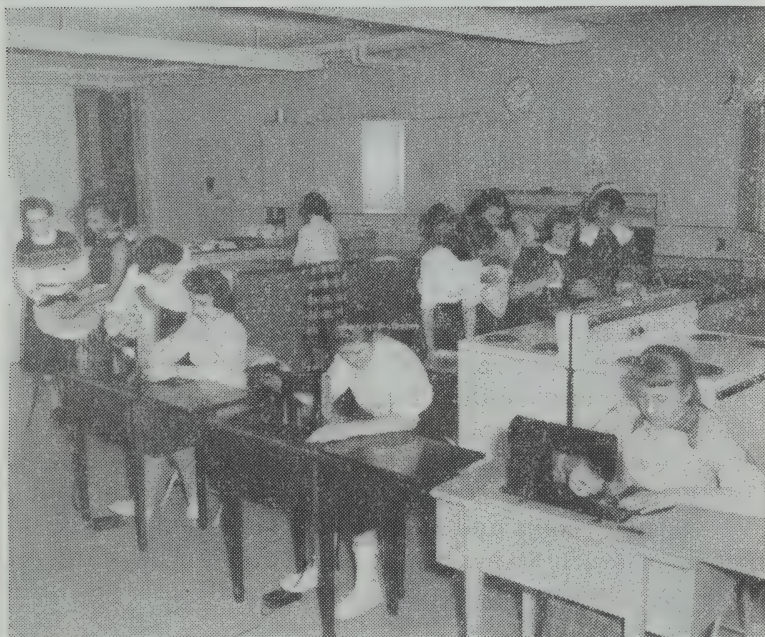
Rear view of the new School.

program are easier to carry on and the building is ample in size for the present load and that of the immediate future.

Several of the new areas such as the Home Economics laboratory make our school one of which we can be proud. The facilities as shown enable us to offer a worthwhile program and encourage us to urge more pupils to enroll in this area of study.



Next door to the Home Economics laboratory is the shop. For the first time Marlboro pupils now have adequate floor area for carrying on a shop program. Several new pieces of equipment have been installed and certain others are planned. Equipment already in place includes a planer, a band saw, a radial saw, a drill press, a jointer, and a jig saw in addition to many new hand tools. Enrollment in these classes is high and will undoubtedly continue to be as the offerings are expanded.



The auditorium-gymnasium makes possible a great deal of extra-curricular work which could not be done previously as well as enabling us to add Physical Education to the curriculum. This part of the new plant is in use practically all of the time during the day and also many evenings. The stage is used for work in Music and English as well as for dramatic efforts. This room coupled with locker rooms and showers in the basement give us a set-up of which we may all be proud and our boys and girls no longer have to apologize to visiting athletic groups for antiquated and inadequate facilities. The School Board has adopted the following rules for use of the auditorium-gymnasium:

1. There will be no smoking in the building.
2. Any organized local group may rent the gym for \$5 per evening (for a non-money making meeting).
3. The janitor must be present unless responsibility is assumed by the principal, a teacher, or a school board member.
4. The school has priority on the use of the gym.
5. Any organized local group may rent the gym for

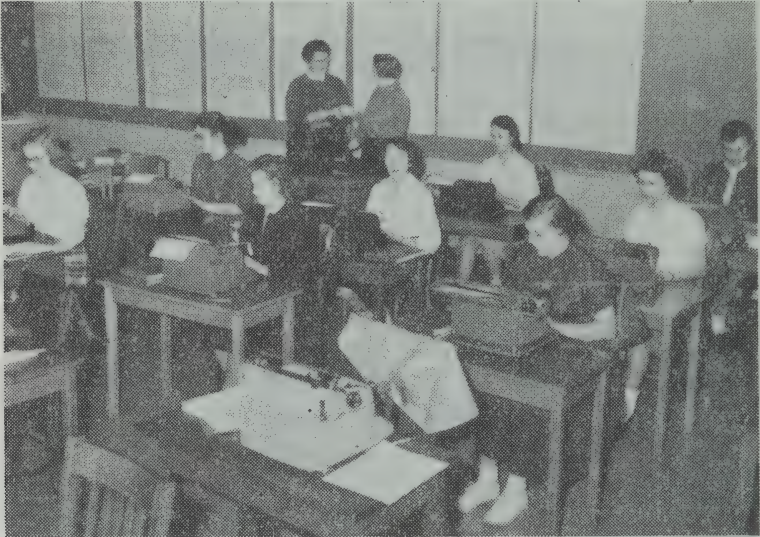
a money-making project for \$10 per evening plus janitor's fees.

6. Mr. Irvin Gordon will be the agent for the gym.

7. Out-of-town rentals will be decided by the school board.



We have six attractive, well lighted rooms on the upper level providing space for our homerooms and teaching areas. Included in these are a large science laboratory and a commercial department.



The building has been in operation about three months now and with the exception of the usual minor adjustments necessary in a new structure it functions well. Many of our local people visited it on the occasion of dedication and have held several meetings here. I have heard many fine things said about it by people coming here from out of town. Our citizens have a right to be proud of what they have provided for our uses.

ATHLETICS AND OTHER ACTIVITIES

Members of our staff continue to give generously of their out-of-school time to work on projects with our boys and girls. Several social events have been held and more are planned for the coming weeks. At least one social event involving one or more grades is scheduled practically every week. Our basketball teams have been reasonably successful in spite of losses of key players by graduation last June. Mr. Hamel is coach of the boys team and Miss

Perrin coaches the girls. A commendable feature of this season is that several more students are participating than in previous years. This is probably due in part to interest created through teaching of the fundamental skills in physical education classes. The teams are playing in the recently formed Southwestern New Hampshire League composed of seven schools from Troy to Charlestown.

