Trachtenberg gives speech on variables, uncertainty

Feb. 25 found Mr. Stephen Trachtenberg, president of George Washington University, in the ICI Auditorium to give a speech on "Variables: The uncertainty of human endeavor." The speech was hosted by the Honors Society, with an audience of about

The speech was a major disappointment to some. "He spoke a whole lot about the history of aviation, personal computers, the nuclear age, the space age, and how the World Wars affected their present outcomes, and then said, 'well, it needn't have been that way'... I think we all learned that things needn't be the way they are when we're just kids," said one annoyed Riddle student. "This was a total waste of my time."

Mr. Trachtenberg chose to read from his paper for the entire duration, made very little eye contact with the audience and was very unclear on what he was trying to get across.

The following are excerpts from Trachtenberg's speech: "There is uncertainty in our efforts, it's

called intellectual uncertainty. Imagine a building that you don't know.

Animated show worthy of praise | What's the fuss?

Comedy Central's South Park, long reviled for its irreverence and foul language, deserves a second look. On its surface, the show is little more than "bad animation and fart jokes," as one critic chided. But a deeper look exposes South Park as smart, satirical and worthy of praise for exposing the follies of everyday life in America (and Canada).

Where else on TV can you hear debate about controversial issues like assisted suicide, sexual harassment, hate crimes, voting recounts and pedophile priests? Sure, you

could hear serious discussions of these issues on news programs, or get Hollywood's take on them like The West Wing and Law and Order. But South Park's tongue-in-cheek

as fun as it is enlightening. South Park takes each issue, bases an episode around it and stretches it

to absurd proportions to prove the satire but are taken to an extreme moral for the episode.

Major logistical problems in Iraq

Planners and operators in Iraq are preparing for a major troop rotation, which is to take place over the coming months. There is, though, one question that is causing a headache among those who plan the methods and means by which troops and equipment are to

of Iraq: How? How is this to be accomplished effectively and safely as possible? Where and by which routes should troops equipment be taken? These

are only a couple of concerns facing the logisticians at U.S. Transportation Command. and the Air Force's Air **Mobility Command** Primarily, though, they must

focus on the up-and-coming troop rotation. A main problem is the idea of flying hundreds of sorties with large, slow transport aircraft, which are susceptible to attack from mortars and shoulder-fired rockets. Another logistical chal-

lenge is the lack of sufficient ramp space to handle multiple large aircraft on the ground at any one time. Currently none of the four U.S. air bases in Iraq is capable of handling civil aircraft, partially due to the threat of such attacks.

Current plans include having be transported into, within and out some of the troops flown into neighboring

countries such Turkey, Kuwait and others in the region. From there, the newly arriving troops will be provided with equipment and move into Iraq via ground con-

voys. However, even with these destinations, many troops will be flown directly into Iraq, some through Baghdad International Airport (BIAP). Military C-130 aircraft will be employed to transport troops between Turkey and

It is hope the transports will be able to avoid Baghdad International as much as possible port aircraft struck by missiles in Iraq were all hit while taking off

The built-up urban and suburban Baghdad areas around the airport make it difficult for troops to patrol an extended area around the

This week was yet another thriller. In a surprise move, Clear Channel fired their "shock-jock," Bubba the Love Sponge, after the network was fined by the FCC for indecency. Clear Channel president John Hogan even went before a Congressional committee to apologize. Howard Stern's morning radio show has also been suspended in several cities. These changes come as the networks try to "clean-up" their act, specifi-cally in light of Janet Jackson's exposure during the Super Bowl. I was very critical of Janet

Jackson after the incident, and

still feel that she was in the wrong; however, I view these radio shows as a completely different animal. The key difference in the two situations is context. People have specific expectations for any type of broadcast. If I were to turn on the Spice Channel, I wouldn't expect to see Martha Stewart Living, and if I were to turn on PBS, I wouldn't expect to see

Busty Babes 19. When people tune into shows like Howard Stern, Love Line and Bubba the Love Sponge they expect to hear discussion of sexually-oriented issues. Accordingly, when people tune into the Super Bowl, they do not expect to see an exposed breast. The only time there should be intervention is when The Vagina Monologues end up on The Disney Channel. As long as programming is scheduled, and its content is expected, there is no reason that any particular content should be banned.

