

Winter Institute Speaker Program Presenters



Ben S. Bernanke took office on August 5, 2002, as a member of the Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System to fill an unexpired term ending January 31, 2004.


Dr. Bernanke received a B.A. in economics in 1975 from Harvard University (summa cum laude) and a Ph.D. in economics in 1979 from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology

Before becoming a member of the Board, Dr. Bernanke was the Howard Harrison and Gabrielle Snyder Beck Professor of Economics and Public Affairs and Chair of the Economics Department at Princeton University (1996-2002). Dr. Bernanke had served as a Professor of Economics and Public Affairs at Princeton since 1985.

Before arriving at Princeton, Dr. Bernanke had been an Associate Professor of Economics (1983-85) and an Assistant Professor of Economics (1979-83) at the Graduate School of Business at Stanford University. His teaching career also included serving as a Visiting Professor of Economics at New York University (1993) and at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (1989-90).

At the time of his appointment, Dr. Bernanke had already served the Federal Reserve System in several roles. He had been visiting scholar at the Federal Reserve Banks of Philadelphia (1987-89), Boston (1989-90), and New York (1990-91, 1994-96), and he had served on the Academic Advisory Panel at the Federal Reserve Bank of New York (1990-2002).

Dr. Bernanke has published many articles on a wide variety of economic issues, including monetary policy and macroeconomics, and he is the author of several scholarly books and two textbooks. He has held a Guggenheim Fellowship and a Sloan Fellowship, and he is a Fellow of the Econometric Society and of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences. Dr. Bernanke served as the Director of the Monetary Economics Program of the National Bureau of Economic Research (NBER) and as a member of the NBER's Business Cycle Dating Committee. In July 2001, he was appointed Editor of the American Economic Review. Dr. Bernanke's work with civic and professional groups includes having served two terms as a member of the Montgomery Township (N.J.) Board of Education.



Harold L. Hodgkinson is co-director of the Center for Demographic Policy at the Institute for Educational Leadership in Washington, DC, where he is currently conducting research on demographics and education.

Dr. Hodgkinson serves as Senior Advisor, American Council on Education; Trustee, Hartwick College; and member, Board of Overseers, Regents College, New York. He has previously held leadership positions with the American Council on Education, National Training Laboratories, American Management Associations, National Institute of Education, University of California at Berkeley, Bard College, and Simmons College.

Dr. Hodgkinson has directed eight major research projects for the Carnegie Commission, the U.S. Office of Education, the Exxon Foundation, the Ford Foundation, and the Atlantic Richfield Foundation.

He is the author of 12 books, three of which have won national awards, and over 200 articles, for which he was honored by the American Education Press Association. He also has been editor of several journals. including Harvard Review and Journal of Higher Education.

Dr. Hodgkinson is widely known as a lecturer and analyst of educational issues at all levels. His consulting assignments have included 600 colleges and universities, numerous public school systems, state agencies, state legislatures, cities, and corporations such as 3-M, Federal Express, IBM, General Motors, Atlantic Richfield, Burger King, Bank of America, and Texas Instruments.

Dr. Hodgkinson holds ten honorary degrees. In 1989, he was one of three Americans awarded the title of Distinguished Lecturer by the National Science Foundation.

Dr. Hodgkinson earned his undergraduate degree from the University of Minnesota, master's degree from Wesleyan, and his doctorate from Harvard University.
