Introduction

Compassion is a crucial component to providing safe and quality care. The effects of the prolonged exposure to high-stress environments during COVID-19 on compassion fatigue remains understudied.

Research questions

- a) What research has been undertaken on compassion fatigue among healthcare providers over the course of COVID-19?
- b) How did compassion fatigue among healthcare providers impact patient care?


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Methods

- 1. Identifying the research question
- 2. Identifying relevant studies
- 3. Study selection
- 4. Charting the data
- 5. Collating, summarizing, and reporting results A PRISMA flow chart was created to illustrate the process of study selection (Fig. 1)

Inclusion Criteria

All healthcare professionals, all ages, English language, all settings, publication year 2020 and beyond.

Exclusion Criteria

Systematic and scoping reviews, no access to full-text, only focus on burnout or secondary traumatic stress
