A report in the <u>Grand River Eagle</u> that a committee was organized in Grand Rapids to help the "worthy and enterprising pastor, the Rev. A. C. Van Raalte," and his people in their settlement. Some members of the committee were appointed to visit Holland. E. B. Bostwick was chairman and A. D. Rathbone, secretary.

The report is reprinted in a modern publication [not identified] under the title, "G. R. Welcomes Netherlanders to Michigan."

# G.R. Welcomes Netherlanders to Michigan

DITORS NOTE: When Rev. Albertus Van aalte and his flock of Netherlanders rrived in West Michigan, the event did ot go unnoticed in Grand Rapids. As he following account indicates, local eaders quickly organized a delegation o visit the newcomers and welcome them.

At a meeting of the citizens of Grand apids held at Irving Hall, on the vening of the 19th inst., E.B. Bostwick as chosen chairman, and A.D. Rathbone acretary.

The object of the meeting was then tated by the Rev. Mr. Penny; and on his ption, D.D. Van Allen, T.H. Lyon and me mover, were appointed by the Chair a pamittee to present resolutions, who abmitted the following:

- 1. That the inhabitants of Grand apids have regarded with deep interest and satisfaction the arrival of a colony com Holland, on the unsettled lands in their vicinity, as affording the pledge a highly respectable and industrious apulation, and they hereby tender them hearty welcome to the blessings of our ee and happy country.
- 2. That we consider it both our duty dour interest to extend to these rangers every expression of aid and mpathy in the present crisis of their duous enterprize.
- 3. That as a first and essential ap we will take immediate measures to an a road through the intervening rest, whereby our mutual intercourse / be facilitated.
- 4. That E.B. Bostwick and Mr. Penny a committee to communicate these colutions to our new neighbors, cough their worthy and enterprising tor, the Rev. A.C. VanRaalte, and to cure from his people such aid in the k as they can afford.

Which were unanimously adopted.

The meeting was then addressed by . Mr. Penny, T.B. Church, D.D. Van en, Jas. Scribner, K.S. Pettibone, . Withey, Esqrs, and the Chairman, in eat and handsome manner.

A committee of five-Judge Lyon, Dr. ny, D.D. Van Allen,-Graham and Chase erly-was appointed to visit New

Holland, and report to an adjourned meeting.

It was voted that the proceedings be published in the village papers.

Also, it was voted unanimously, and by acclamation, that this meeting adjourn to meet at the same place, July 28th, at 8 o'clock, P.M., at which time every man in town is requested to be present.
