

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PREFACE

This is the third in a series of Handbooks of Australian Trade Unions and Employees' Associations published by the Political Science Department, Research School of Social Sciences, of the Australian National University. Like the earlier editions, it forms one of the series of Occasional Papers published by the department. The first edition, by D.W. Rawson and Suzanne Wrightson was published in 1970 and showed union membership as at June 1969. The second, by the present author alone, was published in 1973 and gave membership as at December 1971. The new edition shows the situation as at September 1976. In many cases, it also records the membership of unions as at December 1974.

The earlier editions have soon gone out of print and appear to have served a need. This edition includes more detail in that, where possible, the membership of each union is given divided by state and by sex. The Introduction sets out to provide information necessary for the use of the <code>Handbook</code> and to draw some broad conclusions from the information which it contains and from what can be learnt from comparing the most recent figures with those in the earlier editions.

The preparation of the <code>Handbook</code>depends entirely on the co-operation of the officials of the organisations surveyed, and I am obliged to the hundreds of union officials and staff who responded to my requests for information. In all those states where it was necessary to seek information from public officials, they responded very generously and helpfully. Similarly, I owe a debt to the officials of the various central organisations of trade unions and to the officials of the Australian Labor party who provided the necessary information on union affiliations.

The preparation of the text has been greatly facilitated by the skill, goodwill and patience of Mrs Kath Bourke and Mrs Karen Votto, of the Political Science Department. Despite their efforts, it has to be said, as in the prefaces to the earlier editions, that any such compilation will contain some errors and that these are entirely the responsibility of the author.

INTRODUCTION

No-one is likely to dispute the importance of trade unions in Australia, as in other economically developed societies. During the years since the first edition of this <code>Handbook</code> appeared in 1971, their influence has been increasingly recognised, though the nature and desirability of that influence continues to be debated and disputed. It is not the purpose of the present volume, which is essentially a collection of facts and figures for people to use and interpret according to their own views and their own needs, to enter directly into such controversies. Nevertheless, it may assist in making them somewhat more fruitful, as well as serving more prosaic purposes.

One of the great handicaps to the understanding of unionism has been a tendency to treat all such organisations as though they were, or at any rate should be, of the same kind. They do indeed have a common purpose, by which they are defined; but in other respects they are very heterogeneous. Among other things, they vary greatly in the number of their members; the distribution of these members according to occupation, sex and state; and in their relations with other unions in union federations and with political parties, especially the Australian Labor Party (ALP). It will be difficult to understand the activities of a particular union without information on such questions; and it will be difficult to speak of unionism in general unless we know something of the relative importance, at least in terms of membership, of these various types of unions.

The other difficulty in the way of understanding trade unions is that they are always changing. So are we all, of course, but unions are changing very rapidly and also unevenly. Overall union membership figures show a steady increase over the last nine years to 1975, with a more rapid increase between 1970 and 1974. More detailed consideration, however, shows that this conceals great variation with many unions, including some of the best known, declining in size while others have doubled and trebled their numbers. During the same period, the proportion of unionists who are women increased from 22 per cent to 30 per cent, but this change too was spread very unevenly; we would not know from these figures that, for example, in 1976 women outnumbered men in four of the six largest unions in Australia, which together made up more than a quarter of the total number of unionists. Broadly speaking, the overall steady increase in the number of unions conceals very large increases in public administration and the service industries which has more than made up for reductions in the size of many unions in manufacturing and in parts of the transport and building industries. This may or may not have an effect on the industrial and the political influence of individual unions and of unionism as a whole; but anyone who is interested in any such questions needs to have specific information about what changes have actually occurred.

Those who are interested in such questions have been hindered by the absence of even quite elementary information about Australian unions. The

Australian Statistician has for many years published annual figures which include the number of unions which he considers to exist and their total membership, subdivided according to industry, state and sex and into broad categories of size. The figures as of 31 December are published in leaflet form in July of the following year as the Asutralian Bureau of Statistics Bulletin No. 6.24, and later appear, with other useful information about the registration of unions under arbitration legislation and about the principal trade union federations, in the Bureau's annual Labour Report. These figures, which are compiled from forms sent annually to union secretaries are, of course, of great value and authority.

