The writer says that "believing thus Mr. Littlejohn bill for appropriation of Land for the benefit of the Holland Colony will receive that attention at the hands of the Legislature which we in this part of the state think it merits and thus a commissioner will be appointed to cary [sic] out the design of the law. I would respectfully solicit the appointment to that office if it can be done consistiently [sic] with your feelings and with a view to the public good, ..."
