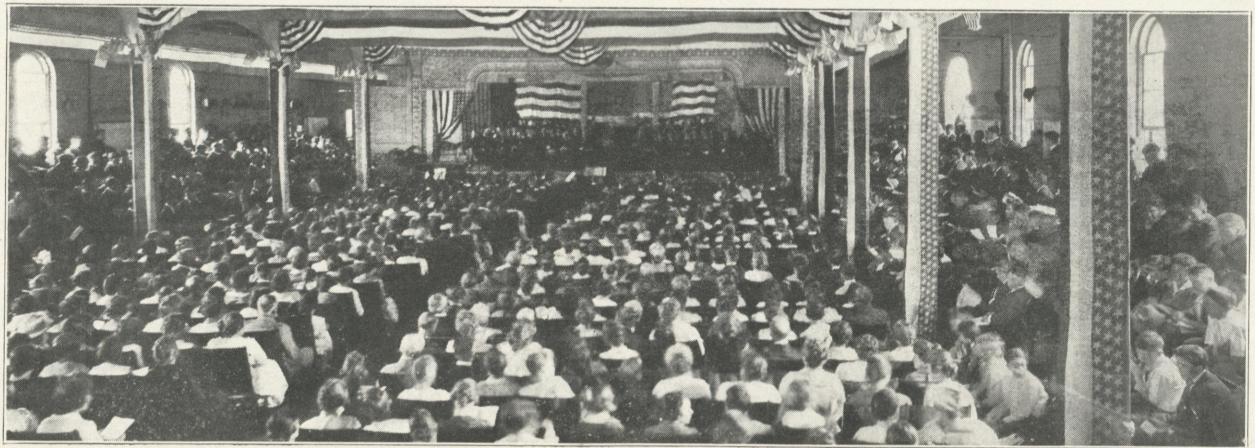



Let us turn our minds for a moment from these happy festivities and consider the only circumstance that clouds the joyousness

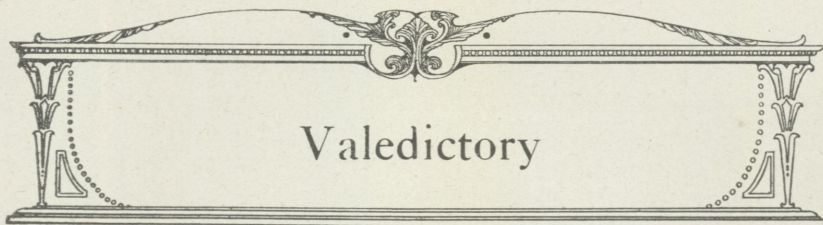

be made manfully, fearlessly, without regarding carping critics, or the harsh words of those who have made necessary that new start in life.

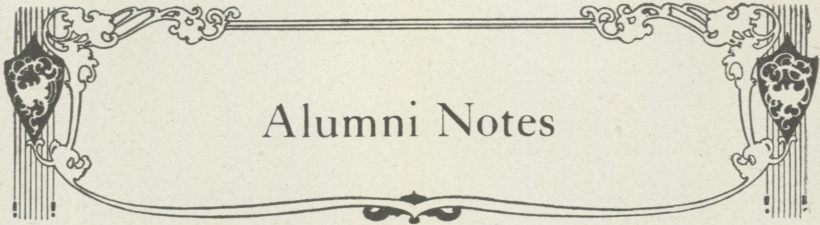

COMMENCEMENT DAY

Alumni Present A large number of alumni were present at the Commencement Exercises, and were seated on the historic stage which extended to the Junior club-room. Dayton and Out-of-Town alumni vied with each other to have the record for attendance.

Rev. John F. Hickey, who replaced Right Rev. Msgr. J. T. O'Connell, D. D., LL. D., of Toledo, Ohio, delivered a splendid address. Monsignor O'Connell was stricken ill in Boston, Mass., and was unable to travel. The entire program of the Commencement, whether addresses or musical selections, rang with patriotism, in harmony with the colors of "Old Glory" which were everywhere in the old historic gym.

ALUMNI BANQUET

Great Success The Alumni Banquet was held at St. Mary College, where an excellent menu was served in the College dining halls, which were patriotically decorated with the Stars and Stripes. Fully 135 alumni gathered around the festive board and celebrated the best banquet ever enjoyed. While credit must be

given to all the alumni who helped to make this year's the best ever, Clarence J. Hochwalt, '06, and Louis E. Moosbrugger, '00, deserve a special mention for the manner in which they took hold of things and fulfilled the responsibilities they gladly assumed.

Under the captions, "Patriotism, Keynote at Annual Banquet of St. Mary Alumni—Every Toast at Dinner Filled with Love for Country," the Dayton Journal carried this "story," written by the City Editor, who was present at the banquet:

One hundred per cent Americanism.

This was the keynote of the twenty-fifth annual banquet of the Alumni Association of St. Mary College last night.

