<u>Professor Betsy Ginsberg Speaks to Daily News Regarding Prisoner Who Was Denied</u> <u>Compassionate Release and Comments on Testing Protocols</u>

<u>Professors Betsy Ginsberg</u> and <u>Alex Reinert</u> represented Hassan Chunn as part of a class action petition against the Federal Bureau of Prisons. Chunn was released April 8 but was initially denied compassionate release several weeks earlier. Professor Ginsberg told the *Daily News*, "It is hard to fathom why he [the warden] took that position, given that Mr. Chunn was two weeks from release and in poor health. In a follow - up article, a judge ruled that the Federal Bureau of Prisons must provide protocols for when they test inmates held in Brooklyn's federal jail for coronavirus.
