A TRIBUTE TO Katherine White 1906-1988

Kay came to Wilmot in 1946 where she and Donna Niles built their home and jelly business on the northwesterly slope of Kearsarge Mountain. The business, known throughout the country — and abroad — as Freedom Acres, literally put Wilmot Flat on the map. Kay was well known for her generous nature, hard work and relentless energy. She loved music and flowers and shared them with all who visited Freedom Acres.

She served the Town in the 60s as school board member. She was one of the founders and first President of the Wilmot Community Association. There was never a more dedicated worker than Kay as she sought contributions to keep the project afloat and to enlist volunteers at the Center and Beach. During her active years at the Center she produced and directed 14 plays featuring local talent. The townspeople looked forward to this annual event. Kay and her plays — and all that she was — will be affectionately remembered by the Wilmot Players and their appreciative audiences.

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TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Wilmot in the (L.S.) County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Wilmot on Tuesday, the 14th day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To see if the Town is in favor of the adoption of Amendment Number 1, as proposed by the Planning Board, for the Town of Wilmot's Planning and Zoning Ordinance as follows:

Amend Article II of the ordinance by creating two new commercial districts; designating the two village districts and the residential district, and; specifying permitted uses and special exceptions that may be undertaken in each of the aforementioned districts?

3. To see if the Town is in favor of the Adoption of Amendment Number 2, as proposed by the Planning Board, for the Town of Wilmot's Planning and Zoning Ordinance as follows:

Amend the ordinance in all appropriate places to make the technical changes necessary to reflect the adoption of Question 1 above?

4. To see if the Town is in favor of the adoption of Amendment Number 3, as proposed by the Planning Board, for the Town of Wilmot's Planning and Zoning Ordinance as follows:

Amend Article III of the ordinance to increase the minimum lot size in the Residential District from 2 acres and 150 feet of frontage to 4 acres and 300 feet of frontage; to increase the minimum lot size in the Village Districts from 1 acre and 100 feet of frontage to 2 acres and 200 feet of frontage; to provide that the minimum lot size requirement for the Commercial District shall be the same as that for the Residential District, and; to "grandfather" lots of record existing at the time of adoption of this question?

5. To see if the Town is in favor of the adoption of Amendment Number 4, as proposed by the Planning Board, for the Town of Wilmot's Planning and Zoning Ordinance as follows:

Amend Article III of the ordinance to establish fees for both sign permits and business permits?

You are hereby further notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Wilmot the 14th day of March, next at seven of the clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

6. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes and to negotiate the extension or renewal of the notes securing such loans when it is necessary. 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,242.00 (Two thousand two hundred and forty-two dollars and no cents) for the Lake Sunapee Home Health Care, Inc.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000.00 (Twenty-five thousand dollars and no cents) for the Wilmot Volunteer Fire Company, Inc.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,200.00 (One thousand two hundred dollars and no cents) for the New London Hospital.

11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell any material or equipment deemed to be surplus to the Town needs; the sale of highway material or equipment to be made with the approval of the Road Agent.

12. To see if the Town will vote to be a member of the regional planning commission, organized and named the Upper Valley-Lake Sunapee Council and to appropriate the sum of \$776.00 (Seven hundred seventy-six dollars and no cents) as the Town's share of the annual operating expense of the regional planning commission to be used in conjunction with other state and federal funds available for planning purposes.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,931.00 (Nineteen hundred thirty-one dollars and no cents) for the continuation of services to the low income residents of Wilmot through the Kearsarge Valley Area Center of the Community Action Program, Belknap-Merrimack Counties, Inc.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 (Two thousand dollars and no cents) to help in the operation of the Wilmot Learning Place, a non-profit organization which is incorporated and licensed in accordance with RSA 292 and RSA 17:E-3. This appropriation is to be used for Wilmot students only.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,665.00 (One thousand six hundred sixty-five dollars and no cents) for the New London Ambulance Service.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 (Five hundred dollars and no cents) for the handling of hazardous household waste.

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000.00 (Twenty-five thousand dollars and no cents) for building an addition to the Wilmot Public Library, this amount to be matched by Federal and Trust Funds.

18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,000.00 (Eight thousand dollars and no cents) for a computer system for handling town records.

19. To see if the Town will vote to appoint the Selectmen as the Franchising Authority with power to grant, renew, amend, or rescind for cause, franchises for the installation and operation of cable television systems in accordance with the provisions of RSA 53-C within the Town of Wilmot.

