Algerians Arrive In Iran Carrying U.S. Response

The Algerian intermediaries in the hostage crisis arrived in Tehran today carrying the U.S. reply to Iran's demands for \$24 billion. A leading Iranian clergyman said Iran should stop bargaining over the 52 Americans and put them on trial like any other criminals because they are spies, not hostages.

The three intermediaries were met at Tehran Airport by representatives of Prime Minister Mohammad Ali Rajai. They refused to talk to reporters and were driven away for a first round of

talks with Iranian officials directly concerned with the hostages seized 14 months ago

Informed Washington sources said the U.S. reply offers to deposit about \$12 billion of Iranian assets in an escrow account in a neutral country, presumably Algeria, and that Iran could claim the funds once the hostages are released.

President Carter said the American response contained "reasonable proposals" and said, "I think it would be to the advantage of the Iranians - certainly to the advantage of the United

States and the hostages - if they would accept what we have proposed."

However, Carter has little more than two weeks left in his administration to settle the issue, and most observers saw little chance of the crisis being resolved before President-elect Ronald Reagan takes office Jan. 20.

The Washington Post reported today that the U.S. response gives Iran until Jan. 16 to accept the proposals. The Post said official sources decribed the date "not as an ultimatum but 'simply a fact of life'." The sources said Iranian s acceptance by Jan. 16 would give the Carter administration time to implement the proposals before going out of

office. The Post said Carter does not want to leave negotiations "in an ambiguous state that limits the options of his successo

The Iranian Parliament decided two months ago the hostages would be freed if the U.S. government returned the wealth of the late Shah Mohammad Reza Pahlavi, released \$8 billion in Iraman assets frozen in U.S. banks, cancelled pending lawsuits against Iran and pledged not to interfere in Iran's affairs

10 TVA Information Staffers To Lose Jobs

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. (AP) - Ten members of the Tennessee Valley Authority's information staff are losing their positions in job and program cutbacks that will trim \$500,000 from agency's annual budget, a TVA official says.

"We need to have a staff to do whatever is necessary, but we don't need any more (people) than that," Craven Crowell, TVA's director of information said Thursday in announcing the cuts

Crowell said his 137-member staff actually will be cut by 40 percent. However, all but 10 of the employees work in TVA technical library, which is being transferred to another department in the 50,000-employee federal utility, not eliminated, he said.

"When we are asking ratepayers to bite the bullet with rate increases, it's important that TVA save money where we can and elminate people and programs that have marginal cost effectiveness," he said.

The cutbacks will be effective Feb. 1. Crowell-said.

Programs that will be discontinued include a newsletter sent to private citizens and consumer groups, a quarterly employee magazine, an internal video information program for employees, the videotaping of TVA board meetings and an audio-visual training program for employees.

which individuals will lose their jobs. 'As director of information, it was my job to eliminate the programs I felt were no longer necessary," he said. "The personnel department gives guidance as to what individuals are impacted by the program changes." TVA employees are not covered by

Civil Service, but are represented by internal unions, Crowell said. "If there are openings somewhere

else in TVA and they qualify, they'll be transferred," he said. "But there is no guarantee."

The information office receives \$5.1 million of TVA's total operating and construction budget of about \$5 billion for 1980

Most of the information office employees work in Knoxville, although branches of the technical library are also located in Chattanooga and Muscle Shoals, Ala. The library, for which \$1.7 million was budgeted in 1980, will be transferred to the division of property and services.

Crowell said \$40,000 each year would be saved by cutting the Action Office newsletter, which was started about four months ago for consumer groups and people calling TVA's toll-free action number.

Eliminating the employee magazine, "Perspective," would save \$100,000 annually and the internal video information program called Monitor would add \$95,000 in savings, he said.

Service Postpones Nine-Digit ZIP To June 1

WASHINGTON (AP) - Despite a large increase in Social Security taxes to be paid this year by workers and their employers, the Social Security system is still facing money problems and there are reports that cuts are being considered in benefits.

