News In Brief

Farmers wanting to bid cropland into program have until Aug. 5

Farmers who want to enter their highly erodible cropland into the USDA's 10-year Conservation Reserve Program may do so during the seventh sign-up period for this program July 18 through August 5.

Farmers may volunteer highly erodible cropland for entry into the CRP for a 10-year period and devote this land to conservation uses. Producers who enroll land in the program are eligible for cost-share payments of up to 50 percent of the eligible costs to establish a permanent vegetative cover, according to David E. Riley, Jr., CED of the Calloway County ASCS Office.

The annual rental payments are for 10 years, and the total amount of rental payments for any fiscal year may not exceed \$50,000 or its equivalent if in-kind payments are made.

Land that is designated may not be grazed or harvested for hay or seed after the contract is approved.

Producers may come by the Calloway County ASCS Office located in the Bel Air Shopping Center for further information. The office hours are from 7:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday.

WASHINGTON — Just hours before the State Department-imposed deadline for his departure, Nicaraguan Ambassador Carlos Tunnermann held a news conference to say whether he will comply. MOSCOW — A journalist says Azerbaijani authorities have cut off food supplies to a mostly Armenian enclave at the center of ethnic unrest, but Tass blames a strike for the shortages.

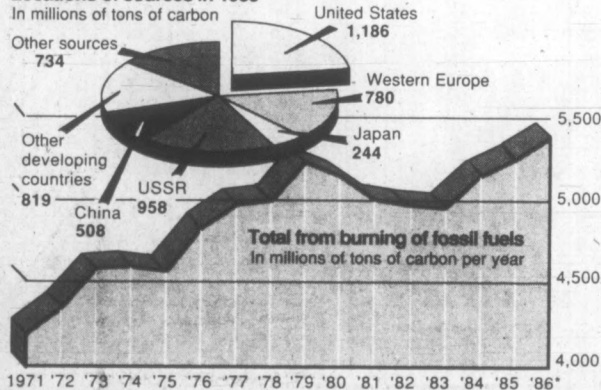
WASHINGTON — William J. McCarthy, the Teamsters' top man in New England for two decades, upset the late Jackie Presser's hand-picked choice to succeed him as president of the nation's largest union.

CHICAGO — Despite an estimated 60,000 deaths in the workplace each year, the federal government is failing to aggressively prosecute companies that violate safety laws and endanger workers, a study concludes.

KANSAS CITY, Mo. — Law officers from 11 cities on Friday concluded a two-day meeting aimed at plotting a national strategy to combat Los Angeles drug gangs, which are spreading drugs and violence to dozens of cities.

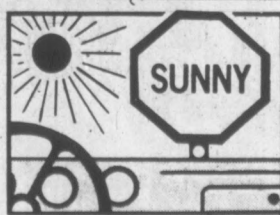

More hay on the way for Kentucky farmers

The arrival of more hay, and prospects of greater shipments in the weeks ahead, provided a glimmer in the gloom for Kentucky farmers trying desperately to hang on until the drought ends.

For everyone else, however, the National Weather Service promised several more days of "oppressive heat," which was blamed for a fifth Kentucky death.

Agriculture Commissioner

Ward "Butch" Burnette returned Friday morning from Oregon, saying he had prospects for perhaps 10,000 tons of hay.

That would feed 50,000 head of cattle for a week, according to state Department of Agriculture averages. Because pasturelands have been baked dry, farmers across Kentucky and several other states have been forced to feed herds the hay that ordinarily would have been saved for winter.

One railroad, CSX Transportation Corp., offered to bring the hay free of charge from Chicago, if the Union Pacific or Burlington Northern lines could get it that far.

Meanwhile, 30 tons of Oregon hay arrived by jet in Louisville, courtesy of United Parcel Service, which has a major hub in the city. The shipment was earmarked for Glasgow, to be sold by lottery from noon to 4 p.m. CDT Monday at Western Tobacco Warehouse.

In Boyd County, prices for a lottery on 20 tons next Friday were set at \$120 to \$160 per ton, depending on grade.

"You can tell by the price that no one is making money on the hay," said Kenneth Franks, the county's agricultural extension agent.

"That's about what you can buy it for any time of the year. The hay

Kentuckians: Jackson calls for changes in registration

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — Democratic presidential hopeful Jesse Jackson called on Kentuckians to join him Friday in a new civil rights challenge — the removal of barriers on registration.

The remedy is legislation providing for universal, on-site, same day voter registration, Jackson told a rally that filled the Lampton Baptist Church and overflowed into the streets.

"People should be able to register as they vote, to insure that no barrier will stand in the way of those who choose to participate."

Jackson, who stopped here en route to Atlanta by caravan for the Democratic National Convention, said that Kentucky is a "part of the New South, a South-moving

Sen. McConnell set to campaign vigorously for Bush's election

WASHINGTON (AP) — U.S. Sen. Mitch McConnell's role as a national co-chairman for Vice President George Bush means he will be campaigning vigorously for the apparent Republican presidential nominee in the coming months.

The Kentucky Republican's commitment has always been political. As he has worked with Bush, it has become more of a personal thing as well.

A recent weekend visit to the Bush estate in Kennebunkport, Maine, illustrated that. McConnell said he was the only non-family member there.

The visit was more social than political. But McConnell still respected the pecking order. He said he "let" Bush catch the most fish.

Last week, McConnell was back with Bush for a strategy session at the vice president's Washington residence. Thirty people attended, including Bush's former rivals Sen. Robert J. Dole of Kansas, Rep. Jack Kemp of New York, Pat

Survey: attitudes growing negative toward drugs

NEW YORK (AP) — Americans have become more antagonistic toward illegal drug use over the past year, according to a study released by a volunteer group trying to de-glamorize drug abuse with a public service advertising campaign.

The Media-Advertising Partnership for a Drug-Free America said this week that the nation's media outlets donated more than \$150 million in free space and time for the barrage of ads it made

available in the first year of the anti-drug campaign. The campaign was launched in March 1987.

The amount of donated space fell short of the \$500 million that the group had targeted for each year of the three-year campaign. But campaign organizers said they were pleased with the results and hope media outlets will find more space and time for the ads this year.

The television ads broke into the top 10 with consumers surveyed by

the independent Video Storyboard Tests Inc. last year, the first time a public service campaign appeared in that list in the 10 years it has been compiled.

One of the more popular ads that the Media-Advertising Partnership created is a television commercial that shows a man breaking an egg, scrambling it and frying it, saying that is what happens to your brain when you take drugs.

In addition to making 32 television ads, 25 radio commercials

and 80 print ads, the group had a benchmark survey of attitudes toward illegal drug use done in February-March 1987 and followed that up in the same period this year to see if those attitudes had changed.

