#### Abstract

This 90-minute PDS is organized and presented by SIG Social Inclusion with the goal of providing practical and meaningful guidance to scholars (at various stages of their careers) interested in pursuing and successfully publishing Social Inclusion research. Our goal is to dispel the perception many hold that Social Inclusion research is difficult to publish in top IS journals. The PDS will facilitate dialogue between scholars and journal editors to surface success factors and key requirements/attributes to publishing in high-quality IS journals. The PDS outcome will be a summary of best practices and characteristics of effective interactions with top journals.

Throughout the session, the PDS facilitators will conduct activities with the audience that will empower audience members to ask questions and leave with actionable steps they can use to enhance their social inclusion research. The session will conclude with Q&A with all panelists.

### Speakers' background, description of symposium and envisioned activities during the session.

Hala Annabi is an associate professor and chair of the MS Information Management at the University of Washington. She is the Director of ACCESS-IT, a research group focused on advancing equity and inclusion in the IT workforce for women and autistic people. She is an experienced scholar in equity and social inclusion and the use of critical theories and methods. Dr. Annabi is also an experienced administrator who has founded programs to prepare and empower women and autistic students as they enter the IT workforce.

Sam Zaza is an assistant professor of Information Systems at Middle Tennessee State University. She has studied social inclusion for caregivers of children with autism and social inclusion, diversity, and equity impact on IT professionals' behavior in the workplace and their intention to leave the profession.

Amy J. Connolly is an assistant professor of Computer Information Systems at James Madison University. She has studied the social inclusion practices in the classroom for the past seven years. Her research includes issues related to gender bias, emotional intelligence, and project management.

The three facilitators will bring together a group of journal editors and prolific IS scholars in two panels to discuss critical strategies for framing and publishing Social Inclusion research in high quality IS journals. Together they will facilitate the PDS workshop and encourage audience discussion.