Most of the money problems are longrange and experts say that major deficits won't occur, if they do at all, until early in the next century, when members of the post-World War II 'baby boom'' begin retiring.

taxes went up from 6.13 percent to 6.65 percent and the maximum amount on which the taxes are raised jumped to \$29,700.

The increases were ordered by Congress three years ago to cover shortterm money problems of the system.

The 46-year-old system's money pro blems can be solved either by increas ing revenues or cutting benefits and Congress has been reluctant to tackle the problem through the latter method because of the political unpopularity of cutting benefits.

Benefits are paid from three Social Security funds: old age and survivors, disability and the the insurance fund. Local Cable News **On Front Page Of Journal**

Readers of the Friday, Jan. 2, edition of The Wall Street Journal were treated to a front-page story about the opera-tion of Murray-Cable News, a subsidiary of The Murray Ledger & Times.

The article, datelined, Murray, Ky., was written by Dan Machalaba, a staff reporter for the journal, who spent two days in Murray during December getting details about the leased-cable channel operation and interviewing townspeople about the cable-news ser-

"It's a radical departure for the 101year-old Ledger & Times," the article says, "but similar moves are being made by nearly 100 of the nation's 1,756 daily newspapers."

The article examines the Murray operation as well as more advanced systems being experimented with by major newspapers chains such as Knight-Ridder and Dow Jones & Co., publishers of The Wall Street Journal.

As one Journal reader said this morning in a call to the Ledger's newsroom, "That sure is some more good publicity for Murray, Kentucky."

"We are extremely gertified that a publication such as The Wall Street Journal has recognized the importance of our pioneering efforts in electronic newspapering," Walter L. Apperson, publisher of The Murray Ledger & Times, said.

Men Celebrating **19th Birthdays Must Register For Draft**

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Selective Service System says men who will celebrate their 19th birthdays in 1981 are required by law to register for the draft next week.

The requirement falls upon all those born in 1962. They may register in any Post Office.

The Selective Service System sug gested that, to avoid lines, men born during the first three months of 1962 register on Monday, those born the next three months to register on Tuesday, and so on.

After this registration, the procedure will be changed so that each man as he reaches 18 will be required to register within 30 days of his birthday, either before or after that date

Next week's registration is the second to be conducted since Congress enacted a law last year resuming draft registration as a standby measure

It would take another act of Congress to resume the draft and President-elect Ronald Reagan, in his campaign for the White House, said he was opposed to peacetime registration and a peacetime draft.

After pancreatitis

DEAR DR. LAMB - I read your column about the man who had pancreatitis. I am 63

who had pancreatitis I am 63 years old and I, too, had such an attack five years ago — severe abdominal pain, high amylase count, a jaundiced condition and dark urine

After I got out of the hospi-tal my wife and I developed a diet which has done wonders for me and enabled me to live ormal life. The key points of the diet are: (a) Fat-free or fat-negligible foods, (b) high-carbohydrate and high-protein foods, (c) papaya enzyme tab-lets with meals and (d) no alcohol of any kind.

Because fat provides a large nutritional component in a small package and is omitted in my diet. I have increased my food volume to maintain my weight. By analysing the food packages, we have developed a varied, tasty diet. The only real requirement is will power - will power not to submit to the temptation of eating some fatty food or drinking alcohol. With pancreatitis there is no room for mistakes. DEAR READER - Thank

you for sharing your experi-ences with others and there is a great deal of merit in your comments. Your program sounds solid and I am glad it





WASHINGTON_(AP) - Hodding Carter III may well have written the epitaph for President Carter's foreign policy when he said the bureaucratic fight between Zbigniew Brzezinski and the State Department produced a 'Tower of Babel" that had many voices purporting to speak for the U.S. govern-

Hodding Carter, chief spokesman for State when Cyrus R. Vance was secretary, calls the national security adviser a "rat terrier" and writes in the February issue of Playboy that the president should have told him to "shut up.

