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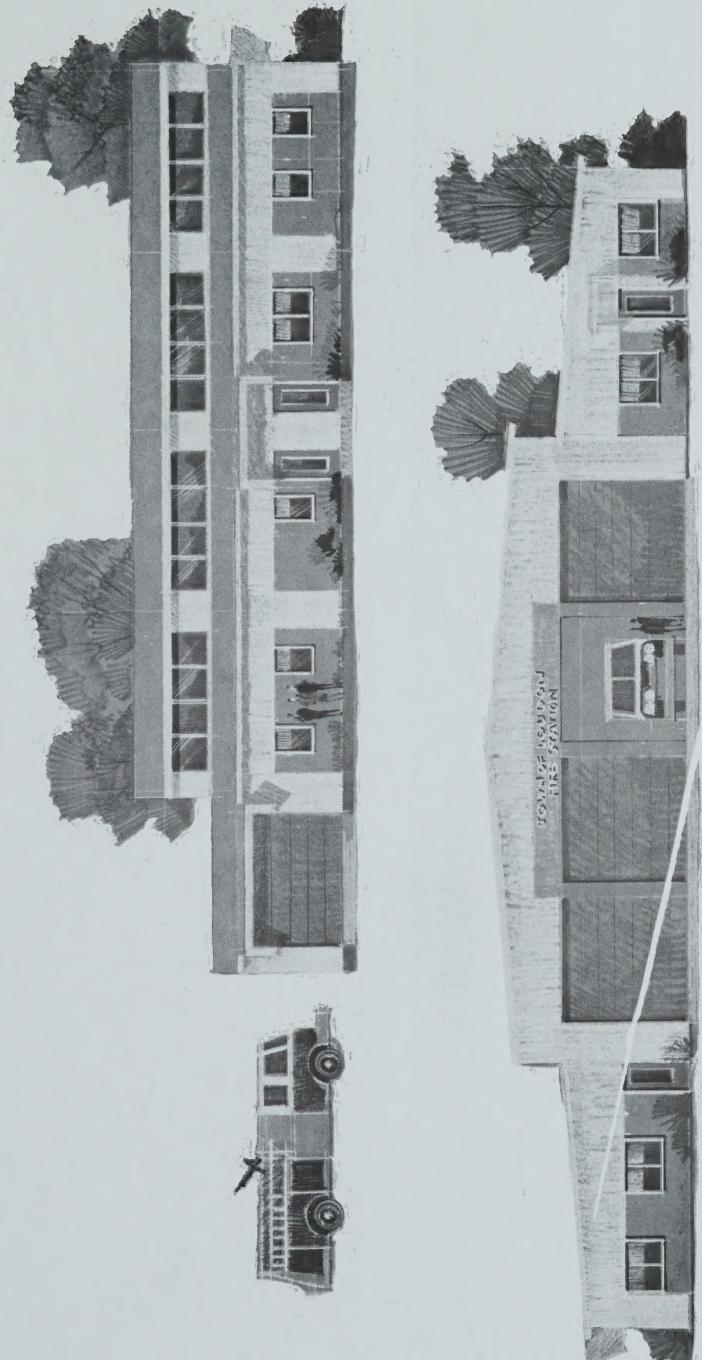

# **LOUDON TOWN WARRANT**

**State of New Hampshire**

**THE POLLS WILL BE OPEN FROM 9:00 A.M. to 7:00 P.M.**

*To the inhabitants of the Town of Loudon in the [L.S.J] County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Loudon, N.H. on Tuesday, the tenth day of March, next at 9:00 of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

**Articles 1, 7, 11-13 and 16 will be by ballot vote on Tuesday, March 10, 1992, between the hours of 9:00 A.M. and 7:00 P.M. at the polls at the Loudon Town Hall.**

**ARTICLE 1.** To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

**Articles 2-6, 8-10, 14-15, and 17-20 will be taken up at the second session of the Annual Town Meeting on Saturday, March 14, 1992 at the Loudon Elementary School, at 9:00 A.M.**

**ARTICLE 2.** To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and the Town Treasurer to borrow on behalf of the Town, in anticipation of taxes, a sum or sums of money and to issue notes therefore to an aggregate principal amount not exceeding the total tax levy during the preceding financial year, said notes to be paid in 1992 from taxes collected during the current year.

**ARTICLE 3.** To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend without further action by the Town Meeting money from State, Federal or other governmental unit or private source which becomes available during the fiscal year. [Pursuant to RSA 31:95-b (Supp.)] This article shall: (1) be used only for legal purposes for which a town may appropriate money; (2) require the Selectmen to hold a prior public hearing on the action to be taken; (3) not require the expenditure of other town funds; (4) to exempt from all provisions of RSA 32 related to limitation and expenditure of town monies.

**ARTICLE 4.** To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept on behalf of the Town gifts, legacies and devises made to the town in trust for any public purpose as permitted by RSA 31:19.

**ARTICLE 5.** To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to convey any real estate acquired by the town by tax collector's deed. Such conveyance shall be by deed following a public auction or the property may be sold by advertised sealed bids, or may be otherwise disposed of as justice may require, pursuant to RSA 80:80.

