WASHINGTON — The Bush administration is resisting heavy pressure to place Japan on a trade "hit list," but members of Congress are threatening to block approval of other trade agreements unless there is a change of heart.



SPACE CENTER, Houston -Discovery trailed the Hubble Space Telescope 380 miles above the Earth today so the shuttle astronauts could watch the \$1.5 billion floating observatory and make sure it was working right.

The telescope, which will gaze at the heavens during a 15-year search for new worlds, was released from the shuttle's cargo bay Wednesday after a last-minute snag that almost sent two astronauts on an emergency spacewalk.

Mission Control awakened the crew early today with a loud rendition of the song "Shout," a fraternity house favorite.

"Good morning, Discovery. I guess you're awake after that

#### New hearing on insurance rates ordered by high court

## Gov. Wilkinson pushing education reform

LOUISVILLE, Ky. — Gov. Wallace Wilkinson is campaigning again, telling other states what Kentucky's General Assembly has done to equalize educational opportunities.

"I'm going to use every bully pulpit that I can find, every forum I can find to continue to talk about it," Wilkinson said in a speech Wednesday to the Kentucky Head Start Association convention in

The governor said no one on the national level talks more about the

He will be in Santa Fe, N.M., on Friday to explain Kentucky's education-reform plan at a meeting of the steering committee of the Education Commission of the

Frank Newman, president of the commission, said in a statement released by Wilkinson's office that almost all of the meeting will be devoted to discussing education in

Wilkinson told the Head Start group that Kentucky's plan makes the state the world leader in education, and that his office has been besieged with calls from governors and other state officials.

'They want to know how we acted so quickly ... so decisively, he said. "They want to know how we addressed both refinancing and restructuring at the same time, for no one has really dealt with that on a parallel course in exactly the same manner that Kentucky has. They want to know how we could have the courage to rewrite educational history in Kentucky.'

The General Assembly passed the reform plan after the state Supreme Court said Kentucky's schools were unconstitutional because they were inadequate and unequal. A major facet of the plan gives more money to poor school

Wilkinson is promoting the idea of a space satellite devoted entirely to educational programming, which he said could give students "in the remotest and most rural parts of America ... the same equal access to education and the same opportunity as children in New York and California and Chicago.'


He said the \$300 million to \$400 million needed to build and launch the satellite could be obtained by building one fewer nuclear submarine or Stealth warplane.



song," said Kathy Thornton, shuttle communicator. "There are a lot of happy people down here. We saw a great deploy yesterday and Hubble had a good night while you were asleep.

"We appreciate the good words from everybody," replied Discovery Commander Loren Shriver.

Throughout the morning, ground controllers tested Hubble's computer systems as part of a long checkout of the telescope. So far, no problems have been reported.

The crew said they had spotted the telescope about 40 miles away this morning.

"It's reflecting like a very bright star up ahead," Shriver said.

After Wednesday's deployment, Shriver gently backed Discovery away from the telescope and put the shuttle through a series of maneuvers, the last one completed this morning, to "park" Discovery in orbit 46 miles behind Hubble.

"The telescope really looked great as we flew away from it, and we sure hope it does good work," Shriver said Wednesday.

"Well, it sure is now, Loren, and thanks for all the great work you've done," replied Mission Control. "Galileo is real proud of

Scientists have hailed the Hubble NASA's most expensive unmanned spacecraft - as the greatest advance in astronomy since Galileo raised a small telescope to his eyes nearly 400 years

Discovery and its five astronauts will follow the telescope while controllers at the Goddard Space Flight Center in Greenbelt, Md., make sure Hubble is operating properly, such as responding to directional commands.

The next milestone is Friday, when the telescope's 10-foot aperture door is to be opened, exposing the finely polished 94.5-inch mirror to starlight.

Then on Tuesday, NASA expects to release the first image from the telescope: an open star cluster in the constellation Carina. Data will follow in a month or two.

If the aperture door doesn't open properly, Discovery could return to the telescope so two astronauts could perform a spacewalk to fix it. Hubble project manager Fred

Wojtalik said the telescope would be tested today for its ability to maneuver before the aperture door

'We want to be in full control so we don't ever endanger the Hubble by putting the aperture door close to the sunlight," he said. Too much light could damage the telescope's sensitive

On Wednesday, mission specialist Steve Hawley used the shuttle's 50-foot robot arm to gently grasp the 12½ -ton telescope and hoist it

One of the telescope's solar arrays unreeled from its mast as

#### power to the telescope's batteries, which otherwise had only eight hours of charge.

But there was trouble with the second panel. It wouldn't budge when the latches were released, and then moved about a fifth of its 39-foot length and stopped again. The panel rolled all the way out on the third attempt.

By the final attempt, astronauts Bruce McCandless and Kathryn Sullivan were in their space suits in the airlock, 30 minutes away from taking tools in hand and going on an outer-space maintenance call. Wojtalik said the cause of the

problem is unknown. The 81/2 -hour procedure was performed 380 miles above Earth, 70 miles higher than any shuttle has ever flown. The orbit was dictated by the need to put Hubble above

the Earth's distorting atmosphere. Astronomers hope to use the telescope to look back to almost the beginning of the time, studying stars and galaxies so distant their light has taken 14 billions years to reach Earth. They hope to determine how and when the universe was formed, currently estimated at 15 billion years ago.

The telescope originally was scheduled for launch in 1983 but was delayed by technical problems and the Challenger accident.

Discovery, which blasted into orbit Tuesday, is scheduled to land Sunday at Edwards Air Force Base,

FRANKFORT, Ky. (AP) — Democratic U.S. Senate candidate John Brock has released results of a drug test that was negative across the board.