20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$40,000.00 (Forty thousand dollars and no cents) to have a complete revaluation by a private appraisal firm that has been approved by the Department of Revenue Administration. Revaluation to be completed for the tax year 1989 or thereafter.

21. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue, subject to gates and bars and make Class VI, Pinnacle Road beginning at Marion Allen property and extending to the North westerly boundary of her property, pursuant to NH RSA 231:45.

22. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following article as petitioned by Stephanie Clarke and others:

"We the residents of Pinnacle Road and Wilmot, N.H., request that the weight limit on Pinnacle Road be reduced to $2\frac{1}{2}$ tons per vehicle."

23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,800.00 (Seven thousand eight hundred dollars and no cents) for so-called "Cruiser time" for the police department as requested by the former police chief.

24. To see if the Town will vote to prohibit the disposal of barn tailings and manure within 150 feet from all surface waters and within 300 feet from all property lines as petitioned by Walter Morse and others.

25. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the town's representatives to the General Court to respond to our solid waste crisis by taking all necessary measures to insure that New Hampshire adopts legislation that will permit consumers to return for refund of deposit within New Hampshire all soda, beer, wine cooler and liquor containers and that all unclaimed deposit monies shall be collected by the state and no less than 80% shall be returned annually to local municipalities for the sole purpose of implementing, expanding and reimbursing community recycling projects, as petitioned by Anne Rowe and others.

26. To take the sense of the voters as to what they think about hiring a fulltime Police chief for the town along with three part-time officers.

27. To see if the town will vote pursuant to RSA 80:42(3) to authorize the Selectmen to quitclaim all interest in the ± 31 acre Muldoon parcel (Tax Map 1 Lot 3) to the estate of Arthur Muldoon in exchange for payment of \$4,900.00 (Four thousand nine hundred dollars and no cents). The subject parcel was obtained by Collector's Deed of June 12, 1985, but such Collector's Deed have been nullified by a recent decision of the New Hampshire Supreme Court. The \$4,900.00 covers back taxes due since 1982 plus interest.

28. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for any Federal or State grants that may be available.

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29. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept any grants that may be allocated to the town and expend same.

30. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF SELECTMEN

We are still experiencing a building boom, although it appears to be slowing up recently. Several large subdivisions are before the Planning board for consideration at the present time. The Planning Board has presented several new amendments for the Town Meeting vote.

There were two very costly bridges replaced this past year, one on Stearns Road over Kimpton Brook and one over Walker Brook on Hobbs Hill Road.

We appointed a Recycling Committee to study the possibility of the Town undertaking such a program. Their report should be ready for the 1990 Town Meeting.

Due to the extra work load, we have had an extra employee added to the work force for the highway department. He will be a full-time employee.

We have been commended for operating a clean transfer station by the E.P.A., but it takes a lot of work to keep it in good condition.

AUDITOR'S REPORT

I have carefully examined the records, accounts, and reports of the Treasurer, Town Clerk, Tax Collector, and Selectmen of the Town of Wilmot for the year ending December 31, 1988. It is my opinion that these records, accounts, and reports are accurately presented herein.

WILMOT TOWN MEETING March 8, 1988

ARTICLE 1: The polls opened at 10:00 a.m. and closed at 6:00 p.m. with 294 ballots cast out of 520 registered voters.

ARTICLE 5: Mr. Earle Chandler made the motion to raise and appropriate the sum of \$310,197 to defray town charges for the ensuing year. Motion was seconded. He then proceeded to explain the budget line item by line item. Motion passed unanimously.

ARTICLE 6: Mr. Nelson Chitterling made the motion to accept Article 6 as written "To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes and to negotiate the extension or renewal of the notes securing such loans when it is necessary." Motion was seconded and passed unanimously.

ARTICLE 7: Mr. Robert Tawney made the motion to accept Article 7 as written "Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 80:58-86 for a real estate tax lien procedure? These statutes provide that tax sales to private individuals for nonpayment of property taxes on real estate are replaced with a real estate tax lien procedure under which only a municipality or county where the property is located or the state may acquire a tax lien against land and buildings for unpaid taxes." Motion was seconded. Discussion followed. Paper ballot Yes 105, No 1. Motion was passed.

ARTICLE 8: Mr. John White made the motion we accept Article 8 as written "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,110 for the Lake Sunapee Home Health Care, Inc." Motion was seconded. Discussion followed, explaining that this was known as the Kearsarge Visiting Nurse Assn. in previous years. Motion passed unanimously.

