FROM THE PROVOST AND ACADEMIC DEAN'S DESK:



Dear Colleagues,

Like many of you, "how" questions dominate my day. Our problem solving ranges in scale from the specific, "How can I support a teammate with a need?" to the general, "How are we going to transform our school?" At each level, individual through institution, the answers to how we operate are critical to those impacted and our success. Yet, despite this importance, I spend so much time on the "how" that sometimes I fear I forget the "why." Over the last 10 days, the why has come into sharp focus through two experiences.

First, I was deeply moved from talking at length with three of our current Ukrainian students, joined by President Rondeau and the Deputy of the International Graduate Programs Office (IGPO). To say that these officers are impressive is an understatement. In the face of daily threats to family, colleagues, and country, they remain steadfast, optimistic, clear-sighted, professional, and proud. It is no wonder that Ukraine's forces have blunted the seemingly overwhelming attack. While painfully eager to return home and engage in their national fight, they understand that their NPS education will make them more effective warriors for their country, and they remain committed to their studies. Their grace is awe-inspiring and provides a clear answer as to why do we do what we do.





Second, a few days before, while meeting with Pacific Fleet, I had the opportunity for the first time to visit the USS Arizona/Pearl Harbor National Memorial. Recognizing and memorializing the attack and losses of December 7, 1941, the USS Arizona Memorial tells a story that is simultaneously solemn, tragic, heroic, and historical. It drives home the importance of readiness, assessment, and sacrifice.

Each drop of oil that bubbles to the surface and each name that is read on the wall crystalizes the sacrifices of our sailors and Marines. We must both remember them and do our utmost to defend our nation from current and future threats. This is why we and NPS are here.

Our days are noisy, busy with the thundering drumbeat of answering and executing the how. This past week, these experiences drove me to find solace in a moment of calm, reconnecting with the why. I encourage you all to focus and reflect on your answers as to why you, our school, and our students are here. If you feel comfortable, share your answers with teammates, and perhaps with me on Friday mornings at Starbucks.