I'm certainly no proselyte of Stern or 'the' Sponge, but I think they have every right to express any and all of their opinions publicly as long as we live under the Constitution of these United States. We should not extinguish voices in America simply because they are not appropriate for all audiences. The fines put in place by the FCC are as good as removing the programs from the air,

because networks are interested in making money, not in the actual quality or nature of their programming. When we allow these controls to take over in the media, we are strangling the soul of intellect. Controls might only be affecting some raunchy DJs right now, but before long they could affect political forums about sexuality, drug usage or other aspects of the American life that the FCC deems inappropriate.

Frankly, I've heard Pat Buchanan say some rather offcolor things that offended me, like "We're going to bring back God and the Bible and

drive the gods of secular humanism right out of the public schools of America." Such blind intolerance is every bit as offensive as a discussion of pornography. At the same time, I recognize that Pattie-boy has every right to express his opinions and that I cannot and should not stop him. If a network perceives a need for a

family network, they should be free to provide it; the same principal applies to adultoriented materials. Individual broadcast networks should be able to set their own standards and listeners should then choose what they do and do not want to

As far as children are concerned, parents must enforce the limits they set for their children. To those who argue that all parents aren't watching their kids I say: if kids don't hear it on the radio, they'll see it on Cinemax or the internet. Networks must use discretion, but by default, some networks and some programs should be expected to be edgier

than others. Things could have been worse this week, though. Ralph Nader could have announced he was running for president, or there could have been a refugee crisis in Haiti, or the Israelis could have put up a wall in the middle of town ..

RAH-66 Comanche cancelled due to cutbacks

General Peter Schoomaker, U.S.. Army Chief of Staff, announced the cancellation of the RAH-66 Comanche armed reconnaissance helicopter on Feb. 23. This is the second major cutback for the army during the current administration, following the Crusader artillery

The stealthy Comanche's termination is also one of the costliest in Defense Department history; \$8 billion has been spent dur-ing the life of the program, and between \$2 billion and \$4 billion must be paid to contractors Boeing and Sikorsky in cancellation fees. However, the \$14.6 billion that was earmarked to build 121 Comanches between 2004 and 2011 will now be applied towards purchasing additional helicopters,

The cancellation will be most painful for Sikorsky, particularly for the 400 employees of Sikorsky's newly-opened

particularly the UH-60 Blackhawk.

Bridgeport, Connecticut plant where Comanche construction was scheduled to take place. Boeing may actually benefit in the long term because the cancellation creates a need for more Boeing-built AH-64 Apache attack helicopters.

General Schoomaker stated that the Comanche, long-viewed as a troubled project, was not relevant in the current military environment. Moreover, it would need extensive modification to regain an advantage over the newest generation of missiles and anti-aircraft artillery. Its role will be filled by upgrading existing helicopter designs and buying unmanned aerial vehicles (UAVs) such as the Hunter and Raven.

In 1983, the Army created the Light Helicopter Experimental (LHX) program to replace the OH-58 Kiowa scout helicopter and AH-1 Cobra attack chopper. By 1988, the teams of Bell-McDonnell Douglas and Boeing-Sikorsky had arrived at designs to meet the requirements. Boeing and Sikorsky won the contract to build the LHX, now known as the RAH-66 Comanche, and their design took flight on Jan.. 4, 1996.

The RAH-66 program had been subjected to cutbacks since its inception. The Army originally planned to buy 4,292 Comanches. By Sept. 2002, this number had fallen to 800, with UAV's being used to augment the Comanche's abilities. These cutbacks forced the aircraft's per-unit price to rise from \$12.1 million to \$58.9 million.