**ARTICLE 6.** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$17,000 for the purchase of a new police cruiser for the Police Department with funds to be withdrawn from the Police Capital Reserve Fund and to appoint the Board of Selectmen as agents to carry said purpose into effect.

**ARTICLE 7.** To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning Ordinance of the Town of Loudon by adopting the following amendment by adding a Section 503.3 to Article 503 to read:

"Temporary camping or campgrounds are not permitted in any district except that of local civic organizations and youth groups which may be granted permission by applying to the Selectmen's Office. If such permission is granted, the Selectmen may impose such conditions and limitations that they deem necessary."

(by ballot, to be voted on Tuesday, March 10, 1992)

**ARTICLE 8.** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$5,500 for the purpose of resurfacing the Town tennis courts and basketball court, refurbishing the swing set and playground equipment and installing same at the Recreation Area, with such funds to be withdrawn from the Recreation Maintenance Trust Fund; and to appoint the Board of Selectmen as agents to carry such purpose into effect.

**ARTICLE 9.** To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$30,000 for the purpose of upgrading and repair of two bridges with such sums to be withdrawn from the Bridge Capital Reserve Fund, and to appoint the Board of Selectmen to act as agents to carry such purpose into effect.

**ARTICLE 10.** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000 to be deposited in the Library Improvement Capital Reserve Fund, thereby increasing the annual appropriation to the Library Capital Reserve Fund from \$10,000 per year to \$25,000 per year.

**ARTICLE 11.** "Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 466:30-a which shall make it unlawful for any dog to run at large, except when accompanied by the owner or custodian, and when used for hunting, herding, supervised competition and exhibition or training for such?" (by ballot, to be voted on Tuesday, March 10, 1992)

**ARTICLE 12.** "Are you in favor of adopting the provisions of R.S.A. 41:2a to establish a 3-year term for the Tax Collector? (by ballot, to be voted on Tuesday, March 10, 1992)

**ARTICLE 13.** "Are you in favor of adopting the provisions of R.S.A. 41:26b to establish a 3-year term for the Town Treasurer? (by ballot, to be voted on Tuesday, March 10, 1992)

**ARTICLE 14.** "Are you in favor of a full time police chief starting January 1993 with a salary range of \$30,000 to \$40,000 incorporated into the Town's 1993 annual operating budget?" (by petition)

**ARTICLE 15.** "Are you in favor of limiting the selectmen's position to two (2) consecutive terms at a time?" (by petition)

**ARTICLE 16.** "Are you in favor of increasing the Board of Selectmen to 5 members?" (by petition, to be voted on by ballot Tuesday, March 10, 1992)

**ARTICLE 17.** To see if the Town will vote to continue the contract with Raceway Ambulance, Inc., of Loudon, and to raise and appropriate the sum of thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000.00 for that purpose, this amount being the same amount required by the contract since its inception in 1988). (by petition)

**ARTICLE 18.** To see if the Town will vote to adopt a unified Town/School District checklist for voters of the Town of Loudon and the Merrimack Valley School District, and further to authorize the Supervisors

of the Checklist for the Town of Loudon to make such additions, deletions or corrections to said unified checklist as are permitted and/or required by State Law.

ARTICLE 19. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

ARTICLE 20. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

## **SELECTMEN'S REPORT 1991**

Seldom does a community the size of ours have much which is noticeably in common with the rest of the nation and much of the world. Unfortunately, 1991 proved to be the exception to the rule as recession continued to force business failures, FDIC bank take-overs, personal bankruptcies, layoffs and foreclosures.

There were some bright spots on our own horizon, though, and the Selectmen would like to take this opportunity to make you aware of what your community experienced and accomplished in these trying economic times.

The most obvious "bright spot" was the New Hampshire International Speedway. The Planning Board, Zoning Board, Conservation Commission, Fire Department, Police Department and Selectmen's Office have worked tirelessly with the owners and managers at the Speedway through the expansion and enhancement of the facility in 1991. The Speedway drew fans from across the nation and the world to see first class auto racing. Those same fans learned a little about what New Hampshire in general and Loudon in particular have to offer.

New Hampshire International Speedway did more than turn the spotlight on New Hampshire, though. The Bahre family funded four \$2,500 college scholarships for Loudon residents. The Bahres opened their doors to local civic organizations such as Boy Scouts, Cub Scouts, Girl Scouts, Kiwanis, and Lions Club for fundraising. They are currently sponsoring a Scout Explorer Project.

Another truly bright spot on Loudon's horizon has been the work done by the Economic Development Committee. In 1988 the Selectmen proposed the creation of a Commercial/Industrial Committee to address the issues of a newly created commercial/industrial district, and to concentrate on ways in which to attract desirable commercial and light industrial growth in that district with an eye to broadening the tax base and providing some property tax relief for residential property taxpayers.

During this last year, the Commercial/Industrial Committee changed its name and broadened its focus. The Committee now serves as the Loudon Economic Development Committee. Their work won high praise from the Office of State Planning and regional Chambers of Commerce when they published a brochure highlighting Loudon businesses and drawing attention to areas which would be suitable for commercial development. More importantly, the Committee, with the support of the Selectmen, spent much of 1991 developing a local "Business Directory."