It is the latest and perhaps the loudest shot yet fired in the bureaucratic war that has been going on between the State Department and the National Security Council, now headed by Brzezinski, since the NSC was elevated from obscurity in the Nixon administration by Henry A. Kissinger

The council, formed after World War II, is the White House organization responsible for gathering and channeling intelligence and foreign policy information to the president.

The fight between the NSC and State reached its peak last spring when Vance quit as secretary in the wake of the failed attempt to free the 52 American hostages in Iran.

Brzezinski recommended the military mission be mounted and Vance opposed it. Carter chose Brzezinski's

view, and the soft-spoken Vance sub mitted his letter of resignation after discovering that the raid had been approved at a meeting to which he had not been invited.

President-elect Ronald Reagan and his top advisers, dismayed by the furor surrounding Brzezinski, say the situa tion will be different in the new administration. The national security adviser's status will be downgraded, they say, with the secretary of state's office given primacy in advising, and perhaps more important, speaking for the president in foreign affairs.

In a recent interview with the New York Times, Vance said, "It is of fundamental importance that there be only two spokesmen for the government on matters relating to foreign policy: the president of the United States and secretary of state." Though he did not refer to Brzezinski by name, Vance clearly had him in mind when he said, "any other arrangement leads to confusion.

Vance's successor, Edmund S. Muskie, has also refused to criticize Brzezinski by name.

United Nations Ambassador Donald F. McHenry, on the other hand, referred directly to Brzezinski when he said recently, "A person who has the job of coordinator, which I would perceive (the NSC director's) position to be, would do well to coordinate and leave the public role of foreign policy to the secretary of state and to the president. Brzezinski himself has publicly said little about the bureaucratic battles

NEW-YORK (AP) - During an interview in the mid-1960s, J. Peter Grace commented that the great U.S. exportable was management knowhow. At the time, Americans still were considered the sharpest business people.



U.S. Religious Forces Join For Resistance

NEW YORK (AP) - American

religious forces - eoncerned about recent judicial and legislative rulings on charities, tax and other church matters - are teaming up to resist what they consider a threat of government intervention in religious affairs.

The perceived threat to religious freedom is "one of the most critical issues" facing present-day religious life, says the Rev. Harold Bennett of Nashville, Tenn., executive secretary of the Southern Baptist Convention.

He said a joint approach to the matter is needed because "in recent months there have been a number of cases where the government has in fact intervened into the religious affairs (of several denominations.

Religious groups are so concerned about the issue, they have scheduled a national conference called "Government as Big Brother. to Religious Bodies" for Feb. 11-13 in Bethesda, Md.

The goal of the conference is to review recent trends of government intrusion, explore its implications and develop resources and suggested tactics for confronting the problem.

Among the topics to be discussed will be regulation of charitable solicitations, Internal Revenue Service rulings that some church operations are not integral to religion, unemployment taxes

on church agencies, regulations on religion-related schools, jurisdiction of the National Labor Relations Board, grand jury interrogation of church and synagogue workers, equal employment laws applied to religious bodies and intelligence agency use of clergy as informants.

"Such incursions by government have increased notably during the past 10 years," says William P. Thompson, an attorney and chief executive of the United Presbyterian Church who is to chair the conference. "But recently the pace has quickened, and the variety of issues has multiplied

"It is occurring at every level of government through action of each branch - legislative, executive and judicial. More often it involves the government's presuming to define what is or is not religion or religious activity.'

Considering the intense concern about the matter, the strategies developed at the meeting will be of major significance, says Bishop Thomas C. Kelly, general secretary of the U.S. Catholic Conference.

The approximately 450 Protestant, Roman Catholic, Eastern Orthodox and Jewish participants expected to attend will represent about 50 religious bodies, mainline and evangelical, with memberships totalling more than 121 million.

