

2015 FACULTY MEMBER OF THE YEAR

Jerry Cohagan

Associate Professor of Communication School of Arts and Sciences



hen Jerry Cohagan received a phone call in 2002 from Dr. Jay Martinson of Olivet, he had no intention of becoming a theatre professor. He was performing as half of the Christian comedy duo Hicks & Cohagan at churches, colleges and conventions across North America. But God's plan did bring him to Olivet.

With a Master of Arts in Theatre Production from Central Washington University and more than 35 years of experience in the performing arts, Jerry serves as Olivet's theatre director and professor in the Department of Communication. "I learn so much more than I teach," he says. "I'm so pleased when I see the success of my students." His students are actively working in the performing arts in Los Angeles, Chicago, New York and other points across the globe.

In 2012, Jerry was certified as an instructor for the Meisner acting technique. In 2013, he was one of a handful of actors invited by Larry Silverberg, the world-renowned teacher and founder of The True Acting Institute, to perform in a Meisner showcase at the Orlando Repertory Theatre in Florida. Along with his teaching and directing duties, he periodically does commercial work throughout the Midwest.

Jerry has authored more than 20 books of dramatic sketches and plays, and has directed and appeared in many productions. He was the co-host of "Gospel Jubilee" on TNN for one year and also a contributing columnist for several periodicals.

Among his honors, he has been recognized as Alumnus of the Year by Northwest Nazarene University, where he received his bachelor's degree in 1979. He received the Evangelical Press Association award for his contributions in humorous writing. And he is the recipient of an honorary Dove Award from the Gospel Music Association for his years of contribution to the arts.

He and his wife, Lynda, are the parents of Chase and Tori. Lynda received her second master's degree in 2009 from Olivet. They enjoy speaking and writing together and are co-authors of three books on marriage.

Jerry believes there is profound truth in telling a story on the stage. He emphasizes the beauty, the gift and the importance of that truth in his work. "Whether on stage or in life, I love the idea of being a part of a greater story," he says. "As Christ followers, we are part of a greater narrative, an ongoing story of Christ redeeming His world through us. Live your story well."

Jerry, for your excellence in encouraging Olivet students, your unwavering commitment to the arts and arts education, and your example of using gifts and talents to serve the Lord, we salute you as the 2015 Faculty Member of the Year.

f you haven't stood near Tony
Fightmaster during the singing

missed a true Olivet experience. Not
only does he have one of the best
singing voices around, but he sings
about Olivet with the passion born
from years of living its mission.

Regardless of where or how he is serving the Lord, Tony is passionate about being the person God has called him to be. He currently serves as the director of church and university relations at Olivet, overseeing the connectivity of the University with the 700 Churches of the Nazarene in Illinois, Indiana, Michigan and Wisconsin. Dividing his time between office, car, assemblies and churches, he represents Olivet both on campus and on the road. Whether he is singing, giving his testimony or sharing God's Word, he embraces the work God has given him to do.

One of his greatest joys is seeing the growth of Olivet's Preaching Ambassadors and Music Ambassadors programs.

Through this outreach, students gain valuable ministry experience, and congregations have the opportunity to meet and hear from the next generation of Church leaders. He continues to be a champion for students, making sure they find the right careers to pursue and the right places to use their gifts and talents.

Prior to that assignment, Tony served for more than 20 years in

Olivet's Office of Admissions. There, he took on multiple leadership roles, from admissions counselor to associate director to the director of the Office of Transfer Admissions.

Following his graduation from Olivet in 1980 and before returning to join the staff in 1986, Tony was a song evangelist, a music pastor and a youth ministry pastor in local churches in Ohio and Michigan. He has also been a song evangelist for revivals, retreats, crusades and camp meetings; and a worship leader in local churches in Ohio, Michigan, Indiana and Illinois.

Tony's connection with Olivet reaches back to World War II. His father, William, received his draft notice on the day he was enrolling for classes at Olivet. Although William didn't attend Olivet after the war, all of his sons did, including Tony.