In this year's budget, you'll find a substantial increase in the Economic Development Committee's budget for the purpose of publishing and distributing that directory. This community has always counted on the local business community for support, relying heavily on local businesses to support Scouting, Old Home Day, P.T.O, etc. The Selectmen believe it's time for the community to now support its businesses. We urge you to "buy local." If you operate a business in Loudon and you aren't listed in the Directory, please contact Bill Schultz, Chairman of the Economic Development Committee. If you'd like to be in business in Loudon and you don't know where to start, the Economic Development Committee is ready to give you a hand.

Another aspect of Town Government which has seen more than its share of activity because of the shaky economic situation is local welfare. With significant cutbacks in aid at both the state and federal level, demands on local public assistance have skyrocketed. The very nature of local general assistance is to provide short-term, emergency aid while the applicant is waiting for State or federal assistance. Because of the enormous increase in requests for food stamps, fuel assistance, Aid to Families with Dependent Children, Supplemental Social Security Income, Social Security Disability Income, and Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled, the Department of Health and Human Services often took months rather than weeks responding to applications for aid. The burden shifted to the Town.

The Town has almost no chance of recovering any of the monies it expended when State or federal programs should have been liable for those costs.

With our own limited resources, and being keenly aware of the burden on our taxpayers, the Town has concentrated this past year on drawing a very fine line between people who are having a terrible time economically and those who are truly in emergency need of general assistance through the Town. The Town's second focus has been vigorously pursuing repayment of funds expended as "General Assistance."

While our successes have been limited, we have managed to see reimbursement of \$731.07, some of which can be seen in this year's budget as the "Workfare" account. While State and Federal law prohibit us from giving any details, one of the nicest people we met in 1991 was an applicant who was laid-off, relocated in Loudon, and could find nothing but limited part-time work. This individual applied for aid, received what the Town could allow under its local guidelines, and welcomed the opportunity to work for the dollars received. This person filled a critical need at the time for professional part-time help in the Town and is now working full-time for the State of New Hampshire.

Through a combination of working for the town and making cash reimbursement, this person repaid every cent received. More importantly, this person is proof that the system, when it is carefully and conscientiously managed, works to everyone's benefit.

After years of work with the Solid Waste Committee, the Selectmen enacted the Solid Waste Flow Ordinance. That project involved hundreds of man hours in drafting, revising, reconsidering, and hearing public comment on the proposed ordinance. The Ordinance went into effect in September, 1991, and represents a major milestone in addressing both the environmental and economic impact of waste disposal and recycling. We sincerely appreciate the Town's efforts throughout the process.

In the 1990 Town Report the auditors reported a pending \$3,000,000 lawsuit filed against the Town by HPH Gravel. In addition to the staggering costs at stake, the suit challenged the legality of the Zoning Ordinance and establishment of various zoning use districts. We're extremely pleased to report that the Town successfully defended the suit in Superior Court and HPH Gravel ultimately withdrew its further appeal to the New Hampshire Supreme Court.

Perhaps the most dramatic and divisive event of 1991 was the vote on the proposed Safety Building. The Selectmen had refused to support funding the construction of a new Police/Fire/Rescue Building for four years, believing that the taxpayers should not be asked to assume such an enormous financial burden when the economy was in such drastic decline. In 1991, the need for more space for the Fire Department, Rescue Squad and Police Department became critical. The tower which was used for drying fire hoses was deemed structurally inadequate and its use had to be discontinued. The new fire truck which the town voted to purchase at the 1991 Town Meeting could not be housed in the existing building. The Police Department had clearly outgrown its present facility, and the lease on the building was in jeopardy.

A bond issue to construct a new Safety Building was defeated at the 1991 Town Meeting. The Town did approve the construction and funding in a special Town Meeting in July 1991. Construction is under way. A number of local businesses have been awarded sub-contracts by the general contractor. A number of factors including the weather, the availability of certain items originally specified in the bid, and ultimately a six week delay in delivery of the steel building itself put the project off schedule. The construction is now well under way and completion is anticipated by the contractor before the end of March.

In the meantime, the Selectmen would like to express their appreciation to Capitol Fire Protection which has allowed the Town to house surplus fire apparatus at their facility during the construction. Capitol Fire's response in this situation is just one more indication of what a community can accomplish when everyone works together.

Cable television has proven to be the true "burr" under Loudon's blanket for the past several years. Originally, the Town contracted with Amrac Cable Television, Inc., because the Amrac proposal would have offered cable to almost 85% of Loudon's residents. Although Amrac was unable to perform on their contract and franchise agreement, the Town was unable to secure a legal release from that contract until late in 1991.

While negotiations were in progress for release from the original cable franchise, the Selectmen were also negotiating a new franchise with Continental Cablevision. A franchise agreement with Continental was signed on February 11, 1992. Continental believes the system will be built and operational within 18 months.

