### COURSE SYLLABUS UNITED STATES DEFENSE ESTABLISHMENT

1. Scope. MS 113 is a one credit hour course which introduces the student to the military as an instrument of national security policy and to the use of force in international politics. United States governmental structures with their associated functions are examined as to their roles in the national security decision-making process, with emphasis on how the Department of Defense functions with respect to current national security issues. The student is also introduced to some basic military skills and to some customs and traditions of the military services. Finally, some fundamentals of military leadership are examined.

### 2. Administrative Instructions.

- a. Students are expected to attend all scheduled classes including all leadership laboratory sessions. If you are unable to attend a particular class, notify your instructor prior to the meeting of that class.
- b. No uniforms will be issued to Basic Course students except for those participating in ROTC extracurricular activities such as the Wichita Ranger Program. In such cases, see your instructor to arrange for uniform issue. Otherwise, civilian clothing will be worn to all classes including leadership laboratories.
- 3. Texts. All texts used in this course will be provided by the Department of Military Science.

#### COURSE SYLLABUS

### INTRODUCTION TO LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT

### 1. Scope.

- a. Academic Work. MS 114 is a one credit hour course which introduces the student to leadership, the art and science of influencing human behavior toward the accomplishment of organizational goals. The student is further offered the managerial concepts and principles of planning, organizing, coordinating, directing and controlling resources such as people, time, materiel, and money in support of goal accomplishment. This course therefore contains the synthesis of the twin job responsibilities of the organizational head; the direct leader function, and the indirect manager function. One hour per week, for a total of 15 hours, is allocated to academic work.
- b. Leadership Laboratories. An additional 15 hours is allocated to the development of individual skills which supplement leadership instruction in the classroom. These additional hours are scheduled throughout the semester by arrangement and are a graded portion of the course. Further information is provided below.

### 2. Administrative Instructions.

- a. You are expected to attend all scheduled classes including the 15 hours of arranged leadership laboratories. If you are unable to attend a particular class, notify me prior to the meeting for that class.
- b. No uniforms are issued to MS 114 students unless you are a participant in an ROTC sponsored extracurricular activity (Wichita Rangers or Pershing Rifles). In such case, see me to arrange for uniform issue. Wear civilian clothing for class and all leadership laboratories.
- 3. <u>Texts</u>. All books used in this course will be provided by the Department of Military Science and must be returned at the end of the semester unless you terminate the course sooner.

### COURSE SYLLABUS The Summer Program

1. MS 200 is a four credit hour course designed to introduce the basic course cadet to military map reading, orienteering, customs of the service, leadership, tactics at the small unit level and marksmanship. There is a strong emphasis on physical fitness as well as an introduction to water safety. Successful completion of MS 200 is equivalent to completing the WSU ROTC basic course and makes the cadet eligible for advanced course standing.

### 2. Administrative Instructions.

- a. Cadets are expected to attend all classes unless <u>prior</u> permission to be absent is granted by the instructor.
  - b. Military uniforms will not be prescribed for wear during the course.
- c. Cadets are expected to prepare for class each day by studying the appropriate reading assignment in the attached course outline.
- 3. <u>Texts</u>. Books, manuals and departmental handouts will be issued at the beginning of each subcourse.
- 4. Evaluation. While the grade is important to all students it is especially significant to those planning to continue with the ROTC program. It is a consideration in selection for attendance at Airborne Training and Army Orientation Training as well as cadet promotion. Since the grade is widely used it is appropriate that it be based on a broad spectrum of military related as well as academic skills. Below are listed the general areas from which the grade will be derived. Percentage weight of each area is indicated.

#### THEORY AND DYNAMICS OF MILITARY TRAINING
