THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Washington qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in the Town Hall in said Washington on Tuesday, the fourth day of March next at ten o'clock in the forenoon. The polls will be open from 10:30 a.m. until 4:00 p.m. to elect Town Officers. The following articles will be acted upon:

Article 1. To elect by non-partisan ballot a Town Clerk, Town Treasurer, one Selectman for three years, Road Agent, Tax Collector, Auditor, Fire Chief, Police Chief, one Trustee of the Library for three years, one Trustee of the Trust Funds for three years, and any other Town Officers.

Article 2. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$719.40 and accept State Aid of \$4,795.99 for Town Road Aid. The total to be applied on the Principal Payment of one Faxon Hill Road note.

Article 3. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for operation of the Highway Department for the ensuing year and take any other action relating thereto.

Article 4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise, appropriate and reappropriate for Special Highway Projects in the ensuing year and take any other action relating thereto.

Article 5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to reappropriate and/or raise and appropriate for a Backhoe for the Highway Department or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and transfer to Capital Reserve for Permanent Bridges.

Article 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year.

Article 8. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow in anticipation of taxes.

Article 9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for support of the Fire Department for the ensuing year and take any other action relating thereto.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to reappropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the installation of a Dry Hydrant at Lake Ashuelot Estates or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for support of the Shedd Free Library for the ensuing year.

Article 12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and transfer to Capital Reserve for the Library Building Fund.

Article. 13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act for use as a set-off against the following debt service incurred for "Priority Expenditures" since January 1, 1972:

PURPOSE AMOUNT
1972 Fire Truck Note \$6,666.70

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to continue its membership in the Upper Valley-Lake Sunapee Council, and to raise and appropriate

the sum of \$209.00 as the Town's share of the annual operating expenses.

Article 15. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise

and appropriate as a donation to the Hillsboro Rescue Squad.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to reappropriate the sum of \$1,850.00 to continue improvements at the "New" Cemetery.

Article 17. To see what action the Town will take with regards to a Dog Leash Law.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Highway Department to plow Valley Road, so called, (a distance of 4.9 miles), and to accept from the Highland Lake Association payment to be agreed upon by the Road Agent, Board of Selectmen and the Highland Lake Association, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to improve the Road running from the red painted house on the Advent Church Road south to the intersection of Mr. Conroy's dirt road leading to Ashuelot Pond, a distance of approximately ½ of a mile or less, so as to be passable for the property owners living on the East Shore of the Pond or to take any other action relating thereto.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to authorize and empower the Town Planning Board to approve or disapprove in its discretion new subdivisions and plats thereof, as provided N.H. RSA Chapter 36: Section 19-29 inclusive and section 34.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,150.00 to cover the cost of a new motor in the International Highway Department Truck.

Article 22. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to add to the Old Home Day fund for the observance of the 1976 Bicentennial.

Article 23. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate towards the preparation of a Town History.

Article 24. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Band Concerts.

Article 25. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to continue the preparation of a Town Tax Map required by Chapter 426, Laws of 1971.

Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to approve the audio tape recording of the 1976 Annual Town Meeting for reference use with the Bicentennial History of this Town, cost for said recording not to exceed \$50.00.

Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint a committee to investigate the feasibility of heating the Town Hall's second floor for approved use by Town citizens during the year.

Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, contract for, accept or expend, on behalf of the Town, any and all grants or other funds available for Town purposes, including, but not limited to disaster aid and Highway funds, which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government, the State of New Hampshire, or any Federal, State or Private Agency or individual or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 29. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the installation of two toilets, a septic system and a well and pump at the Washington Fire Station or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 30. To see if the Town agrees to participate in the National Flood Insurance Program by directing the Board of Selectmen to complete the eligibility application and submit the required information to the Federal Insurance Administration.

Article 31. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

SHEDD FREE LIBRARY REPORT OF LIBRARIAN AND TRUSTEES 1974

Circulation from the 3,664 books and 143 recordings in the Library, and the 2,057 books from the Bookmobile, totaled 4,591. With an official population of 304, this results in a per capita circulation of 15.1 which is more than two and one half times the latest (1973) average of 6.0 among the 216 public libraries in New Hampshire, and we believe this shows we make good use of our library.