The report was released Wednesday with Brock's position paper on drug abuse. It proposed expansion of drug education and treatment programs, interdiction and harsher penalties for drug users and suppliers.

Punishment and interdiction "alone will not bring success and I caution against over-dependence on these efforts and against overspending on them at the expense of education and treatment programs," Brock said.

Brock also raised Dr. Harvey Sloane's health as an issue in their race for the Democratic nomination.

"The health and vigor of a candidate are the business of the people, especially when the candidate is seeking a long term," Brock said in a statement prepared for an appearance in Louisville.

## Evacuations ordered 4 years after the Chernobyl disaster

MOSCOW — Another 200,000 people will be resettled from areas irradiated in the Chernobyl nuclear power plant explosion in a \$26 billion program adopted by the Soviet legislature on Wednesday, the eve of the fourth anniversary of the disaster.

Many members of the legislature, the Supreme Soviet, criticized the plan as inadequate to deal with the health, agricultural, economic and environmental aftermath of the Ukraine accident. Legislator Yuri Scherback estimated 250 billion rubles (\$405 billion) are needed over the next 10 years.

Official reports say 31 people were killed when one of four reactors at Chernobyl caught fire and exploded April 26, 1986. Unofficial reports say 250 died. The blast spewed cesium, strontium and plutonium across much of the Ukraine, Byelorussia and Russia and sent a cloud of radioactive gas around the

After a day of debate, including charges of an official cover-up of the disaster and bungled evacuations, the Supreme Soviet endorsed a program drafted by the three affected republics and the central government for dealing with Chernobyl from 1990-92, Tass news agency reported. About 180,000 to 200,000 people still living in contaminated areas will be resettled.

About 116,000 people were evacuated in the months after the accident, and some Soviet scientists and politicians have been campaigning since then for further resettlements. They say 4 million Soviets are living on contaminated

Wednesday's resolution also provides for stepping up medical aid to residents of the contaminated zone and stabilizing radiation

Many residents have complained of inadequate medical care. Cases of anemia, leukemia and cancers have been reported rising among people living on irradiated land. Many residents still eat irradiated food because alternatives are not

After years of passivity, the people suffering have been staging demonstrations this week. Further protests are planned Thursday, the fourth anniversary, in Byelorussia and the Ukraine.

A 24-hour world telethon for Chernobyl victims began in Moscow Wednesday night and had raised \$4.8 million in the first few hours, Tass reported. CNN showed live scenes of the telethon to U.S. viewers. Many of the donations came from the United States, Japan and Western Europe, Tass said.

Protesters demand trials for the officials who concealed the extent of the danger and delayed evacuating contaminated areas; better medical care for victims; and the import of radiation-free food.

Dealing with the larger questions posed by Chernobyl, the Supreme Soviet directed the government to draft a bill on the use of nuclear energy and nuclear safety, and to phase out the Chernobyl power plant. The plant's three remaining reactors are still operating. The

Ukrainian legislature wants the plant closed by 1995.

Scherbak, from the Ukraine, told a news conference Wednesday a parliamentary commission should be set up to examine decisionmaking in the Chernobyl disaster, and to determine which high government officials were responsible for slow reaction to it and the

Fellow legislator Yuri Voronezhtsev, from Byelorussia, told reporters the commission is needed to single out officials still standing in the way of a full accounting and

'The main thing is not to bring criminal charges against people ... but there are people who have not acknowledged their mistakes who are braking things today," he said.

#### Half of polled respondents say Hawaii becoming Japanese colony

HONOLULU (AP) - Nearly half of the Hawaii residents responding to a media poll say they believe the state is on the verge of becoming a colony of Japan.

Thirty-one percent of those responding to the poll said they agree with that premise, while another 15 percent said they strongly agree. Thirty-eight percent said they disagree and 14 percent said they strongly disagree.

Japanese interests own many of Hawaii's major resort hotels, several shopping centers, restaurants. golf coures, retail stores, convenience stores and one of the state's largest dairies.

More than 80 percent responding to the poll said they see Japan as wanting to replace or challenge America as an economic power, and 60 percent said they don't trust the motives of Japanese nationals.

Although 67 percent of the respondents blamed the sale of land to Japanese as the biggest contributor to the high cost of living in Hawaii, 59 percent also said they feel Japanese foreign investment is good for the state's economy and

The random telephone poll of 408 registered voters throughout the state was conducted March 22-27 for the Honolulu Star-Bulletin and KGMB-TV. Results were released this week. The poll has a margin of error of five

The topic of foreign investment - and Japanese investment in particular - has been debated here in recent months. Honolulu Mayor Frank Fasi has been one of the most outspoken critics, saying Japanese real estate investments have driven up housing costs.

Japanese investors bought \$4.4 billion worth of Hawaii properties in 1989, according to the national accounting firm of Kenneth Leventhal & Co.







#### Scott Paper Co. to locate plant in Midwest area near Ohio River

PHILADELPHIA, Pa. — Scott Paper Company today announced that it is planning to locate its proposed state-of-the-art U.S. tissue paper mill in the Midwest and is currently optioning land near the Ohio River in Indiana and Kentucky.

Last November, the Scott Board of Directors approved steps which would lead to tissue capacity expansion in support of the Company's consumer and commercial tissue businesses in the United States. At present Scott does not have the capacity to meet its current demand and sustain the rate of growth in its U.S. tissue business. As part of that expansion, the Board authorized the selection of a site and for the eventual construction of a new papermaking and converting facility. The Board of Directors must still approve the final configuration and funding for the new mill.

