

Winter Institute Speaker Program Presenters



Arthur J. Rolnick

Senior Vice President and Director of research at the Federal Reserve Bank of Minneapolis, an associate economist with the Federal Open Market Committee, and an adjunct professor of economics, MBA program, Lingnan College, Guangzhou, China and the University of Minnesota's Carlson School of Management.

As a top official of the Federal Reserve Bank, Rolnick regularly attends meetings of the Federal Open Market Committee — the Federal Reserve's principal body responsible for establishing national money and credit policies.

Rolnick's essays on such public policy issues as "Congress Should End the Economic War Among the States," "A Plan to Address the Too-Big-To-Fail Problem" and "The Economics of Early Childhood Development" have gained national attention. His research interests include banking and financial economics, monetary policy, monetary history, the economics of federalism, and the economics of education.

Rolnick has been a visiting professor of economics at Boston College, the University of Chicago, and the University of Minnesota. He is past president of the Minnesota Economic Association. He serves on several nonprofit boards including the Minnesota Council on Economic Education, the Center for Economic Progress and Ready 4 K, an advocacy organization for early childhood development. He is also on the Minneapolis StarTribune's Board of Economicts, and is a member of Minnesota's Council of Economic Advisors.

A native of Michigan, Rolnick has a bachelor's degree in mathematics and a master's degree in economics from Wayne State University, Detroit; and a doctorate in economics from the University of Minnesota.



W. Steven Barnett

Director, National Institute for Early Education Research

W. Steven Barnett is a Professor of Education Economics and Public Policy and Director of the National Institute for Early Education Research (NIEER) at Rutgers University. His work includes research on early education and child care policy, the educational opportunities and experiences of young children Inow-income urban areas, the long term effects of preschool programs on children's learning and development, and benefit-cost analysis of preschool programs and their long-term effects.

Dr. Barnett earned his Ph.D. in economics at the University of Michigan. Recent publications include Lives in the Balance, a benefit-cost analysis of preschool education based on a 25 year study, and, with co-editor Sarane Spence Boocock, Early Care and Education for Children in Poverty.

Barnett co-wrote "Preschool: The Most Important Grade," which presents the long-term benefits of early education, takes a look at state initiatives such as universal pre-kindergarten, and offers policy recommendations for the future of early education. He also has spoken on "Quality Early Childhood Education: It Costs, It Pays, It Counts," which explained the costs and benefits of high-quality preschool for disadvantaged and middle-class children and explored the existing and emerging strategies for financing early education.