The Census and Statistics Act under which the Statistician operates, enables him to require this information from the unions. Unfortunately for some users of this information, the same Act makes it impossible for the Statistician to reveal any information about any individual union or even to disclose the names of the unions from which information has been obtained. Thus, although the leaflet 'Trade Union Statistics: Australia, December 1975', the most recent issue of Bulletin No. 6.24, reveals that there were then 280 unions with a total membership of 2,813,800, it is not possible to tell from it just which 280 organisations were regarded as trade unions.

Other limitations necessarily follow from the Statistician's inability to reveal the membership of individual unions. It is impossible to estimate from the official figures how many unionists are affiliated with a trade union federation such as the Australian Council of Trade Unions (ACTU) or with the ALP. It is possible only in a very general way to see where, and to what extent, union membership is concentrated. And if it is difficult or impossible to discern these things for any one year, it follows that this source, for all its reliability and importance, cannot tell us about changes in these aspects of union membership from one year to another, or over longer periods of time.

The need for a compilation of membership figures of trade unions which would be as complete as possible and which, unlike the records of the Bureau of Statistics, could be made freely available brought about the publication of the earlier editions of this handbook in 1970 and 1973. The present edition provides a good deal more detail. As far as the available information permits, the membership of each union as at September 1976 is shown for each state and territory and for each sex. Where possible, a total membership figure for December 1974 is also given. Its concern, however, remains strictly limited to union membership according to these and other categories, including the more important union affiliations. It does not provide information on union finances or methods of organisation.

Another source of information on union membership in 1976 is *Inside Australia's Top 100 Trade Unions: Are They Wrecking Australia*, published in December 1976 by Ian Huntley Pty., Ltd. This is a book of 336 pages which considers 98 separate unions, including all the largest. It contains much information on union finances, methods of organisation

and activities. However, two points need to be made about the membership figures which it contains. Firstly, they do not attempt to show membership according to state or sex. Secondly, there are some large differences between the membership as shown in this publication and those which will be found here. In 15 cases, the difference is greater than 10 per cent.

This indicates some problems involved in compiling union membership figures. It may never be possible to reach agreement on just what are the 'right' or the most appropriate figures. Our own, unless the contrary is made clear in the tables, are from forms completed by the unions and returned to us between October 1976 and February 1977. some cases they are likely to include varying proportions of members whose contributions are in arrears and who may or may not resume their membership of the union. This no doubt accounts for some cases in which our figure is considerably greater than that of the Huntley publication, since this states that 'wherever possible, financial membership has been used' (p.ii). There are, however, some instances in which our figure is much the smaller of the two, and here there must be some other explanation of the discrepancy. It is likely that the figures shown here are very similar to those collected by the Australian Bureau of Statistics, which uses very similar methods of collection.

WHAT IS A TRADE UNION?

This initial question is not as easily answered as may at first appear. We will not get much help in answering it from such definitions as appear in Australian legislation. There is no such definition in any federal Act and those which have survived in several states are based upon definitions in the British Trade Union Act of 1871. they include employers' organisations within the meaning of 'trade union' but their defining objectives of trade unionism are quite unhelpful. For legal purposes, some of the excessive width in the definition of a trade union was removed by the High Court in the case of Victorian Employers' Federation v. the Commissioner of Taxation, 1957. case, the Employers' Federation claimed to be a trade union and therefore to be entitled to certain tax concessions. Mr Justice Kitto, in rejecting this argument, guoted among others the definition of a trade union in the Oxford English Dictionary as 'an association of workers in their trade or in allied trades for the protection and furtherance of their interests in regard to wages, hours and conditions of labour and for the provision, from their common funds, of pecuniary assistance to the members during strikes, sickness, unemployment, old age etc.' He held that the term 'has not, for the general purposes of the law a meaning different from that which it has in popular usage'. no legal or other problem, then, in excluding organisations or employers from consideration as trade unions, except for certain purposes under state trade union Acts which are not of general interest.

The definition now in the Oxford English Dictionary was first published nearly sixty years ago and in some respects it too does not reflect present usage. The importance which it gives to the provision of 'pecuniary assistance to members' is no longer appropriate since most trade unions do not provide such assistance, except rarely during strikes. More importantly, the use of the words 'trade' and 'wages' implies that one does not find trade unions among salary earners or those who could not be described as working in a trade; but there are dozens of organisations of salary earners in managerial and professional employment which are certainly trade unions. This applies most obviously to those, from the Association of Colliery Management to the Institute of Veterinary Inspectors, which are actually registered under a state trade union Act; but there are many more which are not so registered but whose principal purpose is the negotiation of their members' conditions of employment, and so are involved in that activity which is essential to a trade union.