The research firm Gordon S. Black Corp. of Rochester, N.Y., said more than 4,650 people across the country completed questionnaires for each survey.

Scott Winkler has been selected as the most recent "Out of the Ordinary" employee at Murray-Calloway County Hospital.

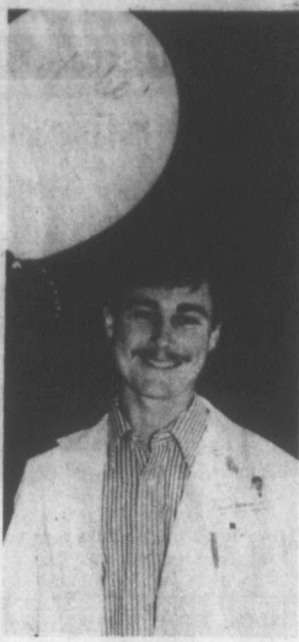
A licensed physical therapist, Scott has worked in physical therapy at the hospital for nine months and says, "I feel honored to be selected out of so many equally deserving co-workers."

Robertson and former Delaware Gov. Pete du Pont IV.

The topic: how Bush surrogates, including McConnell, would focus on what they see as weaknesses in the record of Michael Dukakis, the apparent Democratic nominee.

McConnell does not like to call that "negative campaigning." He prefers to call it "truth-telling" and explains that "it's not going to be exclusively negative."

Bush recently signaled that such tactics were coming when he told voters and reporters that Dukakis, as governor of Massachusetts, let murderers out on a prison furlough program and raised taxes. Dukakis was temporarily forced on the defensive and quickly explained his record.

When McConnell speaks about Bush, he stresses strengths. And when McConnell talks to Bush, he stresses being strong, said U.S. Rep. Lynn Martin, R-Ill. Martin has also attended Bush strategy sessions, including the one last week.

will be selling for \$200 a ton later on," Franks said.

The drought-related shortage of feed, grass and water kept livestock sales up and prices down as farmers dumped herds they could no longer feed.

"Last week and today, we've doubled the number we usually sell," said Dorris Bryant, an owner of the Tennessee-Kentucky Livestock Inc. at Guthrie in Todd County.

On Thursday, 1,050 head of cattle went through the auction barn. "Normally, we'd have 500 to 600 head every Thursday," Bryant said.

In other drought developments: —Authorities in Owensboro said James E. Payne, 62, collapsed and died of heart failure due to heat exhaustion after working in his yard on Thursday. It was the second heat-related death in Owensboro and fifth in Kentucky.

The National Weather Service forecast "oppressive heat over Kentucky for the next several days" and issued tips for coping with the heat.

The tips included minimizing outdoor physical activity and avoiding sunburn, which impairs the body's ability to cool itself. The service also advised people without home air conditioning to spend more time in cool public places, such as malls and libraries.

—The state Department for Social Insurance in Frankfort said it was permissible for 172,000 Kentucky families receiving food stamps to purchase bottled water with them.

Federal officials OK'd the food stamp use after the department received an inquiry, said department Commissioner Mike Robinson.

"We weren't certain of the status of bottled and distilled water, quite simply because the question had never been raised before," Robinson said.

Clarification

In an article in Friday's edition about the city council approving the hazardous-duty retirement plan for police and firemen, city attorney Don Overbey was quoted as saying property taxes could double if a special tax was imposed to pay for the unfunded liability of hazardous-duty. The article should have said the property tax rate would double, according to city clerk Jo Crass.

Crass said city residents can expect a 10-cents-per-\$100 property tax increase and probably a new earnings tax to help pay for switching to the hazardous-duty plan.

The council, however, has not yet decided to levy a special property tax nor an earnings tax.

Those voting against the hazardous-duty plan were John Ed Scott, Danny O. Hudspeth, Steve Trevathan and Ruby Hale. Chuck Foster was absent.

from racial battleground to economic common ground and on to moral higher ground."

He said the nation needs a strong economy to aid areas like Hazard in eastern Kentucky, where "good people who want to work have no job and no hope."

Jackson touched briefly on the controversy between himself and apparent Democratic presidential nominee Michael Dukakis, stating that "my personal relationship with (Massachusetts) Governor Dukakis is not at issue. ... It is not about Governor Dukakis' recommendation of (U.S.) Senator (Lloyd) Bentsen (of Texas)" as his running mate.

Jackson said he seeks no apology from Dukakis. "There is no animosity, no hostility, but we don't have the understanding that we need."

Jackson said the real issue is whether the Democratic Party will make room for his progressive wing which "seeks its proper role at the table. We must be engaged if we are to win in the fall."

Before his speech, Jackson conferred with a number of state Democratic leaders, including party chairman Jerry Lundergran and Mayor Jerry Abramson of Louisville.

Abramson said he told Jackson that "we are concerned about this split and we don't want anyone to bolt. I hope that we will be able to pull the party together."

Lundergran, in a brief speech, said that Jackson had conducted a campaign "that has been fair, fair to all people. He had run a campaign that has involved Democrats across the nation."

He also reminded the crowd that not since Robert Kennedy "has a candidate for president gone to eastern Kentucky or to Appalachia. I am confident that Governor Dukakis will make use of this man's talent and vision."

Lundergran promised that in "my meetings with other state chairmen in Atlanta, I will work hard, very hard with Reverend Jackson in not creating a ruckus or disorderly convention but one that will promote his ideas."

Interrupted frequently by standing ovations, Jackson, who has not given up hope, said that his name will be placed in nomination as a presidential candidate on July 20.

"When I make it, we will have no more impossible dreams. If I win, you win."

He said that his nomination will be a "tribute to the thousands who have worked to make it possible; the millions who have worked to express their support."

Jackson said his organization had put several million new names on voter registration rolls and "these people want to be included and not excluded at the table when the party's policies are defined."

Wholesale prices go up in June

WASHINGTON (AP) — Wholesale prices rose a moderate 0.4 percent in June, the government said Friday, but analysts saw cause for worry in the steep, drought-induced climb in raw food prices.

The Labor Department said the hot, dry weather searing much of the nation sent prices of unprocessed grain and poultry soaring by more than 20 percent last month, pushing raw food prices 4.2 percent higher than in May. It was the biggest jump since October 1985.

The latest study said the change in attitude was most pronounced among college students, which had been among the first groups in the 1960s to increase consumption of illegal drugs but is now showing a greater fear of the consequences of drug abuse.

"Even more impressive is the first evidence of a decline in occasional cocaine use," the study said.