On this year's warrant, you'll find several articles which are to be taken up either as an official ballot vote on Tuesday, March 10, 1992, or during the business meeting on Saturday, March 14, 1992. The Board would urge you to consider the following:

#### Increasing the appropriation to the Library Improvement Capital Reserve Fund.

The Town has been placing \$10,000 per year in the Library Improvement Capital Reserve Fund for several years. As of December 31, 1991, the fund balance stood at \$71,140.59. The need to expand the library services and to provide a suitable facility which can respond to the growing needs of the community is obvious. The Selectmen would suggest 1996 as a target date for new construction. By increasing the appropriation to the Library Capital Reserve to \$25,000 per year, the current fund balance would be increased by \$100,000 plus interest. The remainder of the funds needed for construction could then be raised through the issue of notes or a bond.

#### Adoption of a unified Town/School District Voter Checklist.

During the 1991 legislative session, the General Court enacted a statute providing for unified Town/School District Voter Checklists. The purpose of the bill was to ensure that voters need only register once in order

to be assured that they could vote in both Town matters and School District matters. The idea is a good one, but its implementation in Loudon is a little more difficult than the legislature envisioned. The Town and School District boundaries are not co-terminus, and there are homes physically located in Loudon which are actually part of the Concord School District. By adopting this article, which was suggested by the Secretary of State's Office, we believe that Loudon's Supervisors of the Checklist will be able to separate out those persons who should legally be allowed to vote in school district matters and those who are legally eligible to vote in Town affairs.

Amendment of the Zoning Ordinance to allow temporary camping by local civic and youth organizations when granted prior approval by the Selectmen.

With the increase in activity at N.H. International Speedway, the number of requests for temporary camping permits increased in 1991. The Board of Permit reviewed the current Zoning Ordinance and discovered that NO camping is allowed in anything other than approved, permitted campgrounds. Unfortunately, that also meant that if a local church or scouting organization wanted to host a retreat or a jamboree, they would technically be in violation of the Zoning. By passing this article, the Selectmen would be able to grant permission for activities such as these which are currently not permitted by the Zoning Ordinance.

As always, we close by thanking the volunteers who give so generously of their time and talents. Unfortunately, while the need for volunteers is constantly increasing, the number of people willing to share their time and energy seem to be in very limited supply. It doesn't seem to matter where you are, whether it's Scout meetings, P.T.O. events, Old Home Day, or committee and organizational meetings, you always see the same faces. Volunteerism has always been the life blood of communities like ours. If you want to learn more about your community, how it works and what we can do to face the challenges of the future, we urge you to get involved. Volunteerism works and enriches everyone's lives.

# **AUDITORS REPORT**

**Plodzik & Sanderson, Professional Association  
Accountants & Auditors**

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements of the Town of Loudon for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1991, we considered the Town's internal control structure in order to determine the scope of our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements. Our review of these systems was not intended to provide assurance on the internal control structure and should not be relied on for that purpose.

Under the standards established by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants, reportable conditions involve matters coming to our attention relating to significant deficiencies in the design or operation of the internal control structure that, in our judgment, could adversely affect the Town's ability to record, process, summarize, and report financial data consistent with the assertions of management in the financial statements.

A material weakness is a reportable condition in which the design or operation of one or more of the internal control structure elements does not reduce to a relatively low level the risk that errors or irregularities in amounts that would be material in relation to the financial statements being audited may occur and not be detected within a timely period by employees in the normal course of performing their assigned functions.

During the course of our review, the following conditions were noted that were considered to be material weaknesses as defined above:

## **TAX COLLECTION SYSTEM**

### **Reconciliation of Accounts**

As in previous years, the Collector continues to experience some difficulties in obtaining needed reports from the computerized tax accounting system. As a more complete understanding of the various accounting and computer matters continues to develop, we are hopeful that this situation will be self-correcting. However, until procedures are understood well enough so that monthly balancing of the detailed records is routine, a weakness in accounting control will exist, and bookkeeping errors may not be detected in the normal course of operations.

At the time of our audit, the Tax accounts were not in balance by \$7,954.97. We have instructed the Tax Collector on how to reconcile the

tax accounts and have advised her to balance with the general ledger controlling accounts on at least a monthly basis. We recommend that some level of oversight and training be provided for the Collector and Town Bookkeeper until these procedures can be routinely performed.

## **TREASURER'S ACCOUNTS**

### **Bank Reconciliations**

While the Treasurer's records were very neat and well organized, a weakness in accounting control existed during the year, in that bank and book balances were not reconciled until year end. As a result, a small variance was not detected or corrected in a timely manner. Because the difference was not considered material in relation to the Town's financial statements taken as a whole, we did not expand the scope of our audit to determine the cause of the variance which was approximately \$2,000. However, we have instructed the Treasurer to be aware of items clearing the bank in January that might not have been considered as reconciling items at December 31.

We have instructed the Treasurer to reconcile all bank accounts on a monthly basis.

Also, the following condition was noted that we do not consider to be a material weakness:

## **TAX COLLECTION SYSTEM**

### **Lien Procedures**

Our audit disclosed occasions where proper legal notices were not made in a timely fashion in connection with the release of liens for unpaid taxes. Specifically, notice of redemption was not recorded with the Registry of Deeds until sometime after thirty days which is required by RSA 80:70.

These findings were reviewed with the Tax Collector.

