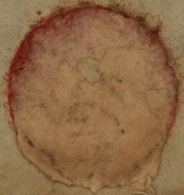

Tranquillity on the March 11 1794

My dear Cousin

Your last letter I received just as I was leaving Philadelphia. The former came to hand a few days before, it arrived during my absence and afterwards travelled here and again to town before I received it. I made enquiry at the bank respecting the bond and received for answer that it had not been usual to deliver up any bonds which had been given as security for good conduct, and as all the demands are satisfied you can receive no injury from its continuing in their possession; though if you are desirous to obtain it, I think it probable it may be procured through Mr. M. Smith of South Carolina one of the securities, he is at present one of the Directors of the Bank and his influence there will give weight to the application in case you apply to him.

I enclose a bank note for 100 dollars with which please to credit me on the bond. I hope Peter is well, tell him I long to see him, and that I am certain he improves fast in all useful accomplishments, and that he continues to afford comfort and pleasure to his dear Mother. I know him too well to suppose it otherwise. Mr. R. with Mary & Cath. join in love to him and you with my dear Mother