Occasional cocaine use among college students has dropped to 6 percent from 11 percent a year earlier, it said, while occasional usage by friends had dropped to 31 percent from 36 percent.

The survey said teenagers displayed the fewest changes in attitude, although they generally took a dimmer view of drug use and the drug user than they had a year earlier.

The changes among children aged 9-12 and adults over age 18 showed improvement but fell in between those for college students and teens, it said.

On a more disconcerting note, the study said it found 18 percent of the children surveyed said they had been approached to buy or use drugs, up from 16 percent a year earlier.

THE SAVING FAITH - Pt. 2

Faith Without Works Is... (Cont.)

The Faith Of Devils. Verse 18 says, "Thou believest that there is one God; thou doest well: the devils also believe, and tremble." It takes more than a devil's faith to save. On more than one occasion devils admitted that Jesus was the Son of God (Mark 5:7; Luke 4:34), but they were not saved, were they? Of course not!

An Imperfect Faith. Verse 22 says, "Seest thou how faith wrought with his works, and by works was faith made perfect?" A working faith is a faith mature or complete. An incomplete faith cannot save because it has no works to show its maturity. In Hebrews 11 every man or woman of faith had a complete faith because it produced action. E.g., "By faith Abraham offered... By faith Noah prepared... By faith Abraham went... sojourning... offered..."

No man should boast of having faith when he does no works. Faith alone has never saved anyone, and the Bible so affirms. Faith alone is always viewed by the Bible as a faith which cannot save (vss. 17, 20, 24). Verse 24 says, "Ye see then how that by works a man is justified, and not by faith only."

Examples Of Saving Faith

In the text three examples, one negative and two positive, of the working, obedient, and saving faith are given. The first is in verses 15 and 16: "If a brother or sister be naked, and destitute of daily food, and one of you say unto them, Depart in peace, be ye warmed and filled; notwithstanding ye give them not those things which are needful to the body; what doth it profit?" The picture is of a brother or sister needing benevolent help. A Christian has the opportunity to help but neglects to do so. The Christian gives words of comfort but not what the brother or sister needs. The words did not profit the destitute ones because what they needed was benevolent help. The Christian should have obeyed the command of God to help the needy (Matt. 25:35; 1 John 3:17). This obedience would have been the work of God produced by the faith the Christian had in God's word (Rom. 10:17). But the Christian's faith was woefully lacking in that it failed to do the work of God.

Council decision not easy

The Murray City Council should be complimented for reaching a decision on the hazardous duty retirement plan at Thursday evening's council meeting.

The council chose the more expensive 20-year retirement plan over the 30-year non-hazardous plan.

New state legislation required the city to make a choice between the plans for all new police and firemen hired after Aug. 1. However, present police and firemen have the choice to go under the new plan, too.

The present pension fund will be phased out after a number of years. The hazardous duty plan allows retirement after 20 years, as does the present system. It allows the employees' annual contribution to remain at 7 percent of gross wages, which is less than they are paying now (7.51 percent).

The hazardous plan also allows for cost-of-living adjustments and health insurance benefits, which the present plan does not.

The drawbacks to the plan are:

On Aug. 1, the city will have an initial \$1.3 million to pay for the plan, which it can finance over 30 years, or, the legislation allows cities to levy a special property tax to pay off the unfunded liability in 15 years at 8 percent interest.

Plus, the city will also have to pay an annual 14 percent of employees gross wages for this plan.

By approving this plan the city will solve its unsound pension plan.

We think the acceptance of this plan is a good move for the city and we know how hard it was for the council to bite the bullet and make the decision to implement this new system.

KENTUCKY WILL BENEFIT FROM TIMELY ACTION ON APPROPRIATIONS BILLS

The month of September will bring an end to the second session of the 100th Congress. Until that time, there remains much to do in the legislative arena of the U.S. Senate.

The major items that will be debated and voted upon include the Trade Bill, drought legislation, Textile Bill, and some form of a contra aid package. In addition, there are numerous appropriations bills, including those that deal with agriculture, education, and aid to the homeless, that will soon provide federal assistance to Kentucky.

The agriculture, rural development and related agencies appropriations bill will provide money to build up and develop our rural areas. For example, the bill appropriates \$12.5 billion for agricultural programs such as the Extension Service and the Federal Crop Insurance Program. Rural development assistance programs will receive a boost from legislation providing for a revised appropriation for the Commodity Credit Corporation. The Women, Infant, and Children Program (WIC), which provides food to thousands who are hungry and in need of basic nutrition, will receive an increase in funding that will help many Kentucky families.

The labor, health and education appropriations bill includes provisions that allocate \$15 million for primary health care grants, \$4.7 million for mental health demonstration programs, and \$12 million for job training.

Adult literacy has always been a problem in Kentucky. Illiteracy is a terribly debilitating handicap. A person who can not read faces a roadblock in almost all areas of personal development. To help combat this problem, the Department of Education has set aside \$159 million to help teach adults to read. Through this funding in adult literacy programs, people who do not have the basic skills to read can take classes and overcome this handicap and improve their quality of life.

I am pleased these appropriations bills are being passed on schedule. Usually, these bills become delayed by partisan politics and, out of desperation, all thirteen bills are lumped together into one mammoth omnibus spending bill which the President must sign or risk the shutdown of the entire federal government. The President, rightly so, has vowed never to be held hostage again by such a bill and has said that he would veto another of these gigantic spending measures.

This year, the Congress has done its work in a more civilized manner. Schedules have been met and agreements hammered out in a bipartisan manner. Hopefully, this spirit of cooperation signals a new commitment by Congress to keep on a strict budgetary schedule and complete work on a timely basis. This is good for Kentucky, and good for the nation.

Southern
Seen

The last time I paid to go to a movie was a year ago. By the time we bought three tickets, a tub of popcorn, three soft drinks, and three candy bars, the tab was over twenty dollars.

Most of my movie watching these days is via television. For the cost of a family evening movie expedition, I figured we could wait to watch movies on the movie channel or buy them on VCR tape and have them forever or even read the book.

Our old hometown was without a movie theatre until recently. Now there's a twin-screen out near the shopping centers at the edge of town. Its immediate forebears were two drive-ins from the 1950s, both now long vacated. Its grandparents were two downtown theatres from the Depression and World War II days, later converted into a dollar store and a discount shoe shop.

The ambience of those old moviehouses is hard to recapture. Trying to describe them is important, because young folks need to understand what the movies did for shaping Early America and because we old folks who are turning into TV couch potatoes need to remember.

