#### **Course Description**

Anthropology is a discipline that studies what it means to be human across time and space. From our biological origins and evolution, to the material record of our past and the languages and cultures of contemporary people, anthropologists attempt to understand as much as they can about the human experience. This course provides a broad perspective on the study of anthropology and covers key topics in biological and cultural anthropology, linguistics, and archaeology.

- Students will acquire an understanding of the history, subject matter, and methods of study in anthropology.
- Students will increase their knowledge of the history of human biological and cultural evolution.

**Weekly assignments** are writing assignments or short projects that ask you to synthesize and expand on the weekly course materials. These assignments may include additional readings, will be provided by Wednesday of each week and are due on Sundays by midnight.

Weekly quizzes cover the course materials assigned during the week. Quizzes open on Fridays and are due Sundays at midnight and will be completed on Moodle.

**The final exam** is cumulative and covers all the assigned course materials. Students are encouraged to use weekly assignments and graded quizzes to study for the final exam. In addition, a study guide will be provided one week prior to the final.