Tony and his wife, Janine '15, met at Olivet. They are the parents of four sons and have two daughters-in-law: Jonathan '15; Ben '15; Caleb '08/'11 MAT and Laura (Wilkens) '08; and Joshua '06 and Jill (Anderson) '05. They are also the grandparents of three granddaughters. "It's rewarding to have my four sons and wife graduate from Olivet," Tony said in an interview with *The Daily Journal* in May 2015. "I wanted my boys to be at a place where the faculty would pour their lives into them. They got that experience." ■

The Law and Politics Society, the student arm of the Olivet Center partnership, commemorated Constitutional Heritage Day during the week of September 17, 2014, with a patriotic library display, an informational table at Ludwig and a civics quiz.

To recognize Olivet's outstanding support, the Center hosted an open house at its new office space at the corner of Main and University Ave. Held during Homecoming & Family Weekend 2014, the event attracted more than 65 visitors.

Along with the Weber Leadership Center, the Law and Politics Society sponsored a luncheon and student forum on April 24, 2015, featuring renowned national economist Stephen Moore.

Led by Center staff members Zach Bohannon and Dr. Susan Emmerich, six Olivet students traveled to Springfield for the University's annual "Student Lobby Day" in April.

The 2015 Law, Justice and Culture Institute — a May-term course sponsored by the Center — attracted 15 talented students representing seven schools. The Center awarded over \$17,000 in scholarships and financial assistance to these students.

On July 31, 2015, the Center served as a co-sponsor of and participant in the Freedom's Journal Institute conference, "In Defense of Life: Why all Lives Matter," featuring Gov. Mike Huckabee, Dr. Eric Wallace, and many other national leaders and pastors.

The work of the Center for Faith and Culture will take place at multiple levels. It will include:

- encouraging and facilitating a culture of intellectual engagement, engaging faculty scholars and students in robust conversation
- nurturing the Olivet community's engagement with the surrounding community dealing with issues of Faith and culture
- resourcing the church in its understanding of Faith and practice of ministry, to effectively engage an increasingly complex and diverse cultural context.

Initially, the Center for Faith and Culture is facilitating faculty/student conversations concerning Creation care in collaboration with Olivet's Honors Program and concerning Human Trafficking in collaboration with Olivet's initiative in Human Trafficking. The Center is facilitating a conferencing event for selected national worship leaders to consider meaningful Nazarene worship. These and other conversations will also be hosted on the Center's internet forum — The Epworth Pulpit.

Further initiatives include a major conference in the spring, development of community partnerships, and exploration of the feasibility of both a Ph.D. and peer-reviewed journal in Faith & Culture. Participation and collaboration across the University is encouraged and welcomed.

A BRIEF HISTORY OF OLIVET

In the beginning (1900 to 1920s)

livet Nazarene University's origins can be traced to the first decade of the last century and to the resolve of several families in east central Illinois who were committed to providing a Christian education for their children. In 1907, classes began in a home in the community of Georgetown, Ill. A year later, the founders acquired several acres of land in the nearby village called Olivet. There, they raised a modest building and added the secondary level of instruction. A College of Liberal Arts followed in 1909, along with the first name for this fledgling, but ambitious, institution: "Illinois Holiness University."

By 1912, the founders and trustees were aware of the school's need for a wider constituency and offered to give their educational work to the Church of the Nazarene. This young denomination accepted the school with a pledge to support and promote its ministry of Christian higher education. That early church commitment is still being perpetuated by the more than 800 Nazarene congregations throughout Illinois, Indiana, Michigan and Wisconsin.

The school grew slowly during the next decade.

There were several acting and short-term presidents; the campus of 18 acres contained only a few small buildings; the first yearbook, the *Aurora*, was published in 1914; and a new school name followed in 1915: "Olivet University." In 1923, the name was changed to "Olivet College."

As was the case with many small church colleges in the 1920s, Olivet's financial base eroded significantly, forcing the trustees to declare bankruptcy in 1926. Then-college treasurer, Dr. T.W. Willingham,

bought the school back at a public auction, outlined a new plan for solvency, and was elected that night to serve as president.

New directions (1930s to 1950s)

A devastating fire destroyed the main campus building in November 1938, prompting the newly elected president, A.L. Parrott, and the trustees to consider locating a new campus as an alternative to rebuilding at their rural site. They found and purchased the present campus in Bourbonnais in 1939 and moved the college in the summer of 1940. "Nazarene" was added to the college's name that same year.

At the time of Olivet's move to Bourbonnais, the campus consisted of 42 acres, which had been the site of St. Viator's College from 1868 until it closed in 1938. Four of the buildings purchased then are still in use today.