My first brush with the law came when I was seized by the owner-operator, Mrs. Hal Lawrence, for being in the ladies'

room of the Capitol Theatre. I was three years old, and it was the only restroom to which my mother had introduced me. It's the only time I can recall my dad taking me to a movie. After several hundred movies, I came to love — and miss — Mrs. Lawrence as much as a grandparent.

Back then, movies changed three or four times a week, usually Sunday-Monday, Tuesday-Wednesday, Thursday-Friday, and Saturday.

Saturday was cowboy day, normally a rotation of Roy Rogers and Gene Autry with occasional Sunset Carsons, Johnny Mack Browns, Lash Larues, and Durango Kids thrown in, along with another chapter of Saturday serial, many of which seemed to feature Buster Crabbe. Saturday showings began at 10:30 a.m. instead of the usual weekday 1:30 p.m., and most youngsters sat through twice. On Sundays, only one evening showing was allowed, beginning around 8:30 after evening church services.

During the week, we could see Bette Davis, Cagney, Bogart, Cary Grant, Gary Cooper, Barbara Stanwyck, Robert Taylor, and a host of other hundreds from the stables of MGM, Paramount, RKO, and Warner stables. Most were black-and-white. In our town in those days, a technicolor movie was a major event. Although not quite as major as getting to see *Gone with the Wind* or *Bambi* when released every five years. About the closest thing to an X-rated movie was *Forever Amber*. Some folks didn't miss a movie, three nights out every week.

Tickets were 25 cents for adults and 12 cents for under-12s. Major murmurings of mutiny arose when prices went to 35 and 14 cents. (About the same time, haircuts were going from 50 to 60 cents, and gasoline was 20 cents a gallon even when rationed.) "P.K.'s" (Preachers' Kids) didn't have to pay at all, and it paid to be best friends of one willing to share his or her tickets, even if they couldn't go with you on Sundays. Methodist ministers seemed to have especially bountiful supplies of children.

In their final years, our two downtown theatres offered no food but popcorn — a nickel a bag. There had been a time, much earlier, when a sweet shop opened off the lobby, a shadow of the huge

candy counters one found at the majestic movie cathedrals in Memphis or Nashville. (If one ran rapidly enough, one could also get to our sweet shop between Sunday School and church each Sunday morning.)

For small towns with little evening entertainments beyond Sunday and Wednesday evening prayer meetings, radio, the telephone party line, and occasional Rook games, movie houses were community centers. Their stages provided a parade of live "stars" as well as movies. Hypnotists, mindreaders, and War Bond salesmen shared footlights with dish drawings, talent shows, beauty contests, Chatauqua lecturers, and "follow-the-bouncing-ball" sing-alongs. Smiley Burnette dropped in occasionally to sing and to sign autographs, and the local paper once reported he had bought a retirement farm out in the county.

With their live and on-film celebrities, their Movietone newsreels, and their huge air-conditioning machines — the first and only ones in town — the moviehouses showed us the future. Between the movies and the war news — and catching covert snapshots of *National Geographic* behind the shelves in the library — we grew up aware that a wider world waited for us outside.

German teachers visiting MSU

There has been a German "invasion" on the Murray State University campus.

German-speaking people are being heard all over the campus and in the community. They are part of the Summer Institute for German Studies at the university, directed by Dr. Milton Grimes, chairman of the Department of Foreign Languages at Murray State, and Dr. Dieter Jedan, associate professor of German.

Developed to enhance the study of the German language and culture for high school teachers of German, the summer program strictly requires that whenever the participants speak and whatever they read or listen to

must be in German.

"By creating a native-like environment, the teachers find that they have a chance to upgrade their linguistic skills," Jedan, the 1988 director and one of the instructors for the institutes, pointed out. "Combined with formal classroom instruction, the program is a good example of professional enrichment."

The focus outside the classroom is on informal activities that reinforce the use of learned skills. Videotapes of German television and German language publications are used to promote conversation.

Assisting Jedan as faculty members are Dr. Walter Lohfert

of the Goethe House, New York; Dr. Peter Hubrich from the Goethe Institute, Cincinnati; and native-speaking teaching assistants Beate Birk and Ulrike Kirchbichler.

Funded through a \$20,000 grant from the Goethe Institute in New York City and a matching grant from Murray State, the program is serving as a pilot project, with the possible addition of two more institutes in 1989.

Participants earn six semester hours of graduate credit from Murray State. Approximately 30 percent of the 22 teachers in the program have indicated their intention to pursue a master's degree in education with an emphasis in German, Jedan noted.

Pearce says higher education starving

Despite his description of higher education in Kentucky as starved, journalist John Ed Pearce told regents at Murray State University Tuesday that he finds encouragement in the "great ferment" he sees among citizens in many areas.

Meeting informally with the board, Pearce said he believes Kentucky has the potential, with positive and effective leadership, "to make remarkable strides in all areas of education in the next ten years."

Pearce, a Pulitzer Prize-winning columnist and longtime associate editor and editorial writer for the Louisville Courier-Journal, was on the campus to speak to participants in the 1988 Governor's Scholars Program. He retired from the Courier-Journal and was elected to the Kentucky Journalism Hall of Fame in 1986.

Now a syndicated columnist and a free-lance writer, he has been a member of the Shakerstown Roundtable for the past three years and in 1987 wrote the report that outlined that study group's findings on the state of education in Kentucky.

"Higher education is starved in Kentucky," he said, "when compared even to its own past, and certainly when compared to higher education in every

neighboring state."

Although he expressed optimism at the stirrings he has observed in behalf of education in Kentucky, he warned of formidable obstacles yet to be overcome.

"We are going to have an adequate higher system only when higher education is adequately appreciated and understood, and as yet there is not the respect in Kentucky for the educated mind that should exist."

Pearce told the three newest appointees to the board of regents at Murray State that they will soon become increasingly aware of the need for funding that exists throughout public higher education in Kentucky.

"Money is a great need," he pointed out, "because to get the best teachers, we have to pay. And without faculty members who are motivated, innovative, and capable of inspiring students, there is really no university."

Pearce said he would like to see all regents involve themselves in every institution and in the whole institution of education in Ken-

tucky rather than just the operation of a single one.

He indicated that he has been in outspoken agreement for many years with criticism in the Shakerstown Roundtable education report that the selection of regents and trustees in higher education is too political.

"Universities of the state are being handicapped by the manner of selection of regents and trustees and by the reasons for which they were chosen," he explained.

"Lack of standards is a terrible handicap to governors in making selections and often to presidents in trying to work with regents and trustees."

He pointed out that members of governing boards in higher education are not required to be college graduates themselves.

"We cannot expect students to have a proper appreciation for the value of a college degree if the people running their universities don't have one," he said.