ARTICLE 9: Mr Keith Fleury made the motion to adopt Article 9 as written "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000 for the Wilmot Volunteer Fire Company, Inc." Motion was seconded. Mr. Robert Tawney then recognized the volunteer firemen for a job well done and a round of applause followed. Motion passed unanimously.

ARTICLE 10: Mr. Nelson Chitterling made the motion to adopt Article 10 as written "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,200 for the New London Hospital." Motion was seconded and passed unanimously.

ARTICLE 11: Mr. Earle Chandler made the motion to adopt Article 11 as written "To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell any material or equipment deemed to be surplus to the Town needs; the sale of highway material or equipment to be made with the approval of the Road Agent." Motion was seconded and passed unanimously.

ARTICLE 12: Mr. Fred Griffin made the motion to adopt Article 12 as written "To see if the town will vote to be a member of the regional planning commission, organized and named the Upper Valley-Lake Sunapee Council and to appropriate the sum of \$746 as the Town's share of the annual operating expense of the regional planning commission to be used in conjunction with other state and federal funds available for planning purposes." Motion was seconded and passed unanimously.

ARTICLE 13: Mr. Robert Tawney made the motion to adopt Article 13 as written "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,679 for the continuation of services to the low income residents of Wilmot through the Kearsarge Valley Area Center of the community Action Program, Belknap-Merrimack Counties, Inc." Motion was seconded and passed unanimously.

ARTICLE 14: Mrs. Joyce Tawney made the motion to adopt Article 14 as written "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000 to help in the operation of the Wilmot Learning Place, a non-profit organization which is incorporated and licensed in accordance with RSA 292 and RSA 17:E-3. This appropriation is to be used for Wilmot students only." Motion was seconded and passed unanimously.

ARTICLE 15: Mr. Nelson Chitterling made the motion to adopt Article 15 as written "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,039 for the New London Ambulance Service." Motion was seconded and passed unanimously.

ARTICLE 16: Mr. Robert Tawney made the motion to adopt Article 16 as written "To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell at public auction any or all property acquired by Tax Collector's deeds." Motion was seconded and discussion followed. Motion passed unanimously.

ARTICLE 17: Mr. Robert Tawney made the motion to adopt Article 17 as written "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 for the handling of hazardous household waste." Motion was seconded and discussion followed. Motion passed unanimously.

ARTICLE 18: Mr. Earle Chandler made the motion to adopt Article 18 as written "To see if the Town will vote to close that section of town road between socalled Big Breezy cottage and the Vaughan house, said road to be maintained by said Vaughan." Motion was seconded and discussion followed. One vote of opposition, motion passed. ARTICLE 19: Mrs.Loretta Zuger made the motion to adopt Article 19 as written "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500 to be used for library consultants for advice on the costs of building an addition to the present Wimot Center Library." Motion was seconded. Mrs. Thelma Minard then made the motion to Amend Article 19 to read "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000 to start a building fund for an addition to the library." Motion was seconded. Discussion followed. Vote on amendment was 60 In Favor, 36 Opposed.

The original motion as amended "To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000 to start a building fund for an addition to the library" was then discussed and the vote was 66 In Favor, 38 Opposed. Motion carried.

ARTICLE 20: Mr. Robert Tawney made the motion to adopt Article 20 as written "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500 to be used for an audit of all financial records of the town." Motion was seconded and passed unanimously.

ARTICLE 21: Mr. Earle Chandler made the motion to adopt Article 21 as written "To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$42,000 to purchase a new front-end loader with \$2,875 to be withdrawn from Federal Revenue Sharing Funds and the balance to be raised by taxation." Motion was seconded. Mr. Henry Patten, Road Agent then answered any questions, motion passed unanimously.

ARTICLE 22: Mr. Robert Tawney made the motion to adopt Article 22 as written "To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for any Federal or State grants that may be available." Motion was seconded and passed unanimously.

ARTICLE 23: Mr. Robert Tawney made the motion to adopt Article 23 as written "To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept any grants that may be allocated to the town and expend same." Motion was seconded and passed unanimously.

ARTICLE 24: To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting:

Mr. Gerald Rayno and Mr. Richard Biron then spoke to the group concerning the school meeting warrant article and stressed the importance of every voter attending.