## **OTHER MATTERS**

### **Future Operations**

Generally, we were pleased by the condition of Town records, and with the efforts made by Town personnel during the year, to correct the defi-

iciencies commented on in prior years. Even though the Town's staff level of accounting knowledge is at a basic level, personnel are working hard to learn accounting procedures and appear to be improving at a steady rate. Unfortunately, the Town again experienced a change in bookkeeping personnel, and as a result, some degradation of records occurred during the last quarter of the year. While these difficulties now appear to be mostly resolved, new personnel would likely benefit from some level of oversight and training.

Given the limited in-house level of accounting knowledge, we were pleased to provide this level of expertise to assist with the analysis of accounts, closing of records and preparation of year-end reports. However, as the Town continues to grow and become more sophisticated in its operations, information needs will continue to increase. Likewise, as a shift is made to more of an accrual basis of accounting, it will be necessary to provide the present staff with continued training or to consider the creation of a position with greater accounting knowledge and experience to oversee the various record-keeping functions on a day-to-day basis.

Our consideration of the internal control structure would not necessarily disclose all matters in the internal control structure that might be reportable conditions and, accordingly, would not necessarily disclose all reportable conditions that are also considered to be material weaknesses as defined above. Likewise, a report of this type typically places a greater emphasis on findings of a critical nature and often fails to disclose the many positive aspects of the Town's systems and procedures. Therefore, to put our comments and recommendations in proper perspective, it should be noted that the weaknesses observed are not necessarily the result of poor management and should not be considered as reflecting upon any individual's integrity or motivation. Oftentimes, they are due to factors which are outside the control of the Town's personnel, such as organizational restrictions, budgetary limitations or inadequate software systems.

This report is intended solely for the information and use of management and others within the administration. This restriction is not intended to limit distribution of this report, which upon acceptance by the Board of Selectmen is a matter of public record.

In closing, we would like to express our appreciation to those persons whose cooperation and assistance have helped us to achieve efficiencies in completing our audit.

After you have had an opportunity to review our audit report and comments above, we would be pleased to meet with you to discuss any questions that you might have.

According to State Law, Town borrowing (exclusive of those exceptions allowed under the provision of the Municipal Finance Act) may not exceed one and seventy-five hundredths percent (1.75%) of the valuation

of property based upon the applicable last locally assessed valuation of the municipality as equalized by the Commissioner of Revenue Administration. At December 31, 1991, the Town of Loudon is using an equalized value of \$177,054,824 and a legal debt margin of \$3,098,459.

### **Change in Accounting Principle**

During the 1991 fiscal year, the Town adopted a new chart of accounts and procedures which were developed by the New Hampshire Government Finance Officer's Association. Primarily, these changes resulted in some reclassifications of voted appropriations into the new expenditure categories and the treatment of overlay as a reduction of property tax revenues instead of an expenditure as had previously been the practice. Prior-period memorandum totals in the report have been adjusted to give retroactive effect to these changes.

## **HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT REPORT 1991**

Last year, once again, the Town Crew undertook new projects and increased activities of general maintenance. Projects included the clearing and widening of some sections on Shaker Road, Flagg Road, Bumfagon Road, and Beck Road. Increased visibility at two dangerous hills were completed on Coaster Road. School Street received a shim coat and new oil surface. As usual we would have liked to have done more but limited funds and time prevented it. We did make some headway on its roadability and profile.

The town crew also has undertaken all of the site work at the new Safety Complex. Its a nice change of pace for the crew and savings to the town.

Gravel roads were graded more often this past year due to increased use. The amount of traffic we received in some areas actually required a grading cycle of every seventh day. We are sorry but this is impossible for us to do.

Next year, we would like to acquire \$30,000 from our already established bridge fund for some minor repairs and site review by qualified engineers. Sanborn Road and Kenney Road are slated for this activity.

Extensive asphalt shoulder work and gravel application on asphalt roads are also on the agenda. We are now in the planning process of eliminating the bad corner on Bumfagon Road. This will also be completed by fall.

Last but not least, the Road Crew will also finish the site work at the new Safety Complex.

Special thanks to the residents who have done road side clearing on their property. It has been a great help in minimizing ice build up this winter. We at the Highway Department appreciate your efforts.

## **TRANSFER STATION REPORT 1991**

For the past year the Transfer Station has remained unchanged in procedures used for handling recycling and refuse material. We did construct a new salt holding area and drop off retainer wall for building debris.

Using our own trailers and tractor to haul refuse and some recycled items has proved to be a great cost savings over private haulers.

This past summer we were informed by our Hydrology Study Engineers to minimize salt contamination in the soil. Prior to building this, procedures used were to pile the salt on open ground. The highway crew erected a containment area out of cement blocks and pavement. At the same time we incorporated a new building debris drop off point, which would have had to be moved for dump closure from its original location. Eventually we will have to fully enclose the salt containment area from the elements, but for now tarps are sufficient.

We have been asked by the Recycling Committee to set up activities in areas already established and add cardboard and tin to our list. Evaluations have been made of our work force and we believe our two part-time employees will handle the changes sufficiently with little change in overall hours.

Once again we would like to thank the residents for their increased acknowledgment and help for recycling and in keeping a clean functional facility. A special note of thanks to Arthur Colby for his expertise and help in our signage.

## **SOLID WASTE AND RECYCLING REPORT 1991**

In 1991 the Solid Waste Ordinance was approved and enacted on September 24, 1991.

