

#### TOWN WARRANT

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Lyme, in the County of Grafton, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Church Hall in said Lyme on Tuesday, the tenth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Budget as prepared by the Budget Committee.

4. To see what compensation the Town will allow its various officers the ensuing year; also, what price per day will be paid for labor, trucks, tractors and teams on the Town Highways the ensuing year.

5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any Real Estate acquired through Tax Collector's deeds.

6. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes the ensuing year.

7. To see if the Town will vote to allow Bank discount on all taxes paid on or before November 1st, 1942.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$81.00 for the issuance and distribution of printed matter calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the Town in cooperation with other Towns in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region. Said appropriation to be disbursed by the Selectmen.

9. To see what sum of money if any the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Forest Fire Tools on a 50-50 basis with the State.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for Blister Rust Control the ensuing year.

11. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Tax Collector to deed to the Town all property where tax deeds are due. 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1141.50 for State Aid Construction. The State to contribute \$2282.00 to be used on the Cummings Pond Road.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$705.03 for Town Road Aid. The State to contribute \$2820.13.

14. To see what sum of money if any the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for additional fire equipment.

15. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate money for a street light near Abbott's Garage.

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to be used for Fire Protection, Additional Police, or for any public health situation that may arise due to the war emergency.

18. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue or close subject to gates and bars the following highways: The cross road from the Geo. Dennis farm to the River Road; the road leading from the residence of Chas. P. Dimick to the Thorndike place, also from the corner below the Thorndike place to the corner above Frank Cutting's residence; also, from Arthur B. Chesley's to the Henry Bailey farm; also, the road leading from the residence of James J. LaMott to the Thomas E. Dimick house.

19. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Several gift books have been received from interested friends of the Library: Mrs. Alden, Mrs. Burr, Mrs. Malloy, Mrs. Porter, Mrs. Lamphere, Mr. Partridge, Mrs. Martha Coburn, and books in memory of Zebidiah Cutting.

Other gifts to the Library include \$10.00 from the Lyme Men's Club which was used to buy a series of five books, "Men of Power," which is especially fine for the High School pupils. The balance remaining was used to purchase three American Library Association books.

Proceeds of \$10.35 from Style Show purchased four fiction and seven non-fiction books for the children's table. Miss Mayo gave a year's subscription of the Colliers magazine. Miss Rowley presented two framed pictures, and Mr. Evans gave an airview photograph of Lyme.

The reading tables continue to be popular. Ten magazines: American, Good Housekeeping, Reader's Digest, Colliers, McCalls, Red Book, Popular Science, American Girl, Boy's Life, and Children's Activities are received regularly.

Mrs. Warren and Mrs. Putnam have contributed a great many magazines. The public school teachers have cooperated with the librarian in suggesting books which would be of most assistance to them in their work. Pupils are using Library books for their book reports in increasing numbers.

It is much to be desired that the town make a generous appropriation in order that the standard of our Library be maintained and its usefulness extended.

It is to be hoped that all the pupils in town and the townspeople will avail themselves of the splendid facilities of our Library.

#### **REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT**

# To the School Board and Citizens of the School District of Lyme:

Your superintendent of schools presents his annual report as a part of the annual report of the school board to the school district of Lyme. It is one of a long series of school board reports, the 23rd in the series of school reports by the superintendent of schools and the 14th by the present writer.

#### General

The work of the schools has progressed along normal lines during the past year. The teaching personnel has been subject to change, as must be the case in the smaller communities. It is probable that as one result of the situation which exists in the country, there will be a lessening number of people entering the teaching service. This will make it more and more difficult to secure adequately-trained teachers for all of the teaching positions which arise. It is therefore necessary for all of us to exercise self-restraint and helpfulness toward the teachers in their work and in their relationships with the pupils. No major changes have occurred in the school program of studies, although the State Department has in process new programs in the fields of science. Music continues to be a part of the school program and there is an increasing tendency on the part of the pupils to enjoy the opportunity to take part in various musical events.

### Achievements

Much has been done during the past several years to improve and make more habitable the school plants at Lyme. On the educational side generally, the textbooks have been improved and more books for reading purposes have been purchased. In some of the schools situated away from the Library there has been a continuing plan for the purchase of some library books and for the utilization of library facilities made available by the state through Plymouth Teachers' College. This has made possible a larger distribution of reading material and has aided somewhat in the English in the several schools.