Negotiations underway to update old act

In an attempt to update a 1995 act, the Bush Administration is renegotiating open skies treaties with Canada and the European Union. The proposal before the Canadian government focuses on route sharing within the two nations; the proposal before the European Union deals with Atlantic routes, but focuses more on liberalizing foreign ownership of domestic

The Canadian government is anticipated to agree to the American proposition. Air Canada CEO, Robert Milton, is a key backer of the American proposal. Air Canada spokeswoman Laura Cooke told the press, "At every opportunity, Mr.. Milton has advocated further liberalization and greater integration of our aviation market." Economists point out that tourism and travel markets soared in both nations after the route deregulation of 1995. The Canadian transport minister is especially interested in the proposal, because it could "Position Canada as

a North-American gateway.' Questions of acceptance are pointed in the other direction for European negotiations. According to the European Union's transportation commission, the U.S. has not addressed many European interests, like ferry flights in the U.S. The proposal does include raising foreign ownership limits on American air carriers to 49 percent, from 25 percent. Michel Ayral, European Union Director of Transport, said that while he is still not satisfied with the proposal, that negotiations have made "significant progress." Lead U.S.. negotiator, John Byerly stressed that while the European Union is calling for "more than" the U.S. proposal, a full agreement will be worked out. Byerly also said the U.S. would like to reach an agreement by summer. Brussels will host the next round of talks March 29.

Stemming from several other shortfalls during the war, planners are busy incorporating their new weapons wish list into the 2006 fiscal budget request. In addition to the renewed interest in the F-35B STOVL (short take off and vertical landing) version of the Joint Strike Fighter and the FB-22, the USAF wants to upgrade all existing aircraft and also receive money to develop new combat search-andrescue copters.

The STOVL F-35B would open up air bases that were previously deemed unusable due to short runways and would also let the Air Force operate much closer to ground forces. Speaking of the tactical air sorties flown

by the British Harrier Aircraft, General Hagee, a U.S. Marine corps commandent, lauded the direction the Air Force planners were taking. He said "... They were able to go into forward arming and refuelling points-small spots of road in the desert; re-arm and refuel and go back up and provide close air support to those troops. That allows you to generate a lot more sorties. The JSF STOVL version will give us that capability, plus longer legs and stealth." JSFs will eventually take on the Air Force's close air support missions, although, in the interim some A-10s will be enhanced to continue the role. Other A-10s will be retired to free up funds to upgrade the remaining

The Raptor has ascended into aviation history after attaining the F/A-22's 5000th hour of safe, successful flight on Feb. 9, 2004. Maj. Jim Dutton, F/A-22 Combined Test Force pilot, reached the 5,000 hour mark while flying a developmental mission in the skies over

tremendous milestone for the program. It's a testimony to the extreme dedication and hard work of the maintenances, engineers and other CTF personnel who make these sorties happen."

Lockheed Martin, with the

support of Air Force Secretary James Roche, has quietly been designing a long range strike variant of the F/A-22, called the FB-22. It would have a 600-1600 nautical mile range, super cruise at altitudes approaching 60,000 feet and carry 30 or more small-diameter bombs. Plans for the FB-22 are still some way from finalization, Air Force officials said. A similar program is the X-44 MANTA; (multi-axis no tail aircraft) a modified delta-winged F/A-22 which uses vectored thrust as its sole means of control. The X-44 will prove a number of advanced concepts in our understanding of flight physics. It has no rudders, stabilators or ailerons. This will be a revolutionary new

Major Air Force contractor at fiscal restraint.

Edwards Air Force Base. "This is a Lockheed Martin plans to avoid any contingency upgrade plans drawn up by the Air Force, by keeping the F/A-22 testing on track. Software reliability is topping the 5-hour errorfree-run level required by the

Pentagon. The Air Force is also eying the possibility of upgrading its F-15Es with active electronically scanned array radars and radar enhancements for the F-15Cs to allow them to conduct ground-to-air missions. Secretary Roche also argued for the need to move forward with a long stalled plan to replace HH-60 combat search-and-rescue helicopters. The next budget drill would also serve as an opportunity to address the standoff jamming requirements of the EB-52 electronic attack bombers. This comes hand-inhand with the acquisition of the E-10A multi-sensor command and control aircraft and the KC-767 tanker program, both of which might face indefinite suspension due to efforts

DVD copying may soon be nixed out of existence. A Lower Northern District Court Judge of California recently declared DVD copying to be in violation of section 1201 of the Digital Millennium Copyright Act (DMCA). The lawsuit sites a company, 321 Studios, who manufactures the software DVDXCOPY, has been ordered to stop selling its software within seven days because it is in violation of the DMCA. However, the lawsuit is far from over however.