According to Philip E. Lippincott, Scott's chairman and chief executive officer, a large part of the new mill's pulp will come from recycled waste paper. The Company will also utilize virgin pulp shipped to the site from other Icoations. No pulp mill is planned for

"Although Scott currently uses about 20 percent recycled fiber in its tissue products worldwide, the use of additional recycled paper at our new mill will be an important step in our plans to increase our use of this fiber," said Mr.

Lippincott. He also indicated that the Company has acquired or is seeking options for three possible sites for the new mill. One site is located near Charlestown, Indiana, which is across the Ohio River from Louisville, Kentucky, and another site is in Posey County, Indiana, near Evansville, Indiana. In Kentucky, the Company has options on

a site near Owensboro. According to Mr. Lippincott, the final site selection, which is expected to take place within a year, will be based on a set of criteria which includes site characteristics, access to transportation. gaining environmental and building permits on a timely basis, community acceptance and support, obtaining favorable utility contracts, and economic incentives available from

lcoal and state governments. Scott indicated that the mill, like most U.S. papermaking and converting mills, is expected to cost more than \$200 million.

We are more often frightened than hurt: our troubles spring more often from fancy than reality.

The most pathetic of bridge players is the Unlucky Expert. Knowing more than most about the game, he is continuously on the lookout for safety plays. In today's example, he times the play masterfully to make his game when West holds all four trumps. In the process, he goes down when trumps prove to be 3-1.

West cashes the heart king and shifts to the spade deuce, a card that looks suspiciously like a singleton.

"If he's short in spades, he might well be long in trumps," thinks our U.E. So he embarks on a plan that will succeed when West has 1-6-2-4

Imagine for the moment that the U.E.'s picture is accurate. He wins dummy's spade ace, leads a diamond back to his queen and ruffs a heart. He gets back to his hand with the diamond ace and finesses trumps. Dummy's jack wins, the club king is cashed, and dummy's spade king is played while the U.E. discards his last heart. West ruffs but is stuck. The U.E. wins the next trick, draws the last trump and

What happens on the way to this huge success? East wins the trump finesse and leads a spade. There is no way to avoid a second club loser, and in tilting against a hostile windmill, Don U.E. goes down in a game in which most would score an

### Black steals the show at the 25th Annual Academy of Country Music Awards show

LOS ANGELES — Clint Black, an ex-ironworker who has been writing songs for 13 years, won album and single of the year to kick off the 25th Academy of

Country Music awards celebration. Hank Williams Jr.'s weepy saloon duet with his late father, 'There's a Tear in My Beer,' won best video, and Williams read a sentimental letter to his legendary father, Hank Williams Sr., who died in 1953.

"Dear Daddy: We finally got to sing together, and you left me such a big hit. ... There's another place you'll always be and that's right here in all our hearts," Williams read in accepting the award at the Pantages Theater.

An old demo tape of "There's a Tear in my Beer" was found in the attic of songwriter "Big Bill" Lister. Hank Williams Jr. used modern technology to record it as a duet with his father and to appear with his father in the video.

Black, 28, won the album trophy for "Killin' Time," his first album, and the single honor for

"Better Man," the first song he ever wrote. The song details the end of an affair that had left him

the better man in the title. "I told 'em I already won. I don't know what to say," Black said onstage in accepting album of the year, "I hope I don't get used to the terror that goes along with

Black had a half-dozen nominations in all. Williams Jr. also had six nominations.

The Judds, the mother-daughter singing duo, won best vocal duet trophy for the sixth consecutive

"You see, there really are guardian angels," said Naomi Judd, with daughter Wynona Judd beaming nearby.

Randy Travis, George Strait, Dolly Parton and the group Alabama joined Williams as top entertainer nominees.

Grammy-winning singer Rodney Crowell had five nominations and Alabama, Travis and Miss Parton had three apiece. Strait, Kathy Mattea, Reba McEntire, Garth Brooks and the group Shenandoah had two

The academy's 2,500 members voted for the winners except for the video of the year award, which is decided by a vote of the academy's board of directors.

### There is no doubt: it's a new day for state schools

### **AGREE** OR NOT

If there ever were any question about the long-range commitment to better education for Kentucky children of the men and women who studied long hours, schooled themselves in the arcana of education, developed an entirely new school system for Kentucky and devoted a goodly portion of \$1.3 billion of higher taxes to support it, that question was answered last week. These people are serious. Deadly serious.

Within hours of signing the school reform and tax-increase bill, Gov. Wallace Wilkinson and most of the members of the Task Force on Education Reform spent two hours with a room full of news reporters and editors from across the state, briefing them on the details of what they had created. It was the first of what is planned to be a series of similar briefings in all areas of the state, perhaps including two in each of the seven congressional districts.

Anyone even remotely involved in the public schools - parents, admininstrators, bus drivers and custodians - ought to attend. You don't have to want to understand the intricacies of the new schoolfinance system - hardly anyone understood the old Minimum Foundation Program, either - or aspire to sit on a schoolmanagement council, but you ought to see exactly how determined these people are that the new system works.

Sen. Mike Moloney, D-Lexington, co-chairman of the Task Force finance committee, waved a news clipping about a recent meeting in which an unnamed school administrator suggested that a school principal could get high cash bonuses for teachers under the reform plan by recommending that students deliberately miss half the questions on initial state tests. That

kind of attitude, Moloney rumbled, is what was wrong with the old school system and people like that

Rep. Kenny Rapier, D-Bardstown, co-chairman of the Task Force of governance committee, was even more fervent in his comments. His experience with the organized opposition by school boards to the plan's restrictions on nepotism by board members made him wonder whether the best course wouldn't have been to eliminate local boards altogether and replace them with regional school

Rapier also said there was sentiment among some committee members to demonstrate immediately their firm resolve to improve the state's worst schools.