In the reports of 1936 and 1937 the attention of the board and citizens was called to the possibility of still further consolidation. But since this has been objected to rather strenuously by the citizens, it has not been felt that the time was opportune for such action. It is brought up at this time so that there still may be a fresh record of the fact that several of the desirable school activities have been considered in previous years and have had the general support of the citizens of Lyme so far as they have been accomplished.

#### Defense

The declaration of war in December brought definitely home to the school officials the necessity for some positive action in making sure that the boys and girls in our schools were protected so far as possible. The statewide plan for finger-printing all school children has been begun in certain parts of the state but has been interfered with slightly because of the necessity for fngerprinting other groups. It is now believed that the officials will be ready to do this work in our communities as soon as they have accomplished this other service which is perhaps immediately more necessary.

The teachers have been instructed and plans have been made so that pupils will understand what they are to do in case an emergency should arise and it should become necessary to evacuate the school buildings. This has been done in such ways as to avoid panic and too great a nervous-upsetting of the children. Everyone has been instructed to exercise self-control and be calm and collected should the need become real. The defense group of the town of Lyme has included the schools in its consideration of the needs and it seems reasonably certain that the school pupils will be protected so far as is humanly possible.

#### **Budget**

The increased cost of commodities will make it more difficult than ever to carry on the public schools without increasing the outlay. Teachers and pupils alike have been continuously cautioned about the use of materials and are showing a good indication of cooperation in meeting this situation. The two items in the budget which show an increase are those for teachers' salaries and transportation. It may not be possible to carry on the transportation at the figure named, but an effort will be made to do so. It is expected that in order to maintain a satisfactory teaching staff it will be necessary to increase teachers' salaries over that of some years previous. It goes without saving that one cannot adequately or accurately judge the expected income, but after serious consideration it seems reasonable to expect the amount indicated in the budget, so that with this added income (even though the two increases have been asked) the net appropriation will be something over \$100.00 less than that of last year. It is recommended that this budget be adopted by the school board and presented to the citizens at their annual meeting.

#### School Lunches

It had been hoped to make some progress in the plan for continuing the school lunches which were begun several years ago and which became too burdensome upon the teaching staff for their continuance. Should the time come when the government makes available the services of W.P.A. workers, it will be possible to undertake this program, but until additional services are rendered by outside agencies the teachers cannot be expected to carry on their school program and at the same time prepare hot lunches. Some communities have provided voluntary help for this work and it has been of value to the boys and girls, but it again requires constant attention and a group of people who can be relied upon to carry through the program continuously if definite results are to accrue. There are only a small percent of the communities in the state where such lunches are provided through paid help. These statements are made so that the citizens may understand why it has not been possible to utilize surplus commodities for this purpose.

#### Repairs

No major repairs have been made during the past year. This is due to the fact that the buildings were in fairly good condition and that it was not felt necessary to carry forward any extensive improvement in the buildings. It is probable that the work will be a bit more extensive next year as there may be some need for attention to the underpinning at the Chesley School and, if possible, there will need to be painting done in one or two of the buildings. Such other repairs as arise in order to carry on the school program will be undertaken as usual.

#### Buildings

The last of the unused buildings in the school district has been sold. This means that no longer is the district obliged to carry insurance on these buildings nor to exercise care in their repair. The buildings now owned or leased by the school district for school purposes are: the Whipple, the Chesley, the Lyme Center Building (or the old Academy building), and the Plain School. These buildings should be sufficiently large to carry forward the school program, unless the number of pupils increases beyond reasonable expectations.

#### Conclusion

The appreciation of the pupils, teachers, and school officials for all of the helpfulness which has been extended to the schools by the citizens of Lyme is again cheerfully extended. The present national emergency is sufficiently serious to cause all of us who are interested in the welfare of the young people to wish to make sure that the democratic ways of life and the principles enunciated by our fathers, as well as the freedoms which we have all enjoyed, are all thoroughly understood by the boys and girls in our schools.

The school enrollment continues to show a decrease. This also is borne out by a small decrease in the average membership although it is still larger than it was five years ago. The percent of attendance is the largest that it has been for the past ten years and the number of tardinesses per pupil has been commendably reduced.
