Open pedagogy:

A set of pedagogical practices that include engaging students in content creation and making learning accessible to all

Principles of Open Pedagogy

- Open Pedagogy is shared with others
- Open Pedagogy depends on open licenses
- Open Pedagogy is active

Features of Open Pedagogy

- Learners are empowered to shape the world as they encounter it
- Students are knowledge creators, not just consumers
- Assignments are renewable rather than disposable



Against disposable assignments

"These are assignments that students complain about doing and faculty complain about grading. They're assignments that add no value to the worldafter a student spends three hours creating it, a teacher spends 30 minutes grading it, and then the student throws it away. Not only do these assignments add no value to the world, they actually suck value out of the world."

- Materials in the public domain
- Free materials protected by copyright
- Free to student library/subscription resources
- > Affordable paid print materials OR copied non-OER materials
- > Pay-for-access print and online materials





Wiki and Teaching

- <u>Recommended practices</u> for designing and implementing Wiki assignments
- Existing Manual of Style and other guidelines
- Address gaps in representation
 - Fewer than 10% of Wikipedia editors identify as women, and less than 1% as trans.
 - Only 17% of all biographical articles on Wikipedia focus on women.
 - "Notability" criteria exacerbate gaps in gender and racial representation

University of Queensland, Brisbane, Australia – Research Methods (Ongoing)

"This semester-long project provides third-year Arts students with an opportunity to undertake research into the lives and histories of Australian subjects. Using traditional documentary research methods, the students build a knowledge base to underpin a high quality Wikipedia article on people and organisations whose archives are held in the collecting library of the University of Queensland.

I choose the subjects of research and the students work in groups with me to develop the content for the article. After some weeks of research the students begin working in a sandbox to build the article. It is transferred to the mainspace two or three weeks out from the end of semester and the Wikimedia Australia members comment on their work. Learning how to work within wiki software and understanding the place of Wikipedia in contemporary knowledge sharing are essential aspects of this project."

"There are over <u>1000 psychology-related stubs</u> in WP:PSYCH. Even new psychology students will be capable of improving these articles to a collegiate level. Introduction to Psychology is an introductory overview of the field of psychology. It is an examination of behavioral, cognitive, psychoanalytic, humanistic and biological viewpoints in psychology. The course includes learning principles and applications, motivation, emotions, stress, psychobiology, personality, abnormal behaviors and approaches to therapy. Sample Projects

Murder, Madness, and Mayhem

The University of British Columbia's class SPAN312 ("Murder, Madness, and Mayhem: Latin American Literature in Translation") contributed to Wikipedia during Spring 2008. Our collective goals were to bring a selection of articles on Latin American literature to featured article status (or as near as possible). By project's end, we had contributed three featured articles and eight good articles. None of these articles was a good article at the outset; two did not even exist.

Caveats

- Edits/additions may be reverted/deleted for a variety of reasons
- Many existing guidelines for editors exist that students should know about
- Potential signup/tech issues: build in time for students to create accounts in advance