Mr. Earle Chandler announced that there is a bill in the Legislature to require all voting polls to stay open to 7:00 p.m. on the voting day and if this passes it would be difficult to have Town Meeting after the polls are closed. A hand vote was taken to see what the preference of people present would be. Mrs. Lois Spearman raised the question again this year concerning the tax effect any warrant article would be to the tax rate. She requested the Selectmen list the projection of what effect the warrant article would be per thousand on the tax rate if the article passed.

The motion was made to adjourn, motion was seconded and the meeting was adjourned.

WILMOT VOLUNTEER FIRE COMPANY 1988 TOWN REPORT

The Wilmot Volunteer Fire Company (WVFC) is a nonprofit organization established to provide the people of Wilmot with fire protection. The only funding by the town is the appropriation we request each year. The twenty-five members of the company are all volunteers. Only the Chief, Secretary and Treasurer receive a salary from the WVFC, the combined total being one hundred and ten dollars (\$110.00) per year. The members in addition to responding to fires and other emergencies, also volunteer their time for other department activities. We have weekly work drills to maintain the building and equipment, monthly drills with the equipment and a monthly meeting. The members organize and run several fund-raising events, which this year raised over five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) in profits for the department. The reward for this effort is simply the satisfaction gained by protecting and serving our fellow citizens during fires and other emergencies.

As you can see from the financial report, we have had a good year. We were able to meet this year's goal of modernizing our equipment. In addition to the new equipment list in the report, we also have on order additional hose and fittings and two new Scott Air Packs. These items will add approximately four thousand five hundred dollars (\$4,500) to the cost of new equipment ordered this year. We also spent approximately thirteen hundred dollars (\$1,300) repairing the pump on our second line pumper. We feel this truck, a 1956 Maxim pumper, will continue to serve us well until we can purchase a new pumper.

Next year we hope to continue to upgrade our equipment while continuing to pay off our current truck loans with the help of the Selectmen we have obtained better insurance coverage at a lower rate through the municipal association. We had planned to ask for an increase in our appropriation this year. However we had an excellent response to our newsletter, approximately eight thousand dollars (\$8,000) was donated to the fire department, and we felt that we could meet our goals without an increase this year. The response to our newsletter was very gratifying to us. We realized how much the community is behind us in our efforts to serve the town. We also received five hundred dollars (\$500) in memory of Al Bacon. We decided to match the donation with our funds and purchased a Certificate of Deposit. This is the beginning of a capital reserve fund for the purchase of a new pumper. This summer we will have an open house. We hope you all will stop down to see how your tax dollars and donations are used. We are very proud of what we have done and would like to show our neighbors.

On behalf of all the members of the Wilmot Volunteer Fire Company, I would like to thank the townspeople for the continued support of our fund raising and their generous donations.

Please remember — smoke detectors and home fire drills save lives!

She holds an Experienced Educator Certificate with the State of New Hampshire Board of Education and had owned and operated a Kindergarten in Salisbury for the last six years.

Melissa Patten has filled the teacher's aide position at The Wilmot Learning Place. Melissa is really an assistant teacher. She is a graduate of Plymouth State College and is certified by the State of New Hampshire Board of Education. Melissa now attends Keene State College in the Continuing Education Program. Her caring for children started years before as a mother's helper and first rate babysitter. Now, Melissa is a wonderful addition to the much needed Early Education Program at The Wilmot Learning Place working with the Pre-schoolers.

The greatest part of our team is the shared love and caring for children. Both teachers hold a mutual Philosophy of Education. On an individual basis, to guide and help mold a love for learning in each child, we both feel learning should be fun! With a flexible schedule, we stress the completion of projects to gain instant gratification and positive reinforcement. Each child is encouraged to be a kind, caring, and polite individual. Melissa and Marybeth work at making all of this possible in the warm and loving environment at The Wilmot Learning Place.

During the 87-88 school year we expanded and improved our in-house library, and upgraded educational materials. Our 88-89 fixed expenses have increased using some of the funds we have accumulated over the past few years for the betterment of our children's education.

The goal of the Wilmot Learning Place is to provide a positive learning experience for our preschool children. In addition to the stimulating and nurturing environment of the classroom, the school sponsors field trips throughout the year for further expansion of knowledge and experience. The success of the school reflects upon the entire community. The board would like to thank the Wilmot Library for encouraging the use of its facilities and numerous townspeople for their continued support. REPORT OF THE FRIENDS OF THE WILMOT PUBLIC LIBRARY, INC.