Pearce said he also favors longer terms for regents and trustees to develop more stability and continuity on the boards.

Staying clean is the best bet

DEAR DR. GOTT: My company will soon start random urinalysis testing for drugs and alcohol. What is the average time period that it takes for the urine to clear after the use of the most commonly abused drugs? Is there any truth to the rumor that orange juice or vinegar will flush the system faster?

DEAR READER: Your urine should clear after about a week of abstinence. Orange juice and vinegar will not accelerate the flushing process.

Are you sure that the company is going to check for alcohol, too? This seems extreme and impractical. There goes the wine with dinner.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I'm 42, married, have two teenage sons and run my

own business. For the past three months I've been taking four Somas and eight Tylenol No. 3 tablets daily. When I stop the pills, I have no energy, diarrhea and flu-like symptoms. I know I have a drug problem. Can I stop the pills cold? What withdrawal problems can I expect?

DEAR READER: Soma (carisoprodol), a muscle relaxant, has not been reported to cause serious drug dependency, although some patients can experience mild withdrawal symptoms, such as abdominal cramps, insomnia and headache.

Tylenol No. 3, however, is another matter, because it contains codeine. Codeine, a narcotic related to cocaine and morphine, has a high addiction potential. Abrupt cessation of narcotics in an addicted individual often will result in the withdrawal syndrome: anxiety, drug craving, yawning, sweating, tremors and muscle twitching. You should not attempt to stop the codeine without adequate medical supervision.

On the positive side, you have taken a first, vital step in overcoming your drug dependency: admitting that you have a problem. The next step is to ask for help within your community. I urge you to discuss the situation with your doctor. Under a system of close supervision, with an intense focus on confidentiality, you should be able to overcome your problem.

Once you have been "detoxed" and

the effects of the codeine have worn off, you may wish to seek continuing outpatient treatment in a 12-step program, such as Narcotics Anonymous. I am grateful that you had the courage to write; I admire your honesty. To help you to find support, I am sending you a free copy of my Health Report, "Where to Get Help: Substance Abuse and Mental Health." DEAR DR. GOTT: Why is the death rate of people between 55 and 65 higher than the death rate of those aged 65 to 75?

DEAR READER: More people die of cancer and heart disease between 50 and 65 than at older ages. This is considered to be a "danger zone," especially for men. Once you have reached your 70s, you have overcome a statistical hurdle. Some demographers have suggested that only relatively fit people live beyond 65. Put another way, if you make it to 65, you've got pretty good genes and you can probably expect to live another 10 years.

Of course, this is merely a statistical game. Real people die of real illnesses at any age. Still, the observation you mention is intriguing.

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Production turns back the pages

The Young Actors' Guild of Murray's Playhouse in the Park has delved into the pages of history to bring their current production,

"The Servant of Two Masters," to the stage. What is most delightful about the history lesson these youngsters are offering is the way they manage to make a 200 year old play as fresh and immediate as today's newspaper, with a liberal dose of comedy to sweeten the experience.

Carlo Goldoni was an innovator in Italian theatre in the eighteenth century, but the changes of form he introduced and the controversies he provoked are issues long dead. The characters he created in his plays, however, are as recognizable — and as funny — as they were in his day, because they derive their problems and their solutions from human nature and not from current events.

"The Servant of Two Masters" is no exception — when a young man finds that his job does not pay enough to provide for all of his needs, he decides to take a second job in order to augment his income. His two masters, embroiled in their own concerns, pay little attention to his machinations, seeing what they expect to see rather than what is actually there, and thus the several threads of plot become interwoven to produce a multi-colored image of the love and silliness and pride that are so basic to the human condition.

It is part of the magic of Robert Valentine's direction that even a long play flies by in minutes; this time, even in the heat, you're sorry to see it end. He has imbued his youthful cast with drive and sparkle and an unerring sense of theatre that take the audience by storm. If this play has been a learning experience for his cast and crew, they'd had a marvelous time in the process; and as a result, the audience basks in enjoyment.

Behnaz Kibra is earnest and determined as the willful Beatrice Rasponi, a young woman impersonating her dead brother in order to collect money owed her family and to escape the confining social mores governing the conduct and choices of omen. Julia Maddox is staunch and crafty as the innkeeper Brighella, who aids Beatrice in her impersonation — Valentine's decision to make the innkeeper a woman instead of the original man not only lets us see another fine young actress, but

strengthens the play thematically as well.

Debbie Mott's portrayal of Clarice, the young woman betrothed to Beatrice's dead brother, conveys to the audience all the helplessness and confusion and wounded pride of a girl whose future depends entirely upon the economics, politics, and whims of the men around her. David Weatherly, playing Clarice's true love Silvio, and Patrick Orr, as Beatrice's lover Florindo, show us clearly that hair styles and speech patterns may change over the centuries, but men in love remain the same forever.

Gene Cook shines as Clarice's father Pantalone, giving his audience some wonderful moments of comedy and his fellow actors total and consistent support. Valerie Chapman is pert and poised as Clarice's maid Smeraldina, and Paul Cagle gives us a pompous, posturing Dr. Lombardi, supporting his son Silvio in the pursuit of Clarice's hand with extravagant gestures and obscure Latin truisms.

But the play belongs unquestionably to Truffaldino, the harassed servant seeking to

satisfy two masters and win the heart of Smeraldina without missing his dinner. Eight-grader David Greene proves himself more than equal to the comic demands of this role; he is a delight throughout, and his version of serving dinner will leave you gasping and wiping your eyes.

Kathryn Ballard's costume designs are attractive and authentic — though you wonder what could possibly have possessed people of the eighteenth century to wear so many clothes, especially in hot weather!

And it is hot in Murray this summer — too hot, many people may think, to go to the theatre — but television reruns can't offer you anything approaching the fun and energy and disciplined hard work you'll experience at the Playhouse in the Park. The Young Actors' Guild will continue their performances of "The Servant of Two Masters" this weekend, July 15-17, with the show beginning each night at 8 p.m. Call 759-1752 for your reservations, and give the Young Actors' Guild the appreciative audience they so richly deserve.

Price is right as top golfers battle 'Windy International'

'Who's Who' turns to 'Who's That?' in British Open

LYTHAM, England — Forget the British Open. For its 117th edition, call golf's oldest tournament the Windy International.

For the second day in a row, winds off the Irish Sea blew scores sky high as the field was cut Friday to 71 golfers for the final two rounds.

On opening day, it was raining and cold, and the wind blew hardest in the morning. Day 2 was sunny and warmer, and the wind picked up in the late afternoon.

Either way, it was enough to transform the leader board from a golfing "Who's Who" to "Who's that?"