321 Studios' President Robert Moore has declared the company will appeal the ruling and seek to stay the injunction, stating its software applies under the principle of fair use.

Fair use is defined as "The right set forth in Section 107 of the United States Copyright Act, to use copyrighted materials for certain purposes, such as criticism, comment, news reporting, teaching, scholarship and research. Section 107 sets out four factors

to be considered in determining whether or not a particular use is fair: (1) the purpose and character of the use, including whether such use is of commercial nature or is for nonprofit educational purposes; (2) the nature of the copyrighted work; (3) the amount and substantiality of the portion used in relation to the copyrighted work as a whole; and (4) the effect of the use upon the potential market for or value of the copyrighted work. This definition was provided by Yale Law School.

321 Studios is defending its right to manufacture software that circumvents all of the security put in place on DVDs to prevent copying because Hollywood wants to prevent illegal sales of copies of the DVDs.

While this is good in fact that the studios are not being ripped off because of piracy, DVDs are fairly easily damaged.

Parents of kids that want to watch their Disney movies have to buy a new DVD every time that the kid decides to make a peanut butter and jelly sandwich out of the DVDs instead of making a copy for 69 cents and giving them the copy to

Although 321 Studios is seeking an injunction, they are fighting a losing battle to the very deep pockets of Hollywood.

HP adopts 64-bit AMD chip

In a highly anticipated move in the computing industry, Hewlett-Packard Co., the world's largest personal computer manufacturer, has decided to use AMD Opteron processors in their ProLiant series servers. Although HP will still be selling their Blade and ProLiant servers with the Intel Itanium chips, the 64-bit AMD Opteron processor is significantly cheaper and performs at the same level, if not better in some cases, as the very expensive Itanium

This move mirrors that of IBM and Sun Microsystems who were already using the AMD chips as of their releases last year. Other companies such as Dell Inc. are still a bit leery of selling the AMD based computers because their customers were not interested in them.

HP has always been a strong Intel supporter and plans to roll out the 64-bit ProLiant servers later this year when the chips become more widely

These 64-bit processors live up to their namesake, processing 64 bits of information at a time as opposed to the 32 bits of the x86 standard, Pentium 4s and Athlon XP's. The AMD Opteron, unlike that of the Intel Itanium, is both 64 bit and 32-bit compatible, so no special software is required should the user want to run a 32-bit application instead of moving to a completely 64-bit environment that Windows does not currently support but was promised around the end of this year.

Currently the AMD Opteron costs

around \$150 to \$1500 on the market. The Intel Itanium chips are not yet available to the general public, so getting your hands on one would require buying a server from Sun, HP or IBM. The Intel chips will probably become available once the 64-bit operating systems hit main-

stream in a year or so.



The Global System for Mobile Communication (GSM), trade association for mobile operators announced, that they, along with leading manufacturers Nokia, Sony Ericcson, Siemens, Motorola, NEC, Panasonic and Sagem, are taking drastic measures to cut down on mobile phone thefts occurring world-

Their plan to stop mobile phone theft from occurring is to hardwire codes into cellular phone handsets. These codes called International Mobile Equipment Identities (IMEI's) are going to be used in order to try and maintain stolen cell phones' codes.

The new plan is to post the

codes from stolen cellular phones in an international database to be blacklisted. From that point cellular phone service providers can use the blacklist to make sure they don't provide a connection in their networks.

Problems are still possible with the introduction of IMEI's in that some thieves can often reprogram the codes before the phone is resold.

To try and deter this from happening, the GSM is introducing new legislation to make IMEI programming illegal. GSM is aware that cellular crime

rates are on the rise across the world. With this new plan of IMEI's, they are hoping to have all cellular providers join in.

AGSM spokesperson said, "Taking it global would be a serious deterrent to organized crime.'





China unveils space plan

China has announced recently that it plans to follow up on its historic manned mission last year with a new week-long mission in 2005 involving two astronauts. China also said it plans to construct a space station in addition to landing a man on the moon.

