He has distinguished himself off the playing field, too, as a humanitarian and an accomplished artist whose works have been exhibited at the Everson Museum of Art.

Our third honoree, David Remnick, who could not be with us this evening, is a journalist, author, and editor of *The New Yorker* magazine. As a former Moscow bureau chief for *The Washington Post*, he also is an expert on Russian history. He won the Pulitzer Prize and the George Polk Award for Excellence in Journalism for his book *Lenin's Tomb*, which gives an eye-witness account of the fall of the Soviet Union. David will be giving the commencement address at tomorrow's ceremony.

I look forward to recognizing each of these honorees and their achievements more formally tomorrow.
