Lives of Hindu and Buddhist Saints

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
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Course description: A study of lives of individuals related to Hinduism and Buddhism, who are alleged to be "saints" in stories, biographies and autobiographies. These life accounts are compared to archetypes found in canonical sources including the *Ramayana*, the *Bhagavata Purana*, and Buddhist *Jataka*. The class considers the genre of religious biography/hagiography in such terms as intended audience and practical usage of the texts. Students will examine stories about ancient and modern Hindus and Buddhists from India, China, Japan, Korea, Southeast Asia and America.

Course objectives: Students will learn to analyze the biographies of Ramakrishna, Buddha, Xuanzang, the 14th Dalai Lama, and Kūkai, in terms of the hermeneutic circle described by Heidegger and Gadamer, Foucault's author function, and Barthes' death of the author. In this context, they will come to recognize common repeating aspects of religious hagiographies and the audiences' role in interpreting them. Students will gain the ability to describe specific historical and cultural backgrounds that contributed to the formation of these and other hagiographical representations, including those in film and other media, and to explain how these life stories reinforce or conflict with religious doctrines of Hinduism and Buddhism, including karma, nirvana, *parinirvana, moksha*, and reincarnation.

Student Learning Outcomes:

On completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Identify major historical figures in the history of Hinduism and Buddhism
- 2. Speak with familiarity on issues concerning hagiography
- 3. Apply hermeneutic approaches to interpreting writings about religious figures
- 4. Express their thoughts concerning religious biography as a means of conveying Hindu and Buddhist ideas

Required Assignments and Grading

1. **Tests on the readings**. There will be four tests, one on each of the first four texts listed above. Each of these four tests is worth 20% of the final grade for the term. Each test will consist of ten short-answer questions primarily on the contents of the books and secondarily on theories of interpretation.

2. **Final Exam**. The final exam is on Tuesday, May 5 at 4:00 p.m. in our regular classroom. It is one the fifth required text listed above (*Kūkai, founder of Japanese Shingon Buddhism*). Exactly like the other four tests on the readings (item 1 above), it will consist of ten short-answer questions and is worth 20% of the grade for the term.