Flyers outlining fees were distributed at the Transfer Station and additional copies are available at the Town Clerk's Office.

Closure of the Landfill is continuing to be reviewed and coordinated. The Recycling Buildings were completed and equipped and recycling began in February for glass and paper. As of 12/31/91 30 tons of paper and 1  $\frac{3}{4}$  ton of aluminum cans have been recycled producing revenue of \$1316.15. The reduction of 31  $\frac{1}{4}$  tons from the waste stream to the Penacook Facility has also saved \$1200.00, for a total of \$2516.15 (Rev \$1316.15 plus \$1200.00 savings).

The glass is being collected. When 20 tons of each color is accumulated it will be sold. Other recycled materials have produced \$1900.00 in revenue in 1991.

In 1992 we are looking forward to implementing recycling of cardboard and tin cans and the purchase of a glass crusher to improve our storage capacity.

Monthly meetings are held the third Tuesday of each month at the Town Offices and the public is welcome.

# LOUDON POLICE DEPARTMENT REPORT 1991

With our current police personnel within the Town of Loudon, consisting of three full-time officers and seven part-time officers, it goes without saying that it is one of the finest police departments within the county. These men have spent countless hours above and beyond their regular hours to investigate and convict the many serious crimes we have encountered this past year. Every member within the department works in total harmony and have aided in situations above and beyond the call of duty. With the major race events at New Hampshire International Speedway, their patience has been truly tested during the intense effort to maintain traffic control and safety. Their professionalism has enabled us to allow smooth operation of the events. I have great appreciation and gratitude to them for a job well done.

As always with population growth comes more crime and particularly with the employment situation. During 1991 Merrimack County Dispatch answered 5,902 telephone calls plus an additional 8,386 calls were answered directly at the Loudon Police Station. There were a total of 8,484 calls for service for the Loudon Police Department. The following is a breakdown of the activity for 1991:

## **LOUDON FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT 1991**

Following a memorable year in 1990 in which the Department marked its 50th anniversary, 1991 continued to be another landmark.

With the Fire Department housed in cramped and outmoded quarters, several replacement design approaches had been considered. Early in 1991 it was decided the town could not afford to build a conventionally framed building and the Building Committee began looking at what other fire departments had done to meet their needs. It was found a steel building would be more cost efficient.

An Article for a new fire station was rejected at Town Meeting and the Department was instructed to come back to a Special Town Meeting to be held on July 31st with a proposal for a facility containing both Fire and Police Departments.

An 11,600 square foot Loudon Public Safety Building was approved at the special meeting. The facility will house fire apparatus in four drive-through bays (5600 sq. ft.) in the center, with a 3,000 foot wing on each side for fire and police administration and support activities. The Building Committee and the project engineer feel the design will fulfill the Department's needs for a number of years to come.

Our new pumper, which was approved at the 1991 Town Meeting was delivered on December 20, 1991. This is the Department's first "custom" engine, an all aluminum, diesel Emergency One attack pumper featuring a 4-door cab fully enclosing four firefighters and an elevated pump console for safety and fire ground vision. It carries 1000 gallons of water and has a 1250 GPM pump.

Total responses for the year were 240, up 9% over last year. Major changes were an increase in chimney, outside, and vehicle fires and shorting utility wires. Motor vehicle accidents decreased for the second year. Average response time was 3.8 minutes.

## **LOUDON RESCUE SQUAD 1991 REPORT**

Despite an overall increase in total Fire Department responses, the Rescue Squad actually had a slight decrease in responses for 1991. The review of responses showed decreases in Motor Vehicle Accidents and increases in Requests for Medical Aid. Out of a total 1991 count of 104 rescue responses, 26 were for vehicle-related rescue, a figure down 11 runs from 1990. Request for Medical Aid rose to 78 calls, up from 68 last year. Only 6 Cardiac Emergencies were noted this year. I hope that number continues to remain low.

The growth of the community and some local businesses tend to indicate that our level of activity will remain somewhat consistent. The squad members continue to crosstrain into other areas of the Fire Department or perhaps the other way around. In any case, EMT-trained personnel are likely to be found on any piece of Fire Apparatus in the Department not just on the Rescue Truck. This enables us to recognize and begin treatment of some injuries before the rescue can get there.

In the coming months you will be receiving a mailing from the Rescue Squad. The object of this mailing is twofold. First the squad has encountered a simple device that should enable us to find your house quicker during an emergency. Second, by selling these devices to you we will be able to raise funds towards the purchase of a new specialized rescue tool. The mailing will explain further so watch your mailbox.

## **LOUDON ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT**

The Loudon Zoning Board of Adjustment was involved with 14 cases in 1991. The case load consisted of 3 Special Exceptions, 9 Variances, 1 non-conforming use change and 1 appeal of an Administrative Decision.

Requests for side and front yard set-back variances are a growing concern for the board. Building permits are not currently required for auxiliary buildings such as garages or sheds and many of these structures are being built too close to property lines. Members to the Board are currently appointed by the Selectmen.

The five permanent members are Roy Maxfield (Chairman), Bruce Mayberry (Vice Chairman), Jack Towle, Mark Bennett and Dave Germain. Our secretary is located in the village town offices. She is available to assist with applications or questions concerning our zoning ordinances and can be reached at 798-4540.