Many of the 190 books added during the year were donated, including four in memory of Leon Andrus from Vernon, Vt., the Cornell family gave 25 records for the Children's Room, and many books were also donated for the book sale, all of which were greatly appreciated. The Building Fund totals over \$5,350 including \$500 in a Capital Reserve Fund, with over \$2,450 added during 1974. Aluminum combination windows were installed and next year we want to have the front protected by combination doors and glass. The 11-year old gas floor furnace was replaced with a forced hot air gas furnace and registers and will be large enough to heat a future addition. A four-drawer card cabinet was purchased for the Children's Room, the catalog cards for same have been retyped, and the children's collection has been updated.

The librarian and some trustees went to book meetings in Keene and Sunapee, and to a book sale in Hanover. The trustees attended conferences in Laconia and Keene, and sent a delegate to the Southwest District Advisory Council of the Statewide Library Development Program. The library received a \$100 grant-in-aid from the State.

On Nov. 15 the trustees received \$8,350 as part of a bequest from the estate of Greta J. Smith of Hillsboro, which they turned over to the Trustees of Trust Funds to establish the Harriet M. and Fred Eugene Jones Memorial Fund, the income to be received quarterly by the Shedd Free Library as stipulated in the will. The Joneses who came from East Washington adopted Mrs. Smith when they lived in Hillsboro years ago. More funds may be received in the future as the above amount was "on account."

During the year 98 books were borrowed through interlibrary loan from Hanover, Newport, Rochester and Dover libraries and from the State Library. Town reports from 1872 through 1954 have been bound in four volumes for historical reference use and the reports from 1955 to date will be bound by summer for the Bicentennial. The library is open Monday and Wednesday from 1:30 to 3:30 in the afternoon and from 7:00 to 9:00 in the evening and we invite you to come in and use your fine library.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND THE DISTRICT CHIEF

All open burning when the ground is not covered with snow is controlled by the Town Forest Fire Warden in cooperation with the New Hampshire Forest Fire Service. Anyone wishing to kindle a fire out-of-doors when the ground is not covered with snow must have a written permit signed by the Town Forest Fire Warden. If the fire is to be kindled on land not owned by the person kindling the fire then he must have the permission of the landowner. No outdoor fires can be kindled between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m. unless it is raining, without the additional approval of the District Forest Fire Chief.

The 1974 forest fire season was one of the worst in the past two decades. Woodlands in central and southern New Hampshire became so dry in mid August that the Governor and Council, upon the recommendation of the State Forester, enacted a partial woodlands closure in Sullivan, Cheshire, Hillsborough, Merrimack and Belknap Counties and a complete woodlands closure in Strafford and Rockingham Counties plus the Towns of Barnstead, Gilmanton and Alton in Belknap County. Through the excellent cooperation of the citizens of our State no major forest fire occurred at any time during the year.

TOWN PLANNING BOARD 1974 Report

Under Article 20 of the 1974 Warrant the town voted to establish a Planning Board of five members subject to the provisions of Chapter 36 N.H. R.S.A. and under Article 21 it was voted to transfer the records and membership of the Planning Committee established in 1949, to the Planning Board. Consequently at a meeting on March 11, 1974, the Selectmen appointed the following to the Planning Board: Preston Rolfe, 1 year to 1975; Wendy Otterson, 2 years to 1976; Robert Niven, 3 years to 1977; Philip Barker, 4 years to 1978, and Joseph Masellis, Selectman, ex-officio member, whose term as Selectman expires 1977.

On March 19 the organizational meeting of the Planning Board was held at the Selectmen's Office and the following officers were elected: Wendy Otterson, chairman; Philip Barker, vice chairman; Preston Rolfe, clerk. It was voted to meet regularly on the second Monday of the month.

At the second meeting on Monday, April 8, bylaws were adopted and Philip Barker was appointed a special committee on the sanitary landfill question. A special meeting was held Monday, April 22 with the Selectmen and Robert L. Ward, regional planner for the Lake Sunapee Regional Planning Commission (Philip Barker and Preston Rolfe are the Directors representing Washington) to hear about the program being conducted for the benefit of the member towns, and three possible sites for sanitary landfill operations were suggested for study by the regional consultants in the summer.