The main architect of China's secretive manned space program and winner of China's annual State Science and Technology award, Wang Yongzhi, said recently that preparations for the launch of the two-person Shenzhou VI craft were proceeding smoothly.

The Shenzhou VI is the succes-

The Shenzhou VI is the successor of the now-famous Shenzhou V which carried solo astronaut Yang Liwei through fourteen orbits of the Earth over a 21-hour period last year. The name Shenzhou means "Divine Ship" in Chinese.

Previous reports by the China New Service indicated that China was aiming to launch three people into space aboard the next Shenzhou mission. "We will continue by launching Shenzhou VII, Shenzhou VIII and so on, carry out spacewalks, make space dockings and set up a space laboratory," Yongzhi said.

He also gave some details of the plan by saying that astronauts would stay aboard the orbiting laboratory for short periods, with spacecraft ferrying them back and forth. That space station would eventually be replaced by a much



larger space station capable of carrying out more extensive experi-

Currently China has 14 trained astronauts, including Yang Liwei. They have been placed into seven pairs to train for the upcoming

mission and eventually three of the seven pairs will be selected as finalists for the mission. China is currently preparing to select and train new astronauts since all fourteen Chinese astronauts are over the age of 30.

Cassini nears Saturn



Black hole devours star

Scientists have caught a rare glimpse of activity near the surface of a super-dense neutron star. A massive cosmic eruption of the star, named 4U 1820-30, took place 25,000 light-years from Earth and emitted more energy in three hours than the Sun does in 100 years. A neutron star is a highly dense star, packing the mass of our Sun into a sphere only 10 km in diameter. Its core is almost entirely neutrons, which can be packed closer together than atoms.

A neutron star uses its high gravitational force to take hydrogen and helium from a companion star. The atoms spiral toward the neutron star in what is called an "accretion disk."

According to David Ballantyne from the Canadian Institute for Theoretical Astrophysics at the University of Toronto, the disk appears around the neutron star much like the rings appear around Saturn, just thicker. He then added in a larger, balloon-like shape to represent the feeder star, and had the two cosmic objects orbiting each other.

The arriving elements collect on the surface of the neutron star, kept under pressure by a gravity pull roughly 300,000 times that of Earth's surface. Every few hours, the coating flares in a thermonuclear fusion reaction. While these regular burst last minutes at most, the carbon ash they create precipitate "superbursts" every year or two when it resettles on the surface, eventually piling almost 100 meters high. This superburst lasts for hours and is three thousand times as potent as a regular burst.

NASA's Rossi X-ray Timing Explorer happened to be monitoring 4U 1820-30 when the superburst took place. The explosion



illuminated the accretion disk from above and below as radiation shot outward, which also heated the mass in the disk, causing it to expand and push the inner layers of the disk outward. The observations showed changes in structure and movement of the disk down to about 20 kilometers above the star's surface – a very significant finding, considering the massive force of gravity at that close

"This is the first time we have been able to watch the inner regions of an accretion disk, in this case literally a few miles from the neutron star's surface, change its structure in realtime," Ballantyne said.

"Accretion disks are known to flow around many objects in the universe, from newly forming stars to the giant black holes in distant quasars. Details of how such a disk flows could only be inferred up to now."

Mars' wet past unclear

Scientists may not know exactly what it is they are seeing, but they are unanimous in their excitement over the microscopic photographs of Martian rock take by the rover Opportunity.

The robot geologist has been

examining the surface of a rock dubbed "El Capitan" and sending back images and analysis of its findings.

When speaking on the findings, mission official Rob Manning said,



"They are just very beautiful things and it's not at all clear that we understand what we're looking at."

The mission of the Opportunity and its twin, Spirit, is to determine

whether Mars was once a wetter place where life could have lived. Another debate that has been raised is whether layered rock found on the surface was formed volcanically, through sediment deposition, mineral growth, or because of wind.

However, the team of scientists isn't yet ready to comment on their findings, and it is uncertain as to when they will do so. "There is a lot of information in the pictures they have been looking at," said Manning