"Maybe we ought to just go down through there and pick out maybe the 10 worst schools and take them over just to show this is really going to be a forceful thing,"

Someone asked why local boards couldn't simply rig the membership of screenig committees created to recommend hiring new superintendents so a "good ol' boy" would get the job rather than someone better qualified. The answer was quick and stern: They can try, but someone will tell on them and they'll be in big-time trouble.

What about all this new state money the worst-financed school systems will be getting soon? What's to prevent them just throwing it away? Again, they can try, but bells will ring in the General Assembly's own Office of Education Accountability set up to monitor the education system and they, too, will be in trouble.

There also was much talk about patience. The effectiveness of the reform measures won't be notecable for several years, and educators, parents and future legislators must be willing to let the new system work overtime. But the governor and Task Force members left no doubt that it's a new day in Kentucky schools. Anyone who doesn't like it, tough luck.

## Goin' east to the Grand Canyon

Not sure if you want to pack the family into the car and drive west to Arizona to see the Grand Canyon? Do the next best thing and go east. Head to Louisville and the Museum of History and Science where you can see the spectacular IMAX film, "Grand Canyon."

Once you settle yourself into your seat, you notice the huge white screen — four stories high. It's not until a few minutes later, when the house lights go down, that the screen becomes a window to adventure. An introduction explains that IMAX was designed so the viewer can "experience" whatever image is being projected. Intensifying the experience is a sound system that literally seems to wrap itself around the audience.

The narrator cautions us that what we will see is not real, though sometimes we may forget this is only a film. If we suddenly feel as if we are drowning in a maelstrom of the Colorado River, the soothing voice tells us just to close our eyes.

The film begins with a pictorial symphony of nature — sky, sheer cliffs of rock, the fury of white water. Abruptly, we plunge toward the water and I find myself skimming along the surface of the Coloardo River. I am already gripping the sides of my chair as if it were a

The word spectacular doesn't nearly describe the raw beauty of the river and the sheer power of the rocks. Surrounded by sound and pulled into the sweep of scenery, I feel as if I am flying, unwillingly, through the canyon. This is not the

cushioned self-propulsion of dreams; it's more like being held aloft in the talons of a huge, swift bird. We coast close to cliffs and then plummet into the abyss. I gasp aloud when we hit white water.

The water is only one phenomenon of the Grand Canyon. The way the light cuts through the rocks, casting huge purple shadows is another wondrous sight. And there are the animals — huge, hariy spiders; ladybugs as shiny as new shoes; a gila monster that looks like an elegant, beaded evening bag; a rattler, coiled and sinister.

The audience gets to fly with an eagle, soaring on the edge of time above the splendor of the Grand Canyon. The scene is so magnificent, it almost hurts to see it. The mountain peaks are a million

In our trip, I begin to see that the Grand Canyon has no need for people, but people need it. Such a journey is a reminder of my own mortality. I don't think anyone can witness the Grand Canyon — even on film — without sensing the presence of the divine and the infinite.

When the lights go up at the end, I'm amazed that I survived the rugged trip. The journey was so realistic that I was tempted to check myself for bruises and broken bones.

The former first lady established





Not everyone will understand that a "pre-addressed envelope" means "an envelope addressed to yourself." (Actually, the prefix "pre" means "in front of" or "before.")







### Cystic Fibrosis treatment drug being tested

BOSTON (AP) — Doctors reported development of the first treatment to reduce the lungclogging secretions that make cystic fibrosis a major killer. Preliminary tests on adults found

that a commonly used blood pressure medicine, given in aerosol form, significantly slowed lung damage in victims, according to the report in the New England Journal of Medicine.

"If it proves safe and effective in a large number of patients, our real fantasy is that we could give it to children at an early age when their lungs are not damaged, and it could be used as a preventative therapy for a long time," said Dr. Michael R. Knowles, who developed the treatment.

Cystic fibrosis results from a genetic defect. Victims' lungs produce thick mucous that interferes with breathing and harbors bacteria. Chronic infections damage the lungs and eventually cause death. Only about half of all victims live to their mid-20s. The new approach, if it works as doctors hope, "could increase life exponentially," said Dr. Robert Beall,

Fibrosis Foundation. "We feel that if we can change the environment of the lung so that we don't give bacteria a good place to live, we might add decades to these kids' lives," he said.

The treatment is an inhaled form of a medicine called amiloride. The drug, known as a diuretic, is ordinarily given as pills to treat high blood pressure, congestive heart failure and fluid retention associated with kidney disease.

Beall said another study is planned to test the therapy on children. Knowles cautioned that until the results are in, doctors should not routinely use the drug on youngsters, because it might have dangerous side effects.

Cystic fibrosis is the most common lethal, inherited genetic defect among whites in the United States. One of every 2,500 people has the disease.

## Reading readiness groups discussed

NEW YORK (AP) — Dividing kindergarten children and first graders into reading readiness groups is insidious, says an education professor at Claremont Gradu-

ate School in California. In "Learning to Read: the Quest for Meaning'' (Teachers College Press, 1990, \$22.95), Malcolm P. Douglass says reading groups based on supposed ability carry with them "all the odious qualities of

real-world segregation policies." Groupings of kindergarten and first-grade children, Douglass says, are usually based on tests that give an "incomplete report on reading ability or achievement." Yet, teachers and administrators use these tests in a mistaken belief that children learn best when they learn ings can be seen in junior high


with others of the same ability. Some teachers even designate groups with names such as "bluebirds," "yellowbirds," and "crows," Douglass says. "Even small children know that everyone would rather be a bluebird than a crow," he says.