The third meeting was on Monday, May 13, and the Bicentennial Committee appointed by the Selectmen met with us. It was decided the main Bicentennial observance would take place on Friday, Saturday and Sunday, Aug. 6, 7 and 8, 1976. The Bicentennial Committee will hold an organizational meeting, choose a monthly meeting date, and then the Planning Board will meet with them as voted by the town under Article 25 of the 1974 Warrant.

The fourth meeting was held Monday, June 10, and the chairman, vice chairman, and clerk were authorized to accompany Selectman Otterson to regional meeting on solid waste disposal at Marlow June 11. Philip Barker reported that the solid waste disposal Site Inspection by regional planner Robert Ward on May 24 resulted in all but one site, on Faxon Hill, being eliminated. Selectman Brown was to get permission from the owner to allow consultants to make test pits.

The fifth meeting was held Monday, Aug. 12, as no meeting was held in July. Dennis Richmond of Winchester, N.H., of the Christian Square Land Corp., a developer of Washington Heights, appeared to see if he was in conflict with the 1974 Land Use Ordinance. We explained he would have to get such information from the Selectmen who enforce the Ordinance and issue building permits. Philip Barker reported the report of the regional consultants study showed Washington would generate 9 tons of solid waste a week which at an extimated cost of \$5.54 per ton would cost about \$2,600 a year to transfer it to Newport site 2. We questioned the 9 ton figure and directed him to contact the Selectmen to see if they would authorize weighing the solid waste brought to the dump for one week.

The sixth meeting was held Monday, Sept. 9. Philip Barker

reported that in the 32-hour check of weight of solid waste, conducted by authority of the Selectmen from Aug. 19 to 25, the 12,900 pounds weighed, would average 2,580 pounds per day, 212 tons per year, $6\frac{1}{2}$ tons per week in summer, and 4 tons per week year round, and cost \$1,100 a year to transfer to Newport 2 site. This figure was much lower than the consultant's. He was also asked to arrange for a meeting with officials of Windsor to discuss a joint landfill located in Windsor. This came about as a result of the inspection made by Roy Shook, Soil Conservation Service; Leon Geil, Sullivan County Conservation District; Philip Barker and Preston Rolfe on Aug. 20 when test pits on Faxon Hill showed a too high seasonal water table for a landfill operation, but a site in Windsor appeared acceptable.

The seventh meeting was held Tuesday, Oct. 8, and we were invited to a regional meeting on solid waste management at Newport on Oct. 10 and a joint solid waste meeting in East Lempster Oct. 9. Then we met with Bob Johnson, Dick Herman, Bob Atkins, Joe Nelson and Ronny Houghton, Selectmen or Planning Board members, from Windsor, to discuss the possibility of conducting a joint sanitary landfill in Windsor, since we have no acceptable site. It was agreed we would get up-to-date figures as we could and meet again in December.

The eighth meeting was held Tuesday, Nov. 12, and Philip Barker reported on the solid waste meeting in East Lempster finally held on Nov. 4, attended by himself, the chairman and the clerk and Selectman Otterson, representing Washington and representatives from Lempster, Marlow and Goshen where it was decided to get permission to dig test pits on a Lempster site.

The ninth meeting was held Tuesday, Dec. 10, and Philip Barker reported no word had been received from Lempster for permission to make site tests and he was instructed to contact them further. There was a discussion on Historic Districts based on a 300-foot radius in East Washington and a 200-foot strip between the Library and Fridlunds in Washington that may be good for the town to adopt. The delegation from Windsor did not come to discuss a joint landfill.

The clerk and the Selectmen enrolled in a five-week Subdivision Workshop held from 7:30 to 9:30 evenings in Newport conducted by the Lake Sunapee Regional Planning Commission. This met on March 14 and 28 and April 4, 11 and 25. The chairman and vice chairman attended some meetings. The clerk went on the Field Trip Saturday May 4, from 1 to 5.

