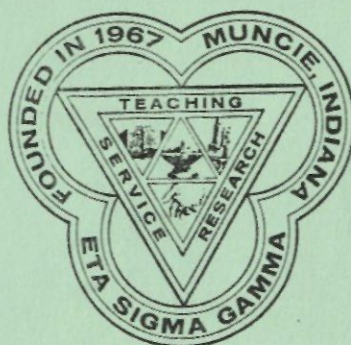

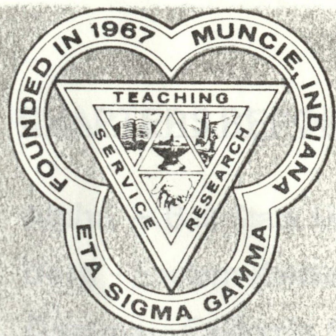

MAJOR EVENTS (ACTIVITIES) OF THE CHAPTERS

ALPHA

Project Direction - the chapter selected one module and made eleven presentations on campus.

Relationships of the 90's Week - served on a planning committee with the Division of Health Education, University Health Center, the Institute for Wellness, the Department of Counseling Psychology and Housing and Residence Life. Chapter members presented the "Safe Sex Playshop."

UniverCity - during the week long campus activities chapter members set up a booth on highway safety. Two members, dressed in costumes representing Vince and Larry, the crash test dummies, manned the booth.

Coupons for Condoms - working with the Student Association, members planned, organized and distributed coupons that were redeemable for condoms.

Kaleidoscope - our theme this year was "Party Safety". Project Direction was displayed and was a major theme in our non-alcoholic bar.

Student-Faculty Mixer - President Goto from Goto University in Japan was our guest speaker. He emphasized the similarities and differences among our two cultures regarding medicine and health practices.

Newsletter - written, typed and copied by the students at Long Beach State. We had several issues with personal and the latest news regarding health education. It was distributed to all students and faculty.

DELTA

AIDS food drive. Set up at local grocery markets, gave lists to patrons of items the AIDS pantry needed. Very successful.

Spring Fiesta - student organized 3-day event benefiting the I Love a Clean San Diego environmental group. Including selling frozen yogurt, partaking in a 5K run, sponsoring a casino night, and organizing different receptions.

Non-smoking petition drive for on-campus eating facilities. Went to president of school. Very effective. Results are pending.

ETA

Conducted a aerobichthon in conjunction with the Women's Wellness Center in Mt. Pleasant. This was a fundraiser which helped provide contributions to the Women's Wellness Center as a result of the pledges solicited by those who participated in the contest.

Participated in the Great Lakes SOPHE and Michigan School of Health Conferences, along with the Great Lakes Summer School Workplace Wellness Conference in the capacity of providing individuals to introduce speakers, as well as evaluate conferences.

Implemented project direction model titled "Sex and Substance Abuse: What are the Links?"

Conducted a survey to determine factors to determine the profile of employable health educators. This was a survey which was funded by the National Office to determine the characteristics of health educators which makes them employable.

Completed a survey and report to determine factors inhibiting the effectiveness of Eta Sigma Gamma chapters. This was a national research study of all Eta Sigma Gamma chapters to determine from chapter presidents and chapter sponsors factors that inhibit the effectiveness of the functioning of their chapter.

Conducted a national survey of Master's degree programs to determine acceptance requirements as well as graduation requirements. This research is still in process of being completed, however, approximately eight Gamman's, along with two faculty members, have collected data and compiled information regarding over 125 Master's degree programs in the United States.

Signals and Actions for Survival Program - from AHA Heart at Work program; do presentations all over campus in departments that requested information about what to do if fellow employee has a heart attack/stroke while working.

Distributed 500 bags of donated information/supplies of health related products for "Break for Safety" program before spring break.

"Health Fest" - a 3 day health fair sponsored by Eta Sigma Gamma consisting of a 5K race, health awareness screening, aerobic instructor demonstration, basketball and volleyball tournaments, speaker on memory improvement, date rape, and eating disorders.

Initiation of ESG's newest members on Jan. 29, 1991. Keynote speaker was Nancy Grembi, Assistant Director for Health Promotion at the Health Center. She talked a lot about the ESG Project Direction. Following the initiation, there was a dinner for both faculty and students.

Senior Send Off - a cook out honoring the graduating seniors of ESG. It was held in an officer's backyard. ESG donated the main food, pledges and members brought side dishes.

Raised money for the chapter by selling Gold C coupon books.

Reviewed the national Eta Sigma Gamma Drug Prevention Program and made contacts with various student organizations.