The ZBA meets on the fourth Thursday of each month at 7:30pm at the Loudon Police Station. If you wish to be on the agenda it would be helpful for you to contact our secretary prior to the meeting. All meetings are open to the public and anyone may attend.

I would like to thank all board members for their many volunteer hours attending meetings, work sessions and site visits during the year. I would also like to thank the Planning Board Members for their assistance and support. On behalf of all board members, I would also like to thank the residents who have appeared before the board for their cooperation and patience.

## REPORT OF THE LIBRARIAN 1991

In 1991, the Maxfield Library worked to provide not only books to relax with, but also current and relevant reference sources. From the NADA "blue book" of automobile prices to job search aids to minutes from local board meetings, the Library's materials developed in answer to a wide range of needs. Interlibrary loans made up for what we didn't have as we borrowed 332 books from other libraries and loaned out 31 of our own.

Your generosity really made a difference in the number of new materials the Library had to offer. Half of the acquisitions for the year were from gifts or were purchased with fine and book sale money. Our thanks to everyone who brought in book donations or who gave some extra change with their fines or book sale items. We all benefit from those books that we could not have afforded on our current budget.

Our programs continue despite the limitations of the building's size. Although the weekly story hours and the December "Just-for-Kids Shopping Day" are the only activities that we can (just barely) accommodate in the Library, there are many events at other spots around town. The American Legion Post #88 generously allowed us to use their hall on four different occasions. Thanks to Friends' funding, storyteller Carolyn Parrott and her fifth grade students entertained the preschoolers with lively tales. Another program for our story hour fans featured Kathy Lowe-Bloch and Sharon Raymond and some unique ideas about ways for parents and children to share their enjoyment of music. The Friends' "Chocolate Festival" fund-raiser in May and the Summer Reading Program Awards Day, with over 100 in attendance, were also held at the Legion Hall. The Library is very grateful for the Legion's caring support.

The P.T.O., the Friends and the Library worked together in April on a National Library Week program attended by close to 200 children. Loudon Grade School Librarian, Mrs. Ellsworth did a fantastic job along with many volunteers as our book lover's "Scavenger Hunt" went on in the multipurpose auditorium. With the Friends' help, the Library took part in the P.T.O.'s Halloween party, the Congregational Church's Harvest Fair and Old Home Day. On that rainy Saturday in August, our cookie decorating booth was set up thanks to David Rice, Bob Hendy and Seth Hamilton. Vicki Whittemore drove our float with its First Amendment theme of "Celebrate Your Freedom to Read."

During the year, the Library hosted group visits from all the classes of the Loudon Grade School, the children from the Loudon Ridge

Kindergarten and Pre-School, the youngsters from the Congregational Church's Summer Day Camp and the Loudon Historical Society.

We hope to buy a computer for the Library this year. Linking up with the statewide network will be just one of the many advantages of automation. The Friends have been working hard to raise the money and expect to have what we need after raffling off their latest quilt. Come in, see it and buy some chances at the Library. In a rose and blue log cabin design, this quilt is definitely one of their best creations.

As our Capital Reserve fund grows, the Library gets closer to the day when its building expansion can begin and we can provide the space that the townspeople need for library resources. With a new heating system that is large enough to heat an addition, new carpeting, insulation and custom built bookcases, the building is being made as efficient and comfortable as possible. A basement renovation will give us a little more space to help get us by until the expansion is completed. When the Fire Department no longer leases the old station from the Library, options will be considered for the best interests of the townspeople and the Library's future needs.

Many thanks to Jean Nelson and Joan Malfait for dedicated work that goes beyond the hours they put in at the library. And a very special thank you to Irene Cadrette, our number one volunteer, Friend of the Library and all-around library supporter.

## LOUDON HISTORICAL SOCIETY 1991

The Society met on a monthly basis from May through November with an average of 15 members in attendance. Meetings were held at the Loudon Town Hall with the exception of the May meeting which was held at the Court House Building and the November meeting which was held at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Malfait.

Several noteworthy projects were undertaken by members of the Society this year. One of these was reproduction of the original town record book 1773-c. 1920 (375 pages). Five copies of the pages of this book were made on acid-free paper and are being leather-bound by Tom Ives of N.H. Bindery. Copies will be made available at the Town Offices and at the Library for use by the public, minimizing unnecessary handling of the original document. Plans are being made to reproduce and bind additional copies for sale by the Society.

The membership selected a design for a "Welcome to Loudon" sign which has been erected just south of Cascade Park. The artwork, construction and material were a gift from the Ives family.

A clean-up of the Town Pound and surrounding area, located on Youngs Hill Road near the Town Hall, was conducted. The Pound has a granite header over its entrance dated 1774, one year after incorporation of the town.

The July meeting was addressed by Nancy Hendy, our librarian, on recent improvements to The Maxfield Public Library and its services. This was followed in November by a visit to the Library by Society members for a tour of the facility given by Nancy and trustee Doug Mahoney. Refreshments were served.