"It was a one-shot, maybe a two-shot difference," said Seve Ballesteros of Spain, who saw his first-round lead blown away in the afternoon breeze of an even-par second round.

Nick Price of South Africa, who hasn't won a tournament in Europe, Africa or the United States since 1985, matched Ballesteros' opening-round 67 for a 5-under-par total of 137 and a one-shot lead over the Spaniard.

Price was out early on the second day, before the winds picked up, and said the warmer, calmer conditions gave him a big boost.

"The warmer weather helped," Price said. "Playing on Thursday, I was wearing three layers to keep warm, and I was losing the feel."

Five of the six closest pursuers of Ballesteros were early starters, too.

Defending champion Nick Faldo of England and former Masters winner Craig Stadler of the U.S. were tied for third at 2-under 140, Stadler shooting 3-under and Faldo 2-under for the day.

Next was American Andy Bean, who birdied five of the last nine holes for a 1-under 70-141.

Sandy Lyle, the 1985 champion from Scotland,

and American Fred Couples had mid-day rounds of 69 for even-par two-round totals. They were joined at 142 by American Bob Tway, who went out late, moved to 3-under with seven holes left — and dropped all three shots in the wind.

Of all the golfers in the second half of the field, only one — three-time champion Jack Nicklaus, with a 1-under 70 — broke par for the second day. Nicklaus was 3-over for the tournament, at 145.

"I was here about 11 o'clock and it looked as if it would be a nice day," Ballesteros said. "But the wind came up and it was very tough out there."

Price started the day 1-under, in a four-way tie for fourth, and swung his round at the end of the front-nine.

He eagled the par-5 sixth hole, took a birdie-4 at No. 7, then a birdie-3 at No. 8.

He traded a bogey-4 at the 12th for a birdie-3 at the 15th, but by the time that, he said, his fate was assured.

"The real secret of this golf course is getting a good score out and holding it on the way in," he said. "Those par-5's are not tough par-5's."

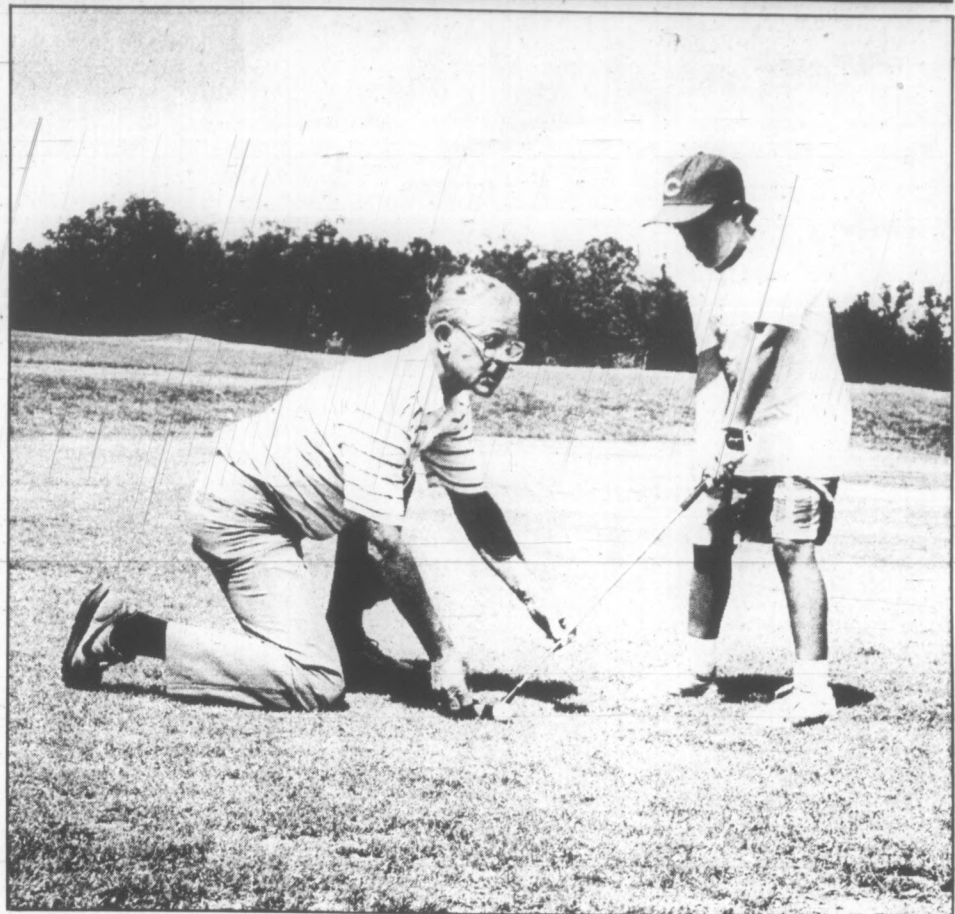
That's the way Ballesteros did it Thursday. But on the second day, he bogeyed the par-4 third by two-putting from 10 feet and — when he bogeyed the treacherous 14th — there was no pad remaining.

The cut for the last two rounds was 148, 6-over par and two shots higher than at the open in Muirfield, Scotland, last year.

Even at that inflated level, the cut took away some of the biggest names in the field.

Gone were two-time champion Lee Trevino and former Masters champ Larry Mize, at 149; Christy O'Connor Jr., of Ireland and former American amateur champion Scott Verplank, at 150; Raymond Floyd at 153; Hal Sutton at 154.

Pirates have Mets in view; Clemens buries Royals

Eleven days ago, the Pittsburgh Pirates were losing sight of the New York Mets. Now they have the NL East leaders clearly in view.

Bobby Bonilla broke a fifth-inning tie with a two-run homer and Barry Bonds had a solo homer and a two-run double Friday night as the Pirates won their seventh straight game by beating the San Francisco Giants 8-5.

The victory, combined with the Mets' 4-3, 10-inning loss in Atlanta, lifted the Pirates to within 2½ games of New York. They've made up five games on the Mets since July 4 and are closer to first place than they've been since May 16, when they trailed by two games.

NATIONAL LEAGUE

In other NL action, Los Angeles edged Chicago 3-2 in 10 innings; Houston beat Philadelphia 5-2; Cincinnati downed Montreal 6-3 and San Diego downed St. Louis 7-3.

Braves 4, Mets 3

Dale Murphy, struggling through the worst season of his career, ended Atlanta's four-game losing streak on one swing — launching Randy Myers' 10th-inning fastball into the left-field seats for his 15th homer leading off the bottom of the 10th.