On Washington's birthday, Mrs. Maureen Jones was fatally injured when her car collided with a car driven by Herman Boyd Jones on Highway 94 west, February 22. She was buried in the City Cemetery.

Eager proponents of elementary consolidattion of county schools won their objective when the State Department of Education announced three elementary schools would be constructed with no addition to local taxes: bonding ability of the school board had been increased, state increased its available funds, and revenues from the 3 per cent utilities tax which could be bonded for building purposes, according to an opinion from the attorney general's office. Schools were to be Southwest Elementary, North Elementary, and East Elementary. Inasmuch as Calloway had twice rejected, or was it three times, a bonding school endebtedness for construction of new elementary schools, stateschool authorities propelled the concept of effecting the project without the benefit of local referendum through a legislative act of 3 per cent on utilities, plus a greater state allocation which has its origin in the state property tax, and lastly the opinion of the attorney general. Same difference, only the smart boys in Frankfort are craftier than the democratic processes of a referendum. There's no way you can beat them when they have the financial resources at their disposal for our people long ago surrendered local controls to federal and state governments.

On March 28, Forsyth Industries purchased a five-acre tract of land from the Chamber of Commerce for the construction of a plant in northeast Murray for the purpose of manufacturing metal stampings used in light fixtures and the fabrication of tubing used in the air conditioning industry, employing an estimated 50 workers. 

that passed in Tennessee in 1978. Tennessee was the first state to require passenger restraint of any kind, but now many states are looking into restraint bills of some kind, he said.

Opposition to the bill came from groups resenting government intervention and groups of the poor resenting the cost, Sanders said.

The Tennessee program covers the problem of cost by setting up lending programs for the poor. Maffet said most systems would not cost more than a tank of gasoline. Sanders stressed that he



It's time to take stock of yourself and your possessions. Employers will distribute W-2 forms this month. Income tax packets will arrive in the And millions Americans will start poking through drawers and closets for the information they need to claim a refund or figure out how much they owe.

A little organization can make life a lot easier. The first step is to throw things out. You're probably keeping more papers than you need.

The only canceled checks you really need to keep for any length of time, for example, are those related to expenses that are deductible on your income tax return. Review your canceled check file every three months and get rid of the onessentials.

Eastman Kodak To **Increase Prices On** Film, Cameras

ROCHESTER, N.Y. (AP) -Eastman Kodak Co., citing what it termed "increased costs of doing business," said today it will increase prices on several products an average of 8 percent in the next two months.

The price of most traditional roll films - color and black and white - will rise about 7.5 percent, effective Jan. 24, the company said. The price of instant film will jump 9 percent and the price of instant cameras will climb 10 percent. Processing of still and movie film will cost about 6 percent

more. The price of most traditional cameras will increase about 10 percent on Feb. 26 and slide projectors will rise 8 percent.

Weekly or monthly paycheck stubs should be kept long enough to be checked against your W-2 forms. If there is no discrepancy, throw them out.

Prepare a personal inventory. You can buy special forms for assets and liabilities or you can simply get a looseleaf notebook and design your own system.

Include personal information like your name, date and place of birth, military service record, Social Security number and legal address. Make a list of the location of important documents - birth certificate, marriage license, divorce papers, passport, health and life insurance

policies, stock certificates, etc. The names and addresses of family members should be written down in the inventory as should credit card and bank account numbers. Record your assets - home, automobile, insurance policies, savings and checking

balances, investments, jewelry, antiques, etc. our liabilities or outstanding debts.



Racers Return Home Saturday

The question of which team Murray State will present for the Ohio Valley. Conference race, which opens next Thursday night at Eastern Kentucky, may be partially answered when the Racers return home against Southeastern Louisiana Saturday night at 7:30 p.m.