Several members attended a regular meeting of the Canterbury Historical Society. We were invited to visit the Society's museum in June, opened especially for this visit, and more than 20 members enjoyed an impressive display of their accomplishments, complete with refreshments.

A very interesting original document was loaned to the Society by William Frost of Loudon. This is the manuscript of a presentation prepared in 1875 for the residents of town in honor of the National Centennial celebration. Since it was also approximately the centennial for the town, its was prepared in the theme of "The First 100 Years of Loudon." This document will be copied, as was the town record book, and made available at the library.

As noted in the report of last year, the Town Hall has been designated as an historic site and officially listed in the National Register of Historic

Places. A discrepancy regarding the official name, also noted in last year's report, has been resolved with the historic name being "Loudon Town Hall" with other names being listed as "Loudon Center Freewill Baptist Church", "Loudon Town House" and "Loudon Meeting House."

The Society has acquired some furniture and equipment: four display cases, a desk and chair donated by Richard Malfait, a free-standing American flag donated by Mr. and Mrs. Wilfred Ives in memory of their daughter, Susan. Also, the selectmen have made available the use of one of the town's safes for the storage of old documents. These items are located at the Loudon Town Hall.

The Society continues to be prevented from accomplishing its true purpose for existence: the collection, maintenance and display of historic artifacts, by the lack of a facility where these artifacts may be afforded the security which must be guaranteed to the persons or organizations who donate or loan them. Therefore, we are unable to accept items other than manuscripts which can be placed in the safe and occasionally displayed, even though several have been offered. The most promising resolution to this stalemate could be the designation of a portion of the soon-to-be-evacuated fire station building as a Historical Museum. The members of the Society hope that the residents and officials of Loudon keep this thought in mind as decisions regarding the future use of the fire station are made.

## **CONSERVATION COMMISSION REPORT 1991**

In 1991 the Conservation Commission oversaw the final segments of the Wetlands Restoration Project at the NH International Speedway, which resulted in a very satisfactory review by the State last fall.

A second project overview was the Commission's involvement in the E.S.M.I. Contaminated Soils Treatment Plant on Rte. 106. This required attendance to a number of Public Hearings, State Air Quality Commission Hearings, as well as Planning Board and Zoning Board Meetings.

The third and perhaps the most important undertaking by the Commission is the Land Conservation Investment Program. This is a project that has been ongoing for two years and has finally resulted in putting into Conservation Easement, two pieces of the Albert Bachelder property, as well as the donation by Mr. Bachelder of a 155-acre piece on Young Hill Road. This latter property includes a large wetland and an unusual upland Heron Rookery. This is a truly wonderful gift to the town.

Another project property which should come to close soon is an additional 80 acres on Upper City Road which will also be under Conservation Easement. Other properties involved at this time could result in the preservation of an additional 800 acres in conservation.

Finally, the commission continues to be involved in the oversight process of all Dredge and Fill Applications, which are required any time work is being done in a wetland, whether to put in ponds, culvert work or even timber cutting operations.

## **LOUDON ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE REPORT 1991**

A strong business/economic base is essential for the survival of a town whose primary source of revenue is property taxes. The purpose of the Economic Development Committee is to promote a business climate which supports the existing businesses in Town and attracts new businesses from outside Loudon.

In March, the Greater Concord Chamber of Commerce held a "Business/Government Meeting" in Loudon. Business leaders seized this opportunity to discuss issues and concerns which affect our business community. A follow-up meeting co-sponsored by the Loudon Economic Development Committee and the Chamber of Commerce is planned for 1992.

The following projects were developed in part to address the concerns raised during the "Business/Government Meeting."

Loudon's first "Business Directory" was researched, written and published by the Committee. The "Business Directory" gives consumers an easy reference for locating local businesses. The directory is ready for distribution.

The Committee developed a detailed map of the Commercial/Industrial District (C/I District). The map includes overlays which identifies those properties which contain wetlands or other bodies of water which may impair development. A list of all property owners within the C/I district is also now available. The map and property owners' list serves as a quick reference for anyone to easily identify properties which may be available for commercial/industrial development.

The Committee is preparing an application for the Federal Government requesting they establish a full time Post Office in Loudon. The process requires that the applicant must demonstrate a need for a Post Office and that the present level of service is not adequate to satisfy that need. Additionally, the application must include a commitment from the town to complete a street numbering system. The committee is working vigorously to complete the application.

The Town of Loudon brochure was distributed throughout the state by placing it in key locations. Commercial real estate agencies in the area were sent brochures with letters inviting their sales prospects to consider locating in Loudon.

Each year the business community is called upon to support our youth organization, local charities and special events. The Loudon Economic

Development Committee strongly encourages the citizens of Loudon to support your local businesses — Buy Local!

This year I showed a considerable increase in my work load. I had a 16% increase in Compliance related activities which included handling daily complaints turned into the Selectmen's Office, inspections on new homes, and other violations of Town's ordinances. A major task taken on this year was tagging the many signs advertising businesses in town so that future signs may be recorded for compliance purposes. Due to the large decrease in building permits issued by the Selectmen's Office, the certificate of occupancies I issued decreased by 28%.

On the other hand, the Health related inspections and complaints increased by 28%. These cases include Day Care inspections, foster home inspection, restaurants, health related questions & complaints.