The Bureau of Statistics defines a trade union as ... an organisation, consisting predominantly of employees, the principal activities of which include the negotiation of rates of pay and conditions of employment for its members'." This definition would be hard to improve upon, and has been followed here. Trade unions are commonly multi-purpose bodies and their subsidiary purposes vary widely. Among the most common of these secondary purposes are the representation of their members, interests within society at large; whithe maintainance of and participation in a political party; mand the maintainance of professional or trade skills and the education of their members in these or other respects. These three purposes are not mutually exclusive, and there are many others. It may be that some organisations included here regard professional or political or other activities as even more important than the negotiation of their members' conditions of employment. I have not sought to make any subtle or difficult distinctions in such cases. As long as a substantial part of the organisation's interests and activities is concerned with conditions of employment, the organisation has been included, even if some might argue that another aspect of its work was of even greater importance.

As already indicated, only organisations which are made up predominantly of employees have been included. Our list does not purport to cover organisations most of whose members are self-employed, of which the Australian Medical Association and the Australian Dental Association are perhaps the most obvious examples. Even this apparently simple distinction is not without its complications. The Australian Dental Association and various sub-divisions of the Australian Medical Association negotiate on behalf of those of their members who are employees, and are represented on Wages Boards in the state of Victoria for this purpose. However, they have not been included here on the ground that this activity is a minor one in the sense of concerning only relatively small proportions of the organisations' members. A number of organisations of employed medical practitioners in the public services are clearly trade unions and have been included.

It will be seen that trade unions are a very mixed lot indeed. For many purposes, and certainly for political purposes, the information that an organisation is a trade union may tell us little unless we can learn more about it. In this handbook it is possible to make only very broad distinctions, but they are worth making. One such distinction concerns whether unions act as though they are part of something which could be called 'the trade union movement' or 'the labour movement'; or, if these terms have somewhat different connotations, to both. It is often important to know whether a union is a part of the Australian Council of Trade Unions (ACTU) or to one or more of the ACTU's state branches, called Trades and Labor councils in most states. Two other union federations, the Australian Council of Salaried and Professional Associations (ACSPA) and the Council of Australian Government Employee Organisations (CAGEO) are also of importance, though a proposed merging of ACSPA with the ACTU is under discussion at the time of writing. There are also some smaller and more specialised federations of trade unions in certain fields.

Whether a union is affiliated with the Australian Labor party (ALP) is obviously an important aspect of its activities and an indication of the union's range of objectives. It is worth noting how the members are distributed between the various states and territories, since the union may operate under very different legal and industrial constraints from state to state. We know from the Bureau of Statistics' annual bulletins that the proportion of unionists who are women has been increasing, but not the unions in which most of this growth has occurred, and these figures too are provided in this handbook wherever possible.

As in the previous editions, our aim has been to provide information which makes possible a sketch of Australian trade unionism in the broadest sense. At the same time, this information shows the hazards of treating unionism as a single whole and indicates the size of some of the broader categories into which unionists may be divided.

HOW MANY UNIONS AND UNIONISTS ARE THERE?

The tables in this handbook list 277 organisations and some 2,770,000 members, the mean membership of just 10,000 members per union being wholly coincidental. The most recent trade union membership bulletin of the Bureau of Statistics states that at the end of 1975 there were 280 unions with a total membership of 2,813,800. The Bureau's figures must, of course, be regarded as the 'right' ones. We can only be glad that our own total is as close as 1.5 per cent to the official figure. There are some areas, including education and the unions of fire fighters, where there are known gaps in our information. However, the fact that the total membership recorded here is so close to that reported by the Bureau of Statistics suggests that these and any other deficiencies are not on a scale which render invalid the broad conclusions which will be made later in this introduction.

