EDITORIAL

This is the third volume of papers to be published from our 17th congress, held in Taipei in September 2002 (for a description of this congress, see the Editorials in Volumes 23 and 24). The supply of papers from this conference has now almost run out, so this will probably be the penultimate Taipei issue (the final one will be BIPPA 26). We are preparing ourselves for another flow of excellent papers from our 18th congress, to be held in Manila in 2006 (see below).

This issue contains two sessions on Palaeolithic archaeology in Siberia, and archaeology in Vietnam. Four other papers commence the volume, including one, by linguist Bob Blust, that was not contributed through the Taipei congress. It will be of considerable interest to Southeast Asian prehistorians.

Readers will note that this volume, as most previous ones, contains a large number of papers contributed by authors who live in developing countries in Asia (and sometimes the Pacific), and who often do not have English as a first language. The policy of this journal is to encourage the publication of such papers whenever possible, to allow these authors to express themselves to a wider audience than they would reach through local incountry journals. Unfortunately, the editorial demands required to maintain this policy can sometimes be considerable, and we often face communication and technological difficulties that keep perfection at bay. But this is a policy that I hope IPPA will maintain.