The Mets lost for the fourth time in five games despite overcoming a 3-0 deficit with the help of homers by Kevin McReynolds and Darryl Strawberry, who led off the eighth with his NL-leading 22nd off Bruce Sutter.

Dodgers 3, Cubs 2

Tracy Woodson, hitless in nine at-bats since being recalled from the minors last week, had a pinch-hit RBI single in the 10th to give the Dodgers their third win in two days at Wrigley Field.

Dave Anderson led off the 10th with a double off Al Nipper, 1-3. Two outs later, Woodson pinch-hit against Frank DiPino and won the game with a base hit to left.

Alejandro Pena, 4-3, pitched two scoreless innings for the victory.

The Dodgers rallied from a 2-0 deficit against 15-game winner Greg Maddux, tying the game in the eighth on Jeff Hamilton's triple and Steve Sax's sacrifice fly.

Astros 5, Phillies 2

Philadelphia starter Kevin Gross made only one mistake in seven innings, but Houston's Glenn Davis made him pay for it.

Davis hit "a cut fastball that just hung up there," far over the left-field fence at Veterans Stadium to cap a four-run third inning as Houston won its fifth straight and Philadelphia lost its fourth in a row and ninth in 10 games.

Reds 6, Expos 3

Eric Davis' three-run homer off Jeff Parrett lifted Cincinnati over Montreal and ended the Expos' eight-game winning streak.

Padres 7, Cardinals 3

Tony Gwynn's second two-run single broke a ninth-inning tie as San Diego handed St. Louis its eighth straight loss.

Gwynn, hitting .512 during a 10-game hitting streak, had a two-run single in the seventh before his base hit to center off Ken Dayley broke a 3-3 tie. Carmelo Martinez drove in the Padres' other three runs with a squeeze bunt and a two-run single in the ninth off Dan Quisenberry.

Roger Clemens made sure Joe Morgan will remember his debut as Boston Red Sox manager.

So did the rest of the Red Sox, who swept Kansas City 3-1 and 7-4 Friday night, making Morgan 2-0 since taking over Thursday from the fired John McNamara.

Angels 6, Tigers 4

California built a 6-0 lead and held on. Jack Howell hit a three-run homer in the first inning for the Angels.

Mike Witt, 7-9, survived the Tigers' comeback to go 7 1-3 innings, allowing eight hits. Brian Harvey finished for his 10th save.

Mariners 8, Indians 5

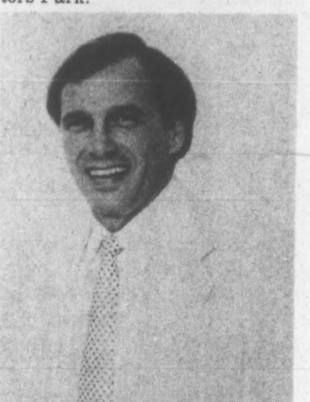
Dr. Ridley, a native of Dawson

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Today's West was half-right in his defense. He did make the right play, but by the time he had decided, South had a marked route to the winning line.

West led his fourth-best diamond and South wisely ducked in both hands. Back came a diamond to dummy's ace, and declarer led a low spade back to his king. West studied the problem for what seemed an eternity and finally ducked. This was the correct play since his spade ace was his only entry to run the diamonds. What was wrong about the play was the long and revealing study. After that tip-off, South led a spade right up to dummy's queen, and the fall of East's jack ensured an overtrick.

The key to the defense is a smooth duck by West. If he refuses South's spade king with no apparent concern, South is likely to lead a spade to dummy's nine and East's jack. After the diamonds are cleared, South tries the clubs for his ninth winner, but that bad break limits him to only eight tricks.

It's not enough to make the correct play. When secrecy is required, one must not reveal all to an alert declarer.

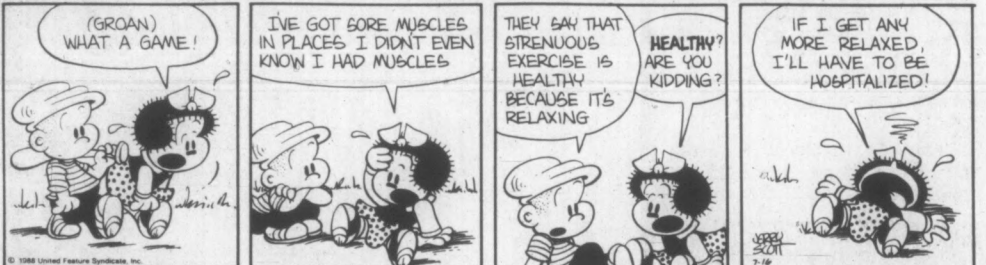

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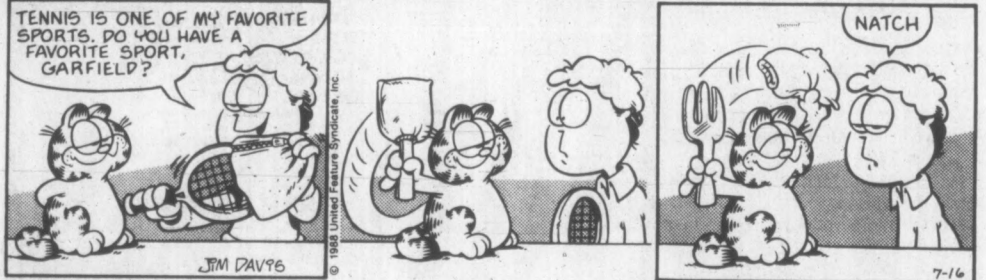

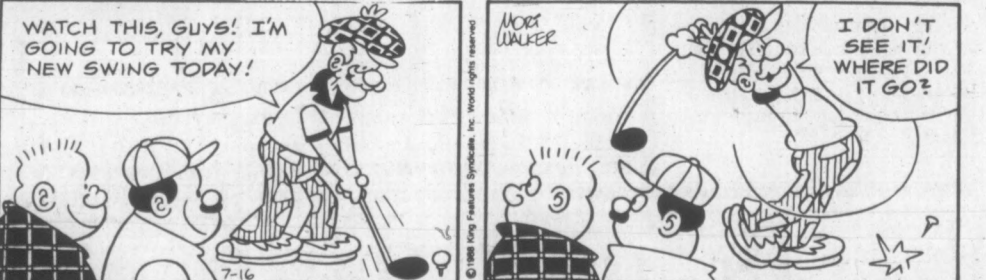

Federal judge denies hearing for Henry Vance

LEXINGTON, Ky. (AP) — A federal judge has denied former gubernatorial and legislative aide Henry Vance Jr. a hearing that might have freed him from prison.