Southeastern Louisiana brings to Murray a team with a 4-5 record, including a 60-58 win over Tennessee State and an 87-72 victory over Georgia Southern in its last game in the Choo Choo Classic

The losses include a 91-62 setback against Northeastern Louisiana, where the Racers won their last game in overtime, 67-59, before going into their three-game tailspin.

Northeastern Louisiana has gone in the opposite direction since that game, winning its last four games.

The Racers' recent slump has MSU coach Ron Greene worried about the upcoming conference games, and he admits that they all the preparation they can get before the OVC season begins.

"These games come at an appropriate time for us," Greene said. as the OVC competition will be.

'We need a lot of work. Southeastern Louisiana and Towson State (Monday night) will both give us a chance to look at various lineups

"Our lineups are not really set right now. I wish they were. I wish we could get some more consistency out of a couple of people.

'We knew early that without Michael Bates (the 6-10 center who was injured in the English Fiat game) it would be a scratch and claw year and that we would have to have a tenacious defense. 'To this point, we have not done either

'We have not sacrificed defensively in any way, shape or form. We will have to in order to be a championship team.

Viewers today don't seem to pay much attention to "The Wonderful World of Disney," soon to leave the air, but in the early days it was THE pioneering television series.


There's a lot more to the Disney series than Mickey Mouse, Donald Duck and cute animals.

When Walt Disney brought "Disneyland," as the show was first called, to ABC in October 1954 it was the first time a major movie studio had anything to do with the upstart television. Disney, of course, did it because ABC was the only company willing to put up money to back that crazy idea he had for a theme park.

"Disney changed the face of television in many ways," wrote Tim Brooks and Earle Marsh in "The Complete Directory to Prime Time Network TV Shows." It was Disney who broke the barrier and to the 'lavish movie-style series so familiar today."

"Disneyland" was ABC's first hit series, and back in 1954 it presented the first mini-series, "Davy Crockett." It moved to NBC in 1961.

To say that Davy Crockett, which starred Fess Parker and Buddy Ebsen, was a smash hit would be "The understatement. Ballad of Davy Crockett' became a hit song, and coonskin caps became as commonplace on young people as long hair did a decade later.





really need it? With many viewers still woozy from New Year's Eve celebrating, what we really need Thursday is some peace and quiet. Instead. the networks will be offering four games, four loud halftime shows and more pregame parades and hoopla than any day of the

year ABC, CBS and NBC will televise the Sugar, Cotton, Rose and Orange bowls. There again will be a 1 p.m. logjam with the Sugar and Cotton bowls vying for TV viewers.

For the fourth time in five years, the Sugar Bowl can boast the top-ranked team when the day's football action begins. No.1 Georgia plays Notre Dame for, perhaps, the national title. But if Georgia loses, the championship could be decided Thursday night in the Orange Bowl between No.2 Florida State and fourth-ranked Oklahoma.

When ABC sought to move the Sugar Bowl to Thursday night, it tried to lock up the New Orleansbased game for five years at night. That deal, sources say, now is on hold. The Sugar Bowl currently is the cheapest New Year's Day game at \$2 million.


Considering the low ratings CBS expects for No.6 Baylor against ninthranked Alabama, the Cotton Bowl is highly inflated at \$3.5 million. CBS is taking a loss, which would be fine if the game was for the national championship. But this one doesn't mean much and it will be hurt badly by Notre DameGeorgia.

The Cotton Bowl can't go earlier because CBS does the Rose Bowl Parade until 2 (so does NBC), and the parade beat the games in the ratings last New Year's, It gets cold this time of the year in Dallas and a later start also would collide with the Ruse Bowl anyway.

Alabama has lost two games this season and won't win an unprecedented third straight national title. Baylor is 10-1, but doesn't have a big following outside of Texas. When CBS raised the Cotton Bowl ante to counter NBC's attempts to steal the game, it certainly wasn't thinking of Alabama-Raylor.

This year's Rose Bowl cost NBC \$3.3 million, which made the Pasadena patrons feel cheated.