Patriotism was sounded in every toast delivered at the end of the elaborate dinner. It reached its apex when Dr. James A. Averdick of Covington, Kentucky, the first president of the Association, described himself in ringing tones as "half Irish, half German, but all American."

Dr. Averdick, answering an invitation to attend the banquet, chose for himself the toast, "The Son of An Alien Veteran." Asserting the truest loyalty of those citizens of alien birth or ancestry, he told of the union of his father, a German from Hanover, and his mother, from Tipperary, and then recounted the famous incident of Barry, the seafighter, who, when asked on the high seas, "Who are you?" responded, "Half Irish, half American, but all Yankee."

Then he brought a storm of applause from the 125 alumni at the banquet by saying, "And like Barry, I am half Irish, half German, but all American."

Joseph J. Pater of Hamilton, previously had sounded the call of patriotism, depicting the glory of the flag and the necessity and propriety of intensest love for it. Al Ward, Dr. B. F. Kuhlman of the Soldiers' Home, John F. Maher and others followed up with pledges of devotion to the flag, the church and the country and again and again did speakers declare the one hundred per cent Americanism of St. Mary.

Only one thing occurred to mar the pleasure of the evening. M. Jean Sicard, a member of the Society of Mary and a sergeant major in the French army, who was to have been a guest of the evening, was unable to come from Camp Wheeler, Macon, Ga.

One of the pleasing incidents of the evening was the presentation of a purse to Father O'Reilly, President of the College, to be spent on a trip he will make to San Francisco in July, when he will attend the convention of Catholic Colleges.

Father O'Reilly, visibly affected by the gift, responded with an expression of thanks and described the fine growth of the College. The event marked the completion of his tenth year as head of St. Mary's.

Charles Whalen, of the class of '07, acted as toastmaster. Mr. Whalen announced his intention to let the others on the program do the talking and contented himself with but brief remarks.

Members of the classes which graduated yesterday were first to respond to toasts—Raymond Westbrook on "Business Graduates of '18"; D. Herbert

Abel on "High School Graduates of '18," and J. Dean McFarland on "College Graduates of '18."

After the response of young Abel, his father, Joseph Abel, of the class of '93, was called on. The presence of a father and son at the banquet was one of the unique features.

F. J. McCormick in a splendidly worded talk, spoke of the "Twenty-five Years of the S. M. C. Alumni Association." He told of the formation of the body and of its progress down to the present time.

Joseph J. Pater, '77, had as his subject "The Papacy as Peacemaker in the World." Mr. Pater said that the Catholic Church in its centuries and centuries of existence had averted more than a hundred wars and had caused but two, those being against tyranny and injustice.

He recounted the tribute of the present Pope to the American flag and brought tumultuous cheers when he declared that that flag is now in France in the cause of freedom and would never come back until the rights of free men had been established for all time.

Dr. Averdick, of the class of '70, followed with his speech, which rang with patriotism.

Among those who made impromptu talks were Captain J. Edward Grimes, who received a degree at the Commencement Exercises in the afternoon; Captain R. N. Brady, army inspector of ordnance, and H. F. Finke.

Last year no banquet was held, because the war, so far as the United States was concerned, was in its infancy, and it was felt that the occasion was not one for festivity. This year it was decided that the event should be resumed, in order that there might be an expression of the patriotism that permeates the Association and because it was felt that there should be some celebration of the action of many of the alumni and students who are now serving heir country.

The banquet hall was elaborately decorated with American flags.

During the evening William A. Keyes, of the class of '93, sang several selections and was loudly acclaimed. The College orchestra accompanied him and provided incidental music.

First Sergt. Al. J. Pohlmann We received the sad news of the death of one of our alumni, who attended St. Mary College in 1911, and who sacrificed his life for his country "Over There," on June 17. The following clipping tells the sad story:

"First Sergeant Aloysius J. Pohlmann, 20 years old, infantryman, son of Casper Pohlmann, 1717 Woodbarn Avenue, Covington, Kentucky, contracting painter, and brother-in-law of Attorney Benjamin Biedenbarn, Covington, was killed in action in France June 17, according to notification received yesterday from the War Department.

"Sergeant Pohlmann was enlisted two years ago and had been in France ten months. He was an all-round athlete, and formerly was a student at St. Mary College, Dayton, Ohio."

Rev. J. Lewis Ott, S. M. Rev. J. Lewis Ott, S. M., former professor of English at St. Mary College, and recent Master of Novices at the Mount St. John Novitiate in Greene County, received his appointment as First Lieutenant and Chaplain on June 29. Father Ott volunteered several months ago. His address is 160 Depot Brigade, Camp Custer, Battle Creek, Michigan.

That is what we made out of the invitation in Spanish, with the aid of an interpreter.