In reality, Douglass says, with young children just learning to read, differences in ability are slight and "human variation is so great it is not possible to form a truly "homogenous' group on any

Yet, he says, once these groups are formed, they are likely to label students in a way that will last beyond their elementary school years. He says the effects of such groupschool, high school and even later. Studies have shown that when a child moves from one group to another, he generally is shifted to one of lower expectations, not

"Early on in the child's school experience, then, we see a system that assigns each boy and girl to an instructional group that carries with it either the sweet smell of success or the sour one of failure," Dou-

"From the beginning, each youngster is assigned a status, an implied sense of worth, one that, because of its relative permanance of the groupings thus formed, will be reinforced as years go by.



## Calloway schools work for the handicapped

The Calloway County School District operates for the mentally handicapped. These programs are broken down into those for the educable mentally handicapped — (EMH) those for the trainable mentally handicapped, (TMH) and those for the severely handicapped.

Nancy Lovett, Assistant Superintendent for curriculum and Project Special Child Coordinator, said that students in the EMH program are slower in academic skills. "They are not able to learn as quickly and they tend to forget and need much repetition to learn." EMH programs are in operation at all three elementary schools, and the middle and high schools.

"We work on academic skills," she said. "But we also work on prevocational and functional life skills."

Fannie Buchanan, who teaches at Calloway County High School, said that the program addresses dents, but the classes are written

(Editor's Note: This is the third basic areas of life skills so that the students can live independently. "We have classes in career education and vocational classes" she said, "and a federally funded work program." The work program allows the students to become involved with employment prior to

> Lovett said it is important to remember that "educable mentally handicapped" is just a school label and that after graduation, the students are no different from anyone else. "Since these students usually have the lower-paying jobs," Lovett said, "we work on skills like budgeting time and money." Buchanan said that the courses the students take are designed for practical application. In the math skills area, we work on counting money, and they learn how to write checks and manage a checking account," she said, "We also work on shopping, figuring sales tax and basic addition and subtraction."

> Lovett said the EMH students follow a functional curriculum that allows them to graduate. "They take the same courses as other stu

differently, emphasizing applied functional skills," she said.

The Trainable Mentally Handicapped Program is not geared academically. These students need to learn self-help skills, danger words, manners and some employment skills. Lovett said these students will always need someone to help them, but can become semiindependent, and sometimes join sheltered workshops as adults.

The TMH program in Calloway County is a cooperative effort between the city and county schools systems. Elementary school-age students attend class at East Elementary in Reed Rushing's Classroom, the middle school-age students and older attend Susan Fisher's class at the Murray Voca-

Rushing said his class tries to "go to where the kids are," by testing them and then instructing them to function in their environment as best as possible.

Rushing said his students are at various levels of achievement, and that one or two are learning to read. "The kids learn skills as they learn their environment," he said.

Rushing has the students until they reach age 13, and then they go to the Murray Independent system to complete the program. Unlike the EMH program, the TMH program does not lead to a diploma. Students completing the TMH program receive an attendance certificate.

Rushing said his class works closely with the students' parents. "We do a formal evaluation of the students annually," he said, "and we are constantly upgrading programs to meet the students' needs. We call on the parents and tell them where their child stands, and what we think we should do, and then we talk about what they think

The emphasis of the Project Special Child program is to locate and help handicapped children. If you know a child who is handicapped and not receiving the help he/she needs, please contact Nancy Lovett at the Calloway County Board of Education office at 753-3033.

It is estimated that an average household throws away 15 pounds of hazardous waste a year. I know, you're saying, "Me? Hazardous waste?" Do yourself and those you love a favor. Walk into your garage and look around. You'll see paints, paint thinners, stains, wood finishes, oil, wood preservatives, pesticides and the list goes on. These items are hazardous and if used or thrown away improperly can cause serious health and environmental damage. We place them in the garbage can and expect the city to take care of our waste and

our growing problem. It is evident that cities across the United States can no longer deal with the huge amount of household waste we generate. As concerned people of the community, it is our hope that you will want to join thousands of Americans across the country who are separating their

Thinners - Buy the smallest container available. Demand from your local store that smaller containers such as half-gallons or pints be sold. Use water with water-based Stains/finishes - Buy the smallest

container. Use latex paint or natural earth pigment finishes. Oil - Contact local gas stations and ask if they will take used oil.

(Many are in a recycling program). Strippers - Buy the smallest container available or share with a neighbor. Use sandpaper, heat gun or water-based strippers.





## program available for 65 or older and disabled residents

If you are age 65 or older, or blind, or disabled with limited income and resources, or if you know someone who is, this column may help. It describes a Federal program administered by Social Security called supplemental security income, or \$\$I for short.

SSI pays monthly checks to people who are aged, blind, or disabled and who have limited income and resources. And being eligible for Medicaid, which can help pay health care expenses.

In 1990, the basic Federal SSI payments is \$386 for an eligible person and \$579 for an eligible couple. Not everyone receives these amounts, however. Some get less because they have other

SSI is not just for adults either. It is for everyone who is disabled or blind with limited income and resources. A person's age — young or old — makes no difference.

People do not need to be completely destitute to receive SSI. For example, they can own the home

#### State Humanities Cabinet awards grant to city. county schools

Murray and Calloway County schools were awarded a grant from the Kentucky Humanities Council during its meeting April 7th.

The next major grant awards will be made in December, 1990, since all funds allocated for this fiscal year were awarded at the April meeting. Deadlines for December grants are Sept. 24, 1990 for preliminary applications and Oct. 29 for final proposal.

insurance policies, burial funds,

and personal or household goods. they live in and Social Security People also have some other income — a Social Security check or job, for example — and still get part of a payment.