The Planning Board participated in the Open Selectmen's Meeting held the evening of Aug. 24 in the upper town hall. Some 70 people were present for a good discussion on the town tax map, a master plan, a land use plan, tax assessing, land use ordinance, building permits, East Washington public beach ordinance, etc. which gave non-resident taxpayers a chance to ask questions and get answers. It was mentioned that there were some 200 land transfers and 30 building permits issued up to the date of the meeting.

Regarding improvement of the New Cemetery, which is supevised by the Planning Board. Philip Barker's bid of \$1,800, the only one submitted, was accepted Oct. 4, but will not be completed until next year because of cold weather closing in. Payments during the year totaled \$150 for: P. Rolfe, seeding, laying out graves, and drawing

plans \$47.07; Social Security \$2.93; P. Barker, preliminary expense \$100; leaving a balance of \$1,850 which should be reappropriated to finish the stone wall contract. Four hundred and thirty graves have been laid out 11 by 4 feet each in the 221 by 100 foot graded area which has a smooth stand of grass which has been kept well mowed by the Highway Dept. Two burials have been made in the 12 graves that have been sold. Each grave lot costs \$25 per grave. This figure was chosen to give a return during the next 10 years of about enough to cover the more than \$7,000 spent by the town since 1969 on improving the New Cemetery.

The Planning Board has no funds to report as their expenses are

paid directly from Town Funds.

The bills for the 1976 Bicentennial celebration are paid by the treasurer of the Bicentennial Committee when he requests a transfer of funds from the Old Home Day Fund which is a continuing fund. For

those figures see their reports.

The Planning Board recommends that the voters adopt the article in the 1975 warrant authorizing them to prepare Subdivision Regulations, as it is to the advantage of everyone to have the Town be able to say that if future subdivisions are made, they will be an asset and bring the community benefits, rather than be a liability and cause losses. Land use regulations help insure orderly development of the town by the voters, and subdivision regulations help insure the orderly development of the town by others.

TOWN HISTORY COMMITTEE REPORT 1974

One member of our committee, Frances J. Crane, died Dec. 9 at the age of 78. She probably knew more about the past happenings in Washington than any of us who survive her and we will miss her help

in preparing our Town History.

Ronald and Grace Jager during the summer of 1974, with expenses paid by a grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities produced a 48-page booklet "Historical Pillsbury: A Brief History of Cherry Valley, Washington, New Hampshire' with a map, nine photographs and three pages of footnotes, which will be incorporated in the History when it is written. This was submitted as an example of their progress on researching and writing our Town History and if acceptable should result in a further grant for Grace Jager to continue working on it through June 1975, then both working full time through December 1975. However, if the grants do not become available due to the current pressure to reduce national spending, the Jagers intend to complete the book, although it would then become a part-time instead of a full-time effort, and the town may have to reimburse them for certain expenses that would have been covered by the grants. It is also possible some funds may be obtained from other sources before summer. The plan is to have the manuscript completed by Jan. 1, 1976, to give six months for the book to be printed and ready for sale July 1. 1976 in advance of the Bicentennial Celebration, Friday, Saturday and Sunday, Aug. 6, 7 and 8, 1976, and the Jagers expect this can be done. It is possible that the genealogical portion might have to be a later. separate volume, due to part-time efforts leaving insufficient time, but this would not detract from the history, and may be settled later in the year. An appropriation of \$1,500 in March of 1975 and a similar amount in March 1976, should provide sufficient funds to meet some expenses that would have been covered by the second grant, and still leave enough to meet publishing costs, all of which will be returned when all histories are sold.

TOWN TAX MAP

Work on the preparation of a tax map required by law to be completed by each town in New Hampshire prior to Jan. 1, 1980, was started in March 1973. To Dec. 1, 1974 we have obtained plans or descriptions of 1,211 parcels of land covering about 15,213 acres. Since the land area of Washington is 46 square miles or 29,440 acres, we have about 52 percent coverage. These plans will be transferred to the Mylar sheets at a scale of 400 feet per inch to complete the map. Since the parcels to date include the larger areas, such as 11 developments and the State Park land, it is estimated that the remaining 48 percent coverage can be completed in the five years remaining. Cost to Dec. 31, 1974 has been \$1,246.15 in 1973 and \$724.20 in 1974 for a total of \$1,970.35.