Even apart from deficiencies of information and possible variations in how a union is defined, the number of unions which exist at any one time is not as straightforward a question as may appear. It is not uncommon for a union to be registered under different names in different states. Thus the Queensland Colliery Employees' Union is the Queensland branch of the Australian Coal and Shale Employees' Federation; which in any case is often referred to as the Miners' Federation and which is registered under the federal Conciliation and Arbitration Act as 'Australasian', though for its own purposes it prefers to use 'Australian'. The body registered under the Queensland Industrial Conciliation and Arbitration Act as the Queensland branch of the Amalgamated Society of Carpenters and Joiners and Bricklayers of Australia is in fact the Queensland branch not of the federally-registered Amalgamated Society of Carpenters and Joiners of Australia but of the federally-registered Building Workers' Industrial Union. The West Australian Locomotive Engine Drivers', Firemen's and Cleaners' Union is the state branch of the Australian Federated Union of Locomotive Enginemen; but, on the other hand, the West Australian Society of Railway Employees, the largest railway union in that state, is not a branch of the Australian Railways Union but a wholly independent body. Just as there are some unions which seem plural but are in fact singular, there are some which seem to be singular but are better treated as separate organisations. The major case here concerns the New South Wales branch of the Transport Workers Union, which has operated so much like a separate union and so unlike a branch of the federal body of that name, which also has members in New South Wales, that it is treated in this handbook, as it was in our first edition, as a separate body. At a very much lower level, the New South Wales and the Victorian branches of the Federated Tobacco and Cigarette Workers' Union have also operated very much as independent unions, being, for example, the only branches of the 'same union to be separately affiliated with the ACTU. We have therefore continued to treat them as separate unions.

Since on this occasion we sought membership figures by state and by sex, union officials were asked to go to considerably more trouble than on former occasions. We are grateful to their officials and staff who responded and believe that this additional detail will be of value to users. One outcome has been, however, that there is now a considerable difference not only in the source but in the type of information which we have from those unions which responded and those which, for whatever reason, did not; or which, unwittingly, we failed to contact. It has therefore been necessary to produce the body of the handbook in two parts. Part I consists of those unions for which membership figures have been provided in response to our own request. Part 2 consists of unions for which the membership figures come from some other source. Some explanation is required of both Parts.

The membership figures in Part I are largely self-explanatory but it will be seen that many unions, including some large organisations, do not tabulate their records according to the sex of their members. This has become a more common practice as the payment of lower rates to female employees has diminished. It means that it is simply not possible to say how many members of either sex exist in certain unions, and there-

fore among unions as a whole. This should be kept in mind by those who use not only our figures but those of the Bureau of Statistics. The Bureau draws attention to this problem in its publications, but this may not always be appreciated by those who see only that the Bureau's figures purport to give the number of males and females correct to the nearest hundred. This would be a quite unrealistic degree of precision if not read in the context of the Bureau's warning. In some cases, union officials have been willing to make an estimate of the proportions of their members belonging to each sex. Such estimates are not recorded here, but they have been used in calculating the total numbers of men and women in the unions which appear in this Handbook. Our estimate, that 31 per cent of these unionists were women, is consistent with the Bureau of Statistics' figures for December 1975 which show the proportion of female unionists as 30.1 per cent. However, it should be remembered that all such estimates are subject to the possibility of considerable error. This does not cast any doubt upon the proposition that women have become a much larger proportion of unionists. In 1969, as a comparison, the Bureau of Statistics found that the proportion of female unionists was 23.3 per cent. The increase since then is obviously far larger than could be due to any lack of precision in the data.

The second group of unions, in Part 2, is made up of unions for which we have not been able to obtain membership figures directly. A variety of alternative sources has been used. Group A consists of unions registered under the New South Wales Trade Union Act, 1881 and the membership figures for these unions are from the Repo-t of the Industrial Registrar under that Act for 1974. This report is published as No. 163 of New South Wales Parliamentary Papers 1975-76. These figures are therefore somewhat outdated; fortunately, the number of unionists for which this source must be used is small.

Group B consists of unions registered under the Queensland Industrial Conciliation and Arbitration Act 1961-1976 and the membership figures come from the Annual Report of the President of the Industrial Court of Queensland, 1975-1976. This report, unlike that for New South Wales, does not give membership by sex. Again, the number of unionists involved is small.

Group C consists of unions registered under the Western Australian Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1971 and/or that state's Trade Unions Act, 1902. The figures come from the Western Australian Industrial Gazette, Vol. 55, Part 1, 1975, pp. 169-171. The report does not give membership by sex and again the number of unionists involved is quite small.