In addition, to having limited

income and resources, people who get SSI must reside in the U.S. And, a person must be a U.S. citizen, or a lawfully admitted immigrant, or an alien permanently residing in the U.S. Disabled recipients must accept vocational rehabilitation if offered.

If you think you might be eligible for SSI, it's easy to apply. Just contact either the Paducah Social Security office at 546 Lone Oak



Suzy Boggus is not the run-ofthe-mill country singer. The nasal twang and the bleeding-heart vocal inflection are not present in her voice. The beer-drinkin', wifestealin' lyrics are not in her songs. Suzy who?

She was not born in a shack in Mississippi or raised in a honkytonk in Texas. She is not some country bumpkin who is tied down to the music world's stereotype of a country song.

Suzy Boggus, chosen top new female vocalist last year, was born in Aledo, Ill. She has a bachelor of arts degree in metalsmithery from Illinois State University. She is a smart, talented and witty singer who has roots in folk, rock and swing music, which is evident in her music.

Suzy will prove all the above when she opens for the Statler Brothers Saturday night at 7:30 p.m. in the Marshall County High School gym.

Her first album, "Somewhere Between" (released last March), has such a variety of music styles in it, it is almost a misnomer to call it a country album.

Sure, it has Suzy doing Merle Haggard's "Somewhere Between" (Merle never sounded so good) and Hank Williams Sr.'s "My Sweet Love Ain't Around," but it also has a jazzy, swing tune, "Handyman's Dream," a couple of yodeler's cheek. delights, Patsy Montana's "I Want to Be a Cowboy's Sweetheart" and "Night Rider's Lament," and a few ballads that could make the crossover into pop music with ease. One of the best and most surprising things about Suzy is her beautiful, clear voice.

Chet Atkins said it best about Ronstadt."

her: "I don't like hot dogs and I don't like people who say there are too many guitar players in the world, and I especially don't llike singers who sneak up on their

"But I like Suzy Boggus...she is always in the tone center, her voice sparkles like crystal water, and she ain't all that bad looking boys and girls — she's only one of the best."

Randy Travis and Clint Black may be country music stars, but you wouldn't want them to sing at your wedding. Suzy has a pure voice that took years to develop.

"My mother was real heavy into the church choir so music was real important to me from an early age," she said. "At age 5, I had my first choir solo. I also had a good school choir and a choir director who taught me to enunciate."

This clarity is even evident in the music she listens to. "The styles I like to listen to are folky country rock. They have a cleaner sound," she said. "Mom was a fanatic of Big Band Era music. That has a clean sound and was a big influence on me.'

With such a voice, where did the yodeling come from?

"It was a goofy thing," she said. "I was working out in Montana where yodeling is big. I was listening to some tapes of it out there and decided to challenge myself. So I learned how to do it and put it on my album. It's sort of tongue in

She's got a sense of humor, but she is serious about her music. She learned to play the acoustic guitar as a teenager and immediately hit the local clubs. "I needed simple arrangements that I could play in the clubs. That led me to James Taylor, Emmilou Harris and Linda

After several years playing nightclubs and coffeehouses, she got her first real break at the Dollywood theme park in Pigeon Forge, Tenn. Capitol Records saw her peform on stage and snatched her

Suzy is currently finishing up her second album due to be released in June.

"In some ways I think I am more focused on this album," she said. "I spent more time with my producer Wendy Waldman to find out what about my music is different and

"I feel really good about it," she said. "It's taken a long time to put it together, but I picked out some songs that I love to sing."

And with a voice like hers, Suzy needs to keep on singing.

Bob Valentine, who also directed the play, does his usual good job as Asher, both a serious and a comic role. Ginger's confrontation with him is, to me, the highlight of the

In Bill Phillip's "Life Line." Vivien Davis from Paducah's Market House Theatre brings a woman to life through a series of telephone conversations taking place over a period of many years. We learn about her life, her problems and heartaches while listening to her talk to her father, mother, son and others.

Phillips manages to keep the dramatic tension going right up to the end, even teasing us a little then. Director April Cochran and Ms. Davis have created a moving portrait.

"The New Ivanhoe" by Mayfield's Don Johnson is a short but very funny play. It's about a middle-aged man named Henry who decides that it's time for him to get a pickup truck and a gun rack and go hunting with the boys, even though he hates hunting. And he wants to be called "Hank."

He also decides it's time for him to get a new friend, a beerdrinking, crude-talking neighbor he has always considered a "redneck, heathen barbarian." How Hank and his wife, Mary, deal with their new friends Joe and his wife, Margaret (no mental giant herself), is very amusing to witness.

Hats off to Mike and Pat Reed and Charlie and Sharon Logsdon of the Purchase Players and their director Ann Mills for well-done comic performances.

The next piece, 12-year-old Tracy Pervine's six-minute "Monologue," is a haunting piece spoken by a young girl sitting in a pool of eerie green light. The ending will surprise you as will the quality of Miss Pervine's prose.

The performance of Valerie Chapman in this Murray High School production was wonderful. Also credit her director Gene Cook for his role in this riveting bit of

For out and out fun with no need to search for deeper meaning, I recommend the Murray State University Theater production of "The Churning Skies" by Ruth Perkins. It transports us to the studios of

drama. The audience becomes the studio audience and is taught by the director to laugh, gasp, chatter and applaud on cue during the "broadcast."

We also find out about the very large egos of the actors as they struggle through a show with one of them acting as a fill-in sound man doing live sound effects. Director and co-star Gene Biby has handled the farcical nature of "The Churning Skies" without letting it get out of hand. A nice job by the entire cast.

'The First Human Impalement Act in These Here Parts" by Bobbie McAdoo Greer featured the largest cast (14) and the most props and set pieces of any of the festival plays. It takes place in Willowdean Bingham's antique store, tanning and beauty parlor in Stateline, Ky. You may be reminded of "Steel Magnolias" as character after character hilariously reveal various aspects of life in these here parts.

