to get Helfrich at second. Laubach fled out to right field and Helfrich scored. Dannehower was retired on three strikes.

In the fifth inning Mauser of Lafayette reached first on a hit. Hammer sacrificed him to second. Edwards made a hit, Mauser scoring. Scheeran struck out, and Helfrich fled out to first.

Ursinus opened the ninth inning by Mathieu making a three base hit and scoring on Mittingling's out at first. Boyer walked. Stugart hit a grounder to Laubach and both Stugart and Boyer went out on a double play—Dannehower to Meyers, thus ending the game.

## COMMENCEMENT NEXT WEEK

### Annual Commencement Program will Include Several Prominent Speakers

The arrangements for the forty-third annual commencement of the college have been completed. Instead of beginning on Sunday evening, as in former years, the exercises will begin, this year, on Saturday evening, with a public recital, in Bomberger Hall, by the students of the music department. On Sunday evening, at 8 o'clock, the Baccalaureate Sermon will be preached by the Rev. C. A. R. Janvier, D. D., of Philadelphia, president-elect of Ewing Christian College, Allahabad, India.

The Class Day Exercises will be held on Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock. In the evening, at 8 o'clock, the Junior Oratorical Contest and the awarding of the Hobson and Meminger medals will take place. On Tuesday, beginning at 10, a. m., there will be the annual meeting of the board of directors, in the president's rooms. At 1.30, p. m. the annual meeting of the Alumni Association will be held, and at 4 p. m. there will be the Alumni Banquet in the College dining hall. At 8. p. m. the Alumni Oration will be delivered, in Bomberger Memorial Hall, by Ralph Huston Spangler, A. M., M. D., '97, of Philadelphia. From 9 to 11 p. m. the President's Reception will be held in Schreiner Hall.

The exercises of Commencement Day will begin on Wednesday, at 10 a. m., with music by Diemer's Orchestra of Pottstown. At 10.30 a. m. the commencement exercises proper will be held and will include orations by two members of the graduating class, the conferring of degrees and the Commencement Oration by the Hon. John Wanamaker of Philadelphia. During the afternoon of Wednesday, there will be an open air concert on the campus, by the Pottstown band, and a baseball game, on the athletic field, between the Varsity and the Alumni.

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**EDITORIAL**

For the past ten years athletics has occupied a prominent place in our college activities. Prior to 1902, or 1903, our athletic teams were less successful than they have been since. Our teams have been steadily growing better until now we can look with pride on our athletic history.

Aside from football and baseball, however, little has been accomplished. This has been due, primarily, to a lack of facilities. We have had no suitable place for basketball, and our track has long been recognized as a makeshift which has been made to answer the requirements of the track men as best it could, in lieu of something better. But, notwithstanding these, at times, rather discouraging conditions, we have advanced. It is our boast that a call for football candidates brings out as many men as at many institutions twice our size, and the support of the student body is undeniable.

A large number of the students ably good.

feel, however, that they have not always been given the consideration due them in return for their loyalty. The fact that we do not have many things in the way of athletic equipment which wealthier institutions have, is the best reason why we should make the most of what we do have; and when the students are met with the refusal to use the athletic field for legitimate and reasonable purposes, the feeling that they have been unfairly treated is hard to keep down. Every student, when he registers in the fall, is required to pay an athletic fee which, among other privileges, entitles him to free admission to all the athletic contests

during the year. The fee, however, more than covers the actual admission price to the games, and the students feel that the other privileges should be more than nominal. When the new field cage was projected the students were asked to contribute, and the sacrifice which many of them made was, probably, greater than that caused by any other contribution. Besides this, when the field is to be placed in repair the students are asked to do it.

These things cause the students to feel that they are entitled to more than simply the privilege of witnessing the games played. When they are refused the use of the field for an inter-class field day, or an inter-class baseball or football game which, while it may not mean much to others, yet, means much to the classes directly concerned, they begin to wonder what they are receiving in return for their time and money and loyalty.

We believe that the students are asking nothing unreasonable when they ask the privilege of holding contests, even though of a minor nature, on the athletic field, and we believe that a little thoughtful consideration for the desires of others will foster a still better spirit than exists even now.

**Y. W. C. A.**

The Y. W. C. A. meeting on Tuesday evening was given over to the Senior girls, who had prepared an interesting program. Miss Hain led the meeting. Miss Schlichter offered prayer, and Miss Bartman read the Scripture lesson, which consisted of abstracts from the gospels, dealing with the subject of service. Misses Fisher and Moser sang a very pretty duet.

Miss Ellis then read an article on "Thoughts which the divine attitude suggests to us." It suggests, first of all, eternal love—love which will not let us rest when we do wrong. Next, it reminds us of the relation between tithes and blessings. We often pray for the promise, and forget the conditions necessary for its fulfillment. Finally, we really love God only when we obey Him; and obedience brings us a larger revelation of Him.

The meeting ended with a short farewell speech, by Miss Hain, in behalf of the Senior girls.

The Ursinus tennis team went to Lehigh on Wednesday, but on account of rain the matches were postponed until Friday, June 6.

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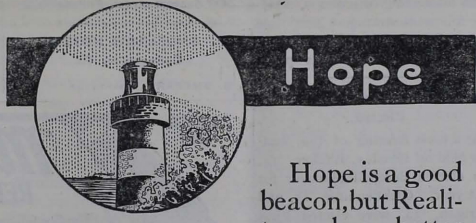
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**BASEBALL.**
