However, a copy of the original was given to the archives of Hope College by Hillie Kooy-Oggel of the Netherlands who had given Dr. George Harinck, a staff member of the Historisch Documentatiecentrum voor het Nederlands Protestantisme (1800-heden), a copy of the original letter in September, 1996. Elton Bruins acknowledged receipt of this gift in his letter to Harinck, 13 September 1996.

³ There is no information available concerning this property exchange. It does indicate, however, that Van Raalte had begun to distribute his property to his children.