Much larger numbers are involved in Group D, which is made up of unions of various sizes for which it has been necessary to take membership figures from the ACTU Executive Report for 1975. In earlier times this would have been a dubious course, since it was not uncommon for unions to have considerably larger memberships than those on which they paid affiliation fees to the ACTU. Our estimate for 1971, as reported in the second edition of this Handbook, was that the ACTU's affiliates' total membership was about 20 per cent greater than would appear from their ACTU affiliations. More recently, however, this overall discrepancy has been much reduced, though it may remain true of some individual unions. We can see evidence of this tendency when we compare the number of unionists for whom affiliations fees are paid to the ACTU with the total number of unionists. Between 1973 and 1975, total union membership as reported by the Bureau of Statistics rose by 6 per cent, but the number of unionists for whom fees were paid to the ACTU rose by 17 per cent. This was not due to any large new affiliations with the ACTU, nor to any disproportionately rapid growth in ACTU as compared with non-ACTU unions; it was due principally to affiliated unions in general paying fees for the entire membership. Therefore, while the source and date of the membership figures in Group D need to be kept in mind, they are probably close to the mark.

Finally, Group E is made up of unions for which there exist no current or recent membership figure which has any plausibility and in which figures are based on those for earlier periods. Fortunately there are few such unions and, with the exception of the Hospital Employees Federation, none is large.

The successive bulletins of the Bureau of Statistics show a remarkably constant growth of trade union membership during the 1970s, not only in absolute terms but proportionately to the total number of wage and salary earners. This latter figure, which reached 61 per cent (its highest point so far) in 1954, fell consistently for the next fifteen years. However, it has since risen again in every year since 1970, reaching (58) per cent at the end of 1975. Since many unions, including some of the largest make no secret of the fact that their membership in fact declined after 1974, it is apparent that this record of overall growth conceals a variety of movements both upwards and downwards among individual unions, which cannot be revealed by the Bureau because of their inability to reveal anything about their separate sources of information. The figures in this handbook, when compared with those in the earlier editions, enable us to be more specific. The current membership of the largest unions, and the direction and size of membership changes since 1969, are shown below in Table 1.

It will be seen that the overall growth in the number of unionists and in the proportion of unionised wage and salary earners, which is recorded in the figures of the Bureau of Statistics, conceals a great variety of movement both up and down in the membership of individual unions. It has long been recognized that some important unions were becoming smaller or failing to keep up with the expansion of the workforce because of economic and technological changes which reduced or limited the demand for their members' work. This has been true, to varying degrees, of such unions as the Waterside Workers' Federation, which had 12000 members in 1976 compared with 18000 in 1969; and unions such as the Seamens', the Australian Coal and Shale Employees' (Miners) and the Australian Railways Union. Unions in a number of manufacturing industries have also showed much the same tendencies. On the other hand, unions in the engineering and metal trades industries had continued to grow quite strongly, while there was even more rapid growth among professional and semi-professional unions, unions of clerical and administrative workers and unions covering some other tertiary or service industry occupations, such as retail trade and hotel and club employment.

During very recent years, these tendencies have sharpened and been modified. Between 1971 and 1976 there seems to have been hardly a union in the manufacturing industry which has kept up with the overall growth of unionism, and many of them have declined in absolute numbers of members. The metal trades unions have been as much affected as any. Australia's largest union, the Amalgamated Metal Workers and Shipwrights, now has some 5000 fewer members than in 1971, while most other metal trades unions have been affected even more. Whether this is a permanent tendency remains to be seen. As will be seen from the tables relating to individual unions, many continued to grow quite rapidly until 1974 and it is only since then that general membership decline in the manufacturing unions has become unmistakeable. It would be premature, therefore, to suggest that unionism in the manufacturing industries has entered a period of irreversible decline, even in relation to other unions. The engineering and metal trades union might be rapidly affected by an economic recovery, just as they were affected by economic decline after 1974. It is perhaps worth noting that ten years ago J.K. Galbraith thought he saw a steep decline in the manufacturing industries' contribution to union membership in the United States and based on this argument that the political and social importance of unionism was bound to decline. However, even the facts in that case are not altogether clear, and any political conclusions which might be drawn from them are still more in doubt even for the United States, let alone for Australia a decade later.

What is not in dispute is that, even during an economic recession, unionism in white collar and service occupations has continued to rise quite steeply. Table 2 below shows that this tendency is not confined to the larger unions. This table lists those smaller unions which grew by more than 20 per cent from 1971 to 1976 and, as will be seen, it is made up almost entirely of white-collar organisations. In this table, unions are listed in order of rate of growth, not of present size.