Last fall soccer was started on an informal basis and indications are that the sport will be continued. We also had a cross country team. In the spring our baseball team will play in the league and we plan to have softball for the girls on a non-league basis.

Sports in the junior high grades are being coached by John Burnham. The touch football team won the trophy in competition among similar teams in the area last fall.

Attendance at games has increased slightly this year but the cost of equipment and transportation for non-income sports is exceeding the amount we take in and consideration must be given to including an item in the budget to help support our program in the near future. This is a common practice today.

SCHOOL LUNCH PROGRAM

Mrs. Doris Porter and Mrs. Madolyn Richardson continue to serve us capably in the lunch program. They serve wholesome meals which definitely bolster the stamina of the pupils during the day. Many pupils who do not buy the full meal take advantage of the opportunity to purchase milk.

This shows a surplus of \$102.00 on the year's operation. During the year more than 27,000 meals were served.

Twenty-two of the above named eighth graders are attending school here and four are attending Our Lady of Monadnock Academy. Six of the seniors enrolled for advanced training and four of the boys entered the armed forces. Four of the seniors were awarded substantial scholarships at the advanced institutions.

LOOKING AHEAD

Next September will find the high school operating under a revised set of standards as prescribed by the State Department of Education. With the new requirements in mind steps were taken this year to meet them in part at least. This included lengthening the periods by five minutes each thereby increasing the length of the school day. Only minor changes in the curriculum have to be made and some teachers will have to have their teaching load reduced by one period to meet the standards. It will be undesirable and even impossible to reduce the number of subjects that we offer so another teacher will have to be employed.

We are scheduled to be visited in the near future by a team of officials from the State Department and these people will make the final recommendations for the approval of our plans and program. We anticipate that the plans for the next year as they now exist will be satisfactory to them.

CONCLUSION

Many of the staff members have waited a long time with patience for the new facilities which have been given us and are experiencing great satisfaction in carrying on their work here. As the administrator of these schools I wish to point out that our system is indeed fortunate to have retained many key people for such a long

time. Many systems like ours experience a turnover of from fifty to seventy five percent of the staff each year. This certainly interrupts the continuity of the effort being made to conduct a sound program.

I wish to humbly thank you and the members of the school board for the support and backing you have given me and to reaffirm my determination to give the students in our schools the finest program that can be developed here. I appreciate the privilege of having met with the committee during the planning and construction of our new plant and pledge myself to see that it is properly maintained and used with discretion. Many of our townspeople have seen the plant while others have not. Few have seen the school in operation. We urge all citizens to visit the schools and learn directly of the effort that is being carried on to train their children at all levels.

Article 6. Voted favorably on motion of Thomas Lord that we accept the reports of agents, auditors and committees, or officers chosen as printed in the report.

Article 7. Voted favorably on the motion of Thomas Lord that the clerk cast one ballot for Clifford E. Richardson, Sr. for auditor for the ensuing year. He was elected.

Article 8. Voted favorably on the motion of Alden J. Beauregard that the school district raise and appropriate \$102,355.00 and to authorize and direct the school board to apply against said appropriation such income as is estimated by the school board exclusive of state aid, and upon the determination of the amount of state aid

to be received by the school district during the next fiscal year, to authorize and direct the school board to apply against such appropriation the sum to be received from state aid and with the school district clerk certify to the selectmen the balance as an assessment to be raised by the town for school purposes.

Charles T. Richardson asked for an explanation of the supplementary budget for the new school building as appearing in the town report. Thomas Lord gave an explanation and answered questions from the floor.

Article 9. Forest Fire Prevention is Everybody's Business

New Hampshire faces a continuing challenge in its forest fire problem—97 per cent of all our forest fires being man-caused and preventable—a serious indictment of interest in our own welfare and that of our neighbor. Both the State and the towns are striving diligently to effectively meet the challenge through education of the public to the threat fire presents to our woodlands; by maintaining a well trained corps of wardens and deputy wardens in every community and by providing ample opportunity for all who wish to dispose of unwanted waste materials. Careless and perverseness, however, continue to be the big hurdles.

Thoughtlessly discarded lighted cigars, cigarettes and matches from moving vehicles by hikers, hunters and fishermen; careless burning of debris during hazardous periods in dangerous locations; illegal burning; improperly extinguished debris, camp and cook fires—all result in serious loss of property disruption of industry and farm work and unnecessary expenditure of town and state funds.

To meet the challenge successfully, the state, your community and your local forest fire warden need YOUR thoughtful and cooperative effort—The rules are simple.

1. Don't burn at home—use your town dump and avoid all fire problems.
2. If you do burn, be sure to secure a written permit from your local forest fire warden when the ground is not covered with snow. Permits are required for open debris fires, home incinerators, outdoor fire places and camp fires. Your warden is instructed to permit burning if weather conditions, site and type of burning are safe.
3. Be sure that all lighted material cigars, cigarettes and matches—are completely out before discarding them. Use ash trays in automobiles.
4. Make certain that your debris, camp and cook fires are completely out before leaving them.
5. Insist that others be careful and comply with burning requirements.
6. Call the warden promptly when fire is detected and aid him to extinguish it.