Greer did an excellent job of directing this large ensemble, all of whom gave fine performances. Especially noteworthy were Sara Hart and Pete Lancaster as Willowdean and her husband, Jenny Thomas as "the reigning Catfish Queen" with the tallest hairdo I've ever seen and Lynn Paulk and Andy Vaughan as a young pregnant couple (he wore an "empathy belly") who are trying to get in touch with their feelings.

Those who read Constance Alexander's columns or hear her radio commentaries already know some things about her life as a high school student in Metuchen, N.J. With the aid of a very talented Bellermine College cast and director and a lot of '60s music, her clever and insightful observations about life among the high school set were brought to life in "64 Blue Let-

If you went to high school, you know most of the people not always kindly portrayed in the play's short monologues and vignettes.

Seeing all seven productions in three days was almost overwhelming. It's rare to get the opportunity anywhere to see such theatrical variety and quality in so short a

The festival continues this weekend with productions of "Monologue," "The Churning Skies" and "The First Human Impalement Act" on Friday at 8 p.m.; "The Pouting House" on Saturday at 8 p.m.; and "Life Line" and "The New Ivanhoe" on Sunday at 2 p.m. For reservations call the Playhouse in the Park at 759-1752.

## The art of pitching

#### Ryan is one of the masters

NEW YORK — If the chance comes up this season, make sure to catch Nolan Ryan's victory tour as he hits the road to 300 career wins.

Watching Nolan Ryan pitch a baseball game is like going to a museum to see a Van Gogh, or to the concert hall to hear a Mozart symphony.

First, Ryan catches your senses and then your breath. When Ryan is on the mound, history is right there with him. He has pitched in four decades, and each of his 42 majorleague records seem to have a story to tell.

The 43-year-old Ryan has pitched a record five no-hitters, yet none may have been his best game. "I still think one of the best games I ever pitched was against Boston," Ryan said. "I retired the last 26 hitters in a

"I led the game off with a walk, struck somebody out, and then Carl Yastrzemski hit a ground ball through the hole between short and third.

Ryan drops names like Yastrzemski, Reggie Jackson, Hank Aaron and Willie Mays like friends trying to get together a

pickup game in Central Park. He has struck out 44 MVP winners and 19 Hall of Famers

Ryan has also fanned Bobby and Barry Bonds and Ken Griffey and Ken Jr. He also struck out brothers Jesus, Felipe and

Ryan's marquee numbers are easy. He is the all-time strikeout leader with 5,084 and nine wins short of the magic 300 mark. Next on the strikeout list is Steve Carlton with 4,136.

To put it in perspective, for a pitcher starting out to reach Ryan's totals he would have to average 20 wins and 339 strikeouts for 15 seasons.

Like Van Gogh and Mozart, Ryan had flaws in his youth,

The word of Ryan's 99-mph heat hit in 1966 when he struck out 272 batters in 183 innings while going 17-2 for Greenville, a New York Mets farm club.

But he couldn't find his control with the Mets, walking 344 in 510 innings over parts of five seasons, and kept putting his blistered fingers in pickle brine. But Ryan did save a game in the 1969 World Series against Baltimore, his only championship

The Mets traded him to California in 1971 along with three minor leaguers for infielder Jim Fregosi, and Ryan started his journey to Cooperstown while Fregosi prepared for his

Despite his many records, Ryan's critics, only until recently, said he was just a .500 pitcher (291-263).

"I think it's the nature of the teams I've played on," Ryan aid. "Of all the clubs I've been with this club has the offen sive potential to be the best team I've ever played on.'

After eight seasons and four no-hitters in California, Ryan spent nine years in Houston before signing as a free agent with the Texas Rangers last year.

At 42, Ryan was 16-10 with a major-league high 301 strikeouts in 1989. Five times he carried a no-hitter into the eighth inning. Five times it didn't seem possible, either.

On opening day in Texas last week, Ryan pitched five no-hit innings against Toronto and right-hander Todd Stottlemyre. When Ryan broke into the majors in 1966, Todd's dad, Mel Stottlemyre, was pitching for the New York Yankees. It's just another story on Ryan's road to 300.

#### Collins is young as he feels

ST. LOUIS — Dave Collins is old enough to think about the senior leagues and young enough to think it can wait a while.

"Somewhere down the road I guess it's a possibility, but I still have my skills," said the 37-year-old Collins, a utility player with the St. Louis Cardinals, his eighth major-league team in 13 seasons. Someday he might fit right in with, say, the St. Petersburg

Pelicans or the St. Lucie Legends. For now, the dream lives. A lot of baseball blasts from the past made ends meet playing baseball in Florida last winter. The Senior Professional Baseball Association played a 72-game season from Nov. 1 to Jan. 31 and was home to the likes of Milt Wilcox (a leagueleading 12 victories), Willie Aikens (17 home runs) and former Kansas City Royals farmhand Tim Ireland (.374 batting average). Guys who used to play against Collins. "I think there were a few there younger than me," he said.

Collins, in fact, nearly played for the Fort Myers Sun Sox, but only to help fine-tune his skills after getting only 106 atbats with Cincinnati last year. Problems with his calf muscle prevented that option, along with a plan to play in 1 to Rico, so Collins bided his time until spring training.

"You can't take anything for granted in this game, I've learned that," Collins said. "But I feel I can still play or I wouldn't have come to training camp."

Collins' standing may be in jeopardy when major-league teams go back to 24- or 25-man rosters on May 1, but he knew when he signed a minor-league contract with St. Louis in February that there were no guarantees. Another chance was all he asked for, and he's getting it.