One May 19, 1988, a group of interested citizens met in the Town Hall in Wilmot Center to organize the Friends of the Wilmot Public Library. Officers were elected, by-laws approved, and plans made for activities and programs for the year. The purpose of the Friends is to focus public attention on the library and to stimulate the use of the library's resources and services. To this end, the Friends helped with the children's summer reading program and story hour, held a craft class for the children, and treated them to a Halloween party. The logo you see at the top of this report is the result of a contest held during the summer. Two very successful bake sales were held, and the Friends helped the Trustees with their annual book sale. The Friends also sponsored an evening with Jane Kenyon during the fall as well as a craft class for adults. During the holiday season, the Friends had published a ''Wilmot at the Turn of the Century'' calendar for 1989, and the approximately \$600 profit from the sale of the calendars was given to the Trustees to help defray the costs of some of the initial planning for the proposed library renovation and addition.

Undoubtedly the most exciting aspect to this first partial year has been the enthusiasm shown by the residents of Wilmot and the surrounding area in supporting the library. Ninety-seven people joined the Friends during this time — a wonderful beginning! The Friends were the guests of the Executive Board at Christmastime as the board's way of showing their apreciation.

During this early part of 1989, the Friends are having a new bookmark printed, indicating the expanded hours of the library. A program featuring Dr. Allen Koop will be held in late February, and plans are underway to create a quilt to be raffled off this summer. During this first full year of our organization, the Friends will continue to support the Trustees in any way possible, to expand our adult and children programming, and to help make the library a source of pride and enrichment to the people in our community.

1988 REPORT OF THE WILMOT PLANNING BOARD

The Wilmot Planning Board had another very busy year in 1988, having considered approximately twenty applications for subdivision approval of various sizes and approximately ten applications for site plan review. The Board also provided opinions on inquiries from town citizens and other interested parties in approximately six instances.

In the category of minor subdivision requests, which generally seek approval of the simple subdivision of one lot into two, the Board approved nine new lots.

Three subdivision applications seeking the approval of five or more new lots each were considered by the Board as well. Of these, the Board approved a new eleven lot subdivision on Kearsarge Valley Rd. and a new ten lot subdivision on the North Wilmot Rd. This latter subdivision, among other positive things, included the imposition of a conservation easement on more than three hundred acres of land. This means that these three hundred acres will never be developed in the future, a situation that has obvious benefits to the Town as a whole.

A proposed seven lot subdivision in the Pinnacle Rd. Area was denied by the Board due to the inadequacy of safe access into the land from both Pinnacle Rd. and the North Wilmot Rd.

In the category of site plan reviews, the Board received applications for approval from approximately eleven individuals. The bulk of these related to site plan approvals from small home-occupation type activities, a growing segment of business activity which is resulting from the increased sophistication of home computer and telecommunications technology. The board approved nine of these site plan applications. We extend our thanks to the Board of Selectmen for their essential assistance and cooperation in our site plan review work.

During 1988, the Boad noted a marked increase in public participation at our meetings for which we are grateful. We encourage the Townspeople to continue this trend as it not only has the positive effect of keeping people informed of the Town's Development but it also is of great benefit to the Board in its efforts to make informed and equitable decisions.

On behalf of the Planning Board, special thanks are again extended to our secretary, Betsy Forsham, for her loyalty and diligence. Her workload is very great and is executed professionally, an invaluable asset to us all.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

We appologize for the inconvenience last spring when I was the only person available to give fire permits. The problem has been resolved and there are now four Deputy Wardens available as listed below.

Between July 1987 and June 1988, we experienced more fires than normal. The three leading causes of forest fires were again children, fires kindled without written permission of a Forest Fire Warden and debris burning. All causes are preventable, but only with your help.

Please help our town and state forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. Contact your Forest Fire Warden for more information.

Enforcement of a state timber harvest regulation is the responsibility of State Forestry officials. Our state had excellent timber harvest regulations; however, your assistance is needed.

If you know of a logging operation and suspect a state timber harvest law may be violated, call your forest fire Warden, Concord Forest Protection Headquarters at (603) 271-2217, or local Forest Ranger.

On January 1, 1989, the Deceptive Forestry Business Practice Law (RSA 224:54) went into effect. This law, in summary, states that a person guilty of a misdemeanor if, in the course of buying or selling a forest product, uses a false weight or measure for falsely determining any quality or quantity of a forest product.
