Notable in this volume are a collection of papers from the Hanoi conference on the Dvaravati period in Thailand. Finally an especially shadowy period of mainland Southeast Asian prehistory has received some substantial scholarly attention. Thanks are due to Wes Clarke for organizing the conference session and assisting in bringing the papers to publication.

We have now published nearly all of the papers resulting from the Hanoi conference and welcome regular submissions for the next volume. We would like to direct prospective authors to our instructions for authors. While these instructions are rather detailed, above all we would like to encourage authors to keep their submissions uncomplicated and to use previously published BIPPA papers as a guide. We are keen to support prospective authors with resources and advice on academic writing, please do not hesitate to write to us to ask for these. To the many scholars that support BIPPA through their careful reviews of submitted papers, we offer our thanks. Many of our readers are likely to be asked to review submissions, and for those who may be unfamiliar with our peer review process, we can here summarize it in two sentences. First, we ask reviewers to say what is good about a piece of work. Second, we ask reviewers to tell the author how to improve it. We discourage freestanding criticisms because these are discouraging to authors and are typically difficult to turn into constructive recommendations.

IPPA 2014 IN CAMBODIA

Our next IPPA conference, the twentieth of the Association, will be held in Siam Reap, Cambodia. Local coordination and support will be provided by the Royal Academy of Cambodia and the Royal Government of Cambodia.