Receiving formal recognition and accreditation by the University of Illinois in

1939 was a major academic milestone for Olivet. The college catalogs of the 1940s reflected a School of Liberal Arts, a School of Music, a School of Religion, and a high school Academy. In 1953, under the skillful leadership of Dr. Harold W. Reed, president, and Dr. Willis Snowbarger, newly appointed dean, all areas of study were grouped into curricular divisions.

Managed growth (1960s to 1980s)

Dr. Harold W. Reed, president from 1949–1975, led Olivet through a period of remarkable growth, including the construction of 20 major buildings to keep pace with swelling student enrollments.

Dr. Leslie Parrott continued this focus on campus expansion, development and beautification during his 16-year tenure with a specific interest in the elevation of Olivet to university status.

In 1986, the school's name was changed to "Olivet Nazarene University" to reflect the diversity

of academic programs and graduate studies.

Significant expansion (1990s to today)

In 1991, Dr. John C. Bowling became president and has led the University in continued growth and effective ministry.

During the 1990s, Olivet expanded and strengthened both its undergraduate and graduate programs. The University established a formal development program, including planned giving and major gifts, an annual fund program known as Friends of Olivet. renewed grant writing, a comprehensive program of donor relations, and the "In Word and Deed" capital campaign. In 1994, a fulltime chaplaincy program was established to give direction to chapel, student spiritual life activities, small-group ministries, missions and compassionate ministry experiences.

Additional successes in the 1990s included: Chalfant Hall was renovated; the Harlow E. Hopkins Alumni Center was established; Milby Clock
Tower was reconstructed;
Ludwig Dining Room,
the Red Room, and the
bookstore were renovated;
the coffee shop, Common
Grounds, was established; the
Olivet computer, media, and
communications network
was created; the campus
entrance was completed;
and the Admissions
Center was constructed.

In the following decade, the campus continued to undergo several changes. Between 2000 and 2009, the Weber Center was constructed; two parcels of land south of the Admissions Center were purchased; and the Larsen Fine Arts Center was renovated. Major renovations also took place in Burke Administration Building, Williams Hall, Chapman Hall, Common Grounds coffee shop and the Decker Quadrangle. Renovations to Benner Library and Resource Center included a new student hangout, Jazzman's. The Hardy C. Powers President's House was renovated to house the Center for Student Success, and a new residence

for the president was established at Reedy House on Olde Oak Drive. Ludwig Dining Hall was expanded and remodeled. Olivet purchased the former Fortin Villa property from Provena Healthcare, including 25 acres of land along Main Street, just south and west of the main campus. Today that property is utilized for ROTC classes, as well as intramural activities.

Significant improvements to the athletic facilities were completed in the 2000s, including renovation of Birchard Gymnasium to include a new varsity weight room and a new fitness center for students, faculty and staff. In Snowbarger Athletic Park, additional seating and a new press box were installed at Larry Watson Baseball Field: tennis courts were resurfaced, and new nets and posts were installed; and electric service was improved. Ward Field was renovated to include a larger running track, a new entry building, fencing, refurbished bleachers, a larger press box, an enhanced facade, and lighting for

night games and practices. In 2002, Olivet began a long partnership with the Chicago Bears as the ONU campus became home to their annual summer training camp.

Throughout the 2000s, Information Technology expanded wireless access throughout the campus, including wired access to every classroom and residence hall room. In the academic realm, the radio station WONU-FM and broadcasting classes moved from the north wing of Benner Library to a former restaurant building next to the Admissions Center on Main Street. The Department of Communication and some art classes moved into the library space, including new television, graphic arts and photo studios. The Bourbonnais offices for the School of Graduate and Continuing Studies moved to 21 Heritage Drive, just north of the main campus.

In 2005, North Central Association granted ONU continued accreditation for the maximum of ten years without conditions. The academic departments were restructured into four Schools and one College: the College of Arts and Sciences, School of Education, School of Professional Studies, School of Theology and Christian Ministry, and School of Graduate and Continuing Studies.

During the summer of 2010, there was a major overhaul of the inner campus landscape and walkways, along with renovation of the Milby Clock Tower. Hills Hall was significantly upgraded, and the process of sprinkling system installation in residence halls continued. One of the most significant projects in the last century came to completion with the construction of the Betty and Kenneth Hawkins Centennial Chapel. The 3,000-plus seat chapel was dedicated on October 29, 2010. Since the spring of 2011, chapel services have been held there, allowing students, faculty and staff to worship together as one community.