Collins couldn't wait for a fresh start after three spotty seasons with the Cincinnati Reds, during which time he seemed to age quickly. He averaged 30 hits a season during that period and was deemed so expendable that the Reds released him last June 23, then re-signed him a little more than a month later.

The Reds released him for good Nov. 11. "It was a little bit disheartening," Collins said. "But I tried not to worry about it because I can't control it."

The Cardinals were interested in Collins, a switch-hitter, to provide right-handed hitting off the bench. He's only 2-for-8 in 14 games with St. Louis, but he's been valuable as a lateinning defensive replacement for Pedro Guerrero.

Collins, who has two stolen bases, also wants to get involved in the Cardinals' running game. He's only 10 stolen bases shy of 400 for his career. He's not your typical extra man, with several big years in his

In his best season, 1984, Collins hit .308 and stole 60 bases with the Toronto Blue Jays. He stole 79 bases in 1980, hit .303 in 551 at-bats with the Reds in 1981, and had a .318 average for Cincinnati's 1979 Western Division champions.

#### Luck changes for Caps; Bruins lose

LANDOVER, Md. (AP) — Considering all the misery the Washington Capitals have endured in the NHL playoffs, maybe it's simply time for their luck to change.

That's the way it looks so far in their series with the New York Rangers, where they're one game away from winning the Patrick Division playoff title for the first time after seven previous failures.

Meanwhile, in Montreal, Canadiens co-captain Guy Carbonneau's prediction came true. When Montreal coach Pat Burns announced that rookie center Stephan Lebeau would dress for his first NHL playoff game, Carbonneau prophesied

"I'll bet he scores a goal. He always scores when he comes back into the lineup," said Carbonneau, who turned out to be right on

So, too, was Lebeau, who scored twice as Montreal, averting a sweep in the Adams Division final, beat the Boston Bruins 4-1 Wednesday night.

While Lebeau led Montreal, Rod Langway, a veteran defenseman who endured most of Washington's other playoff disappointments, led the way Wednesday night with an overtime goal that put the Caps on the brink of the third round with a 4-3 victory over the Rangers.

Langway's first goal in 14 months, 34 seconds into overtime on a shot he was merely trying to put near the goal, gave Washington a 3-1 lead in the best-of-7 Patrick finals which resume with Game 5 on Friday night at New York's Madison Square Garden.

Until Langway scored his gamewinner, the contest was typical of Washington's agonizing playoff past. The Capitals, on the brink of victory, let the Rangers back into the game by blowing a 3-1 lead in the final 4:03 of regulation.

OVERLAND PARK, Kan. - The NCAA Division I Steering Committee turned down a request by the University of Maryland to hear a guick appeal of the school's basketball probation. The announcement came after the spring meeting of the 46-member NCAA Council. The Steering Committee is made up of council members. NCAA president Albert M. Witte said there was no precedent for an expedited appeal. He said Maryland's case would be heard at the Council's summer meeting in August in Monterey, Calif. Maryland's athletic department had asked for a special meeting before the committee in May because the university said waiting until the next meeting in August would do "irreparable harm" to the school.

The NCAA ruled in February that Maryland had committed recruiting violations from 1985 through 1988 and cited the program for a lack of institutional control under former basketball coach Bob Wade.

BAKERSFIELD, Calif. — National League umpire Bob Engel, accused of stealing 4,180 baseball cards last weekend, has been placed on a leave of absence. Bill White, president of the NL, said Engel was given the leave "so that he can direct his energy toward the charges that have been leveled against him." Engel will be arraigned in Bakersfield Municipal Court on May 2. He hasn't commented on the charges, but agreed to the leave, according to a statement issued by the NL.

#### Track and field

INDIANAPOLIS — Larry Myricks, the second-ranked long jumper in the world, has been suspended for three months after testing positive for a stimulant commonly found in an ever the counter cold mediantics. The Athletica Commonly found in an over-the-counter cold medication. The Athletics Congress, governing body for track and field in the United States, said that Myricks tested positive for phenylpropanolamine at the U.S. indoor championships in New York on Feb. 23. If the mandatory appeal is ignored, Myricks would be ineligible for national or international competition until July 13.

DES MOINES, Iowa — Kip Janvrin won his fourth straight Drake Relays decathlon with a record 8,025 points. He finished in the top three in each event to finish 205 ahead of Jay Thorson. Cathy Tyree broke her own Drake record in winning the heptathlon for the third time. She scored 5,631 points in the seven events, breaking the record of 5,461 she set in 1987.

PHILADELPHIA - Steve Theobald of Rutgers won three of the five events to capture the Penn Relays decathlon with 7,090 points. Kevin Luthy of Case Western Reserve University was second with 6,942. DeDe Nathan of Indiana won the heptathlon with 5,461 points, 229 more than Marian Knijn of Boston University.

PORTLAND, Ore. - The NBA has filed a second lawsuit against the Oregon Lottery, alleging that its new scratch-off ticket game is based on the league's championship series. The lawsuit, filed late Tuesday in U.S. District Court, claims the "Basketball Championship Pool" game infringes on the NBA's trademarks, creates confusion for its fans and unjustly enriches the Oregon Lottery. The Basketball Championship Pool game is half of a two-game ticket that costs \$5 and has been on sale since Monday. The other half of the ticket contains an instant-winner game with a generic basketball theme, which was not contested by the NBA. . . .

NEW YORK — Akeem Olajuwon of the Houston Rockets, who averaged 27.1 points and 13.5 rebounds in 11 games, was named NBA player of the month for April He also averaged four blocked shots and two steals, helping the Rockets earn the final Western Conference berth in the playoffs.