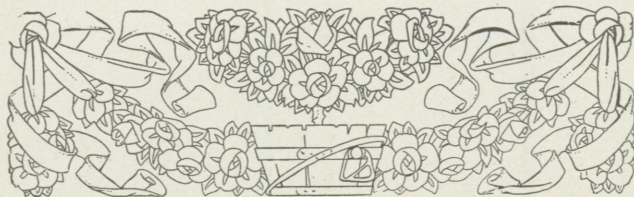

College Notes

Commencement Day The Dayton Evening Herald carried the following story of Commencement:

"St. Mary College celebrated its sixty-eighth annual Commencement Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Parents, alumni and friends of the seventy-five young men graduated arrived early from all parts of the country. Dinner was served to the out-of-town visitors at noon. The gathering showed a large representation of clergy of the Cincinnati Archdiocese, who dined in Alumni Hall with the speaker of the day, Rev. John F. Hickey, of Cincinnati, Ohio.

Before 2 o'clock large crowds filed up College Park Avenue, known to the alumni of St. Mary College of the old days as 'Brothers' Lane.' The College hall was taxed to its capacity long before the opening hour. The academic procession, led by the graduates of the college of arts and letters, pre-medical department and the college of engineering, in cap and gown, marched to the historic hall at 2 o'clock. The graduates of the high school and business departments and prominent guests closed the academic procession. The college orchestra rendered 'Victorious Legions' by Sereby, as the academic procession entered the hall. The entire student-body and audience then joined in the national anthem, 'The Star-Spangled Banner.'

"Maximilian Von Mach, of Detroit, Michigan, delivered the salutatory, evidencing a marked training in oratory.

"The President of the College, Rev. Bernard P. O'Reilly, S. M., introduced Rev. John F. Hickey, of Cincinnati, Ohio, after he had delivered a short address on the growth of St. Mary College the past year, and the plans the authorities of the College expect to carry out with the support of alumni and friends. Father O'Reilly paid a tribute to the donors of medals and cash prizes, whose gifts have stimulated studies in the different departments of the College.

"Father O'Reilly, in the course of his address to the large gathering, announced the winners of the high school scholarships, for which fifty-nine Dayton students of the parochial schools competed. He called the attention of the audience to the glad news, carried in the local press two months ago, that the college of engineering at St. Mary College has been given the highest recognition by the War Department of the United States accorded to the largest and best equipped technical schools of the country. Father O'Reilly called the attention of the audience to the fact that two of the graduate chairs on the stage, decorated with service flags, testify to the fact that two of the members of the college of engineering were called by Newton D. Baker, Secretary of War, to the Engineers' Officers' Training Camp, Camp Lee, Virginia. He mentioned the fact that in the elimination of officers at Camp Lee an examination in mathematics was held, in which John Crowley, of St. Mary College, led Camp Lee, with its men of Yale, Harvard and Cornell, with the perfect mark of 100 per cent, the only man to top 95 per cent in the camp.

“Rev. John F. Hickey, the speaker of the day, followed with his brilliant address, redolent of patriotism, education and religion.

“At the conclusion of the address of Rev. John F. Hickey, medals and diplomas, and the conferring of degrees, which were announced by the Vice President of St. Mary College, Rev. Joseph Tetzlaff, S. M., an alumnus of the class of 1905. The valedictory was delivered by J. Dean McFarland, of Marion, Ohio, who spoke forcibly, showing exceptional power of oratory.

“At the conclusion of the valedictory the College orchestra struck up the college song, ‘St. Mary College March,’ and the alumni and student body took up the air and they sang the words of the inspiring song with a volume that reverberated throughout the hall.

“With the singing of the college song, the Commencement of 1918 was brought to a close. It was a brilliant commencement. The hall was lavishly decorated with the Stars and Stripes; the musical program, under the direction of Brother Louis Vogt, S. M., was typically up to the minute—inspiring, creating an atmosphere that was intensely patriotic.”

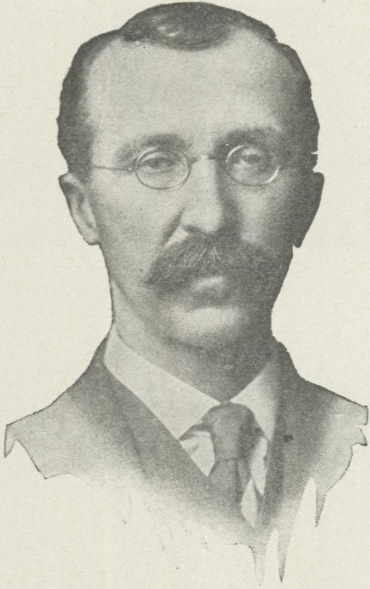

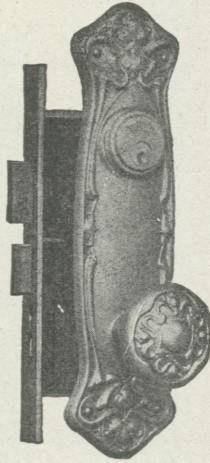

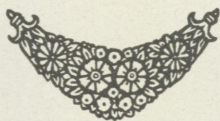
