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# Targeting the Needs of Aging LGBTQ+: Addressing Barriers to Healthcare Access

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Research question: What barriers, if any, do LGBTQ+ elders/aging face when accessing healthcare services?

# Background

- The U.S. aging population will be 94.7 million in 2060.
- Approximately **50 million** people will identify as **LGBTQ+ by 2030**. 2
- ♣ LGBTQ+ are more likely to live alone and need equitable access to healthcare.3

# Objectives

- Understand LGBTQ+ experiences, barriers and perceptions of accessing residential care in Maine.
- Learn how the disparities in healthcare systems affect LGBTQ+ that are seeking and receiving services aimed at improving quality of life.

## Methods

- Partnering agencies distributed the survey link and shared on social media.
- Respondents were LGBTQ+, 18 years of age or older, residential care employees, friends and loved ones of LGBTQ+.




Figure 1. Factors of Importance




Figure 2. Perceptions of care




Figure 3. Experiences accessing care

# **Findings**

- Respect, quality care and welcoming environment are the top-rated considerations for the aging process. (Figure 1)
- 75% of respondents perceive a risk of discrimination if open about sexual orientation/gender identity. (Figure 2)
- ❖ 66.67% of LGBTQ+ have experienced verbal or physical harassment by residents and staff. (Figure 3)

## Discussion

- Addressing the barriers, perceptions and experiences of aging LGBTQ+ in Maine *is* essential to provide quality care.
- This information **is vital** to nursing care facilities in Maine, as there has been no prior research conducted.
- Affirming care **requires** a cultural understanding of LGBTQ+ needs.

## Limitations

- \* 100% of respondents identified as white.
- ❖ Small sample size of N=15
- ❖ COVID-19 staff shortages impacted sample size.