Olivet's School of Graduate and Continuing Studies has experienced tremendous growth in recent years.

In 2004, the School established a Chicago Regional Center in Rolling Meadows, Ill., and in 2011, a new office was opened in Oak Brook, Ill. Through a partnership with a university in that area, Olivet also offers a master's in professional counseling in Hong Kong. Two new regional centers have opened: Indianapolis, with enrollment for classes in summer and fall 2015; and Grand Rapids, Michigan. The Indianapolis center is Olivet's first location in the state of Indiana.

For ten consecutive years, *U.S. News and World Report* has selected Olivet
Nazarene University as a top university in its report, "America's Best Colleges."

For ten consecutive years, the University has also been commended for the pursuit of excellence and ongoing Christian witness to the world by the Best Christian Workplaces Institute. Olivet Nazarene University qualified for certification as "A Best Christian Workplace" in the United States.

The Douglas E. Perry Student Life and Recreation Center was dedicated and opened to students at midnight on 12-12-12. This 160,000-square-foot facility boasts an eight-lane, 200-meter running track; two pools, including a 10-lane competition pool for men's and women's varsity swimming; a four-story rock climbing wall; four basketball courts; workout facilities; a large game area; a spacious central lounge; and several classrooms. The Perry Center is named in honor of Dr. Doug Perry, Olivet's vice president for finance.

In 2014, the University continued to expand and improve facilities within the Department of Athletics. On Ward Field, Kiefer USA installed a new UBU Sports Speed S5-M synthetic turf game field. Tiger football, men's soccer and women's soccer play home games there. The durable playing surface will accommodate the safety and performance requirements for each sport. New entrances south gateway and west gateway — to Snowbarger

Park now welcome our many campus visitors. Brick columns with lighting and black iron fencing provide a more inviting appearance. The recent expansion and remodeling of Gibson-Ide men's locker room include 125 large lockers for the football team and an area appropriate for team meetings, as well as expanded storage areas. In addition, the baseball, men's soccer and men's tennis teams now have newly remodeled and separate locker rooms.

Construction of the 19,000-square-foot, threestory engineering addition to Reed Hall of Science is now a reality. Opening and move in was completed just in time for fall 2014 classes. In May 2015, the Board of Trustees established the Martin D. Walker School of Engineering and Technology. Through a generous gift, the Walker family has demonstrated strong support for Olivet's future.

Plans for the 18,000-squarefoot expansion of the building's south section will provide both new and updated facilities for the sciences. Included in the plans are new laboratory spaces and additional classrooms to accommodate the growth generated by the new School of Life and Health Sciences.

Recognizing the accomplishments and degree offerings of Olivet's music program, the new School of Music designation became a reality in July 2014. Dr. Don Reddick was appointed as dean. In 2013, the iLearn@Olivet initiative provided sheet music, textbooks and apps to all music students through the iPad. In 2014, the School of Music received the Apple Distinguished Program designation. The Marching Tigers received a formal invitation to perform in the 2016 Parade and Festival in London, England, on New Year's Day. To encourage success and leadership in the lives of Olivet students, the family of Dr. David L. Elwood and Ella (Iones) Ellwood — Olivet alumni — made a significant gift to the University in

2014. It is designated to expand and strengthen the programming of the Center for Student Success, as well as to coordinate and strengthen various leadership efforts in the new Elwood Leadership Program. On October 31, the Center was renamed and dedicated as the David L. Elwood Center for Student Success.

Shine.FM continues to add new broadcasting capabilities with the newest stations in Lansing, Michigan, and Indianapolis. Brilla.FM, a Hispanic radio ministry that broadcasts Christian music of the Spanish culture, joins Shine.FM, Shine Worship and Shine RX3 in streaming worldwide. Each week, Shine.FM reaches more than 200,000 listeners online, through the iOS and Android mobile apps, and through stations in Chicagoland and northwest Indiana. In February 2015, Olivet's institutional accreditation was reauthorized by the Higher Learning Commission (HLC). Olivet was recognized for maintaining a solid financial situation, being

significantly missionfocused, having realistic goals and planning processes, and meeting all criteria for accreditation. The University has earned accreditation continuously since 1965.