Of these unions, only the Merchant Service Guild is currently affiliated with the ACTU.

TRADE UNION FEDERATIONS

The Australian Council of Trade Unions (ACTU) is by far the largest and most important central or 'peak' organisation of Australian trade unionism. The ACTU was founded as recently as 1927. Before that time there was no permanent organisation purporting to speak for. Australian unionism at large. In most states, union federations were established in the nineteenth century and they now exist in all states. These bodies now constitute the state branches of the ACTU. In most states they are called Trades and Labor Councils, with some variation of the spelling of 'Labor'. The New South Wales body is simply the Labor Council of New South Wales, and the Victorian organisation is called the Victorian Trades Hall Council.

At the time of its most recent Congress, in 1975, the ACTU had 128 affiliates, ranging in size from the Amalgamated Metal Workers' Union, with over 160000 members, to the New South Wales Government Railways Canvas Workers' Union, with 24: Unions confined to one state may affiliate with the ACTU as well as with the relevant Trades

and Labor Council, but the bulk of the ACTU's affiliated are federal unions, operating in at least two states.

The ACTU has been growing in importance over a long period.

One reason for this is that it has come to include an increasing proportion of the total number of trade unionists. This proportion, which was about 65 per cent in 1961, increased to 77 per cent in 1969 and 79 per cent in 1971. One effect of the rapid growth of non-manual unions, many of which are not affiliated with the ACTU, and the relative or absolute decline in the membership of many manufacturing unions, which usually are affiliated, has been that the ACTU's increasing coverage of trade union membership appears to have been reversed, though perhaps only temporarily. At present, about 70 per cent of unionists belong to ACTU unions. To this may be added a further six per cent who belong to one of the Trades and Labor Councils but not to the ACTU itself. This total figure of about 76 per cent who, directly or indirectly, are associated with the ACTU compares eith a corresponding figure of 81 per cent in 1971.

Except for the affiliation of the Australian Workers' Union in 1966, the previous expansion of the ACTU was due to the growth of unions already affiliated rather than to new affiliations. If the more recent decline is to be reversed, it is likely to be because of new affiliations. This adds interest to a revived proposal for amalgamation between the ACTU and the Australian Council of Salaried and Professional Associations (ACSPA).

ACSPA has 37 affiliated unions and an affiliated membership of about 300,000. One quarter of these belong to unions which are already affiliated with the ACTU. Those which do not include the Australian Bank Officials' Association, the tenth largest union in the country, with over 65000 members, and nearly all the teachers' unions (though the New South Wales Teachers' Federation is affiliated with the ACTU as well as with ACSPA). Discussions on an amalgamation between the ACTU and ACSPA have been conducted intermittently since 1969 and are likely to reach some conclusion during 1977.

The other large and active union federation is the Council of
Australian Government Employees' Organisations, which has 23 affiliates
and a total affiliated membership of 218000. It is made up almost
entirely of federal government employees, including employees of statutory corporations as well as public servants more narrowly defined.
In addition, the Royal Australian Nursing Federation, most of whose
members are employed by other authorities and organisations, is
affiliated with respect to 1000 of its members. Several CAGEO unions

are also affiliated with the ACTU.

Lang MAC Box.

There has been a long-standing association between the Labor party and the ACTU (and, before the ACTU was established, the Trades and Labor Councils). This association is currently symbolised by the fact that Mr R.J. Hawke is the president of both the ACTU and ALP. Few affiliates of ACSPA and CAGEO, in comparison, are affiliated with the ALP.

Nevertheless, the difference is not clear-cut. The ACTU as such, as distinct from many of its affiliated unions, is not affiliated with the party; while all three 'peak councils' are represented on the Australian Labor Advisory Committee, a body whose purpose is to improve communications between the unions and the Labor party. In that sense, while none of the union federations is itself a part of the Labor party, all of them have a 'special relationship' with it which has no counterpart in their relations with other parties.

Other trade union federations noted in this handbook are smaller and less active than these three. The Australian Public Service Federation is a central body on which the major organisations of state public servants are represented. The Australian Teachers' Federation is similarly a representative body of state (and territory) school teachers. As a minor complication, both the Australian Teachers' Federation and its constituent state teachers' unions are affiliated with ACSPA. The Australian Federation of Police Associations and Unions is a comparable but, of course, much smaller organisation.