Vance's attorney, Frank Haddad Jr. of Louisville, had asked for an evidentiary hearing to prove that Vance was not a danger to society.

But U.S. District Judge Henry R. Wilhoit Jr. said Thursday that based on an appeals court ruling that Vance be denied bond, he did not think he had the power to order an evidentiary hearing.

The 6th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals ruled July 8 that Wilhoit erred when he allowed Vance to remain free on bond while appealing his conviction.

Vance was convicted in October of conspiracy and of helping to transport the gun that Kentucky native Bonnie Kelly used to kill a Florida prosecutor in 1982. Vance began serving a 15-year prison term Wednesday.

Chief Justice William H. Rehnquist of the U.S. Supreme Court on Friday turned down an emergency request by Vance that he be freed from prison pending further appeals.

Analysts worry about raw food prices

WASHINGTON (AP) — Wholesale prices rose a moderate 0.4 percent in June, the government said Friday, but analysts saw cause for worry in the steep, drought-induced climb in raw food prices.

The Labor Department said the hot, dry weather searing much of the nation sent prices of unprocessed grain and poultry soaring by more than 20 percent last month, pushing raw food prices 4.2 percent higher than in May. It was the biggest jump since October 1985.

Food prices rose a lower, but still substantial, 1.1 percent at the wholesale level, one step before retail stores. Economists said that it was only a matter of time before price bulges at earlier production stages show up on supermarket shelves.

"Food price inflation looks like it will be with us for many months to come," said Allen Sinai, chief economist of the Boston Co.

Other analysts pointed to a drop in energy prices and generally modest increases in other areas.

Energy prices fell 1.6 percent, with a 7.1 percent decline in fuel oil leading the way. Gasoline and natural gas fell 2.4 percent and 1.0 percent respectively.

"That's a real break because the last few times we had droughts, we also had double-digit increases in energy prices," said Michael K. Evans, a private economic consultant in Washington.

"Energy prices are heading down for the rest of the summer," he said, noting a sharp drop between mid-June and mid-July in the price of crude oil, to the lowest level in nearly two years.

Subtracting the effects of volatile food and energy prices, wholesale prices rose 0.3 percent last month, the same as in May. Analysts consider this rate a better indication of underlying inflationary pressures in the economy.

In other economic news: —The Commerce Department said the U.S. trade deficit rose slightly in May to \$10.9 billion, up from \$10.3 billion in April. But the imbalance was still the second smallest in almost three years. Both exports and imports increased.

—The Federal Reserve Board said production at the nation's factories, mines and utilities rose a moderate 0.4 percent in June, the

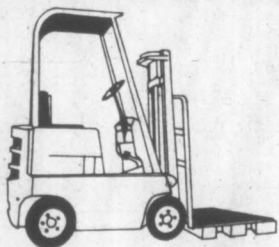
ninth consecutive month without a decline. Production at utilities surged 2.6 percent, primarily for air conditioning during the heat wave.

—Business inventories in May rose a moderate 0.6 percent to \$728.4 billion, held in check by a 0.9 percent jump in sales, the Commerce Department said. Sales rose to \$483.7 billion.

June wholesale price increases pushed the Labor Department's Producer Price Index for finished goods to 107.9, meaning that a selection of goods costing \$100 in 1982 cost \$107.90 last month, 40 cents more than in May. This calculation is not adjusted for seasonal variations, as are other calculations in the report.

If the June price rise held for 12 straight months, the inflation rate would be 4.6 percent annually, more than double the 2.2 percent rise of 1987.

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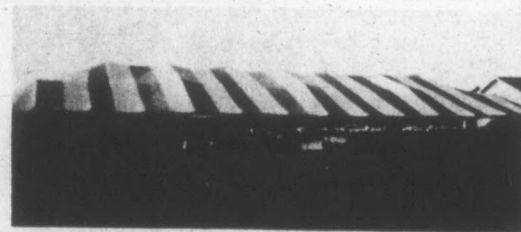

Star Trek fans given chance to play a part in new adventure

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Trekkies who have been following the galactic adventures of Captain Kirk and Mr. Spock for 22 years can now join the action in the new "Star Trek Adventure" at the Universal Studios Tour.

The attraction, which allows fans to play the parts of the Starship Enterprise crew, Klingons and other aliens, opens today.

Gene Roddenberry, creator of "Star Trek," was an early visitor to the attraction two weeks ago. The revolving parts of the stage were working, but workers were scurrying to complete the 2,000-seat theater.

On the stage, a Klingon stood on the bridge of his Bird of Prey spaceship and petted his Puppy Lizzard. The stage turns to bring forward the bridge of the Enterprise, the engineering section, transporter room and the surface of the planet Akumal 7.

Roddenberry gave his approval for the attraction, and the workers, recognizing him, crowded around to shake his hand.

Roddenberry, William Shatner and other actors from the television and movie series are scheduled to be on hand for the opening. About 1,500 Trekkies were invited to the premiere performance after they were the first to respond to a mailing of 26,000 invitations sent to "Star Trek" fan clubs.

Leonard Nimoy, who plays Mr. Spock, is the only member of the original cast not expected at the opening. He is directing a movie in Canada.

"Star Trek" first ran on NBC from 1966-69, then became one of the hottest shows in reruns. Paramount Studios has so far made four hit "Star Trek" movies and the current series "Star Trek: The Next Generation" has become a hit in syndication.

"It still amazes me that 'Star Trek' has become a popular myth," said Roddenberry. "I constantly tell myself that I'm the same guy I was when I was trying to get a script assignment."

"The Star Trek Adventure" allows 29 members of the studio audience to dress up in costumes and play various roles on stage. The performances will be taped, mixed with footage from "Star Trek" movies and computerized equipment will produce 8-minute videocassettes that cost \$35.

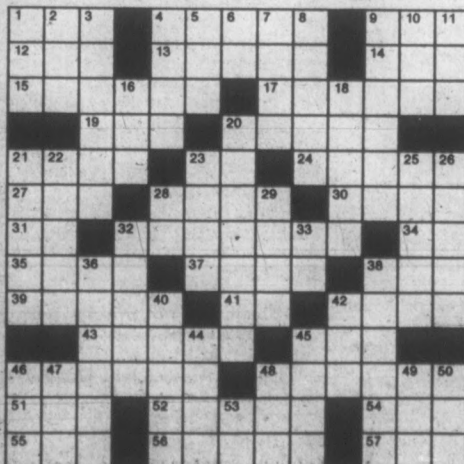



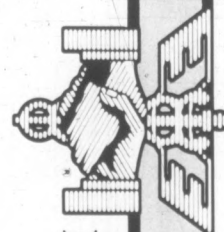
