Knowledge Exchange Exploratory Visit November 13 - December 5, 2012: Visit Report

BACKGROUND

The Global Forum for Health Research, in 1999 recognised that there is 10/90 gap between the developing and developed countries in health research¹. In the fourth report of the Forum acknowledged that despite over three decades of efforts to build up capacity, during which thousands of scientists from developing countries have been trained, results have been very disappointing in many countries such as Pakistan, Bangladesh and Afghanistan². It has been identified that a large numbers of trained scientists are not working in their countries of origin and many countries cannot call upon the necessary human and financial resources to tackle the key health problems affecting their people. The Global Forum call upon a determined joint effort for research collaborations between developed and developing countries to work collaboratively for exchanging research results, ideas, knowledge and skills.

In Pakistan, research has remained a low priority area in all fields and often viewed as expenditure rather than an investment. During 1994 to 2000 approximately \$1.5m (£826,000) was available to the Pakistan Medical Research Council (PMRC), less than half of the amount was disbursed because of a lack of good research proposals³. Current status of health research in Pakistan is individual-based, fragmented, uncoordinated, of poor quality and largely irrelevant to the health policy and planning needs of the country⁴.

The Centre of Health and Social Care Research is a part of Faculty of Health and Wellbeing, Sheffield Hallam University (SHU) United Kingdom (UK). The centre undertakes high quality, strategic, applied research and related education in order to enable a step change in the way research is delivered and services are designed; and to foster knowledge transfer that will improve the quality and effectiveness of health care deign and delivery at national and international level. Hence, the development of international research collaboration between the Centre and different academic and non-academic institutions of Pakistan would be an excellent opportunity to improve research co-operation with knowledge exchange activities among partners. Initially, the collaboration will prepare joint research proposals and undertake research in priority areas but intended to extend the scope of its activities such as faculty exchange and collaborative programme development.

The British Council provided Knowledge Exploratory visit grant to develop strategic institution to institution partnership through introducing international research collaboration (IRC) between academic and non-academic institutions in the UK and Pakistan. The collaboration aimed at developing knowledge exchange mechanisms and facilitating transfer of research ideas, results and skills between partners by developing joint research proposals, strengthening institutional research capacity and systematic human resource development. Initially the collaboration will undertake research-cooperation with knowledge exchange activities, further scope of collaboration will be extended to other activities such as faculty exchange, curriculum and programme development.

Purpose of Visit

Sadiq Bhanbhro travelled to Pakistan, to explore and identify academic and non- academic partners working in the areas of health sciences in Pakistan; to develop opportunities for research collaboration.

Scope of Work

The scope of work for the visit included:

- Conduct meetings and site visits of potential partners
- Review the opportunities and challenges for health science research development
- Identify collaborative research ideas and skills transferring opportunities
- Strengthen partnerships and networking in health science research
- Produce a visit report
- Brief/Debrief the SHU, if requested
- Initial plan of future activities

ACTIVITIES

Sadiq Bhanbhro met and held discussions to address items on the scope of work with various academic and non-academic institutions staff members, including representatives of Aga Khan University (AKU), University of Sindh (US), Shah Abdul Latif University (SALU), Health and Nutrition Development Society (HANDS), The Sand Voices (TSV), Social Research and Development Organisation (SRDO), Collective for Social Science Research, Marvi Rural Development Organisation (MRDO), Aahung and Evolve. The schedule of meetings and site visits can be seen in Annex 1. Individual, group meetings and site visits were held, followed by three participatory half day workshops at Karachi, Hyderabad and Sukkur. The discussions and workshops were based on the notion of 'knowledge exchanges' given by Department of Business, Innovation and Skills (UK) and perspectives on current health related problems and gaps and what were their perceived research priority areas for possible collaboration.

Findings

The collaborators confirmed the profile of their respective organisations, their current research capacity. Majority of institutions showed interest to be part of the collaboration except MRDO, SAFWCO and Aahung. The key areas of possible research and knowledge exchange collaboration and support that were identified during the discussions and workshops are following:

1. Capacity Building

- Institutional research capacity building (doing and implementing research)
- Participatory Action Research Methodologies
- Qualitative & qualitative data collection and analysis
- Publication writing
- Methodologies for human resource development for health and well-being
- Methodologies to influence change
- Measuring the impact of change interventions

Opportunities & Challenges

In recent year Pakistan Higher Education Commission (HEC) has took some initiatives to promote research in Pakistan; such as research support scheme, which provides research; travel and publication grants to faculty members of HEC recognised institutions. NGOs do undertake baseline surveys, small research projects and they have baseline data sets. However, these data sets are under-utilised and the organisation lack capacity to analyse and use data systematically for policy making. The representatives of different institutions identified that lack of expertise in ethical review, health economics, epidemiology, anthropology, new methodologies and health policy and the shortage of staff with statistical, analytical, and managerial skills are major challenges. This severely limits the ability to formulate research

proposals or oversee complex research projects. These skills are also relevant to functions that need to be upgraded within the region's health systems—for example, disease surveillance, health and management information systems, quality assurance, or vital registration systems.
