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# Dating Violence and Sexual Risk Prevention for Young Mothers

- Adolescent mothers are at elevated risk for dating violence (DV), rapid repeat pregnancy, and sexually transmitted infections (STIs), including HIV.
  - DV perpetration and victimization and sexual risk behavior (SRB) are common
- Birth rates for Latinx and Black teens are twice as high as those for white, non-Latinx adolescents
  - Education and income deficits, stigma and discrimination in healthcare disrupt young mothers' engagement in prevention
- Prevention needs to address the unique needs of minoritized young mothers living in low-income urban environments.
  - Little is known about how best to recruit and engage young mothers for prevention in healthcare settings.



## NIH Grant R15HD094195: Project Date SMART- Young Moms

- Date SMART (DS) is an evidence-based DV and sexual risk prevention intervention for teen girls (Rizzo et al., 2018).
  - Designed for underserved adolescent girls by members of our research team
  - Reduces DV and sexual risk
  - Particularly effective for adolescent girls with elevated depressive symptoms
- While some HIV/STI prevention interventions exist for young parents, only DS also targets DV as a primary outcome.
- DS uses cognitive behavioral therapy (CBT) skills to improve socioemotional functioning
  - Specifically designed to reduce depressive symptoms
- Adapt and test DS with young women (ages 15-19) who are already parents
  - Facilitate skill uptake in context of lived experience
  - Not all young mothers are currently in a relationship





### **NIH Grant: Specific Aims**

- Goal: to work with adolescent mothers (15-19) to adapt DS, then test the adapted Date Smart-Young Mothers (DS-YM) intervention in a pilot randomized controlled trial (RCT) with a waitlist control group.
- 3 specific aims:
  - 1. Recruitment and engagement
    - Provider and young mom interviews and focus groups
  - 2. DS intervention adaptation
    - Focus groups review content and format
    - Feasibility and acceptability
  - 3. DS-YM Pilot RCT
    - 32 participants
    - Outcomes: Dating violence and condom use