We attended a Tax Map Panel (with Director Phil Barker) at a regular meeting of the Lake Sunapee Regional Planning Commission Nov. 21 which gave us some up-to-date information, and a Regional Tax Mapping Workshop (with Selectman Otterson) at Newport on Dec. 5. The main speaker was Douglas McIntosh, a nationally recognized tax map expert, and we were glad to learn our tax map work is following acceptable methods of preparation. We suggest the reappropriation of the \$329.65 balance and an appropriation of \$500 will provide funds to continue tax map work during 1975.

For 1974, an appropriation of \$500 added to the reappropriation balance of \$553.85 gave a total of \$1,053.85 for tax map work. Expenditures were: W. Breckenridge, plans of 25 parcels \$69; A. Plumb, plan of 30 parcels \$71.10; Planning Maps Inc., prints \$4.40; P. Rolfe, 161 hours at \$3, \$454.74; P. Rolfe, expenses \$96.70; Social Security, \$28.26; Total \$724.20; Balance Dec. 31, 1974, \$329.65.

REGIONAL PLANNING COMMISSION

Under Article 17 of the 1974 Warrent, the Town became a member of the Regional Planning Commission now organized and named the Upper Valley-Lake Sunapee Council and contributed \$167 as the Town's share of their annual operating expenses.

Each town has two directors on the 45-member board and Philip Barker and Preston Rolfe were appointed by the Selectmen. The Upper Valley Planning and Development Commission has 18 directors from

nine towns of which three are in Vermont.

Our subregion, the Lake Sunapee Regional Planning Commission has 26 directors from 13 towns including Washington, Acworth, Cornish, Charlestown, Unity, Newport, Grantham, Springfield, Wilmot, Sunapee, New London, Sutton and Croydon.

The annual budget is about \$10,900 made up of Federal, State and

Town contributions.

Your two directors attended every one of the six meetings held, four in Newport, one in Lebanon and one in White River Junction, Vt. They asked to be reimbursed for mileage for the longest trip of 102 miles, but feel that it is only fair in these times of high costs to be reimbursed for all travel next year, as they are willing to donate their time.

The Technical Services Program which assists member towns in such things as the Federal Flood Insurance Program is now designed to have all requests for local services routed through the local directors who are best informed on local priorities. The value of services received by Washington have far exceeded the \$167 dues we paid, in the areas of solid waste management studies, technical help in on-site inspection by soil scientists, tax map workshops, and advice in studying joint landfill operations with Marlow, Lempster, Goshen and Windsor, although final arrangements have not been completed.

We uge the town to continue its membership and appropriate the

\$209 dues for 1975 as a good investment in planning.

- 9. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to renovate, equip and staff the Grange room in the Town Hall to make it suitable for classroom use.
- 10. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to purchase an option on a site for a new school.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

The burden of funding education weighs heavily upon local districts while concurrently the task of providing satisfactory educational programs with suitable alternatives is likewise the responsibility of the district. After a decade of participation from the State and Federal governments we have failed to see the emergence of proposed funding but we have seen categorical funding to remove inequities and strong advocacy for accountability.

Timeliness in education is important in preparing our children for the competition of today's world but the importance of individual skill development has never decreased in importance. Although approaches to the teaching-learning process have varied to a far more personal approach, the emphasis is on basics in a functional setting with a sense

of belonging and involvement.

As a rural district we invite and have the involvement of the community in many facets of our public schools. The credibility gap has lessened and confidence in the public school system has increased in most public sectors. Although we still have a few failures, percentages have greatly reduced with diagnostic development, remedial and developmental assistance, and motivation based on achieved competence, career awareness, and viable educational alternatives.

Fortunately, the public school program is destined to change to meet fulfillment of the demands of society in educational, business, and conversely depression factors have attacked our daily routines at work and at home and similarly they have attacked our institutional services. Your indulgence is necessary through these trying times to provide the necessary instruction vehicle so that an undiminished educational

program may continue for our children.

The professional staff and school boards have worked diligently to provide a maintenance budgetary appropriation with change only where mandated for subsistance. We respect your affirmation of excellence in education and support for continuance of instructional improvement for our youth.