AFFILIATION WITH THE AUSTRALIAN LABOR PARTY

It can safely be asserted that no-one, including the party's leaders and officials, knows how many unionists are in unions affiliated with the Australian Labor party! However, as in previous editions of this handbook, it is possible to make a reasonable overall estimate. It seems likely that there has been some decline in the proportion of ALP-affiliated unionists and that this proportion, which for 1969 and 1971 we estimated at about 65 per cent. is probably now about 60 per cent. This is consistent with the more rapid growth of many unions, large and small, which are either not affiliated with the party at all or are affiliated in some states but not others.

Thus, Table 1 includes 18 unions which between 1971 and 1976 grew at a more rapid rate than the figure of 14 per cent recorded for unionism as a whole. Of these 18 unions, 11 are not affiliated with the party in any state while another three are not affiliated in all the states in which they operate. None of the unions in Table 2 is affiliated with the party. Some large and rapidly-growing unions are affiliated in all states, such as the Liquor and Allied Industries Employees', Transport Workers', Storemen and Packers', Health and Research Employees' and the Federated Engine Drivers and Firemens' Association. In general however, the uneven growth of unionism during recent years appears to have somewhat increased the gap between ALP-affiliated union membership and total union membership. W An Australian

unionist is more likely than not to be associated with the ALP, through affiliations: but not very much more likely. *

The problems of assessing how many unionists are in ALP-affiliated unions are of several kinds. Unions are able to affiliate only at the level of a state or territory, rather than at the national level. As will be seen from our tables, it is not uncommon for a union to be affiliated in some states but not in others in which it operates; this is true of the third largest and fifth largest unions in the country, the Shop Distributive and Allied Employees' and the Federated Clerks'. Information on affiliated unions in the Australian Capital Territory and the Northern Territory has not been obtained but this involves only relatively small numbers and would not significantly affect the overall estimate that is being made here. More seriously, the South Australian branch of the ALP, unlike the other five state branches, was not willing to provide a list of unions affiliated in that state. For this reason, no union is shown in the tables as affiliated in South Australia. However, again for the purpose of the broad estimate which is being made here, it is possible from earlier lists and other information to fill this gap in a sufficiently reliable manner.

Our calculations produce a figure of almost exactly 60 per cent of unionists as belonging to unions which are affiliated with the ALP in the state in which they live. The various uncertainties listed above might affect that figure by up to one or two per cent. However, whatever assumptions are made, it seems impossible to avoid the conclusion that there has been a decline, in this figure, though not a highly dramatic let alone catastrophic one, because of the differential growth of different types of unions. This decline could be reversed in the future, either because of a revival of manufacturing industries and therefore of manufacturing unions or because unions which are not now affiliated with the party chose to become affiliated.

NOTE

The following tables record, under the address of each organisation, whether it is registered under a state Trade Union act or a federal or state Arbitration act. Affiliations with central trade union bodies and with the Australian Labor party are also shown. This information is set out as follows:

TRADE UNION ACTS Registration is indicated by T.U. Act, followed by the state or states in which the union is registered. In the case of the New South Wales act, which is the only one under which many unions are registered, the membership figure for the union in that state, as published by the state Industrial Registrar, is also given.


ARBITRATION Registration under federal or state arbitration acts is indicated by the word Arbitration followed, as appropriate, by Federal and/or the names of the states in which the union is registered under a state Arbitration act. Victoria and Tasmania have no state arbitration authorities in the strict sense, but have systems of Wages Boards which serve many comparable purposes. The names of these states indicate that the union is represented on such a Wages Board. In Queensland and Western Australia, published reports give the membership of registered unions, and these figures are repeated here.

ACTU AND TRADES AND LABOR COUNCILS ACTU indicates that the union is affiliated with the Australian Council of Trade Unions. The initial letter of a state following ACTU indicates that the union is also affiliated with the state branch of the ACTU, in most cases called a Trades and Labor Council. The initial letter of a state or states without a preceding ACTU indicates that the union is affiliated with one or more Trades and Labor Councils but not with the ACTU itself.

AUSTRALIAN LABOR PARTY ALP, followed by the initial letter of a state or states, indicates that the union is affiliated with the party in those states. South Australia is not included.


