During the past year and a half as Chair I have had a front row seat to view the ways that our students are preparing to enter the classroom ready to make a positive difference. I am constantly inspired by our Messiah preservice teachers. Last month, I had the chance to co-present with junior education majors, Kelsey Sharpe and Erin Haines. We were invited to Carlisle High School's Preschool lab to share how best to meet the needs of multilingual preschoolers. During their parts in the presentation, I sat back and was inspired by their wisdom and insights into how best to teach English Learners. They were able to make clear connections to important theory as well as best practice. They spoke to the rights that students should have to speak their first language and advocated for a more equitable learning experience. Simply put, I was so proud of them!

I hear similar reflections from my colleagues in the department. We are routinely impressed by our students. We see our students growing and stretching into the kinds of teacher professionals that we need in our classrooms. It is an honor to be a part of this process.

In just this past month, two of our alumni were recognized at a state level. Dr. Kamela Patton was honored as Florida's Superintendent of the year. In her tenure as superintendent at Collier County Public Schools, she has worked to increase achievement and graduation rates of the students in her district. Another outstanding alumni, Elizabeth Raff, a sixth grade teacher in the Penn Manor School District, was just named Pennsylvania's teacher of the year. She was recently quoted in the Lancaster Times, "Kids know when you're in it or when you're not. #### Terry L. Stoudnour Endowed Education Award








She was named Florida's 2022 Superintendent of the Year! Patton received this honor from the Florida School Boards Association and the Florida Association of District School Superintendents.

#### LET MY WALLS DOWN

"Through my experiences, I have learned to find how powerful worshipping through song is in connecting directly to the love, power, and grace of God. 



#### **ADVICE FOR FUTURE TEACHERS**

My name is Brianne (Loop) Torres. I graduated from Messiah in 2015 with a dual certification. I live and teach in inner-city Erie. I have been teaching first grade for the past five years. If asked, I have two pieces of advice for new teachers. The first is to breathe. Your first year can feel overwhelming. You will have e-mails, meetings, assessments, observations and much more. It may feel like the workload never stops. Even as a graduated educator you will constantly be changing, adapting, and learning new things. You do not need to have every task and paper graded by the end of each day. Set a time each day that you will stop what you are doing and come back to it tomorrow. It can wait. You cannot. Breathe and know that you are doing the work that you were called to do.

Secondly, be real. The students learn quickly who is genuine. Form relationships, make mistakes, be yourself, and laugh with your class. Once they know that you care for them, you will be amazed at how hard they will work and what your class will be able to accomplish. They need to know that there is an adult in the world that is fighting for them. It makes all the difference. In the words of Rita Pierson, "Every child deserves a champion: an adult who will never give up on them, who understands the power of connection and insists they become the best they can possibly be."
